Report of the executive committee

for the year ended 31 December 2006

The executive committee has pleasure in presenting the report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2006 which have been prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 1985, Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (SORP 2005) issued in March 2005, applicable UK accounting standards and the memorandum and articles of association.

Structure, governance and management

Legal status

The Gospel Standard Trust ("the Trust") is a company limited by guarantee and not having a share capital which was founded in 1966. Its governing documents are its memorandum and articles of association. It is authorised by the Department for Constitutional Affairs to act as a trust corporation and can therefore act as a sole trustee. It is also a registered charity. The members of the executive committee are the directors for Companies Act purposes and trustees under charity legislation.

Executive committee

The maximum number permitted by the articles of association is 12 and those who have acted as members of the committee during the year are shown on page 4. In accordance with the articles of association only male members of a Gospel Standard Baptist Church who subscribe to the Articles of Faith of the Gospel Standard Strict and Particular Baptists are eligible to hold office as a member of the executive committee. The committee has power to appoint a new committee member but the appointment is subject to confirmation at the following annual general meeting. Three members of the committee retire in rotation at the annual general meeting each year but are eligible for re-election. Messrs J F Ashby, J R Broome and D J Christian retire at the forthcoming annual general meeting. All have expressed their willingness to stand for re-election.

Organisational structure

The activities of the Trust are managed by the executive committee which meets at least three times a year. These meetings deal with all aspects of the Trust's activities. Further meetings are held as necessary to deal with Publications matters. The activities and the funds are divided between General matters and Publications. Publications are managed by Mr C A Pearce with support from Mr J A Kingham and operates from the book room in Harpenden. Publications also have the use of the former Old Baptist Chapel at Sharnbrook to store books. Subscriptions are dealt

with by Mr M G Bailey, a member of the executive committee. Other matters are dealt with by the Trust secretary.

Trustees induction and training

The trustees plan to adopt a policy for the induction and training of trustees during 2007.

Risk management

The committee has considered the major risks to which the Trust is exposed and expects to complete in 2007 the risk register and the policy for mitigating those risks.

Objectives and activities

The objects for which the Trust was established are set out in the objects clauses of its memorandum of association. Primarily these are to assist Gospel Standard Strict Baptist churches or congregations in the furtherance of their religion and charitable work, to assist with the appointment of trustees, legal advice, repairs and maintenance of church property and to support denominational charities and any other charitable trust or fund approved by the executive committee. In the furtherance of these objects the Trust has ancillary powers which include acting as trustee or co-trustee (including as custodian trustee) of denominational property and charitable funds, making grants and loans, assisting pastors (including former and prospective pastors) of Gospel Standard churches in the provision of living accommodation and to print and publish literature approved by the committee.

Achievements and performance

Review of activities

Trust Publications

The number of books sold during the year was 14,275 which was an increase of over 35% on the 10,549 books and tracts sold in 2005. A summary of the numbers sold is given below:

This year has seen an encouraging reversal of the downward trend in sales reported last year. This has been partly due to five new books being introduced during the year, Justification, Oliver Cromwell, A Goodly Heritage, 100 Hymns-From Gadsby's Selection-With Music and Christ as revealed in the Old Testament. It has been another heavy year for printing with 13 titles having been printed or reprinted. This has included Six Remarkable Ministers, the story of six "unflinching preachers of God's free and sovereign grace" and Mary Jones and her Bible, the very touching account of a Welsh girl whose desire to own a Bible led her to save up her little earnings for six long years and then to walk barefoot for 25 miles to Bala. The Miracles series by Mr Ramsbottom continues to sell very well and includes 200 copies of each title sent to Gospel Mission in November. The glorious doctrine that God justifies the ungodly, "is glad tidings of great joy to the sinner who languishes in distress, conscious of his ungodliness, and who thirsts to be accepted in the Lord Jesus Christ" and this truth is dealt with in the extracts now published from Dr John Gill's "Body of Divinity".

We are encouraged when we receive orders from churches and organisations for distribution to local Libraries and Schools, and for sending overseas. One order received was for a wide range of our books, in total 500, for use in Liberia. Shaw's Corner Chapel Redhill have regularly ordered from us for their free distribution over the years, and we desire the Lord's blessing on all who labour in this way.

The majority of our books are sold for onward distribution so we can never be sure who the end reader will be. We are therefore encouraged from time to time to hear of spiritual profit received and how the books have been appreciated, for example concerning the works of J C Philpot. A figure can be put on numbers of sales, but what value can be put on one copy of a book that has been used by God to bless one

of his people? We pray that the Lord will continue to bless the work to this end, to His honour and glory.

Again we would record thanks to Almighty God for help given to our publications manager and all those involved, often behind the scenes, in the publication and distribution of our books.

