The Council Members present their report and accounts for the year ended 31 December 2013

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the charity's Articles of Association, the Companies Act 2006 and the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005

Structure, governance and management

The Church of England Soldiers', Sailors' and Airmen's Clubs (short title CESSAC) is a Registered Charity (No 226684) and a Company limited by Guarantee and not having share capital, registered in England (No 00034118) It is VAT-registered (No 675 8276 83), does not trade for profit and is exempt from Corporation Tax Its directors under company law are its trustees for the purpose of charity legislation and are referred to collectively as the Council throughout this report. None of the Council has any beneficial interest in the company Each member of the charity guarantees to contribute £1 in the event of a winding up. Its Memorandum and Articles of Association govern the charitable company, including the appointment and reappointment of its members of Council

CESSAC is governed by its Council, which has hitherto met twice a year, but will henceforward meet four times The Council is supported by the Welfare Amenities Committee (WAC), which oversees the performance of the centres and makes recommendations about their continuance or the opening of new ones. The Council and WAC are assisted in their responsibilities by the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) who manages the operations and personnel

Advertisements are made to attract potential members/trustees, whose applications are then considered by the Council Those selected as members are eligible to sit on committees and vote at general meetings Potential trustees are invited to an informal meeting with the Chairman and Vice Chairman. This is followed by a brief from the CEO and an invitation to attend the next Council meeting as an observer. A formal invitation to join the Council will follow if both parties agree, followed by induction conducted by the CEO. New trustees are co-opted until election is considered at the next AGM. Training is offered regularly and the Council reviews Governance magazine and other material to keep up to date

Objectives and activities

The Church of England Soldiers', Sailors' and Airmen's Clubs (CESSAC) originated in Aldershot in 1857 to provide an alcohol-free, non-proselytising home-from-home for soldiers. Its founding precept (circa 1881) included its intention. "to provide for the Nation's soldiers, places where they can resort and find rest and healthy recreation and where they can associate on terms of friendly intercourse." The success of the original facility resulted in many others being opened over the years (and many closing again to match changing demand). Apart from the fact that the charity's reach has extended to cover sailors and then airmen, that precept remains as true today CESSAC's principal aims are still, therefore, the operation of 'home-from-home' amenity centres in military bases in support of the Armed Forces and the promotion of the latter's efficiency

Other aims were added in the 1970s, to relieve persons who have served in H M. Forces and the dependants of such persons as are in need of assistance including the provision and management of housing. The Council Members have paid due regard to public benefit and other guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the charity should undertake

CESSAC is a founder member (1939) of the Council for Voluntary Welfare Work (CVWW), which enables it to operate in Armed Forces establishments at home and abroad under a charter with the Ministry of Defence (MoD). It is also a member of Cobseo, the confederation of service charities CESSAC shares a common root with the Aldershot Church of England Services Trust, and three of the former's members are appointed as trustees for the latter.

CESSAC shares its Head Office and some staff with CESSA Housing Association, a separate charitable organisation that owns and operates sheltered housing for elderly ex-services people, their spouses, widows, widowers and immediate relatives. Both organisations have their own Boards and operate independently, the latter accountable to the Homes and Communities Agency and Financial Conduct Authority. Additionally, CESSAC has a long-standing contract with Greenwich Hospital, a Crown Royal Navy Charity, to manage the latter's sheltered housing. In a fine example of collaborative working to reduce costs for all three organisations, the relevant employee costs and overheads are shared proportionately.

An early objective for 2013 was to undertake the assessment of the trial opening of a CESSAC centre in Mount Pleasant Complex in the Falklands. This was successfully completed in January, and agreement reached with the Commander British Forces South Atlantic Islands in March. This therefore confirmed that CESSAC would continue to operate at least seven centres, following the sad closure at Larkhill in December 2012. Another main objective for the year was to consider whether the Armed Forces' decisions on future basing would offer any opportunities for, or threats to, the charity's operations. The announcements in March did not indicate any threats, but nor did they reveal any immediate opportunities, the potential for which will only become apparent once more information is available. Vice Admiral David Steel CBE was successfully recruited as the new President towards the end of the year, the position having been vacant since mid 2012.

STRATEGIC REPORT

In accordance with the Companies Act 2006 the Council's strategic report for the financial year ended 31 December 2013 is set out below

Achievements and performance

Funding sources

The Charter between MoD and CVWW recognises that the operation of centres is enabled by the trading within the homes-from-home and bookshops provided. The income/expenditure is therefore one indicator of whether the centres are being used by the beneficiaries and hence meeting their welfare needs. However, there are many factors outside the charity's control, particularly changes in the number of service personnel present in any location, and just because a centre operates at a loss does not mean it is not needed.

