### REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS

### FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30TH JUNE, 1984

The directors have pleasure in presenting their report together with the audited accounts for the year ended 30th June, 1984.

#### PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES:

The principal activities of the Group are the manufacture and sale of grocery products and toys. The chemicals division was sold with effect from 31 March 1984.

#### RESULTS AND BUSINESS REVIEW:

Turnover increased by £7,242,000 (7%) during the year, whilst profit on ordinary activities after taxation improved by £990,000 (41%).

Much of the improvement in performance has come from grocery products where profit before interest and taxation more than doubled. This strong performance reflects both the effect of the Company's investment in modern manufacturing facilities which resulted in improved productivity, and the major marketing investments made to support key brands. The improvement in profitability during the last year was attained against the background of continued fierce competition within the food manufacturing industry. The directors expect the level of activity in grocery products to continue to improve in the current year.

In line with the ultimate Parent Company's stated policy, the chemicals business was sold with effect from 31 March 1984 and accordingly the accounts include only 9 months results for this division. The effect of the division's performance on the consolidated results for 1984 and the prior year is given in Note 2.

The rationalisation programme for Fisher Price has now been completed and negotiations are currently under way to dispose of the Northampton site. The directors do not consider that any material gain or loss will arise from the disposal of this property. The benefits resulting from the rationalisation should start to come through in the current financial year.

Fisher Price improved its sales turnover by 4% while profit before interest and taxation declined 18% as a result of lower selective assistance grants. Excluding the effect of selective assistance grants, profits improved by 7%.

No dividend is proposed and consolidated retained earnings of £34,308,000 will be carried forward.

Mr. P.E. Price was appointed under article 92 of the Articles of Association and, being eligible, offers himself for re-election.

Mr. R.S. Thomason was appointed under article 92 of the Articles of Association on 13th September, 1984, and being eligible, offers himself for re-election.

None of the directors had any beneficial shareholdings in the U.K. Group of companies at any time during the year.

# CHARITABLE DONATIONS:

The Group made donations to charitable organisations during the year amounting to £1,767 (1983 = £3,073)

# DISABLED EMPLOYEES:

Applications for employment from registered disabled persons are dealt with on the basis of aptitudes and abilities for the job concerned.

In the event of employees becoming disabled, continuity of employment and training is arranged whenever possible.

It is the policy of the Group that the training, career development and promotion of a disabled person should, as far as possible, be no different from that of any other employee.

#### EMPLOYEE CONSULTATION:

The Company places considerable value on the involvement of its employees and has continued its previous practice of keeping them informed on matters affecting them as employees and on the various factors affecting the performance of the Group. This is achieved through in-house magazines, and briefing meetings involving all employees.

#### AUDITORS:

Messrs. Arthur Andersen & Co. have indicated that they are willing to continue as auditors and, accordingly, a resolution will be proposed to reappoint them at the Annual General Meeting.

# NOTES TO ACCOUNTS -- 30TH JUNE, 1984 AND 1983

# SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

, 1.

Basis of presentation and consolidation The accompanying consolidated accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention and include the accounts of the Company and its six wholly-owned subsidiaries, Sutherlands Foods Limited, Felix Catfood Limited, Felix Pet Foods Limited, Fisher-Price Toys Limited, A & R Scott Limited, and Merchandising and Sales Services Limited. Only the last subsidiary is an operating company.

The effect of all significant intercompany transactions and balances have been eliminated.

No profit and loss account is presented for Quaker Oats Limited, as provided by S149 of the Companies Act 1948.

b) Translation of foreign currencies -Purchases transacted in foreign currencies are recorded in sterling at the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions.

Foreign currency balances at year-end are translated into sterling at the rates ruling at that date. Any resultant gains or losses are reported in the profit and loss account.

- c) Stocks (Note 9) Stocks of grocery products (£7,426,000: 1983 £8,471,000 including chemical products £1,122,000) are stated at the lower of quarterly average cost and net realisable value. Stocks of toys (£6,666,000: 1983 £6,733,000) are stated at the lower of first-in, first-out cost and net realisable value.
- d) Intangible fixed assets -Goodwill represents the excess of the cost of investment in subsidiaries over the net tangible assets at the date of acquisition and is stated at cost less accumulated amortisation.

