1 Accounting policies

Company information

Colsan Limited is a private company limited by shares incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is Quadrant House - Floor 6, 4 Thomas More Square, London, E1W 1YW.

1.1 Accounting convention

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" ("FRS 102") and the requirements of the Companies Act 2006 as applicable to companies subject to the small companies regime. The disclosure requirements of section 1A of FRS 102 have been applied other than where additional disclosure is required to show a true and fair view.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the company. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

The company is dependent upon its shareholder companies and their investors for continuing financial support.

The company is financed partly by equity and partly by way of facilities provided by its shareholder companies, and ultimately banking facilities provided to those companies. These facilities fall due for renewal periodically. The directors have no reason to believe that this support will not continue in the forseeable future.

The directors are satisfied that the company has adequate resources to continue its operations for the forseeable future, and, therefore, continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.

1.3 Turnover

Turnover represents rents, insurance receivable and service charges receivable, net of VAT.

Revenue is recognised at the point where the benefit of the service provided is transferred to the customer.

1.4 Investment properties

Investment property, which is property held to earn rentals and/or for capital appreciation, is initially recognised at cost, which includes the purchase cost and any directly attributable expenditure. Subsequently it is measured at fair value at the reporting end date. The surplus or deficit on revaluation is recognised in the profit and loss account.

1.5 Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand are basic financial assets and include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.6 Financial instruments

The company has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the company's balance sheet when the company becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

Classification of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities and equity instruments are classified according to the substance of the contractual arrangements entered into. An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of the company after deducting all of its liabilities.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors, bank loans, loans from fellow group companies and preference shares that are classified as debt, are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of business from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

1.7 Equity instruments

Equity instruments issued by the company are recorded at the proceeds received, net of direct issue costs. Dividends payable on equity instruments are recognised as liabilities once they are no longer at the discretion of the company.

1.8 Taxation

The tax expense represents the sum of the tax currently payable and deferred tax.

Current tax

The tax currently payable is based on taxable profit for the year. Taxable profit differs from net profit as reported in the profit and loss account because it excludes items of income or expense that are taxable or deductible in other years and it further excludes items that are never taxable or deductible. The company's liability for current tax is calculated using tax rates that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting end date.

Deferred tax

Deferred taxation is provided in full in respect of taxation deferred by timing differences between the treatment of certain items for taxation and accounting purposes. The deferred tax balance has not been discounted.

2 Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

In the application of the company's accounting policies, the directors are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.

Investment properties

Investment properties are valued annually at fair value. Fair value is ascertained through review of a number of factors and information flows, including market knowledge, recent market movements, recent sales of similar properties, historical experience, and rent levels and cash flows of cash for the respective investment property. There is an inevitable degree of judgement involved and value can be only reliably tested ultimately in the market itself. Given the property market knowledge and expertise of the directors, no third party valuation has been considered necessary unless required by the lenders.

3 Employees

The average monthly number of persons (including directors) employed by the company during the year was 0 (2016 - 0).

12 Related party transactions

The following amounts were outstanding at the reporting end date:

Included within 'Amounts owed by related parties' is an amount of £413,030 (2016: £413,030) due from Miltenform Properties, a joint venture in which Structadene Limited and Peaceline Limited have an equal interest. This is non-interest bearing and is receivable on demand.

Also included within 'Amounts owed by related parties' is an amount of £32,792 (2016: £34,036) due from Pearl and Coutts Limited. The decrease in loan is as a result of repayments received on the amounts outstanding. This is non-interest bearing and is receivable on demand. D A Pearlman is a director of this company.

Included within 'Amounts owed to related parties' is an amount of £1,394,460 (2016: £1,626,460) due to Searchgrade & Portmount Property, a joint venture in which Searchgrade Limited and Portmount Property Limited have equal interest. The decrease in the loan is as a result of repayments made on the amounts outstanding. This is non-interest bearing and is payable on demand.

Also included within 'Amounts owed to related parties' is an amount of £668,861 (2016: £668,172) due to Structadene Limited, £668,148 (2016: £668,148) due to Portmount Property Limited and £nil (2016: £70) due to Demifix Limited. These are non-interest bearing and are payable on demand.

D.A Pearlman is a director and has overall control of Searchgrade Limited, Structadene Limited and Demifix Limited, whilst A Eisen is a director and has overall control of Portmount Property Limited and Peaceline Limited.

14 Parent company

No individual or entity exercises ultimate control over the company. Searchgrade Limited and Portmount Property Limited each hold fifty issued ordinary shares in the company.
