### Report of the Management Committee

### For the Year Ended 31 March 2002

The management committee presents its report and the audited financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2002.

Legal and administrative information set out on page 1 forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the memorandum and articles of association and the Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

### Objects of the charity

ASHA means 'hope'. Our mission is to empower Asian women to live independently and achieve the goals that they have set for themselves. The aim is to support South Asian women and their children:

- 1 Live independently.
- 2 Help rebuild their lives through self help and choice when threatened with or subjected to domestic violence.
- 3 Improve their future with further education, employment prospects and personal development.

### Review of activities

ASHA operates from three sites (a Resource Centre, a refuge for women with children and a refuge for Young Asian women) and provides:

- a) A culturally sensitive service.
- b) Safe and secure refuge accommodation where Asian women, their children and young girls can recover from their threatened environment and rebuild their lives.
- c) Information, support and advice service.
- d) Emotional support and counselling.
- e) Non vocational training in English as a Second Language, Basic numeracy, Information Communications Skills and Personal development.
- f) Volunteering Opportunities.

In preparation for Supporting People which starts in April 2003 we reviewed the budgets and have set rents to separate the "housing" and the "support" elements. The organisation is undergoing an in depth performance review of the existing structures, policies, procedures, standards and guidelines.

In partnership with Family Housing Association we are developing a new six bed refuge project. As a result we have expanded the number of bed spaces from 13 to 19.

Support for employees has been developed further with the introduction of facilitated peer supervision, a space provided to explore anxieties and issues on a personal, professional and team level.

ASHA is now stakeholder pension compliant and makes a contribution to employee pensions.

### **Future development**

As the time when Supporting People draws nearer there are still many uncertainties such as RSL and agency relationships, cross authority referrals and the pressure to merge. We will develop standards to meet the accreditation process, minimise risks and ensure that Asian women receive services geared towards meeting their needs.

### Report of the Management Committee

### For the Year Ended 31 March 2002

We work in partnership with other agencies to ensure that the identified needs of women coming to ASHA (and gaps in our services) are fully met, hence, ensuring that we provide a holistic service. We will continue to develop this further.

We will continue to develop staff and volunteer skills and expertise for the benefit of service users, the organisation and our commitment to our staff and volunteers.

### Related parties and connected organisations

Related party transactions are disclosed in note 16 to the accounts.

### Reserves policy

ASHA now has reserves policy in line with the Charity Commission's guidelines. Over the years the organisation has successfully built up its financial reserves which are crucial in meeting the requirements set out in the Agreements with Family Housing Association, Lambeth Council and Metropolitan Housing Trust and meeting unforeseen contingencies.

ASHA relies on funding. By maintaining reserves, we can commit ourselves to long term development and protect our work against financial fluctuations. The management committee has reviewed ASHA's needs for reserves in line with the guidance issued by the Charity Commission and have set aside or designated funds as necessary.

The balance of unrestricted reserves at 31 March 2002 was £148,944. ASHA believes that reserves should be at least at this level to ensure the charity can run efficiently and meet the needs of the beneficiaries.

The level of reserves is monitored and reviewed by the management committee four times a year.

### Risk statement

The management committee is aware of its responsibility to identify and review the major risks to which the charity is exposed and to implement systems to mitigate those risks. The management committee will conduct a risk review in the near future.

### Responsibilities of management committee

Company law requires the management committee to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of the affairs of the charitable company as at the balance sheet date and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including income and expenditure, for the year then ended.

In preparing those financial statements which give a true and fair view, the management committee should follow best practice and:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the company will continue on that basis

### Report of the Management Committee

### For the Year Ended 31 March 2002

The management committee is responsible for keeping accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985.

The management committee is also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The total number of such guarantees at 31 March 2002 was 9 (2001: 10). Members of the management committee have no beneficial interest in the charitable company.

### Appointment of management committee members

The minimum number of committee members is 3. There is no maximum. All committee members hold office until the next annual general meeting when they are eligible for re-election. At any other time the committee may appoint any person to be a committee member or to fill a casual vacancy.

### **Auditors**

Sayer Vincent were re-appointed as the charitable company's auditors during the year and have expressed their willingness to continue in that capacity.

