TRUSTEES ANNUAL REPORT

YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2003

The trustees, who are also Directors for the purposes of the Companies Act, have pleasure in presenting their report and the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2003.

OBJECTIVES OF CHARITY

The objectives of the Charity are to promote all or any purposes for the benefit of disabled people in their own homes, with a preference to North Wales, which now or hereafter may be deemed by law to be charitable.

REVIEW OF PROGRESS AND ACHIEVEMENTS

Cartref Ni continues to operate from a very firm base, particularly in the field of Learning Disabilities where our reputation of high quality care has been maintained.

COUNTY REPORTS

Denbighshire

Existing contractual work remains secure and we received a 2.5% uplift in fees during October plus a further 7% on April 1st.

The new resettlement contract for two ladies and one gentleman from Bryn y Neuadd Hospital, based in Rhuddlan, has proven to be most successful despite financial difficulties in recruiting new staff.

Flintshire

All existing contractual work remains secure and we received a 7% uplift in fees. A number of small 'Spot Contracts' were established, primarily through people's independent Living Fund awards, and support to a young woman with profound physical disabilities was extended to a 24 hour package as she moved from her family home into a place of her own.

Conwy

The contract in Llysfaen continues to provide an excellent service. An uplift of 7% in fees was agreed this work.

By mutual agreement, the contract in the Vicarage, Colwyn Bay was reduced to support the four people in the upstairs flat. The one remaining service user downstairs is now supported by another agency. A 7% uplift for the new year was agreed.

The two brothers with learning difficulties, living in Abergele, continue to be supported by our charity.

Wrexham

Although this authority has yet to offer out any new contracts to the independent care sector, Cartref Ni have continued to be involved in their planning process and it is likely that work will become available in the next financial year.

TRAINING

Cartref Ni realises the benefit of a fully trained workforce, to both the organisation and the Service User. Quality training, in subjects specific to the Service User's needs, promotes confidence and understanding which helps staff to develop solid working relationships whilst at all times remaining professional.

In order to maintain and improve the quality of Training and Development in the Care sector, the Care Council for Wales had laid out the new National Minimum Standards of Care for Domiciliary Providers. Amongst other things, these dictate the minimum levels of training and qualifications required for all types of Social Care work. Cartref Ni is one of the lead organisations in implementing these standards and we would wish to ensure that these exceed 'minimum' requirements.

OTHER MATTERS

In mid-2002 we appointed Tony Shield as our new Training Officer. Having previously held a similar post for another North Wales company that provides domiciliary care, Tony is well aquainted with the training needs of our charity and he brings with him a wealth of 'hands-on' experience. Trustees' visits to Service Users continued throughout the year and have proven to be a very useful quality assurance and monitoring tool.

The principal activity of the company during the year was that of the provision of home support for disabled, elderly and vulnerable people.

RESULTS
