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Strategic Report

For the Year Ended 31 December 2019

Introduction

To comply with the Companies Act 2006, the company has provided below a review of the development and performance of the business during the year, including key financial performance indicators and a description of the principal risks and uncertainties facing the company.

The business review contains forward looking statements and opinions that involve risks and uncertainties. These risks and uncertainties could cause results to differ materially from expectations. The principal risk factors are discussed more below.

Business review

The profit from ordinary activities before tax for the year is £1,794,096 (year end 31 December 2018: £1,315,326). This result reflects a positive trading year. Continued investment in equipment provides a solid base for ongoing business as well as providing a platform for potential growth.

The global Covid 19 pandemic presents a number of risks to the business. The company has therefore taken action across a wide range of areas to where possible mitigate these risks. Due to the rapidly changing situation the business will continue to respond dynamically and maintain the following priorities throughout, the health and safety of our staff, customer service, financial discipline and business continuity.

Principal risks and uncertainties

Competition

The market in which the company operates is highly competitive. As a result, there is constant downward pressure on margins. Policies of constant price monitoring and ongoing market research are in place to mitigate such risks.

Fluctuations in commodity prices

The manufacture of our product range relies on materials traded on the commodity market. The price of such materials is therefore susceptible to fluctuations dependent upon market conditions. In order to mitigate the impact of such price movements, management maintains close contact with its suppliers to try and foresee where this could occur.

Fluctuations in currency exchange rates

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A significant proportion of purchases come from overseas and are denominated in foreign currencies. We are therefore exposed to foreign currency fluctuations.

Brexit risk

The British government is negotiating the terms of the U.K.'s future relationship with the E.U. Although it is unknown what those terms will be, it is possible that there will be greater restrictions on imports and exports between the U.K. and E.U. countries and increased regulatory complexities. The business has put measures in place to manage a number of the expected risks and will continue to work closely with customers and suppliers to ensure that any impact is minimalised.

Directors' responsibilities statement

The directors are responsible for preparing the Strategic Report, the Directors' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

Company law requires the directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under that law the directors have elected to prepare the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice), including Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland'. Under company law the directors must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company and of the profit or loss of the company for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the directors are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies for the company's financial statements and then apply them consistently.
- make judgments and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent.
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue in business.

The directors are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the company's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Principal risks and uncertainties

The company is exposed to a series of financial risks, which are described in more detail below. The directors review and agree policies for managing such risks. These policies have remained unchanged from previous years.

Currency risk

The company is exposed to transaction foreign exchange risk.

Credit risk

The company's principal financial assets are cash and trade debtors. The credit risk associated with the cash is limited as the counterparties have high credit ratings assigned by international credit-rating agencies. The principal credit risk arises therefore from its trade debtors. In order to manage credit risk, the directors set limits for customers. Credit limits are reviewed on a regular basis in conjunction with debt ageing and collection history.

Liquidity risk

The company seeks to manage financial risk by ensuring sufficient liquidity is available to meet foreseeable needs and to invest cash assets safely and profitably. Short-term flexibility is achieved by overdraft facilities.

Research and development activities

The company develops and improves products on an incremental basis as part of its normal operations.

Disclosure of information to auditor

Each of the persons who are directors at the time when this Directors' Report is approved has confirmed that:

- so far as the director is aware, there is no relevant audit information of which the company's auditor is unaware, and
- the director has taken all the steps that ought to have been taken as a director in order to be aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the company's auditor is aware of that information.

Going Concern

As of 31 December 2019, the company had net assets of £14.2m (2018: £12.7m) and net current assets of £12.3m (£10.8m). In preparing the financial statements on a going concern basis, the directors have considered the Company's ability to meet its liabilities as they fall due for at least the next 12 months. The directors have reviewed the forecast for the Company, taking into account factors including the potential impacts of Brexit and Covid-19. The impact of COVID-19 on the business is described in the Strategic Report on page 1.

The Directors have also received a letter of support from the Company's ultimate parent company, Hexpol AB. The letter confirms ongoing support, should it be required, for a period of at least twelve months from the date of approval of these financial statements. The Directors have satisfied themselves that Hexpol AB has the ability to provide this support to the Company should it be required.

After making enquiries, the Directors have a reasonable expectation that the Company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Accordingly, they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the annual report and financial statements

Post balance sheet events

The outbreak of Covid-19 is considered to be a non-adjusting post balance sheet event as, at the 31st December 2019 the pandemic had not been declared as a global health emergency at that date. The impact of this has been declared in the strategic report. The future financial impact cannot presently be estimated as it is highly dependant on the severity and duration of the pandemic, but it could be material to the Company's future results and financial position.

