OUR PURPOSE AND ACTIVITIES

- 1) To advance public education in the history of marine vessels by the preservation and public display of vessels at their disposal
- 2) To acquire, maintain and preserve exhibits for public display
- 3) The Society endeavours to provide educational facilities and tours for the benefit of the public at large.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

The Society had a quite year with regard to activities involving the vessel Massey Shaw. Unfortunately, one of the main marine engines suffered a catastrophic failure whilst returning from Dunkirk Little Ship event in Ipswich in May 2018. The engine has had to be stripped down and the restoration has taken longer than expected, resulting in several sailings being cancelled and revenue lost.

The Directors authorised a fund-raising campaign to help with the repair of the engine. The campaign raised £3,750 by the end of the year and a further £2,300 by the date of this report. We are actively working to further increase our finances so that the works on the engine can be completed and we can move forward with our planned activities in 2021.

On a positive note our partnership with the Docklands Scout Project and Canal & River Trust continues to bear fruit. We continue to work together to promote activities in the dock where we are moored and engage with people from the local community.

The Society has managed to build upon its partnership with the London Fire Brigade Fire Cadets and Docklands Scout Project to establish a Marine Unit that provides Marine and Water Safety skills to young people from various Boroughs across the capital. It is intended to expand the above programme during the coming year and provide more opportunities to learn about the River Fire Service.

The Society continues with its working toward becoming an Accredited Independent Museum. Our volunteers continue to produce a comprehensive archive of material based on Firefighting on the River and our vessel's unique history. The next phase will be to digitalise some areas of the archive to allow greater access to members of the public and researchers. During the year our volunteers have welcomed a number of individuals, families and historical groups to the vessel to learn about Massey Shaw's history and how it contributes to the history of the Thames and the capital. Many visitors also visit our Website and follow our activities on social media which is a growing area of our work.

The Society continues with its work with local historical groups and schools by providing support to their Open Days and providing talks on a wide range of subjects. During the Covid period these events have transitioned to online.

The Society has attended a number of London Fire Brigade and Fire Service Preservation Group Open Days and Events on shore throughout the year thanks to the efforts of our volunteers who have given up their time and energies to promote the work of the organisation.

During the coming year the Society will endeavour to increase its efforts to improve funding opportunities by working with other heritage organisations and attracting more members and volunteers to develop the organisations brand. In addition, we have opened an on line shop to promote branded merchandise and other items for people to purchase. We hope to increase this area of our work into new areas during the coming year.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

During the coming months, the Society expects to be able to repair the starboard engine and bring the Massey Shaw back into use. Trials of the repaired engine are expected in late 2020 or early 2021. The Association of Dunkirk Little Shops 2020 Anniversary sailing to Dunkirk was postponed due to the Covid-19 crisis, it is planned that the 2020 trip will take place in May 2021. It is the intention of the Directors to have the Massey Shaw ready to take her place in that trip.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The Society's income increased to £9,902 (2018; £8,823) predominantly composed of donations: Restricted £3,790 (2018; £0) and unrestricted £4,822 (2018; £8,733). The restricted donations were made to assist in the repair of the damaged engine. The Directors are very grateful to the following for their financial support during the year:

Additionally, one member donated £1,000, requesting anonymity. Expenditure fell from £9,781 to £6,622, reflecting the laying-up of the vessel and the repairs to the engine being undertaken by our volunteers. The Directors wish to acknowledge their gratitude to:

All the Society's contributors are volunteers and gave of their time freely, without claims for travel expenses. On rare occasions the volunteers claim for their purchase of spares and consumables used on the Massey Shaw. Again, the Directors wish to express their thanks to all for their invaluable contribution.

Insurance continues to be the biggest expense of the Society and the Directors keep the cost under close scrutiny but are understandably reluctant to own the vessel without proper insurance as salvage costs at the mooring would be significant.

INVESTMENT POWERS AND POLICY

The Trust does not have any investments, due to lack of funds, except for some SSE plc shares received as a donation. The shares will be sold when the markets recover.

RESERVES POLICY and GOING CONCERN

The Directors reviewed the Reserves Policy in 2018 and so no review was undertaken in 2019. The policy is still to generate sufficient reserves to allow for periodic maintenance. Unrestricted Reserves as at December 2019 were £4,827 (2018: £5,377). The Directors have reviewed the finances of the Trust and consider that it is a going concern and have produced the accounts on that basis.

STRUCTURE - GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT (INCLUDING PAY POLICY FOR SENIOR STAFF)

The Society was constituted in 1982 as a voluntary organisation. A Board of Directors oversees the running of the Society. All the Directors, who are elected by the members, are volunteers and do not receive any remuneration nor claim any expenses. Board Members have the responsibility for one or more areas i.e. Membership, Finance, Fund-raising, Restoration and Promotion. One Director is re-elected at each AGM.

Newly elected members of the Board have their appointment confirmed at the next AGM. The Society continues to review its procedures to ensure that it is compliant with the Best Practice Guidelines of the Charity Commission.

The Society can, and does, co-opt individuals to the Board for specific advice and support. The Society is a Company limited by guarantee as well as a charity.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in the notes to the accounts and comply with the charity's governing document, the Charities Act 2011 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice.

This report has been prepared in accordance with the provisions applicable to companies entitled to the small company's exemption.

RISK MANAGEMENT

The Directors keep risk under continuous review, including the loss of the vessel and changes to Maritime and Coastguard Agency requirements for a licenced passenger vessel the Massey Shaw is coded to carry up to 15 people, of which 6 are crew.

During 2019 man overboard and other safety drills were undertaken and improvements to the vessel made as a consequence of the lessons learned in retrieving an individual from the water.

The CEO, David Rogers, led a review of the operation of the vessel because of the Covid-19 pandemic. The vessel was closed to visitors and volunteers between March and June 2020. The Directors are grateful to the Docklands Scout Project, where the vessel is berthed, for using their CCTV system to keep the Massey Shaw under surveillance during the closure.

The vessel re-opened to volunteers in late June 2020, under social distancing requirements, for engine repairs and general maintenance. After a review of how the requirements worked the vessel was opened to a limited number of visitors from July 2020 and the first two visitors have been welcomed aboard.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in the notes to the accounts and comply with the charity's governing document, the Charity's Act 2011 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice.

1. Accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement on Recommended Practise applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

Cash Flow

The financial statements do not include a cash flow statement because the charity, as a small reporting entity, is exempt from the requirement to prepare such a statement under Financial Reporting Standard 1 "Cash flow statements".

1.2 Incoming Resources

Income from donations and grants, including capital grants, is included in incoming resources when these are receivable.

When donors specify that donations and grants, including capital grants are for a particular restricted purpose, this income is included in incoming resources of restricted funds when receivable.

1.3 Resources expended and recognition of liabilities

All expenditure is incurred on an accruals basis. The majority of costs are directly attributable to the specific charitable activities.

Liabilities are recognised on the accruals basis in accordance with normal accounting principles.

Management and administration of the Charity represent costs incurred in the management of the Charity's assets, organisational administration and compliance with charitable and statutory requirements.
