We present our report and the audited financial statements for the nine months to 31 December 2013. In future, our annual reports and audited financial statements will relate to the calendar year. Legal and Administrative Information about the charity is summarised on page 7 and information about our group structure and corporate income is given on page 8.

Purpose and aims

The National Eczema Society was set up in 1975 to support people whose lives are affected by eczema and to work on their behalf. We remain dedicated to those objectives but we serve a significantly larger population. Eczema has become much more prevalent since then, with approximately six million people in the UK now impacted by this life-challenging condition. Exactly why this should be is not fully understood but as a result there has been an ever-increasing need for our services, and we are committed to ensuring that the Society remains at the end of the phone, or available online at the click of a mouse, to provide evidence based, high quality information and advice combined with an all-important listening ear.

There is as yet no cure for eczema, and unless you have the condition it can be hard to imagine the daily challenge the dreaded itch presents. Many healthcare professionals have little dermatology training, and access to good healthcare can therefore be difficult, particularly for older age groups. The aim of the National Eczema Society is to provide eczema patients and their carers with the information and support needed to manage their eczema effectively and the comfort of knowing they are not on their own, while offering accessible training and support to healthcare professionals.

Ensuring our work delivers our aims

We review our activities each year and monitor the impact of our work to ensure that we continue to fulfil our purpose of helping people affected by eczema. We consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives we have set. We have referred to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aims and objectives and in planning our future activities. We have had regard to legislative and regulatory requirements for disclosing how our charitable objectives have provided such benefit. We have complied with the duty set out in section 4 of the Charities Act 2011 and that set out by the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator in the Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005.

The focus of our work

For the period under review our strategy has been to concentrate on our core services to provide, in an uncertain economic climate, people affected by eczema with the information and support they need. This underpins our determination to secure our long-term future as a UK wide charity entirely dedicated to supporting people with eczema.

During the year our key activities have been:

Providing information and support through our telephone and email helplines. We are delighted that during this period we have been able to support an increasing number of people with eczema through a UK-wide eczema awareness and advice campaign run in conjunction with Lloyds pharmacy with support from an educational grant from GlaxoSmithKline.

- We have also been able to enhance our helpline service through our partnership with E45 following the launch of their eczema education resource www.eczemaadvice.co.uk. This website is an online eczema resource about managing eczema which includes the option for parents and carers of children with eczema to register to book a call to a dermatology nurse from the Society's helpline. This fulfils an ambition we have long held and which we are hoping to maintain as part of our core service and to expand to enable adults with eczema to access that same level of support.
- Our Information Services: maintaining and updating our publications and website and our annual awareness campaign in National Eczema Week 2013 – a united front against eczema.
- Running eczema training days for healthcare professionals across the UK.
- Providing information and support through a programme of UK wide family orientated events and exhibitions, supplementing our network of local support groups.
- Continuing to support research opportunities in particular by helping recruitment for clinical trials.
- Membership support including our quarterly magazine, Exchange.

How our activities deliver public benefit

Our main activities and who we try to help are described below. All our charitable activities focus on supporting people affected by eczema and are undertaken to further our charitable purposes for the public benefit.

Who used and benefited from our services?

The National Eczema Society is a membership organisation. During the period under review we had approximately 3,400 members. The annual membership subscription is £20 (if based in the UK) or £40 (if based overseas). Members receive our quarterly magazine, Exchange, and free access to all our publications. As in previous years our support extends far beyond our membership and we remain grateful to those members who continue to support us financially even though they no longer have any personal need for our help.

Helplines

Our telephone and email helplines remain at the heart of our work, enabling us to reach an ever wider audience and to provide the information, support and reassurance needed by people struggling to cope with eczema. Our telephone and email helplines are available free of charge to anyone who needs our support. During the period under review 93% of calls to our helpline were from non-members, 26% from parents of children with eczema and 74% from adults who have eczema themselves. We continue to be asked how to use prescribed treatments and for advice on possible lifestyle adjustments. As in previous years, many of our calls have related to the inability to access healthcare appropriate to more severe eczema, increasingly we are also receiving calls from those unable to access healthcare for less severe eczema or to be prescribed basic treatments, including suitable emollients. To a greater extent than ever, we are encountering people who are experiencing eczema (many for the first time) in later life, also teenagers and young adults whose eczema is no longer responding to the treatments offered and many of whom are very distressed.

Information Services and Publications

We have continued to maintain a wide range of publications about eczema management and treatment for both patients and healthcare professionals. These are published both traditionally

printed and, with increasing popularity, electronically. During the period we recruited a new Information Manager, Jane McIntosh, to spearhead the development of our publications. Jane has a strong track record in publishing as a former commissioning editor at Hamlyn. New editions of three of our most popular booklets were launched in the period – Mind over Eczema, Itching and Scratching and Living with Eczema. Our website www.eczema.org, e-alerts to members and other supporters and presence on Facebook and Twitter are popular and well visited.