As of the 1st January 2020 the assets and the trade of Flexi-Cell (UK) Limited and Hexpol Compounding (UK) Limited, fellow group companies co-located with the Company, were transferred to Berwin Rubber Company Limited.

The value of the net assets transferred from Flexi-Cell (UK) Limited equated to £380,563. The consideration for the transaction has been left outstanding as a non interest bearing intercompany loan.

The value of the net assets transferred from Hexpol Compounding (UK) Limited equated to £1,448,912. In addition to this a premium for Goodwill was paid amounting to £651,088. The total consideration of £2.1m was paid on 26 February 2021.

Flexi-Cell (UK) Limited and Hexpol Compounding (UK) Limited achieved a profit before tax of £547,915 and £473,143 respectively for the year ended 31 December 2019.

Management expects this consolidation of group entities to improve the overall efficiency of the operations at the Dukinfield campus. It also expects this to have no effect on the service it provides its customers and will work closely with them in order to secure this.

This is considered to be a non-adjusting post balance sheet event.

There have been no other significant events affecting the company since the period end.

Auditor

Notes to the Financial Statements

For the Year Ended 31 December 2019

1. General information

Berwin Rubber Company Limited is a limited company incorporated in England and Wales. Its registered head office is at Broadway, Globe Lane Industrial Estate, Dukinfield, Cheshire, SK16 4UJ.

The principal activity of the company continued to be that of the compounding of rubber and other elastomeric alloys.

2. Accounting policies

2.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 102, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland and the Companies Act 2006.

The preparation of financial statements in compliance with FRS 102 requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise judgment in applying the company's accounting policies (see note 3).

The following principal accounting policies have been applied:

2.2 Financial reporting standard 102 - reduced disclosure exemptions

The company has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemptions in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by the FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland":

- the requirements of Section 7 Statement of Cash Flows;
- the requirements of Section 3 Financial Statement Presentation paragraph 3.17(d);
- the requirements of Section 33 Related Party Disclosures paragraph 33.7.

This information is included in the consolidated financial statements of the ultimate parent entity, Hexpol AB as at 31 December 2019 and these financial statements may be obtained from Hexpol AB, Skeppsbron 3, SE-211 20 Malmo, Sweden.

2.3 Going concern

As of 31 December 2019, the company had net assets of £14.2m (2018: £12.7m) and net current assets of £12.3m (£10.8m). In preparing the financial statements on a going concern basis, the directors have considered the Company's ability to meet its liabilities as they fall due for at least the next 12 months. The directors have reviewed the forecast for the Company, taking into account factors including the potential impacts of Brexit and Covid-19. The impact of COVID-19 on the business is described in the Strategic Report on page 1.

The Directors have also received a letter of support from the Company's ultimate parent company, Hexpol AB. 2.4 Turnover

Turnover comprises revenue recognised by the company in respect of goods and services supplied during the year, exclusive of Value Added Tax and trade discounts. Turnover is recognised at the point goods are delivered.

2.5 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets under the cost model are stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management.

Depreciation is charged so as to allocate the cost of assets less their residual value over their estimated useful lives, using the straight-line method.

Depreciation is provided on the following basis:

Leasehold land and buildings - 14 to 35 years
Plant and machinery - 3 to 12 years

The assets' residual values, useful lives and depreciation methods are reviewed, and adjusted prospectively if appropriate, or if there is an indication of a significant change since the last reporting date.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing the proceeds with the carrying amount and are recognised in the Statement of Income and Retained Earnings.

2.6 Stocks

Stocks are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value, being the estimated selling price less costs to complete and sell. Cost is based on the cost of purchase on a first in, first out basis. Work in progress and finished goods include labour and attributable overheads.

At each reporting date, stocks are assessed for impairment. If stock is impaired, the carrying amount is reduced to its selling price less costs to complete and sell. The impairment loss is recognised immediately in the income statement.

2.7 Debtors

Short term debtors are measured at transaction price, less any impairment. Loans receivable are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment.

2.8 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash is represented by cash in hand and deposits with financial institutions repayable without penalty on notice of not more than 24 hours. Cash equivalents are highly liquid investments that mature in no more than three months from the date of acquisition and that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash with insignificant risk of change in value.