General

It has been our pleasure to continue to provide financial help by way of grants and loans to the churches to assist with such matters as redecorations and re-roofing, provision of disabled toilets and ease of access for the handicapped and aged. It is fitting that the chapels be kept in good repair. With many of our people elderly, a properly functioning PA system enables the services to be heard clearly, in an outward way at least, and takes some of the strain off the Lord's servants. We have been able to make grants to help in this way during the year. Grants are summarised in Note 4. We did circularise the churches in April last year to keep them aware of the financial help which is available.

As permitted by our objects, it has been a pleasure and privilege to have been able to help the pastors at Hope Chapel, Blackboys and at Lamberhurst with interest free housing loans to enable them to move closer to their chapels. Note 13 shows a total of £265,000 being loaned. This comprised two loans of £15,000 and £250,000 respectively, the latter including a bridging loan of £180,000 which was repaid in January 2007.

As trustee we have been involved with further property sales which realised over £1m. These included Hope Chapel, Hurstpierpoint and Ebenezer Chapel, Worthing. The proceeds from the former benefits chapels in Sussex and a distribution of £30,000 each was made to 14 chapels. The latter realised £193,750 before expenses for the Gospel Standard Aid and Poor Relief Societies. Chapel closures bring much sadness but funds released by sales are then available to support continuing churches. We have assisted with the appointment of new trustees, obtained solicitors' advice and assistance from the Charity Commission on matters arising from the ownership, occupation or exchange of land and otherwise assisted where we can.

Funds held on behalf of other trusts are detailed on pages 25 and 26. Advantage was taken during the year of the power in the Charities Act 1993 to resolve to remove the restriction with respect to the expenditure of capital of the Rehoboth Chapel, Stotfold, charity. The Charity Commission concurred with the resolution and the funds were distributed to 5 local chapels.

Membership

The recorded membership stood at 269 at 31 December 2006, a net decrease of 7 on the previous year. We were pleased to welcome 5 new members but 12 names had to be removed from the register, 7 of these through death. The loyal support of the members and the churches is much appreciated.

Financial review

The total incoming resources (page 13) were £81,505 compared with £312,837 previously. Sales of publications were higher by £4,025. Total resources expended amounted to £85,415, of which grants amounted to £32,417. Overall, there was net expenditure of £3,910 compared with net income of £168,305 in 2005. The publications fund had net income of £1,849 compared with a net expenditure of £402 previously. The publications details are in Notes 8 to 10 on pages 20 and 21. We do appreciate the continuing kind support of chapels and individuals that have collections and send donations.

Total reserves at 31 December 2006 stood at £1,138,943 compared with £1,142,853 previously. The major part is retained in cash balances. The stocks all relate to books. The policy is to print the number of books estimated to be saleable within five years although some books will take many years to sell. There were 69,990 items in stock at 31 December 2006 which represents nearly five years supply at the 2006 sales level.

Reserves policy. The committee is of the opinion that it requires all of the reserves currently available in order to maintain the investments in freehold property and the book stock as well as having funds available to meet the requests for loans and grants and to provide interest income towards the working expenses of the charity. The level of free reserves at 31 December 2006 was £742,230 (2005: £747,268).

Investment policy and performance. The policy is to retain funds on deposit partly to meet requests from chapels for financial support (which is a principal purpose) and partly because of concern over equity investments and the receipt of shares in profit from unacceptable activities. The major part of the deposits is with the COIF Charities Deposit Fund which provides an above average rate of interest. The committee considers the overall return on the deposits is satisfactory and in line with policy.

Plans for the future

If the Lord will, the Trust will continue to publish Christian books in accordance with the Articles of Faith of the Gospel Standard Baptists and distribute within the United Kingdom and overseas as demand arises or is perceived. The Trust will further seek to use its funds amongst the Gospel Standard chapels as opportunity arises for the repair and improvement of buildings and otherwise.

Statement of executive committee responsibilities

Company law requires the executive committee to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company and of the profit or loss of the company for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the executive committee is required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- comply with applicable accounting standards subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue in business.

The executive committee is responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and to enable it to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. The executive committee is also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Each member of the committee at the date of approval of this report confirms that:

- 1. So far as the committee members are aware, there is no relevant audit information of which the charity's auditors are unaware; and
- 2. The committee members have taken all the steps that they ought to have taken as a director to make themselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the charity's auditors are aware of that information.

This confirmation is given and should be interpreted in accordance with the provisions of section 234ZA of the Companies Act 1985.

Auditors

A resolution to reappoint Mazars LLP as auditors to the Trust and to authorise the executive committee to fix their remuneration was proposed and carried at the annual general meeting on 20 May 2006.

Independent auditors' report to the members of The Gospel Standard Trust

We have audited the financial statements of The Gospel Standard Trust for the year ended 31 December 2006 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Balance Sheet and related notes. These financial statements have been prepared under the accounting policies set out therein.

