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STRATEGIC REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

Business review

The directors present their strategic report on the company for the year ended 30 June 2022.

With the Coronavirus pandemic behind us the business has been focussed on building its orderbook and delivering on some extremely exciting R&D programmes and existing and new customers strong growth.

The business is now growing at over 30% CAGR driven by the multi million investment in people and technological advancement as the microelectronic and advanced technology PCBA business booms. The orderbook is at its highest ever level today, just short of £25m. Customers whom recognising the need to place orders earlier due to increasing component lead times have largely had their stocks secured during this trading period with stock growing to a record high of £4.5m during the period with significant customers and the businesses cash resources going into supporting that. The semiconductor shortage is not expected to alleviate in the foreseeable future but some components are now improving in lead time and product builds are increasing as capacity is built to support the uplift to over £30m sales in the coming period.

During the period and now into 2022/23 Custom Interconnect continues to grow its strategic customer base with continued record levels of NPI as it takes further market share from competition and establishes itself as the only source for certain micro and power electronic technologies in the UK. Its strategy to be the first choice in the UK for mission critical electronic and micro-electronic manufacturing, engineering and product delivery solutions was further recognised by national awards such as the electronics industries "Manufacturer of the Year" and for "Adding Customer value". Sales for the year increased to £18.392 million (2021: £14.849 million) with an operating profit before R&D of £3.546m (2021: operating profit before R&D of £2.421million). This ongoing strong profit performance substantiates the Board's strategy of continued investment in its customer's product manufacturing requirements, process capability and people development across high growth, high technology markets which provide for strong growth in sales and contribution.

The board are confident of continued strong growth driven by the focus to provide leading edge electronic technology solutions applying specialist engineering knowledge with world class manufacturing processes. The new business sales come from significant ongoing investment in people and non-recurring engineering costs (NRE). To support this the business has massively increased its engagement in leading edge R&D projects with £10.7m committed over the next 3 years alongside Innovate UK funding support of up to 60% and will create 105 high quality engineering and manufacturing jobs at CIL's Andover facilities.

The business has maintained its cash headroom during the year with its £4m ABN AMBRO facility and has increased its capital finance facility with HSBC from £2.4m to £4.5m in support of the planned equipment growth. In order to support further investment HSBC post year end has provided additional facilities of £4m in loans and working capital. This investment supports the new projects in R&D and production, enabling the Board to have confidence in the sales growth forecast of 50% per annum over the next two years. Growth on this scale requires additional headcount and infrastructure including property and so the additional new factory in Andover is in the final fit—out stage with a total investment of £9.5m and providing an additional 45,000 sq. ft. of which, 18,000 sq. ft is a Class 10,000 clean room and 23,000 sq. ft advanced electronic manufacture PCBA production space.

In certain electronic manufacturing processes Custom Interconnect is now recognised as an industry leader, namely in semi-conductor packaging; medical lab on chip and next generation Power module requirements supporting Battery Electric Vehicles (BEV) for our roads, rail and the air, motor sport advancement, data centres, power switching and control and renewable energy management. Our progress in developing the electronic processing capability for SiC and GaN processing technology through multiple Innovate UK research projects is leading to our engineering capability extending into design and design for manufacture workstreams for the world's leading transportation OEM's. Over the next 12 months many of the NPI projects we are working on will turn into production requirements, traditionally what may have gone offshore is now destined to stay onshore as the knowledge/capability mission criticality is differentiating and only sustainably commercially viable with support from Custom Interconnect.

STRATEGIC REPORT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

The business has proved hugely successful over the past 5 years at establishing itself as the "First Choice" for all its existing customers and in the development of advanced electronic technologies. Since the end of COVID restrictions it has seen a further strengthening of the order book from existing and new customers as existing product sales grow and the many new products which have been nurtured in our extensive NPI programme come to fruition which puts the business in an excellent position for profitable, cash generative growth and warrants the headcount and facilities expansion. Further-more we have continued to target acquisitions of further customers from underperforming competitors, which continues to be a very successful strategy as the market recognises our best-in-class service levels.

The business culture and investment roadmap are focussed on maximising delivery flexibility in supporting ever changing and growing customer requirements as most drive for unprecedented levels of product development, technical and engineering support in manufacturing higher technology mission critical electronic products.

