#### CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT FOR THE PERIOD ENDED 5 JANUARY 2014

#### Dear Shareholder

I can scarcely believe that twelve months have passed so quickly and once against I am writing my introduction to the annual accounts. The production of this report offers a chance to catch breath and relay to you just how much has been achieved at the Railway during 2013 and what a really valuable difference shareholder funds are making to our Railway.

I am glad to report that 2013 was again a profitable year £61,891 even after absorbing budgeted and unbudgeted additional costs. Sales in 2013 were more than £500,000 higher than 2012. We used some of the margin on those extra sales to further budgeted increase in the staffing at Bridgnorth Motive Power Department (MPD). At the 2012 AGM we announced a significant investment in MPD, the objective of which is to increase the efficiency by which we overhaul and maintain locomotives thus increasing the number of engines in our running fleet. I am pleased to say that in 2013, whilst the measurement is rudimentary, the fleet availability through the year has been excellent and the intermediate overhaul of locomotive 43106 in less than nine months was quite an achievement. MPD have recruited further essential staff during the year including a Boilershop Chargehand, Dave Howell, a new fitter machinist, Tomas Jones, and confirmed Richard Kempton as the Mechanical Foreman. The team at MPD have used their expertise to remove what has been affectionately been called 'Tranter Towers' from the shed building. It is in fact a collection of cabins and containers that have been used as offices and storage. The removal of these structures has increased the workshop space and allowed new fitting bays to be installed and one of the shed roads to be extended. The introduction of an automated programmable lathe within the boilershop, and employment of Alex Bradbury as Operator/Programmer in 2013, has also proved to be a boon as the Railway now has the capacity to produce boiler stays in quantity for both ourselves and customers. Partly as a consequence MPD contract sales in 2013 are £300,000 up from £200,000 in 2012. The Company profit margin also reflects non-budgeted cost pressures felt during the year. The demise of Scottish Coal forced the Railway to find an alternative supplier urgently. This was done successfully, but there was a significant increase in the cost per tonne which saw an increase in coal, oil and water expense of £83,000 in comparison to 2012. The Company took the initiative to establish the Heritage Skills Training Academy in its pilot year, further details below, but all project costs including salaries were underwritten by the Holdings Plc.

The Railway saw an improvement in passenger numbers of 9,000 to 211,000 in the year. The 2013 marketing campaign undoubtedly contributed to an increase in passengers over the summer. The campaign was directed at the family market and centred on a 20 second television advert with the strapline 'Every Journey Ends With a Memory'. The campaign was also reinforced by bill board advertising across the West Midlands and on-train advertising on London Midland trains through the summer months. The campaign saw an extra 7,363 passengers visit the Railway in the holiday months of July and August 2013 compared with 2012. These additional passenger visits helped enormously in surpassing our year end passenger target. Achieving the target was not all plain sailing however and the weather as usual had to play its part during the year. In particular the appalling snowy conditions in March 2013 effectively halved the expected number of Spring Gala visitors.

The SVR is known for its varied events calendar and in 2013 events continued to play an important role in bringing in significant numbers of passengers and enthusiasts. The introduction of Peppa Pig, (a well-known children's cartoon character) as a family event, proved to be hugely popular with 4,630 visiting over an April weekend. Such was its popularity that overcrowding became an issue on trains and at stations. This has prompted a change in format to the event for 2014 to alleviate this problem. The introduction of a Ladies Day in July added a different twist and feel to the Railway which felt more like a Ladies Day at Ascot Races. These events complimented the traditional favourites of the 1940's weekends, the Autumn Gala and the Santa Service which always prove to be popular and successful.

Our Footplate Experience Courses, through the auspices of the new Footplate Coordinator Lewis Maddox, saw a considerable growth in 2013 with an increase in sales of £65,000 or 68% compared to the prior year. Footplate courses expanded to include some of the visiting Gala locomotives in 2013 and for example the opportunity to drive an Autocoach and the Deltic on the SVR proved to be very popular.

