## Report of the trustees (incorporating the directors' report) for the year ended 31 March 2013

The trustees present their report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2013. The trustees, who are also directors of Banner Theatre Company Ltd for the purposes of company law and who served during the year and up to the date of this report are set out on page 1.

#### Structure, governance and management

Charitable objects

- 1) The promotion of education in music, drama and visual arts amongst the community, and
- 2) to provide facilities in the interests of social welfare for the recreation and other leisure time occupation with the object of improving the conditions of life for the persons for whom such facilities are primarily intended

## Report of the trustees (incorporating the directors' report) for the year ended 31 March 2013

#### Achievements and performance

Annual Report 2013

Although it has been another very difficult year financially with less income being generated through fee-paying performances (21 this year as opposed to 42 last year), we have managed to keep our income on par with last year's through grants and commissions for a number of different performance projects

In April we received the first tranche of our £40,000 grant from the Arts Council England for The Future Makers, our new show, which explores the effects of the government's austerity programme on young people. We also received financial support for this production from the GFTU, UNITE the Union, the CYWU, and Choose Youth. We were also commissioned by the GFTU to develop and perform The Union Gap, and managed to raise the funds to develop and perform The Battle of Saltley Gate. We also received financial support from Unison to continue developing our current touring production of Fighting the Cuts, which enabled us to add two new sections to the show. All of which meant that, despite the financial difficulties, it has also been one of our most creative and productive years for some time, with the projects that have been developed having the potential to generate more income in the years to come

Fighting the Cuts toured to 18 union and community organisations, including a performance to ASDA checkout assistants at Wortley Hall in Sheffield The two new sections that were added told the stories of ambulance workers in Manchester who were campaigning against the privatisation and outsourcing of the passenger transport services to Arriva buses, and disabled people in Cardiff who were campaigning against the outsourcing of 'disability monitoring' to Atos, the French multinational, which has resulted in a devastating increase in the numbers of 'unreported' deaths among disabled people

The Battle of Saltley Gate marked the 40th anniversary of a major act of solidarity by 20,000 Birmingham car workers who came out to support the miners who were striking for better pay and conditions. Saltley veterans were videoed as they reflected on the significance of the 1972 struggle on the struggles of today. Banner also worked with internationally renowned storyteller Graham Langley to develop storytelling as an extra component in Banners well-established video ballad techniques. The final production combined music, song, drama, and storytelling and was the highlight of the Taking the Gloves off Festival at South Birmingham College.

The Union Gap is an interactive theatre performance that highlights the value of unions, and both their historical importance and current positive impact on the everyday lives of workers in Britain. The dramatic scenario was broken into two key segments—the first portrayed a nightmarish world where unions had never existed, and where audience members were inducted into the 'company-from-hell', and the second involved a workplace dispute in a world of strong and effective unions that truly represented the concerns of everyday working people. A new creative team was recruited and the show premiered at the GFTU's Youth Conference in early 2013.

#### Plans for future periods

The Future Makers was due to tour in the Autumn 2012, however, due to a variety of logistical problems, the tour was put back into 2013 Following extensive video interviews with a diverse range of young people, a script with songs and video material was developed and previewed at the GFTU Conference in early 2013. The feedback we received was overwhelmingly positive and the stage was set for the production to tour in the North West and West Midlands from the Summer 2013 onwards.

In July we collaborated with Exeter University Drama department and worked with a group of young women from local care homes using digital storytelling techniques that mixed song, video and storytelling to artistically express their experiences growing up in Council care homes in Exeter. We were also commissioned by Exeter University to create a song/video satirical sequence on the theme of 'creativity' focussing on how different sections of society had very different ideas on what was, or was not, 'creative'

In Spring 2013 Don Bouzek from Ground Zero productions in Edmonton, Canada, visited the company to help develop our long term planning with a particular focus on a major new project celebrating Banner's 40th anniversary in 2014

The only addition to Banner's key personnel was Phil Girling who joined the company in April 2012 on a freelance basis as Project Coordinator on The Future Makers and The Union Gap Eve Steele Louise Nulty and Murray Taylor were recruited for The Union Gap, and the show directed by Cheryl Martin, and Kerri Layton was recruited for The Future Makers, due to tour next year

Many thanks to the company for all their hard work and dedication in extremely difficult financial circumstances, however the successes of the year have proved just how resilient, creative and relevant Banner Theatre continues to be

#### Statement of trustees' responsibilities

### Notes to financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2013

### 1. Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies are summarised below. The accounting policies have been applied consistently throughout the year and the preceding year.

#### 1.1. Basis of accounting

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' issued in March 2005 (SORP 2005) and the Companies Act 2006

#### 1.2. Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are expendable at the discretion of the Directors in the furtherance of the objects of the charity. The directors may for administrative purposes, or to comply with best accounting practice treat part of unrestricted funds as a separate fund. This does not legally restrict the trustees' discretion to apply the funds as they see fit

Restricted funds can, because of the wishes of funders' only be expended at the discretion of the Directors in accordance with the grant application and in the furtherance of the particular project

#### 1.3. Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income

Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations and gifts and is included in full in the statement of financial activities when receivable. Grants where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant

Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included

Gifts donated for resale are included as incoming resources within activities for generating funds when they are sold

Grants, including grants for the purchase of fixed assets, are recognised in full in the statement of financial activities in the year in which they are receivable

Income from investments is included in the year in which it is receivable

## Notes to financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2013

#### 1.4. Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates

Costs of generating funds comprise the costs associated with attracting voluntary income and the costs of trading for fundraising purposes including the charity's shop

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them

Support costs are those costs incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the charity and include project management

#### 1.5. Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows
