Report of the Members of Council for the year ended 31 March 2013

Structure, Governance and Management

The Trustees present their annual report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2013

Constitution and Organisation

Fusion Oxfords' Community Arts Agency Limited ("Fusion") is a registered Charity (number 1070805) governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association and Company Limited by Guarantee (number 02089425) Its Board of Trustees governs the Charity

Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees

The directors of the charitable company ("the charity") are its Trustees for the purpose of charity law and throughout this report they are collectively referred to as the Trustees and constitute its Members of Council

Fusion's constitution states that Board membership numbers should not be less than 3 with a quorum not less than one third or two trustees, whichever is the greater. Members are elected initially for 1 year with an option to extend at Annual General Meetings. Trustees to date have been recruited through a direct approach by a member of staff or board member. They are usually previously known to the organisation or the individual who approaches them.

More recently, following guidelines, Fusion has implemented a targeted recruitment campaign, sending out advertisements to appropriate companies and groups with the required skill-set. The applications received back are then presented to the trustees who will meet the candidates and recruit the appropriate people.

New Trustees are briefed on their obligations under charity law and company law and on the committee and decision-making process, the business plan and the recent financial performance of the charity

Trustees cannot personally benefit from Fusion whilst serving as a trustee

Risk Assessment

The Trustees recognise and accept their responsibility for ensuring that risks to which the Charity is exposed are reviewed and steps taken to mitigate potential damage by the use of appropriate preventative controls and corrective actions. Trustees are aware of the Charities SORP issued in 2005 and accept the requirement, in relation to all aspects of their work, for regular assessment of operating strengths and weaknesses. To this end, the risk management strategy comprises an annual review of the risks which the Charity may face, the establishment of systems and procedures to mitigate those risks identified, and the implementation of procedures designed to minimise any potential impact on the Charity should any of those risks materialise.

- 1 Foster and promote the improvement and development of artistic knowledge, understanding and appreciation of the arts including the worlds of drama, dance, music, visual arts, crafts, films, videos, animation and literature for the benefit of the public and in particular community groups, young persons, older people and people with special needs
- 2 Provide or assist in the provision of facilities for the arts, recreation and leisure time occupation with the objective of improving the conditions of life for such persons

Achievements and Performance

Fusion Key Achievements 2012-13

Mission Statement

Fusion Arts is a catalyst for creativity in Oxford, and beyond Since 1977 we have connected artists with communities, and inspired hundreds of bespoke creative projects

Through the transformational power of the arts, we respond to challenging social circumstances by delivering meaningful and inclusive artistic experiences

Fusion Arts has continued to develop a wide range of projects and initiatives to fulfil our remit and service plan of developing both centre-based activities at our site in East Oxford, as well as off site activities

The key strands of work as recently defined in our current business plan are as follows

- Older People and Isolation
- Young People and Attainment
- Community Cohesion

Fusion operates as a key player for developing and maintaining the physical infrastructure of high quality community arts activities and providing a participatory Arts Development programme for community Artists through training and employment opportunities

Key Outreach projects

The Storymakers – Year 2 of 3 of an acclaimed multi-arts course for primary school children with speech, language and communication difficulties, culminated in an exhibition at the Pitt Rivers Museum and also at Fusion Arts Centre This project is funded by Children in Need to help make a difference to the lives of these vulnerable children

Inside Out / Outside In – Is a participatory story telling project that aims to reach immigration detainees based in Campsfield House Immigration Removal Centre and diverse community groups in Oxford to build a bridge between the groups through creative channels

Ribbons of Unity – In the absence of Cowley Road Carnival this year, Fusion Arts devised a new project, funded by Awards for All, to keep the name of carnival alive Community and voluntary groups, schools, local people and families from East Oxford were invited to help create flags, banners and bunting reflecting the diversity of our community, the vast diversity of nationalities from both the Commonwealth and those participating in the Olympics. The decorations were first displayed to greet the Olympic Torch Relay when it passed through Oxford and will now become a community resource to be used for future events like Mela, Carnival and other festivals and celebrations in the area

Verve Tent – We have begun a project with the Pitt Rivers Museum, where Fusion plays a role in furthering their links in to the wider community by creating bespoke textile panels for a workshop tent inspired by items in their collection. We have recently hired artist Anne-Marie Cadman to carry out this work.

