#### Report of The Trustees

The Trustees, who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act, submit their annual report and the audited financial statements of All Change Arts Limited (the Company) for the year ended 31 March 2013. The Trustees confirm that the annual report and financial statements of the Company comply with current statutory requirements, the requirements of the Company's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in March 2005.

## Structure, governance and management

#### a) Constitution

The Company is a charitable company limited by guarantee, number 1964724 and was set up by a Memorandum of Association on 25 November 1985

The Company is also a registered charity, number 293972

## Method of appointment or election of trustees

The management of the Company is the responsibility of the Trustees who are elected and co-opted under the terms of the Articles of Association Recruitment is undertaken as necessary through the identification of skills gaps at trustee level

## c) Policies adopted for the induction and training of trustees

New trustees are given a copy of 'The Essential Trustee" what you need to know" published by the Charity Commission and 'Directors and Secretaries Guide' published by Companies House. In addition new trustees are met in advance of joining the Board by the Chair and have the opportunity to attend a Board meeting as an invited guest. Existing All Change trustees and senior staff work together to ensure thorough and effective induction of new trustees, enabling them to understand and deliver the commitment and duties required to govern the charity. To enable All Change to fulfil the objectives set out in the governing document as effectively as possible, skills sharing is carried out so that trustees can focus with maximum insight on All Change's charitable objects and issues of governance.

## d) Management Structure

The senior management team comprises the full-time Artistic Director (CEO), full-time General Manager and part-time Associate Director. Management decisions are made at this level and implemented by the staff team led by the Artistic Director who reports directly to the Board.

## e) Risk management

The Trustees have examined the major risks to which the Company is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the Company, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate our exposure to the major risks. The Company maintains a Risk Register linked to the senior management team's forward plans, and this is monitored and reviewed on an annual basis by the trustees through the process of a risk assessment exercise.

## Objectives and Activities for the Public Benefit

The trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning future activities

In the period from April 2012 to March 2013, the Company has managed numerous projects designed to meet both All Change's aims and the needs of our partners and participants

In shaping our objectives for the year and planning our activities, the trustees have considered the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit. The Company relies on grants to cover its operating costs

#### Our Aim

All Change works to develop and promote the role of the arts in society by bringing artists and communities together to develop original, high quality arts projects that promote artistic excellence and affect positive change for individuals and communities

All Change values partnership working and collaboration, innovation and risk taking, creating opportunities for artists and people to explore and articulate their ideas, try new things and exceed their expectations, in an environment that celebrates creative thinking, shared learning and artistic expression

#### Report of The Trustees

All our projects are cross artform, working with exceptional artists from all disciplines. Projects result in artistic outcomes that are shared through events, exhibitions and publishing. Our projects reach people of all ages and backgrounds, especially those who would not usually participate in the arts.

#### Achievements and performance

During the year the Company designed, managed and delivered a full programme of successful projects -

## Young people & Families

Something Different – a combined arts programme, working with young people from across Islington's social housing estates, using a range of art-forms including visual and digital arts, and creative writing. Strands of work included partnership working with Arsenal in the Community's football training initiative, Islington Housing and Islington Young People's Service. In 2012/13 Something Different has seen young people create public artworks across the borough including hoardings in the Caledonian Road area.

Creative Producer - Platform arts programme and OCCUPY project - following the development work with the Young Advisors from 2009 onwards and the launch festival in 2011, All Change has continued to work with Platform Youth Hub taking on the role of Creative Producer for the arts programme and delivering an innovative combined arts project - OCCUPY from October 2012-March 2013 OCCUPY, made possible with funding from Arts Council England, brought together a group of arts partners including. All Change, Cubitt Education, Wayne McGregor|Random Dance, Apples & Snakes, Islington Community Theatre and the Barbican Centre to deliver a 6 month combined arts programme leading up to a spectacular event filling the whole building over a weekend in early April 2013 – mixing visual arts, theatre, digital arts, dance, music and spoken word. The programme and final events were co-produced with a team of 6 Young Creative Producers aged 16-19 working towards Gold Arts Award accreditation through their involvement. In addition All Change has worked to transform and develop a rich offer for young people and the wider community at Platform, including activities such as life-drawing, singing, creative writing, music production, dance and theatre, visiting theatre shows, film screenings, Yarn Dances – intergenerational tea dances and knitting events, and more

