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DIRECTORS' REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 NOVEMBER 2005

The directors have pleasure in presenting their report and the unaudited Financial Statements of the company for the year ended 30 November 2005.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The company is a registered charity, number 1019824.

The principal activity of the company during the year was helping handicapped and vulnerable Romanian children and the resocialization of prisoners in Romania, in conjunction with Europa pentru Europa, which is the sister charity in Romania.

REVIEW OF THE YEAR

The main focus of our activity continued to be in Romania. However, as in recent years, the charity has extended its mission to other countries both for the benefit of our core activities and also to apply knowledge and expertise where appropriate. Within Romania, our grassroots, educational and leadership initiatives developed successfully with encouraging outcomes in the lives of our disadvantaged beneficiaries, students and collaborators. In conjunction with our sister charity in Romania we have made numerous achievements as described in the following paragraphs.

Grass Roots

During this year, three of the young people we supported for 15 years entered the final year of their university courses. Monica was studying secretarial skills and office administration. Maria was reading Social Work and Constantin chose to major on Literature in his English and Journalism degree. After completing her two-year professional studies course, Monica accepted an invitation to visit our long-standing supporters in Tennessee. She was granted a 10 year US multiple entry medical visa with a view to receiving post-polio treatment. This had been proposed ten years previously but official obstacles had stopped her benefiting from American assistance earlier. As with many of the other young people we assisted since the collapse of communism, our purpose has been to promote development of their character, life-skills and education. The outcomes are now visible in their academic achievements, personal relationships/marriages and for others, through their success in finding independence through full-time paid work.

We continued to invest in our property to sustain existing activities and to prepare for future projects. In the 'Europa' boys' house the internal and exterior walls were repaired and painted. It was also necessary to replace the gas central heating boiler. Thanks to a grant from DFID to our Romanian sister-charity, a company was contracted and paid to continue renovations on the farmhouse at Siria making it nearly ready for occupation. We enjoyed a visit from the British Ambassador and other members of his staff. A work team also travelled out from Britain to prepare for Phase 2 of this development. Our abandoned girl's apartment in Rahova, Bucharest became registered as charitable property. It required new double glazing to stop draughts, condensation and damp. This was installed before the winter, which the five residents greatly appreciated. In Jucu a group from Bucharest Girl Guides organized a summer youth camp. An advance party repaired burst copper piping and worked on the garden and driveway. Volunteers from New Zealand and USA conducted Bible Camps for families and young people from various local churches. We continued to help our friends from ROSEP with the legal process to transfer ownership of their house in Santana into our responsibility.

Education

Our education initiatives ranged across the areas of knowledge required to train and prepare East-European students and professionals to engage fully in the objectives established in our developmental programmes. These included courses on justice reform, child protection, human rights, drug recovery and social work. As primary partner with ANA - the Romanian national anti-drug administration - we initiated projects to prevent, research and address the growing crisis of illicit drug transportation, consumption and production. At the invitation of the Romanian drug czar, we participated in an international conference in Bucharest to examine the role of the Church and the concept of 'Faith and Addiction'. At Vasile Goldis University in Arad and Satu Mare, we produced the curriculum and launched a new 'Community Justice Administration and Drugs' Masters Degree with 100 students. These modules will be made available on our EuropaClass website. Our staff and volunteers continued an active program in Arad jail for women and the maximum security penitentiary for juveniles and men. Classes on functional literacy, numeracy, English, computer skills and drama were enthusiastically attended. We also provided legal advocacy and social counselling throughout the year.

With ministerial, university and medical observers, we successfully demonstrated the latest technology (Neuro-Electric Therapy - NET) for detoxification of opiate and other drug dependencies. Two training seminars were conducted by an expert flown in from Ireland and the groundwork was laid for a strategic interdisciplinary program that is intended to become a model of best practice in drug recovery treatment. During the year our capacity to extend this mission to smokers, alcoholics and hard drug users grew in scale and scope through close communication and support from the family of Dr Meg Patterson who pioneered the system of NET. The vision of wide-scale drug recovery projects was taken up by the Torch Project, which reached many faith communities seeking direction in contemporary mission needs across the region and the country. Almost inevitably, our friends in Tennessee and Kentucky became aware of the break-through being achieved with addicts in Romania and sought to make this available there also. This led to collaboration with American faith-based drug court and prison workers who recognized that our experience was cross-culturally relevant in their 'war against drugs and organized crime'.

Leadership

Mentoring good leadership, values and character continued to be a significant aspect of our mission in the Balkans. Given the privilege of selecting three participants at the President's Prayer Breakfast in Washing DC, we invited and sponsored (with World Vision) a former Mayor of Arad in charge of social and educational programs and European integration; a Supreme Court Judge who later became the minister responsible for the legislative reform and the Secretary of State responsible for the Romanian Anti-Drug Administration. Our organization continues to be a full member of the International Council on Alcohol and Drugs. We had previously arranged sponsorship for delegates to the ICAA in Toronto and Venice. This year the annual conference was located in Budapest so we and our Romanian colleagues were easily able to participate, just over the border in Hungary.

Other international leadership forums sought our participation and provided scholarships or bursaries for us to share our practice in drug demand/supply reduction. The US National Institute on Drug Administration (NIDA) paid for our presentation at their annual congress in Florida and the FCO symposium at Wilton Park subsidized our participation in their round-table of experts. We gladly agreed to identify with and share in the launching this year of the Ratiu Foundation for Democracy through leading the evaluation team and also by becoming an advisory member of the Ratiu Family Foundation (Ioan Ratiu - a businessman, intellectual and politician - had been tremendously involved in the struggle for freedom and renewal in Romanian life before and after the collapse of communism.)

Anticipating future needs, we are well positioned to play a significant role in child and youth protection for the most vulnerable - justice reform, drug recovery and social development projects in poor neighbourhoods. Our programs and infrastructure are established, sustainable and forward-looking. Given the necessary personnel and financial resources, we have great capacity for further expansion in scale and scope.
