COMMONWEALTH HUMAN RIGHTS INITIATIVE REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

for the year ended 31 March 2018

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2018. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The Commonwealth Human Rights Initiative (CHRI) is an independent, non-partisan, international non-governmental organisation, headquartered in New Delhi, India, working for the practical realisation of human rights across the Commonwealth.

CHRI's objectives are to promote awareness of and adherence to the Harare Commonwealth Declaration, the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, and other internationally recognised human rights instruments, as well as domestic instruments supporting human rights in member states.

Significant activities

The main focus of the year was preparation and advocacy in advance of the Commonwealth Heads of Government meeting (CHOGM), scheduled for April 2018 in London. This work was in two distinct elements:

1. Advocacy around SDG8.7

CHRI collaborated with the Commonwealth Secretariat, civil society organisations working on SDG8.7, and researchers at the London School of Economics to advocate for action on SDG Target 8.7, the issues within which disproportionately affect Commonwealth member countries, at the 2018 CHOGM.

CHRI produced the first report which put the issues into a Commonwealth context which was launched at a high profile event headlined by 2014 Nobel Peace Prize laureate Kailash Satyarthi and Urmila Bhoola, UN Special Rapporteur on Contemporary forms of Slavery. Separately, advocacy was conducted with the UK government team preparing the summit and with other member states. CHRI also led the civil society group which prepared the official civil society submission to the CHOGM and which presented to senior official preparing the Summit agenda and communique.

2. Other work around CHOGM

In advance of the CHOGM the London office led preparations for the most ambitious CHRI CHOGM programme ever. Plans and preparations were made for a Commonwealth film festival, a round table on civil society space, a prisons conference, a panel discussion on small states, and CHRI's 30th birthday party in the House of Lords.

Additionally, in response to the application from the government of The Gambia to join the Commonwealth the London office mounted a fact finding mission in November 2018. The mission engaged with the President and his cabinet, officials, Commonwealth diplomats, and representatives of the judiciary, parliament, and civil society. Following the mission, a report was prepared which was passed to the Secretary-General and Commonwealth governments.

The office continued to produce the Commonwealth daily news update and to support the other CHRI offices as requested.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

General unrestricted funds of £9,885 are held at the year end. Although future costs are uncertain, based on current year support costs of £2,405 there are sufficient reserves for the next 36 months of support operational costs.

There are £158,966 of restricted funds at the year end.

These are made up of Gambia £6,249, Foundation to Promote Open Society (FPOS) £133,732 and Foundation Open Society Institute (FOSI) £18,971.

The fund from FPOS is to support the charities work to realise human rights across the Commonwealth through advocacy, education, stakeholder engagement and convening local groups.

The FOSI funding is for Human resources and fact finding initiatives to help promote the commonwealth human rights initiative.

The Gambia fund is the budget remaining on Gambia's proposal to join the Commonwealth.

Financial Review

The Charities Incoming resources amounted to £209,912 (2017: £30). Outgoing expenditure on charitable activities during the year was £43,185 (2017: £13,486).

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

Independent examiner's report to the trustees of Commonwealth Human Rights Initiative ('the Company')

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

There were no trustees' remuneration or other benefits for the year ended 31 March 2018 nor for the year ended 31 March 2017.
