TRUSTEES' REPORT

For the year ended 31 March 2009

The members of the Board of Trustees, who are the Directors of the Charity for the purposes of the Companies Act, and trustees for charity law purposes, submit their annual report and the financial statements of Elfrida Rathbone (Camden) for the year ended 31 March 2009. The Trustees confirm that the annual report and financial statements of the Charity comply with current statutory requirements, the requirements of the Charity's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities (revised 2005)'.

The company also acts under the name Parents & Co and The Leighton Project.

Structure, governance and management

The Charity is registered as a charitable company limited by guarantee.

The Trustees form the Management Committee which consists of not less than five nor more than 17 trustees. At each Annual General Meeting one-third of the Trustees must retire but are eligible for re-election. The Management Committee, led by the chairperson together with a vice-chair and treasurer, governs the organisation. The Management Committee has, in addition to the elected members, an observer from the London Borough of Camden who is an Early Years education advisor.

The Trustees are responsible for the governance of the organisation and delegate the day-to-day management of the organisation to the Director / Company Secretary. The Director works with the team of project managers to ensure that the Charity develops and delivers quality services for our beneficiaries. Alexis Keir has been Director of Elfrida Rathbone Camden (ERC) since June 2007.

Trustees are recruited through advertising in community and voluntary sector resources such as the Volunteering Centre Camden website, the REACH organisation and direct links with local service users and networks. Currently the Board has 8 trustees with a diverse range of backgrounds including education, community safety, community development, business development, family support and legal sectors.

As before new Trustees are required to visit the organisation and meet the Director to discuss the activities and operations of the Charity and are invited to observe a management committee meeting before their application is accepted and confirmed. There is no entitlement for any other external person or organisation to appoint trustees.

The principal objects of the Charity continue to be:

- a. To promote the personal, social and educational development of children, young people and adults with learning difficulties and vulnerable families and their children.
- b. To ensure that children, young people and adults with learning difficulties and vulnerable families and their children may with support and assistance be able to make their own life choices.
- c. To ensure that as far as possible children and individuals may develop as members of society.
- d. The relief of poverty, distress and sickness among children, young people and adults with learning difficulties and vulnerable families and their children.
- e. The provision or assistance in the provision of recreational occupation of beneficiaries, who by reasons of poverty or social and economic circumstances need to improve their quality of life.

Ensuring our work delivers our aims

The Trustees and management team review the Charity's aims, objectives and activities each year. This review looks at what we achieved and the outcomes of our work in the previous 12 months. The review looks at the success of each key activity and the benefits they have brought to those groups of people we are set up to help. The review also helps us ensure our aim, objectives and activities remained focused on our stated purposes. We have referred to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aim and objectives and in planning our future activities. In particular, the trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set.

In December 2008 the Board of Trustees, working with the management team, reviewed and updated the strategic plan for the organisation going forward to 2011 and approved the following mission statement and goals:

Mission Statement

Elfrida Rathbone Camden works to achieve independence, empowerment and personal development for disabled people, children and young people, parents and families.

Our Goals

For the lives of parents and families to be improved by access to the support they feel they need.

For disabled people to be supported to maximise their potential through:

- Access to education, training, information and recreation;
- By promoting self-esteem, confidence and independence;
- · By supporting families and carers of disabled people.

For children and young people to have the maximum opportunities to achieve their potential.

Elfrida Rathbone Camden continues to offer access to services and support to achieve these goals for children, young people, families and disabled people living in Camden and other London boroughs. No-one who fits the criteria for our service provision is required to make any payment and a range of settings and activities are used to enable access for people who face barriers of language, social exclusion, ill-health and disability and poverty.

In 2008-9 for our beneficiaries ERC provided:

- a weekly art group for vulnerable children with emotional and communication support needs— after the course at least three quarters of the children attending the group felt better about themselves and parents fed back that children had improved in their self-esteem and self confidence, relationships and behaviour;
- support for over 120 families where children were vulnerable, including young carers and children on the child protection register. The organisation helped 79 families with a child under 5 years old including 12 teenage parents and 5 families where the child had a disability;
- supportive open access parenting support groups and courses attended by 103 parents and a drop in for under 4s used by 189 children and 158 families;
- an innovative health advocacy project which trained 10 people with learning disabilities to help other users to access health services;
- · a group for Bengali parents used by 52 families;
- education and training for 11 young people with learning disabilities aged between 18 and 25 in our Leighton project who attended 4 days a week during term time;
- a twice weekly youth club for disabled young people and support for a participation network led by disabled young people;
- summer activities attended by 94 children and a Christmas party attended by 25 children;
- support for 20 parents with a learning disability to improve their skills in supporting their children but also to tell social workers and other statutory services about how their families needed to be supported;
- an educational advocacy service for 160 Camden children who were disabled or had special needs to help their parents navigate their way through confusing local authority systems and to state their needs;
- training for 8 parents of children with special educational needs to be supporters of other parents and to run their own weekly support group;

- a specialist parenting programme for parents of children with behavioural disabilities including autism and ADHD attended by 10 parents;
- a ground breaking family support service within the Hampstead Group Practice which has been the basis for the award of £450,000 from the Department of Children, Schools and Families to offer support across the borough to children whose parents are separated or separating.

Activities and Services

In 2008 ERC became a member of bassac, the membership network for organisations which are central to their community and provide a range of services. This was a reflection of the increasingly multi-dimensional nature of our service provision which enables service users to both access a range of support and become involved themselves in supporting others in need.

The activities of the organisation are centred on 3 main areas of service provision:

Family support

A range of groupwork for parents and children and direct support at home offered by the Parents & Co project. As well as receiving support from LB Camden Children Schools and Families for the core costs of running the organisation, ERC has a contract with the Safeguarding and Social Care Department to deliver home-based services to vulnerable children and their families. ERC Family Development Workers spend part of their week based at the Camden Safeguarding and Social Care Centres in the north and south of the borough, and we also have a worker substantively based with the Kilburn Priory Children's Centre. We have developed new partnerships with health providers; from September 2008 we have been partners in the provision of an innovative project funded by the Children's Workforce Development Council to base a family support and information service within a GP practice, in this case at the Hampstead group. This service has been very popular, making access to informational and advice easier for families and encouraging co-working between GPs, other health professionals and social care workers.

Work with young disabled people

The **Leighton Project** continues to be a central and significant project providing an education and training service for young adults aged 16 – 25 from across North London with mild to moderate learning difficulties, with 11 or 12 students attending each year. For 2008/9 and 2009/10 we have been able to obtain a significant increase in the value of our contract with the **Learning and Skills Council** which more accurately reflects the additional costs of education provision for disabled students.

ERC has also continued its partnership with Camden Youth Service to support the 7 O'clock Youth club for young disabled people. However, our own consultation and communication with young disabled people has enabled the development of two significant new projects. We supported the **Young People for Inclusion Forum** to hold a successful conference in March 2009 involving the police, Camden Housing, London Transport and a range of other service providers. We also consulted with young people from the Leighton Project, Seven O'clock Club and Young people for Inclusion Forum about projects they wanted to develop and they told us that they wanted to be involved in helping others - from that idea, we developed a volunteering project proposal which was put forward for Department of Health funding via bassac and which was successful in gaining funding of £90,000 over 3 years.

Advocacy Services

Despite our funding from the Big Lottery ending in November 2008 ERC has continued to provide advice, information and support for parents from Camden and other boroughs who need help to understand and challenge the educational provision for their children who have a disability or special educational needs. To provide that support we have been very grateful for the input of parents who have themselves become ERC volunteers after training as Independent Parental Supporters, so that they can help other parents encountering the same problems they have had to deal with. Those parents have also run a weekly support group at the ERC base in Kentish Town.

A new area of **Health Advocacy** has also been developed. In August 2008 ERC put forward a groundbreaking proposal to Camden PCT Health Innovation Fund for a scheme to address the health inequalities for people with learning disabilities arising from the barriers (including those of lack of information and confidence) affecting their access to primary care services such as the GP or dentist. That bid was successful and ERC obtained £75,000 over 18 months to train and support a small team of peer health advocates with learning disabilities themselves who would help other service users attend appointments and health programmes. In applying for the funding Alexis Keir, ERC Director was very grateful for the support offered by Diana Molony a member of OUR GROUP YOUR GROUP who assisted in the presentation to the Innovation Fund panel of judges.

Fundraising

In April 2009 we had our first ever runner in the London marathon and we are immensely grateful to Kate Horbury, running her second marathon in six months, for helping us to raise over £3000. One major part of the publicity raising efforts for the marathon was a visit by the poet and comedian John Hegley who in March 2009 performed a virtually private gig for 25 young disabled people who used our services and who were quite literally reduced to tears of laughter. In terms of performance another headline event was the collaboration of members of the Seven O'clock club with students from the Central School of Speech and Drama over several workshops which culminated in a performance at the Hampstead Theatre in March 2009.

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Learning and Training

It is important to note that ERC ensures that project budgets enable the provision of specialist training for staff and we also access a range of statutory and voluntary and sector training opportunities. For this we are particularly grateful for the provision offered by Voluntary Action Camden, Volunteer Centre Camden and London Borough of Camden.

ERC itself is a supporter of the training of practitioners and in this year the Director and Project Managers supervised and verified the development of three social work students who had enomously varied and satisfying placements with the organisation. Those workers themselves, Brenda Amisi, Emilia Pankowska and Christina Pankowska made a significant contribution to our work with service users, particularly through their support for the Leighton Project students and parents with learning disabilities in OUR GROUP YOUR GROUP.

