#### Governing document

The charity is constituted as a company limited by guarantee and is therefore governed by a memorandum and articles of association

#### Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Signals appointment of trustees is by invitation from the existing board. Signals strive to have a balance of expertise and experience represented on the board of trustees.

A structured recruitment programme was implemented throughout the year

#### Induction and training of new trustees

Signals have a board development pack which is aimed at providing members of the board with all the relevant information to make them aware of their responsibilities

#### Organisational structure

The charity is organised so that the trustees meet bi-monthly with the funders. Ad hoc meetings of the board are also called when the trustees see fit

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### Related parties

The charity has a very close relationship with Essex County Council, which provides observers who attend regular meetings with the trustees, and provides funding to enable the charity to carry out its charitable activities

#### Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the chanty is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error

Signals board meetings include a review of the charity's accounts as well as a detailed analysis of the cashflow forecast for the coming period

Signals board also consult with the CEO through smaller working groups to look at the operational elements of the organisation

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Objectives and aims

To advance education, promote understanding, appreciation of, and participation in digital art, film and media for the benefit of the public Through

#### Maintaining a media arts centre for the benefit of the public

Helping young people and the disadvantaged enjoy and achieve through creative activities, allowing them to develop skills, advance in life and contribute positively to society

Encouraging the development of the art of digital media and film

Signals aims to support media working in the region, encouraging people to participate in production and increase understanding of media. Signals does this through courses, projects, film and media exhibition, providing equipment and facilities and through guidance, information and sharing skills.

#### **Public Benefit**

In deciding a programme of activity and development the Trustees have paid due regard to the Charity Commission guidance on public benefit. In seeking to achieve our aims Signals is strongly committed to working inclusively with all people in the community it serves, much of its project work is aimed at disadvantaged young people who would not usually have access to media production. It is fundamental to Signals' belief that everyone should be able to increase his or her understanding of media.

Signals is a public facility that offers guidance, facilities and courses to all. Signals operate primarily in Essex but also across the Eastern region and works in partnership with other organisations and schools. Signals provides projects for disadvantaged groups that are free for participants and is able to provide resources at its centre or travel to groups enabling full access to our resources. Signals is especially interested in inspiring people to learn and develop personal skills and prioritises groups that face barriers in formal education, either through exclusion from mainstream education or a disadvantage that prevents participation. This could be behavioural, physical or lack of opportunity.

#### Volunteers

Signals worked with 6 regular volunteers this year who provided valuable support in workshops, projects and in the office. Many of Signals volunteers go on to full-time training or careers in media. Signals has a volunteer policy and agrees a plan of work and training with each volunteer on commencement.

#### **ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE**

#### **Achievements**

Signals has had a successful year significantly increasing the number of people it works with by 100%. New partnerships were developed and Signals continued to develop its programme and implement the 5-year business plan. Signals also held a stakeholder workshop, this helped Signals develop new branding and influenced the development of the programme. The meeting also highlighted the importance that creative media projects have on improving lives and helping communities, 36 people attended the facilitated and documented workshop.

#### **ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE**

#### Key projects

Signals continues its work with young people and disadvantaged groups. This year Signals worked with over 2,000 young people developing media and life skills and worked with a range of disadvantaged groups including social deprivation, and children with disabilities. Signals actively seeks to work with groups it has not worked with before

#### First Light Films

Three short films were created with young people from 1 The Chinese community who created an animation in three languages that combined Chinese folk stories with the modern world 2 The Ormiston Trust's children of offenders group made a puppet film about isolation and redemption 3 Cherry Tree Primary School and Speech and Language Centre produced 'Wonderful Word' an animation that has had international festival screenings and was nominated for best Animation at the prestigious First Light Movies awards in London

#### Sexual Health

Family Mosaic commissioned Signals to work with a group of young, supported housing residents on a film about sexual health, the film was completed in April 09 and included ASDAN accreditation delivered by the Signals Education Co-ordinator. This film will be shown to young people as a teaching aid. A second film on STDs was also made in this year.

#### GiFT - Step in to History

A one day event at Hollytrees House as part of Colchester Gift Festival Signals worked with St Helenas School and EAFA to create a 'green screen' room and archive screenings, the green screen allowed visitors to dress up and enter film archive scenes. This was popular with the 390 people who took part.

#### Media Club

Signals worked with a group of young people to develop a proposal for an after school media club where 11 to 16 year olds can learn practical skills and make films. Members of the group will also serve as a youth advisory panel for youth work. This project received funding through the Essex Community Foundation and will run next year.

#### Calendar

Signals worked with Essex Children's Services to produce 1,200 calendars designed by 'looked after children' in Essex

#### 'Time Bomb'

Signals was asked to work with excluded children from Langdon Hills Pupil Referral Unit on a short film about peer pressure 
This project proved very successful and has increased Signals interest in working with excluded children and young people

#### 'Stories of the World'

Signals is a key partner in the 'Eastern Exchanges' Cultural Olympiad project where we will be working with museums in the Eastern region providing media expertise, documenting events and contributing to exhibitions. The project began with an opening at the Fitzwilliam Museum Cambridge in February 2010 and will continue until 2012.