2.9 Financial instruments

The company only enters into basic financial instruments transactions that result in the recognition of financial assets and liabilities like trade and other debtors and creditors, loans from banks and other third parties, loans to related parties and investments in non-puttable ordinary shares.

Debt instruments (other than those wholly repayable or receivable within one year), including loans and other accounts receivable and payable, are initially measured at present value of the future cash flows and subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Debt instruments that are payable or receivable within one year, typically trade debtors and creditors, are measured, initially and subsequently, at the undiscounted amount of the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received. However, if the arrangements of a short-term instrument constitute a financing transaction, like the payment of a trade debt deferred beyond normal business terms or financed at a rate of interest

2.9 Financial instruments (continued)

that is not a market rate or in case of an out-right short-term loan not at market rate, the financial asset or liability is measured, initially, at the present value of the future cash flow discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument and subsequently at amortised cost.

Investments in non-convertible preference shares and in non-puttable ordinary and preference shares are measured:

- at fair value with changes recognised in the Statement of Income and Retained Earnings if the shares are publicly traded or their fair value can otherwise be measured reliably;
- at cost less impairment for all other investments.

Financial assets that are measured at cost and amortised cost are assessed at the end of each reporting period for objective evidence of impairment. If objective evidence of impairment is found, an impairment loss is recognised in the Statement of Income and Retained Earnings.

For financial assets measured at amortised cost, the impairment loss is measured as the difference between an asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated cash flows discounted at the asset's original effective interest rate. If a financial asset has a variable interest rate, the discount rate for measuring any impairment loss is the current effective interest rate determined under the contract.

For financial assets measured at cost less impairment, the impairment loss is measured as the difference between an asset's carrying amount and best estimate, which is an approximation of the amount that the company would receive for the asset if it were to be sold at the reporting date.

.Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount reported in the Statement of Financial Position when there is an enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Derivatives, including interest rate swaps and forward foreign exchange contracts, are not basic financial instruments. Derivatives are initially recognised at fair value on the date a derivative contract is entered into and are subsequently re-measured at their fair value. Changes in the fair value of derivatives are recognised in profit or loss in finance costs or income as appropriate. The company does not currently apply hedge accounting for interest rate and foreign exchange derivatives.

2.10 Creditors

Short term creditors are measured at the transaction price. Other financial liabilities are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

2.11 Foreign currency translation

Functional and presentation currency

The company's functional and presentational currency is GBP.

Transactions and balances

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the spot exchange rates at the dates of the transactions.

At each period end foreign currency monetary items are translated using the closing rate.

Non-monetary items measured at historical cost are translated using the exchange rate at the date of the

transaction and non-monetary items measured at fair value are measured using the exchange rate when fair value was determined.

Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of transactions and from the translation at period-end exchange rates of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognised in the Statement of Income and Retained Earnings except when deferred in other comprehensive income as qualifying cash flow hedges.

Foreign exchange gains and losses that relate to borrowings and cash and cash equivalents are presented in the Statement of Income and Retained Earnings within 'finance income or costs'. All other foreign exchange gains and losses are presented in the Statement of Income and Retained Earnings within 'other operating income'.

2.12 Finance costs

Finance costs are charged to the Statement of Income and Retained Earnings over the term of the debt using the effective interest method so that the amount charged is at a constant rate on the carrying amount. Issue costs are initially recognised as a reduction in the proceeds of the associated capital instrument.

2.13 Dividends

Equity dividends are recognised when they become legally payable. Interim equity dividends are recognised when paid. Dividends on shares recognised as liabilities are recognised as expenses and classified within interest payable.

2.14 Operating leases: the company as lessee

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Income and Retained Earnings on a straight line basis over the lease term.

Benefits received and receivable as an incentive to sign an operating lease are recognised on a straight line basis over the lease term, unless another systematic basis is representative of the time pattern of the lessee's benefit from the use of the leased asset.

The company has taken advantage of the optional exemption available on transition to FRS 102 which allows lease incentives on leases entered into before the date of transition to the standard 1 August 2014 to continue to be charged over the period to the first market rent review rather than the term of the lease.

2.15 Pensions

Defined contribution pension plan

The company operates a defined contribution plan for its employees. A defined contribution plan is a pension plan under which the company pays fixed contributions into a separate entity. Once the contributions have been paid the company has no further payment obligations.

The contributions are recognised as an expense in the Statement of Income and Retained Earnings when they fall due. Amounts not paid are shown in accruals as a liability in the Statement of Financial Position. The assets of the plan are held separately from the company in an independently administered funds.