For this reason, the current and anticipated use of each centre is constantly reviewed against the perceived benefit being provided in an attempt to best match the running costs across all of them with the likely income overall. Thus a loss-making centre perceived to be meeting a particular welfare need can be supported financially by surpluses generated elsewhere. The current aim is that CESSAC's proportion of Head Office costs are funded by investment and other income, while major improvements/repairs are paid for by the growth of the investments. For several years, the trading income has been insufficient to cover the running costs of the centres, which have therefore needed to draw some support from the reserves.

General

One of the most significant achievements of this year, and plans for 2014, results from an unexpected turn of events. Another longstanding member of the Council for Voluntary Welfare Work, Salvation Army Red Shield Defence. Services, announced mid-year that it would be withdrawing from several Armed Forces establishments between July 2013 and March 2014. Seizing the opportunity, CEO approached all the affected bases. Most expressed interest in CESSAC taking over the facilities, so they were then visited by the General Manager to assess the viability of starting to operate there. Following the recommendations of CEO and the General Manager, the Council approved the work to re-invigorate the coffee shop in Worthy Down Camp and to continue negotiations with the others. 'Alfies' opened to acclaim at Worthy Down on 7 October and is providing a welcome service, particularly in the evening for the trainees of the various colleges there. Another unplanned development was the resignation of the Head Office Manager early in the year. Fortunately an excellent replacement was found promptly and has since helped drive down office overheads as well as instituting more rigorous financial controls.

UK and other Centres

These are straightforward coffee shops or cafes providing homes-from-home for service personnel and their families, often adjacent to recreational facilities and/or the chaplaincy Accordingly, each has a relatively modest turnover, with Blandford's £82,000 dwarfing Lossiemouth's £14,000, but now exceeded by the new centre in the Falklands' £93,000. It is too early to draw firm conclusions about Worthy Down Blandford's turnover has dropped in 2013, following the loss of many buffets, and hence dipped into deficit, while Lossiemouth's turnover is considerably higher thanks to new management there. Fortunately, the Oasis in the Falklands has generated a surplus that has compensated for the other three.

Cyprus Centres

Unlike the other centres, all four of CESSAC's locations in Cyprus include bookshops as part of the homes-from-home concept, selling a permitted variety of often UK-sourced goods difficult to otherwise obtain. It has been reported previously that the turnover in the shops is being reduced by the rise of internet shopping. The effects of this are being monitored carefully, because it is more difficult to justify running any shop at a loss than a cafe. The Cypriot banking crisis early in the year was an unwelcome surprise, but the centres weathered the immediate storm thanks to the hard work and ingenuity of the staff. However, the resulting financial uncertainty has compounded other factors and continued the downward trend in turnover. This reduction has been to the extent that, despite further reductions in overheads, reorganisation and increased gross profit on cost, the centres have not yet returned to surplus as hoped. Nevertheless, all four centres remain well supported by the Command chain and valued by the service personnel and their families, generating £1,567,000 of turnover in 2013.

On the plus side, the planned reductions in stock levels have been achieved and helped fund the losses, so that further cash was not required from Head Office Additionally, with the support of Officer Commanding Episkopi Station, staff from the Western Sovereign Base Areas opened a new seasonal facility at Lemmings Beach in June Although this made a small loss in its foreshortened first year, better is hoped for in 2014

There was very welcome news in the autumn when it was announced that CESSAC's bid for a grant of £35,000 from the MoD's Libor fund, in support of the Armed Forces' Covenant, had been successful. This will go towards overdue repair work at the Dhekelia centre and the first payment was made in December to enable work to start promptly in January (see Note 20).

Housing

To meet its aim with regard to elderly ex-service personnel, CESSAC has provided financial support and donations to CESSA Housing Association since 1974, both directly for the benefit of tenants and also for improvements to buildings. In 2012 the charity loaned the housing association £520,000 at a reduced interest rate that enabled the latter to save money by redeeming its expensive Building loans (taken out when rates were over 10%). This arrangement also provides a better income for the charity than is currently available from its deposit accounts. CESSAC continues to manage 91 sheltered flats at three sites on behalf of Greenwich Hospital for a fee on a three year agreement. This was last renewed in September 2011, but at a meeting in 2013 it was mutually agreed to defer the next review by one year until 2015.

Financial review

Investment policy and performance

CESSAC's reserves are spread between a number of financial institutions (see Note 15). The greater part is in BlackRock Common Investment Funds (Charishare (£1,305,000 & Charinco £235,000) with £867,000 in a Charles Stanley discretionary managed portfolio at medium low risk. The former BlackRock cash instruments had to be moved in 2013, due to changes in the way that firm operates, and have been placed in a Virgin Money Charity Deposit Account at 1 65%. The investment elements have performed well in 2013, gaining £209,550.