Achievements and Performance (continued)

Banbury Young Carers – We were commissioned by Banbury Hub to create a bespoke project for young carers over two half terms. We worked with musician and poet Steve Larkin to deliver workshops in lyric writing over the October half-term to write a song with the group called 'I Care'. In February, filmmaker Chris Bradley worked with the young people to animate their song into a film

Banbury Hub Weekly Art Classes –Banbury Hub also commissioned us to work with their weekly art club members in Spring Artist Miranda Bence-Jones worked with the young people on a photography project using their images in an installation that was put on display in the Hub foyer

Bretch Hill Lanterns - This year Fusion Arts returned to work with young people and their families at The Hill Neighbourhood Centre in Bretch Hill, Banbury, making Christmas willow lanterns. We offered workshops over three evenings and the lanterns were lit up, to create a beautiful backdrop for the Centre's Community Choir Christmas performance.

Centre-based activities at Fusion Arts

Fusion continues to organise bi-monthly *Pop Up Nights* featuring local musicians and artist's exhibitions, a night that attracts 100+ audience members every other month since it launched in 2011

Fusion also hosted the East Oxford Taster Exhibition for *Artweeks*, featuring examples of local artists' work from around the area as well as from the onsite Life Drawing group

Regular on-site groups continue to flourish including well established classes, *Artscape* weekly classes for adults with early onset dementia, *Life Drawing* classes, *Music for under 5s with Nick Cope, Dimensions Aerobics, Woodcraft Folk, African Drumming* and the two Age UK *Movement classes for Over 50s*

Fusion also welcomed on board new classes this year in African Dance, female Scouts, East Oxford Hub Youth Forum, and Oxford Young Men's Project

Fusion continues to offer regular artist surgeries and volunteering opportunities for local community artists

Fusion was pleased to partner with Oxford University Career Services for another Student Consultancy Research project which undertook an 8 week consultation process in to demographic changes in Oxford and how this will affect our work in early 2013

Financial Review

Reserves

The Board has an established reserves policy with a five year target to build a reserve covering two months' operating costs. In the 2012-2013 financial year it has not been possible to add significantly to the Reserve funds, due to the increasingly harsh funding climate limiting possibilities for securing unrestricted funds. The Board continues to monitor closely the funding position of the organisation in order to make adjustments and take decisions appropriately.

Application of reserves

The Board intends that the Reserve is established and preserved as a fund to ensure business continuity in the event of a temporary funding shortfall or an ultimate decision to wind up operations, requiring a close-down period. However, the Board considers the following applications to be valid uses of funds placed in the Reserve over and above the base level of two months' operating funds.

Financial Review (continued)

- 1) Business Support core support to the business designed to advance its activities or strengthen its resources, including funding of additional resources, human or material
- 2) Development funds small allocations to permit development of new initiatives in the absence of other developmental funds being secured
- Stability reserve further building of the base reserve level, taking into account inflationary pressures on budget and/or the impact of increased staffing or other costs on the two-month operating costs reserve level

In the case of uses being proposed under 1) or 2), the Board will receive, in advance of any commitment being entered into, a costed proposal for consideration, along with indication of method and timing of restoration of any temporary depletion of the base Reserves level

In the case of use under 3), the Board will be advised by the Director, in consultation with the Treasurer, of any amounts drawn down for business continuity purposes, the underlying reasons for this and the plans for restoration of the Reserves to the established level

Future Plans include raising funding for several potential projects

A 12-week accredited programme of music lyric writing and production workshops for young people aged 15-25 years old that have a strong creative entrepreneurial emphasis and strengthen links with the new Early Intervention Hubs. We also hope to establish a visual arts equivalent with the scheme of work linked in to two local events, Light Night and Cowley Road Carnival.

We also have plans to extend our offering to older people in isolation in an intergenerational multimedia project

Notes to the Financial Statements for the year ended 31 March 2013

1. Accounting Policies

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards and the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008). They follow the recommendations in Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting by Charities (Revised 2005) and the Companies Act 2006.

Incoming resources

Voluntary income received by way of donations and grants to the charity is included in full in the statement of financial activities when receivable, receipt is reasonably certain, and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy

Income from legacies is accounted for on a receivable basis, and is recognised in full in the statement of financial activities in the period in which receipt becomes certain

All other discretionary income is recognised on a receivable basis in the statement of financial activities

Income generated from the supply of services is included in the statement of financial activities in the period in which the supply is made

All of the income generated in the year has been derived from activities wholly undertaken in the LIK

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are built up from incoming resources received or generated for the charitable purpose. They are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.

Designated funds are funds set aside out of unrestricted funds by the Council and applied towards specific purposes as identified by the Council

Restricted funds are funds used for specified purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure meeting the criteria is charged against the fund, together with a fair allocation of overheads and support costs.

Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings, they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of those resources.

Governance costs are those incurred in connection with the administration of the charity regarding compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements

Staff costs and overhead expenses are allocated to activities on the basis of staff time spent on those activities

Liabilities are recognised as resources expended as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the Charity to the expenditure
