Chair's report

For the year ended 31 March 2018

As always with acta, when asked to write this annual report it's almost impossible to choose highlights from the wide range of inspiring projects we've experienced, learned from and enjoyed throughout the year. First however, I want to commend and give thanks for the creative thinking, hard work and strong management that Neil and Helen both contribute on a daily basis to this valuable and well-loved organisation. The challenges this year have reflected cuts in grants and public subsidies and the uncertainty of Brexit, increasing the demands on Neil's time in particular. Fundraising has become an ever-present necessity. It's important also to thank Rosalie and Sara, who have worked alongside Neil to achieve the grants that enable acta to continue to deliver work of the highest quality: locally, nationally and internationally.

You'll read in the body of this annual report that during the past year, the work has included 500 participatory workshops, 13 original new shows, producing 39 performances to audiences totalling over 3,000 - 75% of whom are not regular theatre-goers. The Get Together programme of activities targets new people locally, the Young Carers' programme, acta's youth theatres, and the first year of the new Stories programme engaging new adult performers from across the City - and which was directed by foundation drama workers Tracey Harvey and Jody Cook, who "graduated" in July. Two new foundation drama workers started in September to work with acta core team in delivering a series of new weekly adult groups with refugees and migrant communities in Easton and St Pauls, and at Hannah More School in St Phillips. None of this could be delivered without a dedicated staff team prepared to give over 100% commitment - and I thank them all.

My report would not be complete without mention of acta's ongoing partnership with the Malcolm X Elders, and the Gas Girls tour, but I must make special mention of the REACT project: in partnership with Rotterdams Wijktheater (Holland) and Centro per lo Sviluppo Creativo Danilo Dolci (Sicily), acta is coordinating this thought-provoking EU Creative Europe Refugee Integration programme for refugees to share their stories with host communities. The learning from programme partners was shared at the festival of theatre made by refugees at actacentre in March 2018 - an event which clearly demonstrated acta's organisational skills and teamwork at their very best. It is to be followed by a book, film and online dissemination in summer 18.

In conclusion: even a cursory look at acta's work over the past 12 months will confirm that the company plays a major role in delivering invaluable and relevant community theatre addressing the issues of today's complex world. I look forward to the next 12 months with anticipation.

Report of the trustees

For the year ended 31 March 2018

The trustees, who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, submit their annual report and the unaudited financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2018.

Reference and administrative information set out on page 1 forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the Memorandum and Articles of Association and the Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting by Charities (effective from January 2015).

Structure, governance and management

The charity is a charitable company limited by guarantee.

It is governed by memorandum and articles of association (September 1987), which provide details of the Council of Management and procedures for the Annual General Meeting, at which at least one third of trustees, those who have been longest in office, will be subject to retirement or rotation.

Public benefit

All of our work exists for the benefit of the public, to bring about positive change for individuals and community through promoting active, creative participation in theatre.

acta creates high quality, relevant theatre with vulnerable and socially isolated people from all generations and cultures through an open access and free creative programme which provides positive and enjoyable shared experiences, building friendships and a shared appreciation of common humanity.

The Company has delivered four main programmes of work this year, including over 500 participatory workshops with over 500 different people. The programme has enabled the creation and performance of 13 original new shows, producing 39 performances to audiences totalling over 3,000 - 75% of whom are not regular theatre-goers.

We continuously review our aims and objectives to ensure that our activities are developed in accordance with our stated charitable purposes. We have referred to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit to review our aims and objectives and in planning our future activities:

Our aims and objectives

The memorandum and articles of association describe our objects as follows:-

- Instigate and supervise drama projects for youth an community groups;
- Provide all sections of society with the opportunity to participate in theatre;
- Supervise drama sessions with people who are encouraged to create and perform their own show:
- Identify (in conjunction with others if necessary) areas and communities in which theatre activities are lacking and to remedy deficiencies identified as a result;
- Design projects which emphasise the educational aspects of workshops and the personal and social development of individuals within a group;
- Supervise projects which are designed to assist community development.

Our purpose - strategic aims

acta believes that theatre is for everyone, and exists to promote opportunities to access theatre and the related arts.

The Company works to a diversity action plan with the following strategic aims:-

- acta workshops are open to everyone within the project target group;
- acta will make no charges to participants for workshops, and keep box office prices to a minimum, to ensure people are not prevented from participating for economic reasons;
- Workshop and performance venues are always welcoming, and accessible to the needs of the specific target group;
- acta will endeavour to provide transport to workshops for participants who may not otherwise be able to attend; and
- acta's artistic policy is to give all participants an equal opportunity to be involved in the project, with people encouraged to develop their own roles within the group. Project participants devise all acta shows, thus ensuring their relevance to the communities with which we are working.