#### 'Explore Culture One World Festival'

In partnership with Essex County Council Signals began work on a cross-Essex film exhibition programme that takes place from March to October 2010 Signals will be showing films that have an Essex theme and reflect diverse resident cultures in a mixture of venues

#### Courses

Signals worked with Extended Services to provide 24 low cost courses in school holidays for young people in economically deprived areas of Colchester, over 250 children attended. This enabled Signals to reach new participants. Signals continued its own public access courses, which are increasingly fully booked. In evaluation 95% of participants graded Signals courses as excellent or good with 70% of the total excellent.

The University of Essex practical filmmaking modules from the BA and MA took place again at Signals

#### Production

The Colchester Filmmakers Network continued to be supported by Signals. This group encourages local filmmakers to collaborate on production and share skills. Signals provides space and reduced camera hire rates to the group. The network held 30 sessions this year and produced 12 films.

#### Exhibition

Signals held 18 exhibition events this year including feature films and shorts made by Signals projects Next year will see Signals full participation in 'Explore Culture One World Festival' exhibiting films around Essex

#### **ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE**

#### Organisational

Signals continues to review and update policy and procedures and consult with stakeholders it seeks to increase quality and productivity in all that it does and inspire those qualities in the people it works with. Due to the reduction in core funding this year and the challenging current general economic situation Signals did not replace the 2 part time members of staff who left in April and May 09. Signals will continue to do all possible to keep overheads to a minimum and diversify its income streams. Signals employed a professional bookkeeper on a freelance basis to ensure a high level of accurate financial reporting in the years ahead in this new economic climate Signals will regularly review and revise its business plan. Signals is pleased to receive on going support and partnership commitment from Essex County Council and have developed several joint projects for which Signals will be taking forward next year.

#### **Staffing**

Two part-time member of staff left early in the year. The Finance Officer was replaced by a trained accountant employed on a freelance basis

#### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

#### Financial position

In this difficult financial climate Signals has experienced financial pressure and the organisation's income was significantly reduced from the previous year. This was due to reduction in trust and foundation funds available and less earned income through commissions and hire. In response to this Signals revised its business plan and produced a short term Action Plan that looked at the steps needed to create an increased, diverse and stable income. It was recognised that some steps toward the full implementation on the business plan would be slower due to the reduction in funds available however Signals is largely on track to achieve its goals on time. Signals has mitigated financial difficulties by having diverse income from commissioned work, equipment, space and skill hire, experienced fundraising skills and strength through partnership working. Going in to the new year Signals has secured funds for the 'Explore Culture One World Festival', funding from First Light for 3 production projects, funding for the new media club and a two year commitment from the Museums Eastern Exchanges project. Signals is pleased that Essex County Council continue to support and fund the organisation.

#### Reserves policy

Signals strives to ensure that it develops a reserve fund of 3 months operational costs. At this time it has not achieved this figure. It aims to build up reserves annually from earned income at the level of around £4,000 per year.

#### **FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS**

Signals listened to the stakeholder's feedback at the July 2009 workshop and has taken steps to develop in accordance with some suggestions. Future developments include

To develop Signals profile locally and regionally and within the sector by creating a new brand logo as a 'Centre' and increasing marketing and publicity

To seek to develop the studio space and improve resources Signals will apply through Biffa to fund a refurbishment to the studio and increase signage

To develop an events programme including film screenings and opportunities for artists

To increase capacity Signals will seek to employ two people through the Future Jobs Fund programme to assist with marketing and media production and will consider an ongoing internship or apprenticeship programme

#### **FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS**

#### **New Projects**

With funding from Essex Community Foundation the Youth Media club will start in 2010. This will be a term time weekly after-school club for 11 to 16 year olds.

Signals has been awarded £30,000 by First Light for 3 film productions for 2010 and will be working with young people from the local African Caribbean community, a group from Maldon PRU and a group of 'looked after children'

Signals has been commissioned to develop a media project for primary and secondary schools through the Brentwood Youth Arts Partnership

The Explore Culture One World Festival will largely take place in 2010/11 this will include a 'Made in Essex' film festival that will celebrate the creativity of local filmmakers. Other screenings will take place across the county and include films selected by the members of the diverse community represented in the county.

In partnership with Essex County Council Signals began work on a cross-Essex film exhibition programme that takes place from March to October 2010 Signals will be showing films that have an Essex theme and reflect diverse resident cultures in a mixture of venues

Signals is developing several new projects and is seeking Lottery funding for a three year project based in Harlow and a project looking at the role of the Polish in WWII through an HLF grant. Signals also intends to continue to seek development opportunities for an artists programme

#### STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES RESPONSIBILITIES

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2010

#### 1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### **Accounting convention**

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, the Companies Act 2006 and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities

#### Financial Reporting Standard Number 1

Exemption has been taken from preparing a cash flow statement on the grounds that the charitable company qualifies as a small charitable company

#### Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy

#### Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

#### Allocation and apportionment of costs

Support costs are those costs which have not been directly allocated to an activity of the charity but nevertheless support those activities. Support costs have been allocated on the basis of the estimated time involved.

#### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life

Fixtures and fittings -20% on cost and -10% on cost

Computer equipment -50% on cost and

-25% on cost

#### Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items

#### **Taxation**

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities

#### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity—Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements
