## Report of the Members of Council for the year ended 31 March 2017

### Structure, Governance and Management

The Trustees present their annual report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2017.

## **Constitution and Organisation**

Fusion Oxford's Community Arts Agency Limited ("Fusion") is a registered Charity (number 1070805) governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association and Company Limited by Guarantee (number 02089425). Its Board of Trustees governs the Charity.

#### **Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees**

The directors of the charitable company ("the charity") are its Trustees for the purpose of charity law and throughout this report they are collectively referred to as the Trustees and constitute its Members of Council.

Fusion's constitution states that Board membership numbers should not be less than 3 with a quorum not less than one third or two trustees, whichever is the greater. Trustees to date have been recruited through a direct approach by a member of staff or board member. They are usually previously known to the organisation or the individual who approaches them.

More recently, following guidelines, Fusion has implemented a targeted recruitment campaign, sending out advertisements to appropriate companies and groups with the required skill-set. The applications received back are then presented to the trustees who will meet the candidates and recruit the appropriate people.

New Trustees are briefed on their obligations under charity law and company law and on the committee and decision-making process, the business plan and the recent financial performance of the charity. Trustees cannot personally benefit from Fusion whilst serving as a trustee.

#### **Risk Assessment**

The Trustees recognise and accept their responsibility for ensuring that risks to which the Charity is exposed are reviewed and steps taken to mitigate potential damage by the use of appropriate preventative controls and corrective actions. Trustees are aware of the Charities SORP issued in 2016 (FRS 102) and accept the requirement, in relation to all aspects of their work, for regular assessment of operating strengths and weaknesses. To this end, the risk management strategy comprises an annual review of the risks which the Charity may face; the establishment of systems and procedures to mitigate those risks identified; and the implementation of procedures designed to minimise any potential impact on the Charity should any of those risks materialise.

#### Objectives and Activities for the Public Benefit

#### Our aim is to

- 1. Foster and promote the improvement and development of artistic knowledge, understanding and appreciation of the arts including the worlds of drama, dance, music, visual arts, crafts, films, videos, animation and literature for the benefit of the public and in particular community groups, young persons, older people and people with special needs.
- 2. Provide or assist in the provision of facilities for the arts, recreation and leisure time occupation with the objective of improving the conditions of life for such persons.

The Trustees have complied with their duty to have due regard to the guidance on public benefit published by the Charity Commission in exercising their powers and duties.

#### Fusion Key Achievements 2016 -17

#### Mission Statement

Fusion Arts is a catalyst for creativity in Oxford, and beyond. Since 1977 we have connected artists with communities, and inspired hundreds of bespoke creative projects.

Through the transformational power of the arts, we respond to challenging social circumstances by delivering meaningful and inclusive artistic experiences.

Fusion Arts has continued to develop a wide range of projects and initiatives to fulfil our remit and service plan of developing both centre-based activities at our site in East Oxford, as well as off site activities.

The key strands of work as recently defined in our current business plan are as follows:

- Older People and Isolation
- Young People and Attainment
- Community Cohesion

Fusion operates as a key player for developing and maintaining the physical infrastructure of high quality community arts activities and providing a participatory Arts Development programme for community Artists through training and employment opportunities.

## **Fusion's Artistic Policy:**

- delivers high quality, participatory arts in partnership with the communities we serve
- initiates inspiring and innovative arts projects that support social inclusion
- provides access to a wide range of expertise, facilities and resources
- acts as an advocate for creative excellence
- We prioritise those who otherwise would not access the arts, including:
  - o Vulnerable young people
  - People from culturally diverse backgrounds
  - o The homeless & those vulnerably housed
  - o Asylum seekers and refugees
  - o The economically disadvantaged
  - o Those with physical, learning or mental health difficulties
  - o The elderly
  - We also support artists in furthering their community arts skills

#### We believe the art:

- Enables communities to explore issues, communicate ideas and celebrate their identity
- Offers opportunities for self-expression and skills development

Oxford, Cultural Partners Group OCC, Cultural Education Partnership Board, Film Oxford, Oxford University Museum of Natural History, Christmas Light Night Festival, Pitt Rivers Museum, Bodleian Libraries, GLAM partnership, TORCH, Oxford Brookes University, Pegasus Theatre, Oxford International College, Young Women's Music Project (YWMP), Modern Art Oxford, Magdalen College School (MCS Art Festival), OVADA, OXJAM (Hub for Oxford) & local Schools.

## **Key Outreach projects**

## Large projects:

Story Makers 2 – Year 1 of a second round of 3-year funding from BBC Children in Need. An acclaimed multi-arts course for primary school children with speech, language and communication difficulties. Working with children 7-11 years old with Speech, Learning and Communication needs at 3 schools in areas of disadvantage in Oxford in partnership with a University of Oxford Museum: benefitting the children directly and indirectly by improving provision and understanding within schools, museums, home life and local community.

UpBeat - Youth Music funded Gold and Silver Arts award mentoring and masterclasses. Partnership with Artist in Residence YWMP to produce resilience and sustainability within the organisation. Feb 2017 – Feb 2018

Future Food Kids – Barton. A programme of drama workshops about healthy food and food sustainability, aimed at helping children learn about healthy eating choices and the wider issues around food sustainability. Delivered to 400 children at Bayards Hill School. Part of NHS Healthy New Towns initiative. Partners included - The Ministry of Imagination, NHS England, Oxford City Council, 3 Keel. Jan 2017

iCreative - A partnership project with Film Oxford. Programmes aim to develop alternative pathways into employment for young people Not in Education, Employment or Training, low income, excluded and disadvantaged. The first iCreative started in March 2017.

#### Small - Medium Projects:

[inside]OUTSIDE: Interdisciplinary Arts Festival: July - Sept 2016. Artist-in-residence - Oxford Brookes MA Social Sculpture festival. A unique, free festival of Contemporary Art, Social Sculpture and Sonic Art. The festival included new work at Fusion Arts and across the City, ranging from performance art, sonic art, public interventions, social and ecological justice projects, installations, film, interactive work, poetry and more.

Cowley Road Carnival. Provided essential staff base during the weekend of the carnival. For refreshment, meetings and drop off. The backstage of the festival.

KLICK exhibition. An international art project offering a platform for young artists from Leiden and Oxford. The two cities will have been twinned for 70 years. Inspired by this friendship, KLICK brings together young artists from both cities to honour our shared history and forge new links through exchanges and exhibitions.

Oxford Youth Dance Living Moving Archive Event. In celebration of 30 years of Oxford Youth Dance, the space will be used as a performance and workshop space for dance, for performers and audience. Oxford Youth Dance.

OXJAM. Volunteer day, fundraising exhibition and music venue. Attendance for OXJAM Festival estimated at around 300 throughout the day and evening. Fusion supported Oxford OXJAM Art Exhibition and Auction with space and staff time. Acted as main venue running the events, corporate partners for the event. Fundraised for OXJAM and acted as exposure for local artists.

Oxford International College summer arts programme. 30 Chinese Students given the freedom to experiment with a wide range of creative arts. They took this back into the local community, taking part in local events such as the Cowley Road Carnival.

World Music Afternoon. Workshop to discover the giant Ugandan Embaire Xylophone and West African Kora with Jali Fily Cissokho and performances with Afro fusion.

## **Key Outreach projects (continued)**

What Next? Oxford. Started in September 2016 coming to Fusion every 6 weeks. What Next? Oxford includes creative practitioners and cultural leaders from across the city. Covering all art forms and includes representatives from creative organisations, artists, the University and the City Council. Aims to strengthen the cultural sector though regular updates, sharing best practice and contributing to national strategies. Youth Ambition Music Workshops. Working with the Youth Ambition Team Fusion provided a highly experienced Music Leader through Zahra Tehrani of YWMP to run a making session at East Oxford Community Centre Youth Club.

#### Artists in Residents:

Young Women's Music Project in residence. Supporting the strengthen of Young Women's Music Project as a charity. Converting the Fusion darkroom into a temporary recording Studio for training sessions and using studio 2 for group workshops and YWMP twice monthly meet ups. Free temporary residency extended this year.

East Oxford Independent Art Market - Stalls by independent makers with new, affordable work. Find unique Christmas gifts while support local artists. In the evening live music.

Fusion Supports Artists and Organisations through a dedicated Artist in Residence scheme, with additional short-term opportunities for artists to use the studio when aiming towards specific projects. Fusion also supported 6 artists to produce works for OXJAM, AOFS, Warneford Hospital, Said Business School.