Achievements and performance – a review of activities

In this year we welcomed new employees and participants from diverse backgrounds as we completed the first year (and began the second) of the engagement programme supported by Paul Hamlyn, to extend Foundation and to deliver Stories with adults across the City. Two new half-time foundation drama workers started in September, and the new full-time foundation post, Director's Assistant, began at the same time.

Another significant development for acta this year was the start of Youth Investment Fund (YIF) support for our youth theatre network, at actacentre, in Lockleaze and with young carers.

Our local Get Together programme engaged isolated people of all ages in making new original theatre.

The REACT festival of theatre made by refugees was a particular highlight of the programme at the end of another busy year for the Company.

A review of our main programmes and projects this year follows below:-

Get Together, Bedminster

Get Together, our local programme supported by BIG Reaching Communities, developed further to engage new people of all ages in weekly participatory arts workshops to improve confidence, tackle social isolation, improve emotional well-being, individual self-esteem and community pride of place.

This local actacentre programme included the following weekly workshops:-

- Phoenix young adults produced A Bit of Imagination in December;
- Choir the intergenerational community choir performed a series of concerts at acta events throughout the year, and performed Blood on the Coal in October;
- The Thursdays produced the Blood on the Coal show, based on local mining heritage; and
- Making Time a daytime group for isolated older people merged with the new "day trippers," to create a theatre show for local school children, *Phoebe's Story*, "a story from all our stories."

Youth Investment Fund (YIF)

Our young carers programme, supported this year by BBC Children In Need together with YIF, offers a weekly youth theatre for young carers from across Central, South & East Bristol, plus intensive holiday activities for new young carers. The young carers' youth theatre produced their annual production, *The Keeper of Souls* in May. In addition, a series of three "play in 3 days" projects were delivered for new young carers, in July, October and February.

In Lockleaze (North Bristol), two new weekly youth theatres began in September, with young people working towards a double-bill of annual productions to perform locally in June.

In Bedminster, two youth theatres for young people from South Bristol began in September, with young people working towards their youth arts awards, and to create a double-bill of annual productions at the end of term in July.

Stories

In the summer term, the first year of the new Stories programme which makes theatre with new adult performers from across the City, produced their end of year theatre shows. The shows were directed by foundation drama workers Tracey Harvey and Jody Cook, who "graduated" from their yearlong learning posts in July. Four original Stories shows were produced by five groups: *It's My Life* from Hannah More, *Down Our Road* from Lockleaze, *Dream On* from Redcliffe and *All Change* in Avonmouth. Eight public performances watched by a total audience of 493 people.

Two new foundation drama workers started in September and worked with acta core team to deliver a series of new weekly adult groups with refugees and migrant communities in Easton and St Pauls, and at Hannah More. A new Lockleaze Stories group in North Bristol also began, and all groups devised new theatre shows to perform in the summer term.

REACT – Refugee Engagement and integration Through Community Theatre

In partnership with Rotterdam's Wijktheater (Holland) and Centro per lo Sviluppo Creativo Danilo Dolci (Sicily), acta is coordinating this EU Creative Europe Refugee Integration programme for refugees to share their stories with host communities. The learning from programme partners was shared at the festival of theatre made by refugees at actacentre in March 2018, and will be followed by a book, film and online dissemination in summer 18.

The acta shows shared at the festival were *Dream On* from Redcliffe Stories, and a new show from refugees living in Easton (supported by Ashley Housing), *Lost Sheep*.

Malcolm X Elders

Our longstanding partnership with the Malcolm X Elders Theatre Company developed further this year, as the company worked with children at St Nicholas of Tolentine Primary School to produce their own version of the *Ticky Picky Boom Boom* show in July. *Moonshine Nights*, which performed in 2016, was brought back for two new performances in the Autumn.

Gas Girls

This celebrated WWI centenary show toured to new theatre venues in Bristol and beyond in May and June; performing at Trinity (East Bristol), The Rondo in Bath, Blakehay in Weston-Super-Mare and in Lockleaze (North Bristol), transforming a primary school hall into a sold-out community theatre venue.

Financial review

The Company ends the year with a reduced balance sheet value, although general funds increased slightly, in accordance with the reserves policy.

The trustees continuously review their policy on free reserves, consulting Charity Commission guidance. The Company continues to aim to build up its free reserves to three months' normal operating costs, circa £105,000.