B Project - in recognition of the fact that only half as many young women as young men participate in out of school activities in Islington, the Council commissioned All Change to deliver a young women-led creative engagement project to better understand what young women want and to help them influence and develop new services. The B Project was launched in 2011 and has continued throughout 2012/13 with further funding support from Islington Council and Islington Giving All Change has employed 14 young women as Peer-Leaders to co-produce the project with us, and a team of female artists to collaborate with them. In 2012/13 the B project ran a number of programmes for young women including weekly photography, singing, dance, creative writing and drama projects at Canonbury, Platform and Lift Youth Hubs, and an intensive summer programme B Creative for over 50 young women at Sadler's Wells in 2012 resulting in a public performance in Exmouth Market B has also developed a new author led project Write Ideas at Platform, working with publisher Hot Key Books, the Edge Writers Group and Islington libraries to develop creative writing skills and knowledge of professional writing and publishing careers for young people. In addition the B project has delivered a number of intergenerational Yarn Dance events - mixing tea dancing and knitting at Platform, and a pop up Christmas choir around public spaces at Angel in December. In Spring 2013 this year's work was brought together for a week long event - B Voices, featuring a tour of photography in public spaces including the Town Hall, Islington Green and the Business Design Centre, the launch of I AM - a publication of photographs and poetry, and a combined arts performance at Platform featuring drama, poetry, photography and singing. Two B Peer Leaders have also participated in an exciting partnership programme with Save the Children this year. The Young Leaders programme has provided them with training and work experience within this major international children's charity

Making Waves – supported by funding from Arts Council England, All Change worked in partnership with Islington Boat Club to deliver a summer programme of visual arts and dance activities for young people, created specially designed permanent flag and bunting artworks for the Boat Club site and a 15m hoarding artwork for the Mount Anvil development on the City Road Basin Young women participated in dance workshops, creating a series of flash mob performances for the annual Angel Canal Festival in September 2012

LIFT – a creative design project to develop an identity for the new healthy living youth hub at White Lion Centre with young people. Artists Carl Stevenson and Esther Yarnold worked with young people to design and produce interior art works and furniture for this new youth space, using flight as inspiration, they created a 'departure lounge' on the ground floor including customised furniture, lighting, graphics and signage ahead of the launch of the centre in May 2012

Inspire! — a creative learning programme for young parents and pregnant young women aged 14-19 in Islington. The project provides an accredited creative learning programme of arts activities including music, photography, film-making, performing arts and creative writing, designed to provide participants with an opportunity to develop skills and confidence, express their ideas, create high quality work and develop plans for future learning and to achieve their aspirations. The creative work is complemented by a programme of advice and support on education, parenting and health delivered by project partners. Through 2012/13 the young women have participated in a series of projects working with a range of exceptional artists. They have produced and launched a book of stories for children with Paul Lyalls and Mila Sanders.—

Twinkle Twinkle Little Bus, which was published and launched as part of the WORD2013 festival and is held by all Islington libraries. Through autumn 2012 and spring 2013 the group worked with poet and performer Kat Francois to develop a series of stories about their experiences for performance and publication. This work will be further developed in 2013/14 as Inspire! nears its 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary. In spring 2013, the group participated in the annual Sadler's Wells Creative Learning team's main-stage production, as part of a cast of 100 alongside other groups of all ages — Riot Offspring, set to Stravinsky's Rites of Spring. This ambitious and demanding project provided the opportunity for the young parents and their children to work with professional choreographers Mafalda Deville (Jasmin Vardimon Company) and Ivan Blackstock (Birdgang) supported by Katie P for All Change, and the chance to perform to a full-house on the main-stage at Sadler's Wells