## Regular and one-off Sessions at Fusion Arts Centre:

Ballet – Adults, Babies and Toddlers. Introduction to ballet and learning by playing / African Drumming. by musician in the community / Awkward Actors Theatre Group, an Oxford-based community group for anyone who wants to learn how to improvise both comedy and drama / Flux Dance Theatre / Oxford Middle Eastern Dance Society (OMEDS) / Exhibition - Artwork and poetry from The Dub magazine, a free local reggae roots publication / Oxford Printmakers and the Welcome Trust Centre for Human Genetics - an art & science day (free and open to the public) / Xtra.Art - Young artists from Slough Creative Junction (previous Gold Arts Award successes) touring show in conjunction with AOFS / Modelling Change final exhibition before closure of project run by Thames Valley Partnership supported by Fusion / Life Drawing classes - Drop in sessions and taught sessions run by local artists for the community / Movement and exercise classes for Over 50s funded by Age UK.

#### **Financial Review**

#### Reserves

The Board has an established reserves policy with a five-year target to build a reserve covering two months' operating costs. In the 2016-2017 financial year it has not been possible to add to the Reserve funds, this is due to the increasingly harsh funding climate limiting possibilities for securing unrestricted funds. The Board continues to monitor closely the funding position of the organisation to adjust and take decisions appropriately.

Application of reserves: The Board intends that the reserve is established and preserved as a fund to ensure business continuity in the event of a temporary funding shortfall or an ultimate decision to wind up operations, requiring a close-down period. However, the Board considers the following applications to be valid uses of funds placed in the Reserve over and above the base level of two months' operating funds.

## Financial Review (continued)

- 1) Business Support: core support to the business designed to advance its activities or strengthen its resources, including funding of additional resources, human or material.
- 2) Development funds: small allocations to permit development of new initiatives in the absence of other developmental funds being secured.
- 3) Stability reserve: further building of the base reserve level, considering inflationary pressures on budget and/or the impact of increased staffing or other costs on the two-month operating costs reserve level.

In the case of uses being proposed under 1) or 2), the Board will receive, in advance of any commitment being entered, a costed proposal for consideration, along with indication of method and timing of restoration of any temporary depletion of the base Reserves level.

In the case of use under 3), the Board will be advised by the Director, in consultation with the Treasurer, of any amounts drawn down for business continuity purposes, the underlying reasons for this and the plans for restoration of the Reserves to the established level

#### **Future Plans**

Future plans include raising funds for core development and the continuation of several successful projects such as Black Box, Future Foods and iCreative. We also have plans to extend our offering to local artists and our ability to increase wellbeing in the community via creative practice.

Fusion Arts is re-working and updating the business plan and working structure in time for the new build of EOCC opening in 2020. The plan is to expand the Vision and Mission of Fusion Arts keeping in line with current core values, working smarter, while achieving greater outputs for wellbeing. The new build of the space will provide Fusion Arts with new opportunities to develop and enhance its outputs and engage with a wider community.

## Notes to the Financial Statements for the year ended 31 March 2017

### 1. Accounting Policies

### **Basis of Preparation**

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 2006, the Charities Act 2011, accounting and reporting by charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1st January 2015) (Charity SORP FRS 102) and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102). The charity meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

#### Incoming resources

Voluntary income received by way of donations and grants to the charity is included in full in the statement of financial activities when receivable, receipt is reasonably certain, and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Income from legacies is accounted for on a receivable basis, and is recognised in full in the statement of financial activities in the period in which receipt becomes certain.

All other discretionary income is recognised on a receivable basis in the statement of financial activities.

Income generated from the supply of services is included in the statement of financial activities in the period in which the supply is made.

All of the income generated in the year has been derived from activities wholly undertaken in the UK.

#### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are built up from incoming resources received or generated for the charitable purpose. They are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.

Designated funds are funds set aside out of unrestricted funds by the Council and applied towards specific purposes as identified by the Council.

Restricted funds are funds used for specified purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure meeting the criteria is charged against the fund, together with a fair allocation of overheads and support costs.

## Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings, they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of those resources.

Governance costs are those incurred in connection with the administration of the charity regarding compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Staff costs and overhead expenses are allocated to activities on the basis of staff time spent on those activities.

Liabilities are recognised as resources expended as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the Charity to the expenditure.