2.16 Interest income

Interest income is recognised in the Statement of Income and Retained Earnings using the effective interest method.

2.17 Provisions for liabilities

Provisions are made where an event has taken place that gives the company a legal or constructive obligation that probably requires settlement by a transfer of economic benefit, and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

Provisions are charged as an expense to the Statement of Income and Retained Earnings in the year that the company becomes aware of the obligation, and are measured at the best estimate at the Statement of Financial Position date of the expenditure required to settle the obligation, taking into account relevant risks and uncertainties.

When payments are eventually made, they are charged to the provision carried in the Statement of Financial Position.

2.18 Current and deferred taxation

The tax expense for the period comprises current and deferred tax. Tax is recognised in the Statement of Income and Retained Earnings, except that a charge attributable to an item of income and expense recognised as other comprehensive income or to an item recognised directly in equity is also recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity respectively.

The current income tax charge is calculated on the basis of tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date in the countries where the company operates and generates income.

Deferred tax balances are recognised in respect of all timing differences that have originated but not reversed by the Statement of Financial Position date, except that:

- The recognition of deferred tax assets is limited to the extent that it is probable that they will be recovered against the reversal of deferred tax liabilities or other future taxable profits; and
- Any deferred tax balances are reversed if and when all conditions for retaining associated tax allowances have been met.

Deferred tax balances are not recognised in respect of permanent differences except in respect of business combinations, when deferred tax is recognised on the differences between the fair values of assets acquired and the future tax deductions available for them and the differences between the fair values of liabilities acquired and the amount that will be assessed for tax. Deferred tax is determined using tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date.

2.19 Research and development

In the research phase of an internal project it is not possible to demonstrate that the project will generate future economic benefits and hence all expenditure on research shall be recognised as an expense when it is incurred. Intangible assets are recognised from the development phase of a project if and only if certain specific criteria are met in order to demonstrate the asset will generate probable future economic benefits and that its cost can be reliably measured. The capitalised development costs are subsequently amortised on a straight line basis over their useful economic lives, which range from 3 to 6 years. If it is not possible to distinguish between the research phase and the development phase of an internal project, the expenditure is treated as if it were all incurred in the research phase only.

28. Going Concern

As at 31 December 2019, the company had net assets and net current assets of £12.3mn (2018: £10.8mn). In preparing the financial statements on a going concern basis, the directors have considered the Company's ability to meet its liabilities as they fall due for at least the next 12 months. The directors have reviewed the forecast for the Company, taking into account factors including the potential impacts of Brexit and Covid-19. The impact of COVID-19 on the business is described in the Strategic Report on page 1.

The Directors have also received a letter of support from the Company's ultimate parent company, Hexpol AB. The letter confirms ongoing support, should it be required, for a period of at least twelve months from the date of approval of these financial statements. The Directors have satisfied themselves that Hexpol AB has the ability to provide this support to the Company should it be required.

After making enquiries, the Directors have a reasonable expectation that the Company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Accordingly, they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the annual report and financial statements

29. Post Balance Sheet Events

The outbreak of Covid-19 is considered to be a non-adjusting post balance sheet event as, at the 31st December 2019 the pandemic had not been declared as a global health emergency at that date. The impact of this has been declared in the strategic report. The future financial impact cannot presently be estimated as it is highly dependant on the severity and duration of the pandemic, but it could be material to the Company's future results and financial position.

As of the 1st January 2020 the assets and the trade of Flexi-Cell (UK) Limited and Hexpol Compounding (UK) Limited, fellow group companies co-located with the Company, were transferred to Berwin Rubber Company Limited.

The value of the net assets transferred from Flexi-Cell (UK) Limited equated to £380,563. The consideration for the transaction has been left outstanding as a non interest bearing intercompany loan.

The value of the net assets transferred from Hexpol Compounding (UK) Limited equated to £1,448,912. In addition to this a premium for Goodwill was paid amounting to £651,088. The total consideration of £2.1m was paid on 26 February 2021.

Flexi-Cell (UK) Limited and Hexpol Compounding (UK) Limited achieved a profit before tax of £547,915 and £473,143 respectively for the year ended 31 December 2019.

Management expects this consolidation of group entities to improve the overall efficiency of the operations at the Dukinfield campus. It also expects this to have no effect on the service it provides its customers and will work closely with them in order to secure this.

This is considered to be a non-adjusting post balance sheet event.

There have been no other significant events affecting the company since the period end.
