Report of the executive committee

for the year ended 31 December 2011

The executive committee has pleasure in presenting the report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2011 which have been prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 2006, Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (SORP 2005) issued in March 2005, applicable UK accounting standards and the memorandum and articles of association.

Structure, governance and management

Legal status

The Gospel Standard Trust ("the Trust") is a company limited by guarantee and not having a share capital which was founded in 1966. Its governing documents are its memorandum and articles of association. The Trust acts as a trust corporation under a certificate granted in 2006 by the Department for Constitutional Affairs (now the Ministry of Justice) and the Trust can therefore act as a sole trustee. It is also a registered charity. The members of the executive committee are the directors for Companies Act purposes and trustees under charity legislation.

Executive committee

The maximum number permitted by the articles of association is 12 and those who have acted as members of the committee during the year are shown on page 4. In accordance with the articles of association only male members of a Gospel Standard Baptist Church who subscribe to the Articles of Faith of the Gospel Standard Strict and Particular Baptists are eligible to hold office as a member of the executive committee. The committee has power to appoint a new committee member but the appointment is subject to confirmation at the following annual general meeting. The committee was pleased to welcome two new committee members, Mr A Crowter and Dr M J Hyde who were appointed on 1 November 2011. Three members of the committee retire in rotation at the annual general meeting each year but are eligible for re-election. Messrs M G Bailey, G D Buss and H Mercer retire at the forthcoming annual general meeting. All have expressed their willingness to stand for re-election.

Organisational structure

The activities of the Trust are managed by the executive committee which meets at least three times a year. These meetings deal with all aspects of the Trust's activities. Further meetings are held as necessary to deal with Publications matters. The activities and the funds are divided between General matters and Publications. Publications are managed by Mr P E Skelton, who works closely with Mr J A

Kingham, Publications Director, and operates from the book room in Harpenden. Subscriptions are dealt with by Mr M G Bailey, a member of the executive committee and Mr G L TenBroeke, 1725 Plainwood Drive, Sheboygan, Wisconsin, WI 53081, USA, who is responsible for those resident in North America. Other matters are dealt with by the Trust secretary.

Trustees' induction and training

New executive committee members (trustees) with the appropriate knowledge, experience and abilities for the Trust's activities are selected from the male members of Gospel Standard churches as required by article of association number 26. The two new trustees were provided with an induction pack and an induction meeting with two executive committee members and the secretary was held in November 2011. Continuing briefing and support is provided as necessary.

Risk management

The committee regularly considers the major risks to which the Trust is exposed and updates the risk register and the policy for mitigating those risks.

Objectives and activities

The objects for which the Trust was established are set out in the objects clauses of its memorandum of association. Primarily these are to assist Gospel Standard Strict Baptist churches or congregations in the furtherance of their religion and charitable work, to assist with the appointment of trustees, legal advice, repairs and maintenance of church property and to support denominational charities and any other charitable trust or fund approved by the executive committee. In the furtherance of these objects the Trust has ancillary powers which include acting as trustee or co-trustee (including as custodian trustee) of denominational property and charitable funds, making grants and loans, assisting pastors (including former and prospective pastors) of Gospel Standard churches in the provision of living accommodation and to print and publish literature approved by the committee.

Public Benefit

The executive committee has previously considered the public benefit guidance issued by the Charity Commission. The work carried out by the Trust in fulfilling the Objects summarised in the preceding paragraph assists churches and trustees to continue with the regular provision of services for the public worship of God in accordance with the Holy Scriptures and the Articles of Faith of The Gospel Standard Baptists. Further, under the blessing of Almighty God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, this work together with the publication of good books and electronic communication will bring sinners from darkness to light and establish them in the truth with the consequent benefits to themselves and others. Man's first responsibility is to God, to worship and to serve Him. Further, as it is recorded in New Testament teaching, for example Galatians Chapter 6, the result for the benefit of all should be "Let us not be weary in well doing: for in due season we shall

reap, if we faint not. As we have therefore opportunity, let us do good unto all men, especially unto them who are of the household of faith."