Performance of centres and Head Office

There has been a welcome reduction in the net outgoing resources to £68,188, the lowest level since 2009 This is thanks to the hard work of a number of staff. Although it has not yet proved possible to eliminate the losses in Cyprus, they have been reduced again, despite the financial crisis in the country and falling turnover Turnover elsewhere has been increased by two new centres and the revitalisation of Lossiemouth, while costs have been reduced by Head Office. The investment gains have therefore been able to cover the lower operating losses and result in the higher balances at year end. The latter is particularly timely since there will be a number of costs to set up the three new centres planned in 2014, including the associated costs of moving staff to Germany.

Reserves

The reserves policy was reviewed in April 2013 and updated in February 2014 (see Note 21) The loan to CESSA Housing Association is one designated fund while operational reserves have been set at 8 months' of turnover, currently about £1,250,000, to cope with variations in income and allow for the need to maintain cashflow in more than one currency and multiple banks. The rest is available to fund repairs/improvements of the Clubs and/or make donations in furtherance of the charity's aims. However, since the trading income alone has been insufficient to fund centre operations for some years, investment income is required to help offset the losses and enable the charitable output to continue.

Asset cover for funds

Note 22 sets out an analysis of the assets attributable to the various funds. These assets are sufficient to meet the charity's obligations on a fund by fund basis

Plans for the future

Apart from recruiting a new Chairman and members, the immediate plans for 2014 involved completing the repairs at Dhekelia and concluding negotiations with the various authorities to take over the remaining former Salvation Army centres. Agreement over Bovington was achieved first and all the work undertaken to enable 'Matilda's' to open on 18 February. This then left just enough time to put the arrangements in place to open at Detmold in support of British Forces Germany on 11 March. This has been done despite knowing British Forces are scheduled to withdraw from Germany by 2017, and a second centre, at Bielefeld, is expected to open around Easter. Elsewhere, work will continue to attract increased use by beneficiaries and hence reduce or eliminate the operating losses. Abatements of leases will be sought wherever possible and further cooperation pursued with other Cobseo members, including grant applications.

Principal risks and uncertainties

The most significant risks to the charity are failure of one or more of its financial institutions, which is why the investments have been spread as previously described. Alterations in the Armed Forces have regularly caused centres to close over the years, but sometimes present new opportunities. However, the last Defence Review will take some years to be fully implemented and it seems unlikely that any further changes in the medium term would be a threat. While sustained losses in centres such as in Cyprus could result in painful withdrawals, these need not threaten the viability of the charity as a whole. The Council reviews the charity's entire risk register at least annually, and assesses any urgent issues as soon as they are alerted by the staff (such as the banking crisis in Cyprus in 2013). It is satisfied that systems or procedures have been established to manage major risks. A risk-based approach to internal controls has been taken, including directing Members to undertake internal examinations.

Disclosure of information to auditors

Each of the directors has confirmed that there is no information of which they are aware which is relevant to the audit, but of which the auditor is unaware. They have further confirmed that they have taken appropriate steps to identify such relevant information and to establish that the auditors are aware of such information.

Auditors

A quinquennial review of auditors was conducted by the directors in 2013 and a resolution proposing that Jones Avens Limited be reappointed as auditors of the company will be put to the members

1 Accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation

The accounts are prepared under the historical cost convention modified to include the revaluation of certain fixed assets

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005 and the Companies Act 2006

12 Incoming resources

Income from charitable trading activities principally represents retail sales and other income in CESSAC's Services Centre in Cyprus and at CESSAC Centres in the UK and elsewhere with other operating income arising from fees for managing sheltered lettings, owned by other charitable bodies, for ex-members of HM Forces and their spouses

13 Resources expended

Expenditure, which is charged on an accruals basis, is allocated between -

- expenditure incurred directly to the fulfilment of the Charity's objectives (direct charitable)
- expenditure incurred in supporting the charitable activities and in the governance of the charity
- expenditure incurred in funding grants and donations

1.4 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets other than freehold land are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows.

Freehold land is not depreciated

15 Investments

Investments are included at market value. The cost of quoted investments is shown by way of a note investment income received and accrued, including income tax recoverable, is taken to the credit of the income and expenditure account. Net gains and losses arising on revaluations and disposals during the year are included in the statement of financial activities.

1.6 Stock

Stock is valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value

1.7 Pensions

The charity operates a defined contributions pension scheme Contributions are charged in the accounts as they become payable in accordance with the rules of the scheme

1.8 Foreign currency translation

Transactions denominated in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate ruling at the date of the transaction

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rates of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. All differences are included in net outgoing resources

19 Accumulated funds

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the accounts

The reserves policy was reviewed in 2014 and following agreement reserves have been established as follows

- a An operating cost reserve equal to eight months' chantable activity (£1,250,000)
- b A capital fund for future opportunities and investment

A further reserve has been established representing the investment in social housing by way of a long term loan to Church of England Soldiers' Sailors' and Airmen's Housing Association Limited

1 10 Taxation

CESSAC is a registered charity and is not subject to taxation on income. Any income tax recovered on investment income and covenanted subscriptions is included with the respective income.