Let's Talk – a creative workshop programme supporting families affected by domestic violence. Following a successful pilot programme in 2007, All Change working in partnership with Family Action, Children's Services and Islington Children's Centres, delivered a series of creative projects over 2 years for parents and their children aged 5-11, designed to strengthen communication and family relationships through taking part in arts activities together. A creche for under 5's was provided, along with refreshments and travel support, to enable families to attend weekly after school activities. Families reported improvements in their relationships and children's behaviour as a direct result of taking part. In 2012 work was undertaken to evaluate the impact of the project, which was shared through a special event 'Let's Talk. – The Conversation' at Sadler's Wells in February 2013, bringing professionals from the arts, social care and family support sectors together with funders (including City Bridge Trust, Islington Council and Cripplegate Foundation) to share practice and learning, and to develop ideas for future projects. A website resource has also been launched to make the learning from this successful and innovative partnership project available to professionals working with families.

#### Artist led programme.

Outer Space – a creative curriculum development project with Thornhill Primary School All Change works in collaboration with Little Angel Puppet Theatre, Cubitt Education and Thornhill Primary School to develop an ongoing programme of artists' residencies, which help to develop the school's curriculum and how children learn. All Change provides a writer-in-residence Paul Lyalls, who is working to develop confidence and creativity in written and spoken word within the school. This year All Change has published its first anthology of poetry created by the children – Words are Birds, which was launched as part of the WORD2013 Festival in May 2013 with an event featuring a performance by John Hegley, who referred to the poetry in the book as 'Some really, really good stuff, good stuff really really Really superb aren't they—really?"

Creative Producer - Word Festival 2012-14 the WORD Festival celebrates reading, writing and creative expression inspired by Islington Reads – the reading strategy for the London Borough of Islington. All Change working in partnership with the Council's Library and Heritage Service and Arts Service, and Free Word Centre, secured funding through Arts Council England to build on the successful inaugural festival in 2012 with two further annual events in 2013 and 2014. All Change worked to commission participatory projects and events, and to programme the festivals, the first of which took place in May 2012, and the second in May 2013 - involving a wide range of events and activities for all ages working with diverse partners including Crossrail, Arsenal in the Community, the Business Design Centre Group, schools, cafes and shopping centres. The festivals have included the creation of large-scale public hoardings at Farringdon and Finsbury Park Stations, performances, author events and contributions from poets and writers including John Hegley, Yemisi Blake, Paul Lyalis and Charlie Higson, and new All Change publications including Words are Birds with Thornhill Primary School, Twinkle Little Bus with Inspire! young parents project, and I AM by the B project young women. All Change delivered a number of special events in the 2013 festival including 'In Between the Conversation' at Fix Coffee with writers Sarah Butler and Joseph Coelho. The festivals have included contributions too from a wide range of arts organisations including Spread the Word, Apples & Snakes, Cubitt, Hot Key Books, Almeida and English PEN.

Steps Ahead – an arts and heritage project with young people. As part of A Million Minutes, an arts led regeneration programme in Archway and Finsbury Park, All Change in partnership with Arsenal in the Community, was commissioned to work with a group of young men to explore the story of local born 70s football icon Laurie Cunningham, and to create an exhibition for the local community which took place in summer 2013.