This report is made solely to the company's members, as a body, in accordance with Section 235 of the Companies Act 1985. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the company's members those matters we are required to state to them in an auditor's report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the company and the company's members as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and auditors

As described in the Statement of Executive Committee's Responsibilities the trustees, who are also the directors of The Gospel Standard Trust for the purposes of company law, are responsible for the preparation of financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

Our responsibility is to audit the financial statements in accordance with relevant legal and regulatory requirements and International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland).

We report to you our opinion as to whether the financial statements give a true and fair view and are properly prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 1985. We also report to you if, in our opinion, the Executive Committee's Report is consistent with the financial statements, if the company has not kept proper accounting records, if we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit, or if information specified by law regarding trustees' remuneration and transactions with the charity is not disclosed.

Basis of audit opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland), issued by the Auditing Practices Board. An audit includes examination, on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. It also includes an assessment of the judgements made by the trustees in the preparation of the financial statements, and of whether the

accounting policies are appropriate to the charitable company's circumstances, consistently applied and adequately disclosed.

We planned and performed our audit so as to obtain all information and explanations which we considered necessary in order to provide us with sufficient evidence to give reasonable assurance as to whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or other irregularity or error. In forming our opinion we also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the financial statements.

Opinion

In our opinion:

- the financial statements give a true and fair view, in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice of the state of the charitable company's affairs as at 31 December 2006 and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including its income and expenditure, in the year then ended;
- the financial statements have been properly prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 1985; and
- the information given in the Executive Committee's report is consistent with the financial statements.

Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2006

1 Accounting policies

Basis of accounting

In accordance with the requirements of paragraph 3(3) of schedule 4 to the Companies Act 1985, the directors have adapted the arrangements, headings and sub-headings otherwise required by paragraph 1 of the schedule due to the special nature of the company's activities.

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with relevant legislation, applicable UK accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (SORP 2005) issued in March 2005 and the Companies Act 1985. Corresponding amounts have been restated where relevant so as to comply with SORP. Assets held in trust are not included in the balance sheet, but are set out in a separate schedule attached to the financial statements.

Freehold property

This comprises a share in a chapel pastor's house and a book storeroom. Depreciation is being provided at 4% per annum on a straight line basis.

Furniture and office equipment

Depreciation is calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of office equipment over three years on a straight line basis.

Stocks

Stocks, which are of publications, are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost comprises the direct cost of publications with no addition for overheads. Provision for depreciation has been made in accordance with note 9 in determining net realisable value.

Incoming resources

Interest income is accounted for on an accruals basis whilst legacies are accounted for as incoming resources either upon receipt or where receipt is virtually certain.

Notes to the financial statements

1 Accounting policies continued

Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category.

Grants payable

Grants payable are payments made in furtherance of the charitable objectives of the charity. Grants are recognised upon an obligation being created in accordance with FRS12.

Charitable activities

Costs of charitable activities includes grants made and direct costs in relation to publications, and an apportionment of overhead and support costs.

Support costs

Support costs have been allocated as a direct cost or allocated between charitable activities and governance. The analysis of overhead and support costs are shown in note 5.

Governance costs

Governance costs comprise all costs involving the public accountability of the charity and its compliance with regulation and good practice. These costs include costs related to the statutory audit together with trustees' expenses and an apportionment of overhead and support costs.

Funds held and their purpose

The General fund is used principally for the support of Gospel Standard chapels by way of grants and loans. The committee considers individually each application for assistance and provides a grant or loan or both depending on circumstances. The Publications fund is used for the publishing and distribution of Christian books. Legacies, donations and proceeds from chapel sales received specifically for either of those two funds are credited accordingly, otherwise such income is allocated under the discretion of the committee. The Endowment fund cannot be spent and the income is to be used for the general purposes of the Trust.

Trustees Report for 2006

Once again, at the end of the year, we record the goodness and faithfulness of the Lord in maintaining the work of the Library. In February the Library was added as a link to the Gospel Standard website. Then in June we bought a new computer, which has e-mail and internet access, and a flatbed scanner. (We are grateful to Jonathan Topping who installed the necessary software, transferred data etc. and has sorted out some of the problems which subsequently arose.)

The result has been a much wider use of the library, and we have had a number of enquiries and requests from various quarters of the UK and abroad about books and tracts, some of which were not available elsewhere. As a consequence there has been an increase in the number of borrowers, both within our denomination and from other areas, to 40 and 31 respectively. The number of books loaned was 451 - 30 more than last year, an increase of almost 15%.

As well as the catalogue of the Library books being available on the website there is also the catalogue of tracts and pamphlets in the bound "R" books. Both are in pdf format which facilitates searches.

There have been 69 accessions to the Library (excluding duplicates of new publications) and we are grateful to The Gospel Standard Trust Publications, The Huntingtonian Press and other sources for copies of new publications, and for the various gifts of books that we have received.

Rebinding and repair of books continues as necessary and as time permits.

In accordance with current legislation the electrical installations at the Library were inspected and the necessary recommendations implemented.

The financial position of the Library is satisfactory and there has been an increase in donations and Gift Aid.