It would be remiss if I did not take this opportunity to again thank shareholders for their truly tremendous response to the 2012 Share Offer; to issue over two million shares within twelve months is remarkable for any organisation and especially notable for a heritage railway. The funds are making a fantastic difference to what the Railway can achieve both now and in the coming years. Three of the most important projects from the Share Offer document are Bridgnorth Redevelopment, the Heritage Skills Training Academy and the overhaul of Company Locomotive 4930 Hagley Hall. I would like to give you an update on progress in 2013 on these projects:

With regard to the redevelopment of the Bridgnorth site the dedicated Project Team led by Ian Baxter have spent an extraordinary number of hours preparing the options analysis and developing the business plans to support a final proposal ready for publication this summer 2014. The project has shown very significant progress and is on schedule for the project team Sponsor to update the Board in April, with the master plan ready for July and a planning application going to the council in August. The Board have 'ring fenced' 2012 Share Offer funds to support this vital project.

The Heritage Skills Academy is coming up for its first anniversary. Three trainees, James Lewis, Chris Bird and Max Green, have been undertaking 'on the job' training at the Carriage Departments at Bewdley and Kidderminster and the Motive Power Department at Bridgnorth, whilst also attending a full time course at Telford College in engineering. They have proved under the guidance of the Project Coordinator Richard Thurlow that the Academy concept really does work, and recruitment is already underway for the 2014 intake of trainees. The popularity of this venture has created great publicity resulting in a recent appearance on Countryfile as well as numerous other appearances on TV and in the press.

Company owned locomotive 4930 Hagley Hall has been out of traffic for 27 years. Always a popular engine, its overhaul and the restoration of the Great Western carriages was included as a project in the Share Offer document. In October 2013, with great ceremony, Hagley Hall was carefully shunted from The Engine House and dispatched to Bridgnorth ready for its overhaul. The Friends of Hagley Hall have supported this venture in many ways and have already organised a swap of its tender, meaning that the locomotive, once restored to its prime, will be coupled to a more appropriate Collett tender. In my introduction to the Share Offer document I stated that where possible the Railway would look to secure funding from outside the Railway using share offer funds as a 'match' to external funds. Through the offices of the Severn Valley Railway Charitable Trust (SVRCT) I can report to shareholders that whilst £200,000 of share offer funds has been allocated towards the overhaul of Hagley Hall £95,000 has been awarded by the Heritage Lottery Fund towards parts and materials used in the overhaul of the locomotive. The restoration of Great Western (GW) carriages is an important element of the project and during 2013, coach 1146 entered Bewdley Carriage works to undergo repair and repainting. This will be the first in a number of GW carriages entering the works.

The Company continues to invest heavily in its infrastructure to maintain a safe and well cared for Railway. Over the last two years £1 million has been invested in infrastructure works. During the last year major projects have included the replacement drainage scheme at Bridgnorth, back drive in preparation for the re-development work at Bridgnorth. Track replacement at Fishermans Crossing and further improvements to the drainage at Eyemore Cutting have been made during the year. The replacement of the water treatment plant at Kidderminster and improvement to the exchange sidings from the SVR main line. There is no doubt heavy expenditure will be required to continue in the coming years.

Of course none of the above would be possible without the unstinting support and dedication of our Working Members who continue to support our Railway with such passion. Last year this achievement received national recognition. The Queen's Award for Volunteering was awarded to the Railway by the Lord Lieutenants of Shropshire and Worcestershire and received by Alan Longdon, Deputy Chairman of the Guarantee Company, on behalf of all Working Members on the Railway. The award is the equivalent of a volunteer MBE! This is a prestigious accolade for the Railway and, in particular, the volunteers who dedicate so much of their time and skills to the SVR.