The Goodwill is being amortised on a straight line basis over twenty years.

e) Investments in subsidiaries Investments in subsidiaries are stated as the Company's equity in the net assets of the subsidiaries, less advances from non-trading subsidiaries.

f) Tangible fixed assets Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost (net of regional development grants) less accumulated depreciation. The Group has provided depreciation to write off the cost of the assets over their estimated useful lives on a straight-line basis at the following annual rates -

Moulds and tooling equipment

- 25%
- 25% to 33.3%

g) Government grants Regional development grants are credited to the cost of the assets
concerned. Accordingly they are amortised to the statement of profit and
loss over the lives of the related assets.

Selective assistance grants are reflected in the profit and loss account when the Company meets the conditions under which the grant was given and when the grant is received.

- h) Turnover Turnover represents the invoiced value of shipments to customers, less returns, allowances and VAT.
- i) Taxation (Note 5) The charge for corporation tax is based on the profit before taxation adjusted for expenses not allowable for tax.

Provision is made for deferred taxation under the liability method except in respect of any tax reduction which, on reasonable evidence, can be expected to continue for the foreseeable future. Deferred taxes that have been provided are set out in note 12.

# NOTES TO CURRENT COST ACCOUNTS--30th JUNE, 1984

# 1. SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

- a) Basis of presentation The accompanying consolidated accounts have been prepared in compliance with S.S.A.P.16. The current cost system, whilst not a system of accounting for general inflation allows for price changes specific to the business when reporting assets employed and profits arising therefrom.
- b) Current cost operating profit Current cost operating profit is the surplus (before interest,
  taxation and extraordinary item) arising from the ordinary activities
  of the business in the year. It is determined after allowing for the
  impact of price changes on the funds needed to maintain the productive
  assets of the business but does not take into account the way in which
  these assets are financed.
- Current cost profit attributable to shareholders Current cost profit attributable to shareholders is the surplus after
  allowing for the impact of price changes on the funds needed to
  maintain only their proportion of the productive assets of the
  business. It is shown after interest, taxation, extraordinary item
  and the gearing adjustment described in section e.
- d) Fixed assets and depreciation Most of the Group's property, plant and equipment was revalued by
  independent firms of valuers at 30th September, 1980. The revalued
  amounts and the cost of the Group's other fixed assets have been
  restated to 30th June, 1984 using appropriate Government indices.

The estimated asset lives used for the purposes of calculating current cost depreciation have been reviewed upon the introduction of current cost accounting, and the existing estimates were found to be adequate.

- e) Stocks Stocks have been revalued to reflect the impact of price changes arising between the date of acquisition and the have sheet date, using estimated replacement cost.
- f) Gearing adjustment A proportion, of the net operating assets of the business is financed by borrowing. As the obligation to repay borrowing is fixed in a monetary amount, irrespective of price changes on the proportion of assets so financed, it is unnecessary to provide for the impact of price changes on these assets when determining the current cost profit attributable to shareholders. Thus, the gearing adjustment has been applied to abate the current cost operating adjustments by the average gearing proportion in the year.
- g) Other accounting policies Except as set out above the policies used in the preparation of the
  current cost accounts are the same as those used in the preparation of
  the historical cost accounts.

# 2. CURRENT COST OPERATING ADJUSTMENTS:

- a) Depreciation
  The depreciation charged in the current cost operating profit
  represents the average current cost of that proportion of property,
  plant and equipment consumed in the period. The depreciation
  adjustment of £1,368,000 is the difference between the depreciation
  charge in the historic accounts and current cost accounts.
- b) Working Capital -Working Capital comprises stocks, debtors and prepaid expenses less creditors and accruals.

In order to allow for the impact of price changes on working capital, two adjustments are made to the operating costs calculated on the historical cost basis, one relating to stocks and the other to monetary working capital. The adjustments are based on movements in price indices issued by the Government. These indices reflect closely the changes in input prices experienced by the Group.