Achievements and performance Review of activities

Trust Publications

The past year has been calmer than the one before, with no major changes. We have continued to produce new books, five in all, and seem to have managed to space them much more evenly over the year. At times we have seemed to be very quiet for weeks on end, and this is reflected in the significant decline in the number of books sold, even though the value has increased. We are thankful to the Lord for all help given, and that we have been maintained as a witness for the truth in this increasingly sceptical and hostile world.

The number of books sold was 6,613 and the details are given below. In addition grants were made for the printing of 6,000 Bible Doctrines in Urdu and 2,000 Gadsby's Catechism in Zambia (see note 4 to the accounts). The numbers below for 2010 likewise do not include the 1,650 books sent overseas by way of grant including 585 in the Miracles Series and 800 in the Martyrs and Reformers Series.

The value of sales as shown on page 20 of the accounts increased by 17% to £27,716. The geographical distribution of sales has shown a significant shift from the past few years with a marked drop in UK sales, both in absolute terms and as a

percentage of total sales, and a marked increase in North American sales, especially to Gospel Mission. Online sales through our website are increasing although the total was relatively small at 6.5% in value terms.

The new titles published during the year were Hymns by Thomas Kelly, The King James Bible – Its History and Excellence, Articles of Faith – Why and where from?, Bible Search and Peter Disciple of Jesus. Thomas Kelly was born in 1769 and spent most of his life near Dublin in Ireland. The book contains a short biography as well as his hymns. We are delighted to have sold virtually all of the original 200 print run of The King James Bible and have printed a further 100 copies. Articles of Faith is the first of a series of lectures given by Mr Kenneth Matrunola on the 35 Gospel Standard Articles and Mr Timothy Abbott has added further information on the history of these Articles. Bible Search contains 44 pieces originally written as editorials for the Friendly Companion whilst Mr L R J Broome was editor. His series of questions are included after each piece with the answers at the end of the book Peter Disciple of Jesus is the tenth and last book in the Miracles Series by Mr B A Ramsbottom. Other titles have been reprinted as necessary.

We are currently working on further new titles. In 2010 we produced *Some Scots Worthies*, brief biographies of thirteen ministers and covenantors and we are now working on a similar publication for some Welsh ministers. Already published in 2012 is *Gospel Precepts* by J C Philpot. The sub-title is "The Believers Rule of Conduct" and this book shows that the precepts of the New Testament are a gracious principle to guide the whole life of the believer. Other translation projects are under way or nearing completion, *Bible Doctrines* into Farsi and also into Dutch and *Jesus the Way* (by Dr Ian Sadler) into Portuguese for use in Mozambique.

Our publications manager acknowledges the goodness of God with thanks to all those who have helped with publications matters through another year. May the Lord still bless our books and open more doors for their distribution.

General

Grants paid increased by almost 20% to £32,043 as detailed on page 18. The main chapel beneficiary was Hope Chapel, Great Yeldham where we contributed £6,600 to provide a disabled toilet. Other grants included repairs to drainage and a boundary wall. The scanning project in conjunction with the Gospel Standard Library has continued and we paid £10,199 for scanning the *Friendly Companions*. When indexing is complete we hope to make available a DVD.

It has been a particularly heavy year for legal fees. Our solicitors were very helpful in connection with the Equality Act 2010 and its application to the churches. In May we reported to chapel correspondents. The draft statement for churches to set out their understanding of scriptural teaching on equality issues was requested by

over 40 churches. Work continues in connection with the first registrations of chapels with the Land Registry following appointments of new Trustees. Further consideration with the Charity Commission of the draft model Constitution for church working funds has been deferred pending clarification of Government requirements. We reported on this issue in the *Gospel Standard* for April 2011 on page 127.

The Trust has been represented at trustees' meetings for chapels and charity funds to provide help in connection with property matters, the maintenance of services, the distribution of funds and other responsibilities. The number of trusteeships at 31 December 2011 was 67 and during the year we were appointed trustee for the Minety Chapel Graveyard. Under the powers contained in Sections 75 and 75A Charities Act 1993 the committee passed resolutions to remove the restrictions with respect to the expenditure of capital in the cases of four charities – Zion Chapel, Ely, Providence Chapel, Rainham, Bethel Chapel, Robertsbridge and Sharnbrook Old Baptist Chapel. The capital of the latter was paid out during 2011 and the others are expected to be distributed during 2012.

