ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a) Accounting convention

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable UK law and accounting standards.

b) Cash flow statement

Under FRS1 Cash Flow Statements (revised 1996) the company is exempt from the requirement to prepare a cash flow statement on the grounds that it is a 90% subsidiary undertaking of the BT Pension Scheme.

c) Deferred tax

Deferred taxation is provided in full on timing differences that result in an obligation at the balance sheet date to pay more tax, or a right to pay less tax at a future date, at rates expected to apply when they crystallise based on current tax rates and law. Timing differences arise from the inclusion of items of income an expenditure in taxation computations in periods different from those in which they are included in financial statements. Deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is regarded as more likely than not that they will be recovered.

d) Shareholders' funds

There has been no movement in shareholders' funds and therefore no reconciliation of movement in shareholders' funds is included in these financial statements.

e) Investments

Investments are valued at cost less impaired investments.

2. AUDIT FEES

The auditors' remuneration for the years ended 31 December 2005 and 31 December 2004 was borne by the BT Pension Scheme.