Shareholders will note that the SVRCT is now integral and essential to the fundraising success of the SVR. In 2013, it financially supported the Heritage Skills Training Academy and the Hagley Hall overhaul. Shareholders and shareholding will always be an important part of the SVR with the Charity as an organisation with the ability

to access funding opportunities that hitherto have been unavailable to the Railway. I am sure we all look forward to working closely with our SVRCT colleagues in 2014.

The Railway has survived the recent rain storms of January and February 2014. However, a couple of small landslips at Sterns and Bridgnorth continue to remind us that our infrastructure continues to require maintenance and investments to secure its longevity and safe operation.

Looking forward to 2014 and beyond, there are many exciting projects now coming to a point of design completion and construction. By July this year we will have the masterplan for the Bridgnorth Station site, the construction of the Diesel Depot at Kidderminster will commence in the final quarter of the year. Furthermore the Railway will have moved into its new Company offices at Kidderminster in April, plus there will be further important news on the negotiations concerning the locomotive lease agreements. I look forward to meeting you at the Shareholders AGM and providing further relevant information and analysis on the successes of 2013.

Thank you for your continued support for this most wonderful of Railways.

The Directors present their report and the Financial Statements for the period ended 5 January 2014.

#### **DIRECTORS' RESPONSIBILITIES STATEMENT**

The Directors are responsible for preparing the Strategic Report, the Directors' Report and the Financial Statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

Company law requires the Directors to prepare Financial Statements for each financial year. Under that law the Directors have elected to prepare the Financial Statements in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable law). Under company law the Directors must not approve the Financial Statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company and of the profit or loss of the company for that period. In preparing these Financial Statements, the Directors are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgments and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the Financial Statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue in business.

The Directors are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the company's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and enable them to ensure that the Financial Statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

#### **RESULTS AND DIVIDENDS**

The profit for the period, after taxation, amounted to £61,891 (2013 - £58,158).

In accordance with the special resolutions passed at the Extraordinary General Meeting of the Company on 19 December 1997, the Memorandum and Articles of Association of the Company no longer permit either the payment of dividends or the participation of members in the distribution of any residual property or assets upon the winding up or dissolution of the Company.

#### QUALIFYING THIRD PARTY INDEMNITY PROVISIONS

During the year, an indemnity from the Company was available to the directors against liabilities that might be incurred by them in defending proceedings against them in respect of the affairs of the Company. The indemnity is subject to the provisions of the Companies Act and is set out in the Articles of Association.

#### STRATEGIC REPORT FOR THE PERIOD ENDED 5 JANUARY 2014

#### INTRODUCTION

The principal activity of the Company is to operate the Severn Valley Railway between Bridgnorth in Shropshire and Kidderminster in Worcestershire and the financial statements are drawn up to the accounting reference period of 5 January 2014 (*prior period - 6 January 2013*) to correspond with the end of the Company's 'festive season' running schedule.

#### **BUSINESS REVIEW**

The Directors are pleased to report that 2013 was again a profitable year, with a profit for the year of £61,891. A comparison of 2012 to 2013 accounts shows that sales have increased by £637,314, driven by growth in passenger numbers.

More than 211,000 people visited the railway in 2013, exceeding initial forecast numbers by more than 6,000 passengers and representing an increase of nearly 9,000 passengers compared to 2012's figures. This growth is attributed to a number of factors including a host of well-attended events and a bumper summer season. The new-format family fun weekends attracted nearly 7,000 visitors and the Santa and festive season services attracted over 45,000 passengers in December. The Company also invested in a campaign to encourage families to spend a day out on the railway, including TV advertising for the first time since 2010.

During 2013 significant progress was made to increase the efficiency of locomotive overhauls at Bridgnorth Motive Power Department (MPD) where the continuing objective is to increase the company's ability to overhaul and maintain its locomotive fleet. MPD recruited further essential staff during the year to support this objective and to continue to develop its ability to provide external contract engineering services. MPD contract sales in 2013 are £334,000.