The geographic sales mix of the business during the year remained lower than pre COVID levels of direct international sales, however recent shifts in our international OEM customers demands will increase this, particularly with the US and Europe as our service levels and value demonstrably exceed our international competition. It should be remembered that nearly all the businesses customers are international mission critical product suppliers. The Brexit deal has not adversely impacted sales and rather combined with uncertainties in China has increased the onshoring to the UK/WEST and the pounds value supports Custom Interconnect as a dependable and competitive source for global manufacturing solutions. The wider Connexion Technologies group consisting of Castle Microwave Limited, Pure Electronics Limited, and Accura Engineering Limited with unique mechanical, electronic manufacturing and RF/PCB supply chain capabilities has also weathered the COVID/BREXIT storm well and although the Group sales reduced 20% in 2020/21 these have now bounced back higher in 2021/22 and as a group we are forecast to grow to achieve record sales of £48m in June 2023 with a run-rate as we write this report of £54m forecast to deliver over £70m sales in the year to June 2024.

The capital investment plan of the business continues to be focussed on process differentiation ensuring a one stop solution whilst maximising quality and right first-time delivery performance. This combined with continuous IT investment in real time management information in support of complex customer technology, mix and variant requirements has enabled the business to grow with a lower fixed cost base and headcount.

Custom Interconnect is hugely focussed on being the best it can at what it does. We have again been the winner of the Insider South East UK business awards for "Manufacturer of the Year (under £25m)" and hot off the press we also secured in November 2022 "Manufacturer of the Year" with the prestigious European Elektra Awards supported by Electronics Weekly.

Custom Interconnect has now celebrated over 36 years of business and the board would like to thank its customers for their ongoing trade, some of which have been with the company over 25 years. Furthermore, they wish to recognise the commitment and resolve of the supplier base and employees who continue to aspire to be the best in what we choose to lead the world in.

Custom Interconnect is committed to ESG and is investing hard to increase its output on a minimal carbon footprint, world leading standards being employed in the new factory infrastructure. We continue to be a socially responsible employer and ensure we operate world leading systems and processes to improve productivity and sustainability whilst responsibly governing the business in the interests of all stakeholders.

STRATEGIC REPORT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

Principal risks and uncertainties

The principal risks and uncertainties facing the company includes:

- Material shortages and quality of component supply;
- Customer and staff retention;
- Product innovation and development.

The process of risk acceptance and risk management is addressed through a framework of policies, procedures and internal controls. All policies are subject to Board approval and ongoing review by management. Compliance with regulation, legal and ethical standards is a high priority for the company and each department head takes on an important oversight role in this regard. The Audit Committee is responsible for satisfying itself that a proper internal control exists to manage financial risks and that controls operate effectively.

Financial key performance indicators

The directors consider the Key Performance Indicators to be gross profit and profit before tax as disclosed in the Profit and Loss Account.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

1. General information

Custom Interconnect Limited (the "Company") is a private company incorporated, domiciled and registered in England and Wales. The registered number is 02026753 and the registered address is CIL-House, Charlton Road, Andover, Hampshire SP10 3JL.

2. Accounting policies

2.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention unless otherwise specified within these accounting policies and in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 102, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland and the Companies Act 2006.

The preparation of financial statements in compliance with FRS 102 requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise judgment in applying the Company's accounting policies (see note 3).

The following principal accounting policies have been applied:

2.2 Financial Reporting Standard 102 - reduced disclosure exemptions

The Company has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemptions in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by the FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland":

- the requirements of Section 7 Statement of Cash Flows;
- the requirements of Section 3 Financial Statement Presentation paragraph 3.17(d);
- the requirements of Section 33 Related Party Disclosures paragraph 33.7.

This information is included in the consolidated financial statements of Connexion Technologies Limited as at 30 June 2022 and these financial statements may be obtained from Companies House.

2.3 Going concern

The company has cash resources and has no requirement for external funding in excess of its current facilities. The directors have a reasonable expectation that the company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. In making their assessment the directors have considered the ability of the company to continue to service customers, the impact on future revenues and cash collections and the financial position of the wider group. They continue to believe the going concern basis of accounting appropriate in preparing the annual financial statements.

Accounting policies (continued)

2.4 Foreign currency translation

Functional and presentation currency

The Company's functional and presentational currency is GBP.

Transactions and balances

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the spot exchange rates at the dates of the transactions.

At each period end foreign currency monetary items are translated using the closing rate. None monetary items measured at historical cost are translated using the exchange rate at the date of the transaction and non-monetary items measured at fair value are measured using the exchange rate when fair value was determined.

Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of transactions and from the translation at period-end exchange rates of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognised in profit or loss except when deferred in other comprehensive income as qualifying cash flow hedges.

Foreign exchange gains and losses that relate to borrowings and cash and cash equivalents are presented in the Statement of comprehensive income within 'finance income or costs'. All other foreign exchange gains and losses are presented in profit or loss within 'other operating income'.

2.5 Revenue

Turnover represents sales to external customers excluding value added tax. Sales are recognised at the point at which the company has fulfilled its contracted obligations.

