Structure

Beavers Arts Limited is a company limited by guarantee and not having a share capital under the Companies Acts 2006 (registration number 02143658) and is registered with the Charity Commissioners as a charity (registration number 1068736) under the Charities Act 2011.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2016

Trustees Responsibilities

The trustees (who are also directors of Beavers Arts Limited for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP 2015 (FRSSE);
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in operation.

The trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Recruitment of Trustees

As a matter of policy the Trust would normally expect to advertise for new trustees in both the local and national press to ensure that the most suitable candidates are selected for interview by the Board. In some cases the Board may become aware of someone with particular qualifications and may invite such a person to apply for Trusteeship.

All new Trustees receive the Charity Commission's booklet giving guidance on being a charity trustee as well as following a formal induction programme. In appropriate cases, by agreement with the Trustees and the applicant, a trustee designate may attend up to three trustee meetings before his/her appointment is confirmed.

Key risks affecting the Business

The Company operates a risk adverse policy in all areas of operation. Overall responsibility for identifying and managing risk rests with the Board. All major risks to which the charity is exposed have been reviewed and systems have been established to manage those risks.

Objectives and Activities

Charitable Objectives

The main objective of the Charity is to promote, maintain, improve and advance the education of the public in the arts.

Activities

The charity aims to achieve the objectives by way of increasing the availability of arts and to promote, encourage and increase the appreciation of the arts generally. Activities and events are planned and performed in which the arts are promoted to the general public, and which can be either standalone projects or annual events. These are mainly supported by local authorities and grant making trusts.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2016

Achievements and Performance

Beavers Arts Limited (B Arts) objects are to work creatively for change with individuals and communities by employing artists and creative professionals in work that is innovative, intelligent and meaningful and that leads to a process of cultural democracy. The company continued to deliver well against its charitable objects of promoting and increasing the availability of the arts during the year 2015-16.

In particular the company's activities reached beneficiaries at home and abroad and had a positive impact on communities within Stoke-on-Trent and North Staffordshire. In total the company worked with 11833 people and supported 45 volunteers. It employed 4 permanent staff and 110 contracted artists to reach these beneficiaries.

Within 2015-16 B Arts worked across the following themes, which together form the company's core activities:

Site-Specific Performances

The company delivered a major new performance piece, A Place At The Table, at China Halls in Stoke-on-Trent in November 2015 during the British Ceramics Biennial, supported by Grants for the Arts. It worked in Newcastle-under-Lyme to create a new summer carnival event for communities in the city, Midsummer Wakes, in July 2015. Its programme of site-specific cinema and live theatre events continued with events in Stoke-on-Trent and South Cheshire, supported by Creative England. The company worked in Meir, Stoke-on-Trent, to create a seasonal celebratory event in December 2015 funded by Arts Council England through the Appetite Stoke Creative People and Places programme.

Community Bakery

The company continued to build its skills and experience in baking and working with communities. This year it was funded by the Coalfields Regeneration Trust to deliver baking session and bread clubs with communities in former mining communities in Stoke-on-Trent which it did as part of the A Place At the Table project. The bakery started to sell bread to the public on an ongoing basis from February 2016, an activity which includes an extensive volunteering programme. The company also operated the cafe at the British Ceramics Biennial from September - November 2015 and the cafe was a platform for young music promoters, performers and artists from diverse communities in Stoke. There was also a children's takeover of the cafe during half-term.

Making Stoke A Better Place To Live and Work

The company continued to deliver a major programme of artist development, Artcity, in partnership with a number of other creative organisations based in Stoke-on-Trent: Airspace Gallery, Cultural Sisters, Letting In The Light, Partners In Creative Learning and Restoke, supported by The Esmee Fairbairn Foundation. A number of disused and vacant buildings were animated by cultural projects throughout the year in Stoke-on-Trent.

Appetite Stoke

The company concluded its involvement with the consortium of arts organisations delivering the three-year Appetite programme, supported by the Arts Council's Creative People and Places programme. The company worked in Meir, Stoke-on-Trent, to create a seasonal celebratory event in December 2015 funded by Arts Council England through the Appetite Creative People and Places programme. Rebecca Frankenberg of B Arts continued to act as an Appetite Builder on the programme and supported three community groups in Stoke to develop ideas for artistic activity in their neighbourhoods.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2016

International Work

The company concluded its three-year European Neighbourhoods project with communities and partner organisations in Paris, Copenhagen, Oslo and Berlin. A new relationship was created with communities in Gothenburg, Sweden and a partnership with Gothenburg University.

Organisation Development

The Board of Trustees was strengthened with the appointment of Jo Blagg on 27 November 2015 who brings substantial knowledge and experience of the local and regional arts scene to the board.

Financial Review

The Charity's financial position is laid out in the balance sheet and financial statements. The total funds of the charity at 31 March 2016 are £55,538 (2015 £31,487).

Reserves of £55,538 represent restricted funds of £7,738 comprising previous capital projects and unrestricted funds of £47,800.

Trustees Investment Powers and Policy on Reserves

The Trustees have power to invest and expend the funds of the Charity in such a manner, as they shall consider most beneficial for the achievement of the objects in accordance with the Articles of Association of the Charity.

Reserves in this context constitute all funds held in cash, at the charity's bankers, or in the form of other current, medium or long term investments, which form part of the Trust's unrestricted funds available for expenditure on the Trust's charitable purposes.

The Board considers that it is desirable to hold a minimum of three months' total operating expenditure in reserve, with the strategic aim of building reserves up to twelve months, in order to smooth the effect of any adverse fluctuations in income. The trustees note that unrestricted reserves currently represent only two months unrestricted expenditure, and plan to increase the unrestricted reserves to meet their policy.

The policy is reviewed annually by the Board, and reserve levels quarterly by the treasurer.

NOTES FOR THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2016

1. Accounting policies

1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and on accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015). In preparing the financial statements the charity follows best practice as set out in the Statement of Recommended Practice FRSSE, Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

The following is a summary of the significant accounting policies adopted by the company in the preparation of the financial statements.

In the ordinary course of business, the company continually incurs expenditure on props and costumes, which have no realisable value, but are reuseable on future projects. These costs are written off in the financial statements, but are considered by the directors to be capable of generating a future income stream, the amount and timing of which cannot be quantified.

1.2 Turnover

Turnover represents amounts receivable for grants, performance and related revenue, net of VAT and trade discounts.

1.3 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

Plant and machinery

10% per annum of net book value

Computer equipment

33% per annum of cost

1.4 Income resources

Voluntary Income is derived from corporate, individual and community donations, grant making trusts, National Lottery Funds, and statutory sources. It is included in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable. Legacy income is included before receipt when there is sufficient evidence of the certainty of its impending receipt and value.

1.5 Resources expended

Costs of generating voluntary income include all direct and indirect costs of the fundraising department.

Charitable activities include all direct and indirect costs of delivering the activities in support of the charity's objects.

Governance costs are all general running costs not associated with fundraising or charitable activities.

Support costs are allocated to the activity categories of Resources Expended based on reasoned estimates of staff time employed on the activities concerned.

1.6 Restricted and unrestricted funds

Incoming resources with conditions attaching to future capital or revenue expenditure are classified as restricted funds until the restriction has been discharged by that expenditure. All other income is classified as unrestricted funds.

2. Taxation

The Company is registered as a charity, as such, it is not liable to taxation on its income.