### **ASHA Projects**

We have audited the financial statements of ASHA Projects for the year ended 31 March 2002 which comprise the statement of financial activities, balance sheet and related notes. These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and the accounting policies set out therein.

### Respective responsibilities of the management committee and auditors

The responsibilities of the management committee (who are also directors of ASHA Projects for the purposes of company law) for preparing the report of the management committee and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards are set out in the statement of responsibilities of the management committee. We are not required to consider whether the statement in the report of the management committee concerning the major risks to which the charitable company is exposed covers all existing risks and controls, or to form an opinion on the effectiveness of the charitable company's risk management and control procedures.

We read other information contained in the report of the management committee and consider whether it is consistent with the audited financial statements. We consider the implications for our report if we become aware of any apparent misstatements or material inconsistencies with the financial statements. Our responsibilities do not extend to any other information.

### Basis of opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with United Kingdom Auditing Standards issued by the Auditing Practices Board. An audit includes examination, on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. It also includes an assessment of the significant estimates and judgements made by the management committee in the preparation of financial statements, and of whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the charitable company's circumstances, consistently applied and adequately disclosed.

We planned and performed our audit so as to obtain all the information and explanations which we considered necessary in order to provide us with sufficient evidence to give reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or other irregularity or error. In forming our opinion we also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the financial statements.

### **Notes to the Financial Statements**

### For the Year Ended 31 March 2002

### 1. Accounting Policies

- a) The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable accounting standards. They follow the recommendations in the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (issued in October 2000) and the Companies Act 1985.
- b) Grants for the purchase of fixed assets are credited to incoming resources when receivable. The purchase costs of the assets are credited to a fixed asset fund and depreciation is charged against the fund.
- c) Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure which meets these criteria is charged to the fund.
- e) Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources received or generated for the charitable purposes.
- f) Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the management committee for particular purposes.
- g) Core staff costs are allocated to activities on the basis of staff time spent on those activities as follows:

Resource Centre	7%		

- h) Support costs comprise the salary costs of the finance and administration function of the charity.
- i) The costs of generating funds relate to the costs incurred by the charitable company in raising funds for the charitable work.
- j) Management and administration costs include the management of the charitable company's assets, organisational management and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.
- k) Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset over its expected useful life, which in all cases is set at four years. Depreciation costs are allocated to activities on the basis of the use of the related assets in those activities. Only assets costing over £500 are capitalised. Assets are reviewed for impairment if circumstances indicate their carrying value may be above their economic value.
- I) The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the charitable company in an independently administered fund. The pension cost charge represents contributions payable under the scheme by the charitable company to the fund. The charitable company has no liability under the scheme other than for the payment of those contributions.

- m) Rentals payable under operating leases, where substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership remain with the lessor, are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the minimum lease term.
- n) Specific provision is made for all rental debtors where the management committee consider there is a significant risk of non-recovery.

### Employers Contractual Obligations Fund

Provide for the costs associated with meeting contractual obligations such as employing temporary staff in periods of maternity and sickness leave.

### Premises Fund

To meet the costs associated with locating and purchasing premises for the Resource Centre and meet any additional costs arising from the expiry of the existing lease.

### Residents Recreation Fund

Provide trips and outings for women and children at the refuge.

### Infrastructure and Capacity Building Fund

Cover the associated costs of training and consultancy associated with capacity and infrastructure building of the organisation.

### Hardship Fund

Supports women and children who are facing extreme hardship.

### New Projects Fund

Support new projects planned and new initiatives within the organisation.

### 16. Related party transactions

The husband of the finance worker S Bhandal printed the annual report and invitations to the AGM for a total cost of £1,173. The work was competitively tendered and the lowest quote was accepted. There was no outstanding liability at the year end.

L Joseet, a member of the management committee until 20 October 2001 and the mother of N Joseet who was appointed a committee member on 23 October 2001 was paid £2,940 during 2001/02 for consultancy services in helping ASHA develop a new strategic framework incorporating the implications of the *supporting people* legislation. This consultancy work is ongoing. N Joseet was employed under a temporary contract of employment to mount an exhibition of the charity's work and remunerated a total of £4,616 in the period prior to becoming a management committee member.