Membership

The recorded membership stood at 265 at 31 December 2011. Six members died during the year and three resigned. We were pleased to welcome nine new members. The continuing loyal support of the members and the churches is much appreciated.

Financial review

The total incoming resources (page 13) were £87,778 compared with £239,907 in 2010. We were remembered in the Will of the late Miss Rhoda Kershaw and we received a legacy of £22,396. Investment income has risen by over 50% mainly due to the receipt at the end of the previous year of the sale proceeds of the Sharnbrook Chapel

Total resources expended were significantly higher at £122,428 compared with £91,438 previously. There was a net outflow of funds of £34,650. The net outflow on the Publications Fund was £34,860, an increase of 56% on the previous year. A significant proportion of books sold are to retailers and other distributors hence, after trade discounts, there is very little contribution towards our overheads. Two other significant costs were incurred in that we made grants of £3,744 for printing books overseas (see note 4) and we have had to make a provision for Royalties payable at over £9,000 for which no provision had been made in earlier years. The continuing support of chapels and individuals by way of collections and donations is greatly appreciated.

Total reserves at 31 December 2011 stood at £1,258,165 (page 14) compared with £1,292,815 at December 2010 of which the major part is held in bank deposits.

Reserves policy. The Trust needs reserves to fund the investments in freehold property and the book stock which are used for the Objects of the Trust and to provide working capital. Otherwise the committee, believing that "the cattle upon a thousand hills" is the Lord's, will seek to lay out the remaining funds for the permitted Objects of the Trust as the needs are brought before the committee and opportunity arises. The level of free reserves at 31 December 2011 was £599,221 (2010: £599,843).

Investment policy and performance. The policy regarding investment is to retain funds on deposit partly to meet requests from chapels for financial support (which is a principal purpose) and partly because of concern over equity investments and the receipt of shares in profit from unacceptable activities. The funds are spread between immediate access and term deposits in accordance with a periodic review of the access needs and allocated to a number of deposit takers to spread risk and to achieve competitive interest rates.

Plans for the future

If the Lord will, the Trust will continue to publish Christian books in accordance with the truth in the scriptures which we love and in accordance with the Articles of Faith of the Gospel Standard Baptists and distribute within the United Kingdom and overseas for the benefit of our congregations and the church of Christ at large of all ages. The Trust will further seek to use its funds amongst the Gospel Standard chapels as opportunity arises for the repair and improvement of buildings and otherwise. We acknowledge the help of the Lord through the past year and desire that He will go before us in 2012. Brethren, pray for us.

Statement of executive committee responsibilities

Company law requires the executive committee to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company and of the surplus or deficit of the company for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the executive committee is required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- comply with applicable accounting standards subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue in business.

The executive committee is responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and to enable it to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance

with the special provisions of the Companies Act 2006 relating to small companies. The executive committee is also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Independent examiners

Mazars LLP were re-appointed at the annual general meeting on 14 May 2011 as independent examiners. The executive committee have continued to take advantage of Section 480 of the Companies Act 2006 which entitles the Trust to be exempted from having an audit.

Independent Examiner's Report to the members of The Gospel Standard Trust

I report on the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2011, which are set out on pages 13 to 24.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The trustees (who are also the directors of the company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements. The trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144 of the Charities Act 2011 (the 2011 Act) and that an independent examination is needed.

Having satisfied myself that the charity is not subject to audit under company law and is eligible for independent examination, it is my responsibility to:

- examine the financial statements under section 145 of the 2011 Act;
- follow the procedures laid down in the general Directions given by the Charity Commission under section 145(5)(b) of the 2011 Act; and
- state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of independent examiner's report

My examination was carried out in accordance with the general Directions given by the Charity Commission. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the financial statements presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the financial statements and seeking explanations from you as trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently no opinion is given

as to whether the financial statements present a 'true and fair view' and the report is limited to those matters set out in the statement below.

1 Accounting policies

Basis of accounting

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with relevant legislation, applicable UK accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (SORP 2005) issued in March 2005 and the Companies Act 2006. Assets held in trust are not included in the balance sheet, but are set out in a separate schedule attached to the financial statements.