During 2013/14 the company has successfully raised its profile through a variety of means

- Positive partnership working
- Providing leadership as Creative Producer for strategic initiatives and programmes in Islington Platform Youth Arts Hub and the WORD Festival
- Presentations and talks by All Change staff and participants at key events organised by a range of bodies including Cripplegate Foundation and Islington Council
- Publishing high quality publications and digital products including DVDs and websites to share the creative results and learning from our projects
- Funding bodies using All Change project case studies and All Change project images in their own publicity materials
- Increased use of Associate Artists working alongside All Change's core and project teams bringing new skills and contacts to the company, and fresh ideas and approaches to the work
- Local press coverage
- Increasing and diversifying audiences for All Change events and through our online and social media presence

All Stars - In 2012/13 the company invested resources in reviewing and strengthening the organisation's operation and potential for development by embarking on an exciting new collaboration with Macquarie Bank through the Cripplegate Foundation's Core programme, to look at business planning and sustainability. Through this collaboration All Change has developed a new individual giving scheme — All Stars, which was launched on 29 November 2012 with an event at Maquarie Bank. The scheme provides a mechanism for individual giving — including online donations, and new fundraising initiatives. We have also established a training and development initiative for a team of young adults aged 18-25, who have been beneficiaries of our work. The £5K Challenge team, supported by All Change's General Manager and Board members, is developing skills in fundraising and income generation, developing new events and initiatives to raise money for projects for their local community.

#### Financial Review

#### a) Reserve policy

All Change Arts Limited endeavours to maintain sufficient reserves to cover overheads and salary costs for three months operation. At 2012/13 levels All Change's overheads and salary costs for three months amount to £33,594. Having invested in activities to strengthen the company's front line provision in an ongoing economic downturn during 2010/11 and launched a new individual giving scheme – All Stars in 2012/13, All Change has worked to increase its unrestricted reserve in 2012/13 from £29,507 to £33,056. A review of the current reserves level and reserves policy is carried out annually.

#### b) Summary

All Change had an income of £271,443 in 2012/13. This was £60,000 less that the income of £335,346 from the previous year, of which £81,617 was brought forward to 2012/13 for ongoing projects. Expenditure for 2012/13 was £317,139, an increase of £3,307 on the previous year, reflecting the consistent delivery of project work.

The previous year saw changes in staff structure which involved some extra expenditure to cover hand-over periods and maternity support, which is reflected in the higher salaries for that year, compared with 2012/13. The first quarter of 2012/13 operated on a core staff of 2.2 until the new General Manager was appointed in June, further explaining the reduction in the overall cost of salaries in 2012/13, compared with the previous year

in 2012/13 All Change developed and launched the All Stars individual giving scheme and the £5K Challenge at a fundraising event at Macquarie bank, shown in the rise of fundraising expenditure for the year

## Statement of trustees' responsibilities

#### For the Year Ended 31 March 2013

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### 1 1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), applicable UK Accounting Standards and the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (SORP 2005), issued in March 2005

#### 12 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost or valuation of fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives as follows.

Office equipment - 25% reducing balance basis

#### 13 Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income.

- Voluntary income including core grants, sponsorship, donations and gifts is included in full in the Statement
  of Financial Activities when receivable. Grants, where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a
  specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the
  grant.
- Incoming resources from charitable activities includes income from performance fees received under contract. Grant income included in this category provides funding to support performance activities, touring or education projects and is recognised where there is entitlement, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.
- Investment income is included when receivable

#### 14 Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis. The irrecoverable element of VAT is included with the item of expense to which it relates.

- Costs of generating funds are those costs incurred in attracting voluntary income
- Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.
- Governance costs include those incurred in the governance of the charity and are primarily associated with constitutional and statutory requirements

#### 1.5 Operating leases

Rentals applicable to operating leases where substantially all of the benefits and risks of ownership remain with the lessor are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities as incurred

## 16 Funds accounting

Restricted funds – these are funds that can only be used for specific restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Unrestricted general funds – these are funds which can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the trustees

#### 17 Legal status

All Change Arts Limited is a company limited by guarantee and has no share capital. The liability of each member in the event of a winding up is limited to £1

## **Notes To The Financial Statements**

## 18 Taxation

The charitable company is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the charity is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 Part II Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes
