Structure, governance and management

Governing document

Lambeth Accord is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 9th March 1984 and registered as a charity on 24th April 1984. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association, which established the objectives and powers of the charitable company. It is governed under its Memorandum & Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up, members' liability is limited to £0.25p.

Recruitment and Appointment of Management Committee

The Directors of the company are charity trustees in accordance with charity law. Under the company's Articles they are also designated as members of the Executive Committee. They are elected to serve for a period of one year and elections take place annually at the Annual General Meeting.

Recruitment and Appointment of Management Committee (cont)

Members of the Executive Committee have a broad range of skills and experience including voluntary sector management at a senior level, social enterprise development and building management.

Following the recruitment of six new trustees in the last few years, the Committee now has access to greater expertise in terms of finance, property development and management, property and charity law and planning, all key areas in terms of its future strategy.

The trustees delegate day-to-day management to the manager Adrian Hams.

Pay and remuneration of key management is set by reference to market conditions.

Risk Management

Lambeth Accord regularly undertakes a review of major risks; financial, legal and other, to which the charity is potentially exposed and systems and procedures are in place to manage those risks. The Executive Committee has taken a very prudent approach to the organisation's finances to ensure that appropriate levels of funds are held in reserve while continuing to invest in the maintenance of the building to meet its responsibilities to tenant organisations and service users where required

Objectives and activities

The company is a charity that exists to promote the social and economic inclusion of disabled people within the community. Our operating name is 'We are 336', which reflects the ethos of the building.

In setting its objectives the trustees have due regard to the Charity Commission guidance on public benefit.

Supporting and Working with Disability Organisations

We offer accessible and affordable office accommodation to disability charities. The number of disability organisations in the building that Accord has supported this year is 18.

Lambeth Accord has regularly offered work experience placement opportunities to disabled people some of which have led to paid employment. We have worked with Status Employment, South London and Maudsley NHS Foundation Trust and other local voluntary organisations. These opportunities help people prepare for the world of work.

Lambeth Accord has a positive action procurement policy, to purchase goods and services from local disability organisations. During this year Lambeth Accord has continued to work closely with Abbeville's Restaurant and Carpet Cleaning Care.

We support a One Stop Shop located at 336 Brixton Road. This enables groups within the centre to deliver a variety of regular face to face advice and information sessions and the facility is also available to external disability services which wish to widen their reach.

Lambeth Accord continues to be a partner in the Lambeth Council's Community Hubs Development Programme. Lambeth Accord is currently coordinating work with a range of third sector organisations on the development of a property framework / protocol to seek consistency and fairness in the third sector's use of Lambeth Council property and other assets.

Supporting and Working with Disability Organisations (cont.)

Lambeth Accord has played a leading roll Volunteer and Community Sector, Property Subgroup, which has started to work with and lobby Lambeth Council to develop constant approach and standards in dealing with VCS organisation in the Lambeth Council properties, to ensure fairness and transparency on all sides.

During the year Lambeth Accord has coordinated or supported a number of partnership initiatives with other disability organisations in the centre including the Lambeth Disability Hate Crime Partnership. The 336 building is now a reporting centre for Disability Hate Crime co-ordinated through the DASL Hate Crime Advocacy and Outreach Worker. The charity has also collaborated with the tenant organisations on initiatives to further raise the profile of We are 336 and the services based here. A joint information market was held again in 2019 to showcase the work of the charities to a wide audience of Disabled people, carers and professionals.

Community Conference Centre and other uses of the centre

This has been extensively used throughout the year by a wide range of local community groups and statutory agencies. Local employers have also used this venue for events and programmes which enhance access to employment opportunities for long term unemployed people.

A number of local disability organisations were supported by Lambeth Accord through subsidised or free use of the conference facilities for training workshops, interviews and meetings.

Performance and Developments

The main focus for the year has been the building development project, the end objective being the major refurbishment and expansion of the current site. The Directors' aim is to transform the building into a 'state of the art' accessible office resource for disability organisations and a first class inclusive conference and meeting facility.

Despite a continuing very challenging financial climate which has affected not just Lambeth Accord, but those organisations which occupy our office space and which use our conference facilities, our income has been maintained at a satisfactory level.

- Lambeth Accord has started to change to the new energy efficient LED lighting, starting in
 areas with no daylight. The aim is both to save on electricity and to reduce the amount of
 maintenance required and is line with the charity's proactive approach to making the building
 more environmentally sound.
- Lambeth Accord has to replace the central heating boilers. The aim to save on gas and reduce the amount of maintenance required.
- During this year we have maintained sufficient reserves to meet the reserve policy requirements of 6 months running costs. We have unrestricted reserves of £252,233.
- The occupancy of the office space by disability organisations has been fairly constant at 18
 organisations. Tenant occupation by duration shows that the majority of tenants in 2019/2020
 had been in occupation for more than two years, and nearly two-thirds had been in occupation
 for more than five years.