The Company's Net Asset position at 5 January 2013 grew by £1,036.035 with respect to the 2012 position; this increase was driven by Shareholders' fantastic response to the Share Offer.

Looking forward to 2014 and beyond, there are many exciting projects now coming to a point of design completion and construction. By July 2014, the masterplan for the Bridgnorth Station site will be developed and the construction of the Diesel Depot at Kidderminster will commence in the final quarter of the year. Furthermore, the Railway will have moved into its new Company offices at Kidderminster in April, plus there will be an update on the negotiations concerning the locomotive maintenance agreements and their impact on the financial accounts which will be carefully monitored.

#### PRINCIPAL RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Directors consider the following issues to be the Company's main risks and uncertainties:

- Continue to operate within the company's safety management system
- The current economic situation and its impact on disposable income
- Weather and its impact on the number of passengers
- Availability of coal, oil and other necessary resources
- Age of working volunteers and their continuing support of the Railway
- Risk of not finding funding for ongoing repairs or future projects
- Availability and recruitment of skilled staff
- Ongoing changes to legislation
- Environmental issues
- Compliance with Health & Safety

In order to mitigate these risks and uncertainties, the Directors produce detailed business plans and monitor progress against these.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE PERIOD ENDED 5 JANUARY 2014

#### 1. PRINCIPAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The Financial Statements have been prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 2006 and applicable Accounting Standards in the United Kingdom. A summary of the accounting policies, which have been applied consistently, are set out below.

#### 1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The Financial Statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The Directors have drawn up these accounts to the accounting reference period of 5 January 2014 (6 January 2013) to correspond with the end of the Company's 'festive season' running schedule.

When preparing these Financial Statements, the Directors have assessed the Company's ability to continue as a going concern. As a result of this assessment, no material uncertainties have been identified by the Directors that may cast significant doubt about the ability of the Company to continue as a going concern.

The Company's business activities, together with the factors likely to affect its future development, performance and position are set out in the Strategic Report.

The Company meets its day-to-day working capital requirements through cash reserves. An overdraft facility is retained which is due for renewal in July 2014. The Company's forecasts and projections show that the Company should be able to operate within the level of its current facility. The Company will hold renewal negotiations with the Bank in due course and has, at this stage, not sought any written commitment that the facility will be renewed. However, since the year end, the Company has held discussions with the Bank about its future borrowing needs and no matters have been drawn to its attention to suggest that renewal may not be forthcoming on acceptable terms.

The Directors have a reasonable expectation that the Company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Therefore they continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the annual Financial Statements.

#### 1.2 Turnover

Turnover comprises revenue recognised by the company in respect of goods and services supplied during the period, exclusive of Value Added Tax and trade discounts.

Income associated with credit sales is recognised at the point an invoice is raised. Invoices are raised once the Company becomes entitled to consideration for goods and services supplied.

Income associated with cash sales is recognised at the point of sale for non-refundable goods and services. Where services are purchased in advance of the date that the service is provided, the income is deferred until the date of supply.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE PERIOD ENDED 5 JANUARY 2014

#### 1. PRINCIPAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

#### 1.3 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

The cost of acquired fixed assets is their purchase cost, together with any incidental costs of acquisition.

Capital work in progress comprises the cost of capital projects under development, which includes, where appropriate, elements of specifically identifiable and attributable internal labour costs. Capital projects comprise major repair or refurbishment works, which give rise to a significant and continuing economic benefit to the Railway. Depreciation is provided against the cost of such projects in the period in which they are completed.

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of tangible fixed assets, less their estimated residual values, over the expected useful economic lives of the assets concerned. The principal annual rates used for this purpose are:

Freehold buildings and permanent-

2% - 20% on cost

Locomotives and rolling stock
Office and computer equipment

5% - 10% on cost

Office and computer equipment - 20% - 25% on cost Motor vehicles - 20% - 25% on cost

Commercial fixtures, fittings and - 4% - 20% on cost

Freehold land is not depreciated.

Where fixed assets are acquired with the aid of specific grants, they are capitalised and depreciated as above. The related grants are treated as deferred capital grants and released to income over the expected useful life of the asset.

#### 1.4 Operating leases

Costs in respect of operating leases are charged on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

#### 1.5 Stocks

Stocks and work in progress are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value and include goods for resale and stores of goods for use in operation of the Railway. In general, cost is determined on a first-in first-out basis and includes transport and handling costs. Where necessary, provision is made for obsolete, slow moving and defective stocks.

#### 1.6 Deferred taxation

Provision is made in full for all taxation deferred in respect of timing differences that have originated but not reversed by the balance sheet date, except for gains on disposal of fixed assets which will be rolled over into replacement assets. No provision is made for taxation on permanent differences.

Deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is more likely than not that they will be recovered.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are not discounted.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE PERIOD ENDED 5 JANUARY 2014

#### 1. PRINCIPAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

#### 1.7 Pension costs

The Company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Amounts falling due are charged to the Profit and Loss Account as incurred.

#### 1.8 Grants

Grants are released to the Profit and Loss Account over the same period to which the related costs are charged once confirmation of the grant amount to be received is certain. Where the grant is for a capital project, it is released to the Profit and Loss Account over the same period as the asset is depreciated. Where the grant is for a revenue project, it is recognised in the same period as the expenditure.

#### 1.9 Rental Income

Rental income is recognised on an accruals basis.

#### 1.10 Locomotives and Rolling Stock

These arrangements are in the nature of operating leases. Repairs and maintenance are provided for in accordance with the locomotive and rolling stock agreements. Costs of repairs and maintenance, over and above those in the terms of the agreement, are charged to the Profit and Loss Account as incurred.

#### 2. TURNOVER

In the opinion of the Directors, the Company's business is a single entity, that of operating a heritage railway, with a scheduled service, in the United Kingdom.

All turnover arose within the United Kingdom.

#### Loan 1 - Kidderminster

The loan limit is capped at £550,000 and was initially repayable in monthly instalments of £3,863 repayable within twenty years from draw down in April 2006. From 1 April 2008, monthly instalments were increased to £4,000 (including interest) in order to accelerate repayment of the capital amount. At 5 January 2014 £42,960 is repayable within one year, £171,852 repayable in 2 to 5 years and £73,163 repayable in over 5 years.

Interest is charged at 1.25% over the HSBC Bank plc base rate.

#### Loan 2 - Arley and Bewdley South Viaduct

The loan limit is capped at £500,000 and is repayable over a term of five years. The total amount drawn down was £492,918 and repayment commenced on 4 April 2011 at a rate of £8,928 (including interest). At 6 January 2013 £100,858 is repayable within one year and £114,968 repayable in 2 to 5 years.

Interest is charged at 2.24% over the HSBC Bank plc base rate.

Both bank borrowings are secured by means of a fixed charge over all book debts and freehold properties and a floating charge over certain assets, goodwill, undertakings and uncalled capital, both present and future.

Deferred income includes grants and public donations received towards Kidderminster carriage shed, Kidderminster station building improvements, Highley Engine House and Bridgnorth locomotive shed roof refurbishment.

The grants and donations are being released to the Profit and Loss Account over the economic useful life of the respective asset and in line with depreciation for freehold buildings.

#### Factors that may affect future tax charges

The tax rate of 20% (2013 - 20%) has been used, as the Directors consider that this is the rate applicable to the Company taking into account its expected level of future profits.

The Company has a potential deferred tax asset of £719,373 (2013 - £718,803) relating to tax losses carried forward and a potential deferred tax asset of £833,728 (2013 - £875,567) relating to fixed asset timing differences.

The potential deferred tax assets have not been provided for, as the Directors cannot be sure that there will be sufficient taxable profits against which these assets can reverse in the foreseeable future.
