Independent auditors' report to the members of Brooklands Limited

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Brooklands Limited (the 'Company') for the year ended 31 December 2022, which comprise the Statement of comprehensive income, the Statement of financial position and the related notes, including a summary of significant accounting policies. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

In our opinion the financial statements:

- give a true and fair view of the state of the Company's affairs as at 31 December 2022 and of its loss for the year then ended:
- have been properly prepared in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice; and have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Companies Act 2006.

In preparing the financial statements, the directors are responsible for assessing the Company's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the directors either intend to liquidate the Company or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditors' responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements

Notes to the trading profit and loss account Year ended 31 December 2022

1. General information

Brooklands Limited is a private company limited by shares incorporated in England and Wales. The address of its registered office is disclosed on page 1.

2. Accounting policies

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Section 1A of the Financial Reporting Standard 102, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland and the Companies Act 2006. The particular accounting policies adopted are described below.

Going Concern

The company is part of a charitable group. The Trustees of the charitable group have accordingly prepared detailed projections for the next 12 months and outline projections up to 2024, based on expected income from regular activities, grants and donations from the funders and other donations, against expected general and project expenditure.

On the basis of those projections they consider the of the charitable group and the company to be a going concern for at least 12 months following approval of the accounts and for the foreseeable future and therefore able to support the company. No material uncertainties that may cast significant doubt about the ability of the company to continue as a going concern have accordingly been identified by management or the Directors. The financial statements are accordingly prepared on the going concern basis.

Tangible fixed assets

All fixed assets are initially recorded at cost.

Depreciation is provided on cost in equal annual instalments over the estimated useful lives of the assets. The rates of depreciation are as follows:

Shop fittings and equipment

10% per annum

Catering plant and equipment

20-25% per annum

Stocks

Stocks are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

Financial instruments

The group only has financial assets and liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially measured at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

Deferred taxation

Deferred tax is recognised in respect of all timing differences that have originated but not reversed at the balance sheet date where transactions or events have occurred at that date that will result in an obligation to pay more, or a right to pay less or to receive more tax.

3. Turnover

Turnover represents amounts derived from the provision of goods and services which fall within the company's ordinary activities after deduction of trade discounts and value added tax.

All turnover is derived from activities within the UK.

4. Information regarding employees and directors

No director received any remuneration in the year ended 31 December 2022 (Dec 2021 - £nil).

The average number of monthly employees, including directors was 3 (2021-3). It pays a service charge to its parent company for work carried out on its behalf. During the year a service charge of £204,000 (Dec 2021 - £136,000) was paid to its parent company.