The Company accounts are reviewed by the trustees on a quarterly basis to ensure annual targets will be met, with the Treasurer attending quarterly finance subcommittee meetings with SMT prior to reporting back to the full Council of Management.

The trustees work closely with the Artistic Director to ensure that all possible areas of risk are considered in the management of the Company, and to develop all opportunities available. Each project is assessed before the charity makes a commitment to the work, and is then monitored on a monthly basis to ensure that any risks are minimised.

The Company continues to invest in fund-raising and to diversify its funding sources and activities, with a view to minimising the external risks to funding. The Company benefits from a clear fundraising strategy, and has secured funding from Arts Council England and Bristol City Council Culture for the next four years, as well as from new charitable sources.

Internal risks are minimised by the implementation of procedures for authorisation of all transactions and projects, to ensure consistent quality of delivery for all operational aspects of the charitable company. These procedures are periodically reviewed to ensure that they still meet the needs of the charity.

Volunteers

The Company works with over 500 participants each year, who volunteer their time as community performers and to take part in our workshops and events. Additionally, 35-50 volunteers each year assist with stewarding events and performances, assisting with refreshments, gardening and other volunteering opportunities. Staff members are all aware of our volunteer policy, and ensure volunteers are appropriately supervised, with an allocated key worker for each volunteer. We are grateful for all the efforts of our volunteers involved in service provision over the year.

Employee involvement and employment of disabled people

Employees have been consulted on issues of concern to them through weekly company meetings, and have been kept informed on specific matters directly by the senior management team, in addition to regular supervision meetings. There is regular communication between management members and employees, both through the senior management team and a system of staff reports to management.

The Artistic Director liaises with the trustees on the annual job review process for each employee.

The charity has implemented a number of detailed policies in relation to all aspects of personnel matters including:-

- Equality and diversity policy;
- Volunteer policy; and
- Health and safety policy.

In accordance with the charity's equality and diversity policy, the charity has long established fair employment practices in the recruitment, selection, retention and training of disabled people.

Full details of the business plan and policies are available from the actacentre.

Statement of responsibilities of the trustees

The trustees are required to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and the incoming resources and application of resources, including the net income or expenditure, of the charity for the year. In preparing those financial statements the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and which enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. The trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The trustees confirm that to the best of their knowledge there is no information relevant to the examination of which the independent examiners are unaware. The trustees also confirm that they have taken all necessary steps to ensure that they themselves are aware of all relevant examination information and that this information has been communicated to the independent examiners.

Members of the charity guarantee to contribute an amount not exceeding £1 to the assets of the charity in the event of winding up. The trustees are members of the charity but this entitles them only to voting rights. The trustees have no beneficial interest in the charity.

Independent examiner's report

To the trustees of

I report to the trustees on my examination of the accounts of ACTA Community Theatre Ltd (the charitable company) for the year ended 31 March 2018, which are set out on pages 10 to 24.

Responsibilities and basis of report

Notes to the financial statements

For the year ended 31 March 2018

1. Accounting policies

a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities in preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

ACTA Community Theatre Ltd meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note.

b) Going concern basis of accounting

The accounts have been prepared on the assumption that the charity is able to continue as a going concern, which the trustees consider appropriate having regard to the current level of unrestricted reserves. There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

c) Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the item of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Income from the government and other grants, whether 'capital' grants or 'revenue' grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred.

d) Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity: this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank.

e) Funds accounting

Unrestricted funds are available to spend on activities that further any of the purposes of the charity. Designated funds are unrestricted funds of the charity which the trustees have decided at their discretion to set aside to use for a specific purpose. Restricted funds are donations which the donor has specified are to be solely used for particular areas of the charity's work or for specific projects being undertaken by the charity.

f) Expenditure and irrecoverable VAT

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

g) Allocation of support costs

Support costs are those functions that assist the work of the charity but do not directly undertake charitable activities. These costs have been allocated between cost of raising funds and expenditure on charitable activities on the basis of staff costs between activities:

Raising funds 16.9% Charitable activities 83.1%

h) Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write down the cost of each asset to its estimated residual value over its expected useful life. The depreciation rates in use are as follows:

Stage equipment 25% reducing balance Office fittings and equipment 25% reducing balance

Items of equipment are capitalised where the purchase price exceeds £500.

i) Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

j) Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

k) Creditors

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

I) Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

m) Pension costs

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme for its employees. There are no further liabilities other than that already recognised in the SOFA.