Performance and Developments (cont.)

The conference centre income for the year has been satisfactory. Additional space that was
refurbished and brought into use last year for conference bookings is helping to meet demand
at busy times.

Towards the end of the financial year, the outbreak of the Covid 19 virus and subsequent Government imposed containment measures had a major impact of the operation of the building. Appropriate steps were taken to protect staff and users of the building whilst continuing to offer access to the charities based in it so that they were able to support vulnerable disabled people, older people and family carers during the crisis. Although there was only limited impact on the financial outcome for 2019/2020, this will be more significant in the next 12 months.

Planned Developments

We are now at the stage of looking to the development and implementation of a funding strategy to finance the complete refurbishment and extension to Lambeth Accord's building at 336 Brixton Road. We are exploring new options to help us achieve our primary redevelopment objectives including with possible partners. This process has been facilitated by the removal of a legal charge on the building that had been held by another charity. The economic impacts of the Covid 19 virus, as yet unknown, may mean that we will have to review the timescale for any developments, however we hope to be able to make progress in selecting the best way forward.

Financial Review

The position of the charity at the year-end is set out on page 7. As noted already Lambeth Accord undertook major repairs to the southern and eastern elevations of the building and repaid the charge contributing to the increased deficit over the year.

The principal funding source continues to be tenant income.

Reserves policy

Total reserves at the year-end amounted to £1,377,232 of which £1,124,999 related to restricted reserves.

The Directors recognise the need to establish funds sufficient to deal with any unplanned building maintenance or repair requirements. The minimum target set by the Directors is £150,000. Lambeth Accord maintains this sum as reserves which represents 6 months of running costs.

Any additional money over and above the agreed level of reserves will be used on the building development.

Free reserves at the year-end (unrestricted reserves not tied up in fixed assets) amounted to £252,233 (2019 £389,065).

Year ended 31 March 2020

1. General information

The charity is a private company limited by guarantee, registered in England and Wales and a registered charity in England and Wales. The address of the registered office is 336 Brixton Road, London, SW9 7AA.

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Charities Act 2011. The charity constitutes a public benefit entity.

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities and investment properties measured at fair value through income or expenditure.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity and rounded to the nearest \mathfrak{L} .

Disclosure exemptions

The entity satisfies the criteria of being a qualifying entity as defined in FRS 102. As such, advantage has been taken of the exemption of including a cash flow statement.

Going concern

The COVID-19 viral pandemic is one of the most significant economic events for the UK with unprecedented levels of uncertainty of outcomes. It is therefore difficult to evaluate all of the potential implications on the charity's operations, funding, suppliers and wider economy. The Trustees' view on the impact of COVID-19 is that, given the measures that could be undertaken to mitigate the current adverse conditions and the current resources available, they can continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular future project or commitment.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

3. Accounting policies (continued)

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.
- income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is
 impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor
 or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the
 accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for
 the contribution of general volunteers.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the
 contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual
 requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case
 it may be regarded as restricted.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, noncharitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking
 activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those
 support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable
 activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

Tangible assets

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Any tangible assets carried at revalued amounts are recorded at the fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

Tangible assets (continued)

An increase in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of a revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, unless it reverses a charge for impairment that has previously been recognised as expenditure within the statement of financial activities. A decrease in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, except to which it offsets any previous revaluation gain, in which case the loss is shown within other recognised gains and losses on the statement of financial activities.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of an asset, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Freehold property

2% straight line

Plant and machinery

20% straight line

Impairment of fixed assets

A review for indicators of impairment is carried out at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated where such indicators exist. Where the carrying value exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is impaired accordingly. Prior impairments are also reviewed for possible reversal at each reporting date.

For the purposes of impairment testing, when it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, an estimate is made of the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. The cash-generating unit is the smallest identifiable group of assets that includes the asset and generates cash inflows that largely independent of the cash inflows from other assets or groups of assets.

For impairment testing of goodwill, the goodwill acquired in a business combination is, from the acquisition date, allocated to each of the cash-generating units that are expected to benefit from the synergies of the combination, irrespective of whether other assets or liabilities of the charity are assigned to those units.

Debtors and prepayments

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discounts. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any discounts.

Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably.

4. Limited by guarantee

Lambeth Accord is a charitable company limited by guarantee. In the event of the charity being wound up members' liability is limited to 0.25p.