Financial review

Our major funding partners for this year were London Borough of Camden (Children, Schools and Families Division including Integrated Early Years), City Bridge Trust, the Big Lottery Fund, and the Learning and Skills Council. LB Camden have made it very clear that the organisation needs to end its reliance on support from the borough for core costs. A productive dialogue about how to manage this process has continued between local authority officers and the Trustees, including attendance by commissioners for the Children, Schools and Families Department at a meeting of ERC's Board of Trustees in November 2008. There is a positive engagement and commitment on both sides towards achieving a manageable timescale for ending grant funding, and ensuring ERC's ability to offer current and future service provision through contracts. This year's deficit is the result of a planned use of reserves to support the organisation as we move from grant aided core funding to full cost recovery commissioning.

Smaller funders such as the Fitzdale Trust and the Violet Melchett trust have enabled us to continue to organise smaller events such as summer activities for children which are nonetheless very important for the quality of their life in the community. In this year ERC was also able to received £80,000 from the St. Pancras Foundation which had been held up in a prolonged disbursement period since 2005 – this funding had been earmarked to support our work with parents with learning disabilities, crèche/Early Years provision and work with students with learning disabilities.

ERC was able to conclude negotiations with our landlords over a new lease in January 2009 with terms which were significantly more favourable than those originally offered in 2007; for this we are extremely grateful for the support of Richard Posner who volunteered his time and expertise in this area.

Reserves Policy

The Trustees have maintained a policy whereby the unrestricted funds not committed (the "free reserves") held by the company should be approximately 25% of the annual costs, which equate to approximately £220,000. The Trustees still feel that this level is sufficient to allow for contingency and or equipment replacement. The current level of free reserves is approximately £135,000. This is significantly lower than the target, however, we have further designated reserves for assets and staff funds.

Risk Management

The Trustees have undertaken a risk review, looking in particular at those risks related to operations and finances. The Trustees are confident that sufficient measures have been put in place to minimise any significant risks and will continue to monitor the situation.

Plans for future periods

Major bids to the Big Lottery Reaching Communities and Family Learning Funds over the past year have been unsuccessful and Trustees have enabled funding for external support for managers in pursuing the range of funding opportunities which an organisation of ERC's range of services is undoubtedly eligible to apply to. The key areas for service development and funding support over the next year are:

- To obtain non-statutory and full cost recovery funding to maintain a full range of core and support services including Director, Finance and administration salaries and also provision of adequate HR support for a growing organisation.
- To obtain non-statutory funding which will enable ERC to independently offer groupwork and family support outside the narrow range of services commissioned by the local authority.
- To maintain and fully fund the successful and highly regarded provision of SEN advocacy services which has earned ERC a national reputation for good practice.
- To continue the development of a range of advocacy services including health advocacy and advocacy for children and young people.
- To continue to develop our work in partnership with young disabled people.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the year ended 31 March 2009

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Companies Act 1985, the Charities SORP (Statement of Recommended Practice: "Accounting and Reporting by Charities (revised February 2005)") and the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2007).

The effects of events relating to the year ended 31 March 2009 which occurred before the date of approval of the financial statements by the Trustees has been included in the financial statements to the extent required to show a true and fair view of the state of affairs at 31 March 2009 and the results for the year ended on that date.

Company status

Elfrida Rathbone (Camden) is a company limited by guarantee. In the event of the Charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the Charity.

Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objects of the Charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the Trustees for particular purposes. The aim and use of each designated fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors which have been raised by the Charity for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements. Statutory grants which are given as contributions towards the Charity's core services are treated as unrestricted.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the Charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Funding from statutory funders have been reflected as incoming resources from charitable activities.

Donated services and facilities, including the use of seconded staff, are included at the value to the Charity where this can be quantified. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included in these accounts.

Deferred income comprises grants received in the year, but which the grantor has specified must be used in future accounting periods.

Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been included under expense categories that aggregate all costs for allocation to activities. Costs of generating funds comprise the cost assoicated with attracting voluntary income. Support costs, which cannot be directly attributed to particular activities, have been apportioned on the basis of floor space. Governance costs include the costs of servicing Trustees' meetings, audit and strategic planning.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the year ended 31 March 2009

Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

All assets costing more than £500 are capitalised.

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives on the following bases:

Fixtures & Fittings - 25% straight line Computer Equipment - 33% straight line

Operating leases

Rentals applicable to operating where substantially all of the benefits and risks of ownership remain with the lessor are charged to the SOFA as incurred.

Pensions

14. PENSION COMMITMENTS

The Charity operates a defined contributions pension scheme. The assets of the scheme are held seperately from those of the Charity in an independently administered fund. The pension cost charge represents contributions payable by the Charity to the fund and amounted to £9,214 (2008 - £11,940) in the year. There were contributions outstanding at the year end of £2,281 (2008 - £1,446).