Freehold property

This comprises a share in a chapel pastor's house and a book storeroom. Depreciation is being provided at 4% per annum on a straight line basis.

Furniture and office equipment

Depreciation is calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of office equipment over three years on a straight line basis.

Stocks

Stocks, which are of publications, are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost comprises the direct cost of publications with no addition for overheads. Provision for depreciation has been made in accordance with note 9 in determining net realisable value.

Incoming resources

Interest income is accounted for on an accruals basis whilst legacies are accounted for as incoming resources either upon receipt or where receipt is virtually certain.

Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category.

Grants payable

Grants payable are payments made in furtherance of the charitable objectives of the charity. Grants are recognised upon an obligation being created in accordance with FRS12.

1 Accounting policies continued

Charitable activities

Costs of charitable activities includes grants made and direct costs in relation to publications, and an apportionment of overhead and support costs.

Support costs

Support costs have been allocated as a direct cost or allocated between charitable activities and governance. The analysis of overhead and support costs is shown in note 5.

Governance costs

Governance costs comprise all costs involving the public accountability of the charity and its compliance with regulation and good practice. These costs include costs related to a statutory independent examination together with trustees' expenses and an apportionment of overhead and support costs.

Funds held and their purpose

The General fund is used principally for the support of Gospel Standard chapels by way of grants and loans. The committee considers individually each application for assistance and provides a grant or loan or both depending on circumstances. The Publications fund is used for the publishing and distribution of Christian books. Legacies, donations and proceeds from chapel sales received specifically for either of those two funds are credited accordingly, otherwise such income is allocated under the discretion of the committee. The Endowment fund cannot be spent and the income is to be used for the general purposes of the Trust.

Trustees Report for 2011

Through the goodness and faithfulness of the Lord the Library has been maintained for another year during which books have been borrowed, and information of interest for family histories, projects and home schooling has been located and researched

This year there has been a slight increase of books loaned from 452 - 475 but the number of borrowers has remained about the same although there have been several new ones both within the denomination and elsewhere.

There have been 128 accessions to the Library this year, (including duplicates), a good many of which have been amongst books donated to the Library In particular there were a number of books from the estate of the late J C Morgan many of which are Religious Censuses and other books of value for research We are grateful to the Gospel Standard Trust Publications, The Huntingtonian Press, Dr M J Hyde and others for donations of new publications.

There has been some increase in books donated and the income from second-hand books sales is up by 13%. We are always glad when good literature finds its way into new homes where it is appreciated, rather than being discarded, and would be pleased for any future donations when friends are either condensing or disposing of books.

The Friendly Companion from 1875-2003 was scanned into electronic format with OCR by Hollingworth & Moss and an index, apart from the first 7 years, has been completed by Muriel Stonelake. John Kingham has correlated the PDF files and the index and provided the necessary links. We hope that by the end of February the index will be complete and the DVD will then be available. We are very grateful to both Muriel Stonelake and John Kingham for all the work that this has entailed and also to The Gospel Standard Trust who have financed the project.

Chapel records held at the Library, except those of the London chapels, have been deposited at the relevant Record Offices via John Broome and the Wiltshire Record Office, who have then channelled them to the appropriate Authority Because of the recession and the subsequent reduction in funding (about 30%) for Record Offices, photocopies of Church Minute Books have not been provided and only one authority sent digital photographs.

A list of the Chapels, Record Offices and Accession/Reference numbers is being compiled and will be available from the Library or on-line, when completed, so that any future research will be facilitated

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Trustees Report for 2011 continued

Donations to the Library have increased slightly and we are very grateful for a grant of £2,000 from The Gospel Standard Trust and also to the Trustees of Fitzwilliam Chapel which has now closed. Expenditure has again exceeded income so there is still some cause for concern.

Handrails have been installed by the steps outside the Library to make it easier and safer for anyone visiting the Library with any disability

The Annexe in Sheboygan is used a little more with a small increase in the number of borrowers in the USA. It is hoped that the Library there will be of greater benefit in the future.

Repair and rebinding of books continues as necessary and when time permits.

We acknowledge the continued goodness and faithfulness of the Lord in affording help and wisdom to our Librarians, and pray that He will continue to go before them and the Trustees to assist and guide in all the concerns and decisions to be made in the coming year