2.6 Operating leases: the Company as lessee

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

Benefits received and receivable as an incentive to sign an operating lease are recognised on a straight-line basis over the lease term, unless another systematic basis is representative of the time pattern of the lessee's benefit from the use of the leased asset.

2.7 Government grants

Grants are accounted under the accruals model as permitted by FRS 102. Government grants are made up of income received under the Coronavirus Job Retention Scheme and are disclosed as other operating income in the profit and loss account.

2.8 Finance costs

Finance costs are charged to profit or loss over the term of the debt using the effective interest method so that the amount charged is at a constant rate on the carrying amount. Issue costs are initially recognised as a reduction in the proceeds of the associated capital instrument.

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NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

2. Accounting policies (continued)

2.9 Pensions

Defined contribution pension plan

The Company operates a defined contribution plan for its employees. A defined contribution plan is a pension plan under which the Company pays fixed contributions into a separate entity. Once the contributions have been paid the Company has no further payment obligations.

The contributions are recognised as an expense in profit or loss when they fall due. Amounts not paid are shown in accruals as a liability in the Balance sheet. The assets of the plan are held separately from the Company in independently administered funds.

2.10 Current and deferred taxation

The tax expense for the year comprises current and deferred tax. Tax is recognised in profit or loss except that a charge attributable to an item of income and expense recognised as other comprehensive income or to an item recognised directly in equity is also recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity respectively.

The current income tax charge is calculated on the basis of tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date in the countries where the Company operates and generates income.

Deferred tax balances are recognised in respect of all timing differences that have originated but not reversed by the balance sheet date, except that:

- The recognition of deferred tax assets is limited to the extent that it is probable that they will be recovered against the reversal of deferred tax liabilities or other future taxable profits; and
- Any deferred tax balances are reversed if and when all conditions for retaining associated tax allowances have been met.

Deferred tax balances are not recognised in respect of permanent differences except in respect of business combinations, when deferred tax is recognised on the differences between the fair values of assets acquired and the future tax deductions available for them and the differences between the fair values of liabilities acquired and the amount that will be assessed for tax. Deferred tax is determined using tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date.

2.11 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets under the cost model are stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management.

2.11 Tangible fixed assets (continued)

Depreciation is charged so as to allocate the cost of assets less their residual value over their estimated useful lives, using the straight-line method.

Depreciation is provided on the following basis:

Long-term leasehold property

- over the life of the lease

Plant and machinery

- 6% to 33%

Motor vehicles

- 25%

The assets' residual values, useful lives and depreciation methods are reviewed, and adjusted prospectively if appropriate, or if there is an indication of a significant change since the last reporting date.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing the proceeds with the carrying amount and are recognised in profit or loss.

2.12 Stocks

Stocks are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value, being the estimated selling price less costs to complete and sell. Cost is based on the cost of purchase on a first in, first out basis. Work in progress and finished goods include labour and attributable overheads.

At each balance sheet date, stocks are assessed for impairment. If stock is impaired, the carrying amount is reduced to its selling price less costs to complete and sell. The impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

2.13 Debtors

Short-term debtors are measured at transaction price, less any impairment. Loans receivable are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment.

2.14 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash is represented by cash in hand and deposits with financial institutions repayable without penalty on notice of not more than 24 hours. Cash equivalents are highly liquid investments that mature in no more than three months from the date of acquisition and that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash with insignificant risk of change in value.

2.15 Creditors

Short-term creditors are measured at the transaction price. Other financial liabilities, including bank loans, are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

2. Accounting policies (continued)

2.16 Provisions for liabilities

Provisions are made where an event has taken place that gives the Company a legal or constructive obligation that probably requires settlement by a transfer of economic benefit, and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

Provisions are charged as an expense to profit or loss in the year that the Company becomes aware of the obligation, and are measured at the best estimate at the balance sheet date of the expenditure required to settle the obligation, taking into account relevant risks and uncertainties.

When payments are eventually made, they are charged to the provision carried in the Balance sheet.

2.17 Financial instruments

The company holds only financial assets and financial liabilitiess of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments include debtors and creditors. Debtors and creditors are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at amortised cost. Financial assets refer to fixed asset investments and debtor balances excluding prepayments, and financial liabilities refer to all creditor balances excluding deferred income.

2.18 Dividends

Equity dividends are recognised when they become legally payable. Interim equity dividends are recognised when paid. Final equity dividends are recognised when approved by the shareholders at an annual general meeting.

3. Judgments in applying accounting policies and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements under FRS 102 requires management to make estimates and assumptions which affect the financial statements. The key estimates and assumptions relate to the following:

Stock obsolescence:

The company makes a provision for slow moving stock on a sliding scale basis that increases with the age of stock, with all stock being typically fully written down after 3 years. This process requires the exercise of judgement and is not just a mechanical process.