National Eczema Week 2013

Our 2013 National Eczema Week Campaign focused on Helpline Live Events. Following the success of this initiative in previous years, NES teams once again took information, advice and support directly out into local communities to fight eczema patient by patient in events in Wood Green, North London, Norwich, Peterborough, Bradford, Moss Side, Manchester, Bournemouth, Kirkcaldy, Gateshead, the Wittington Hospital, North London, Oxford and Nottingham. The response was overwhelming and confirmed that this is an excellent way of promoting the Society and what it offers to families living with this challenging condition.

Healthcare Professional Training

The Society remains committed to providing training for healthcare professionals to facilitate improvements to patient care. During the period we held six healthcare professional study days, in Brighton, Blackburn, Cambridge, Gloucester, Oxford and Perth to ensure that these events were made available in venues across the UK.

Future Plans

Our Christmas 2013 Appeal was focused on the National Eczema Society's School Packs. This was a huge success raising over £10,000 to be devoted in 2014 to creating a new version of this highly valued resource. Supporting children with eczema in the classroom will also be the focus of National Eczema Week 2014. March 2014 will see the first edition of our new look Exchange.

We are enhancing the support provided to our members with the launch of a new Member's Guide to eczema management, introducing a new booklet on wraps, bandages and therapeutic garments and will also be revising and updating our publications on treatments for severe eczema and on contact dermatitis. We are in addition reviewing our fact sheets.

We are continuing our healthcare professional training days but will also be seeking to provide greater support to healthcare professionals by rewriting our Nurse's guide to managing eczema, increasing the number of free patient publications they can order from us. We will also be introducing an online edition of Exchange magazine in the healthcare professionals section of our website. Training is increasingly difficult for healthcare professionals to access at an affordable level, particularly nurses working in primary care and we believe that by offering them this additional level of support we can make a difference to the outcomes for a significant number of eczema patients.

We have an exciting project, long in development, which we hope to bring to fruition in 2014: namely our ethnicity project. Filming is well advanced on our project to produce videos to demonstrate how to use emollients, washes, bath and leave-on emollients as well as topical

steroids. The videos will also discuss the main characteristics of eczema, common trigger factors and possible lifestyle adjustments. We are filming different skin types – Afro-Caribbean, Asian and south-east Asian as well as Caucasian. The videos will be available in ten languages in addition to English and launched on www.eczema.org (via You Tube) for the Society's AGM in November.

We will continue all our core information services, including a programme of exhibitions, shows and eczema helpline live events during National Eczema Week 2014 at several locations across the UK.

We plan to hold five healthcare professional study days in 2014 in Birmingham, London, Manchester, Newcastle and Southampton.

Scotland

In our last report to you we reported that we had become a registered charity in Scotland. We now have a member of staff, Director of Operations, Christina Vowles, living in and working from home in Scotland. Our healthcare professional study day in Perth in September was very successful with 100% of delegates saying that they would recommend the course to colleagues. Hot on the heels of the Perth study day, Christina, assisted by volunteer and retired nurse Ina Menzies, set up a NES information stand at Victoria Hospital, Kirkcaldy, as part of our Eczema Week 2014 initiatives to provide support to families with eczema.

Results

We budget to make a surplus of £245,000 in the nine months to 31 December 2013 and this included £370,000 for legacy income. Although we expected legacy income to be strong, it proved to be even stronger than we had expected at £426,258. Overall, we had a surplus of £381,035 for the period compared with a deficit of £70,802 for the 12 months to 31 March 2013. At 31 December 2013 our reserves stood at £1,287,571 (£906,536 at 31 March 2013).

We would like to thank the many people who, as in previous years, by joining or renewing their membership, supporting our appeals and fundraising in a variety of often innovative ways, have enabled us to continue our work including many who took on a quite gruelling challenge to raise funds through sponsorship for the Society. We are grateful also to those who remembered the Society in their Wills, the charitable trusts and companies that have supported us during the year and to all the healthcare professionals who have provided us with so much time, advice and support.

Reserves Policy

We aim, in the current economic climate, to maintain reserves at a level at least equal to the average of current income and expenditure. In round terms, having regard to income and expenditure in the 9 months to 31 December 2013, this amounts to approximately £550,000, compared to actual reserves of £1,287,571 (£906,536 at 31 March 2013). Thus we have set a deficit budget of £103,000 for 2014. However, we remain committed to taking a cautious approach to expenditure so as not to endanger our ability to deliver core services in a sustainable way.

Risk Management

The trustees have taken steps to identify and address major risks facing the Society.

Investment Policy

All surplus funds are currently placed on deposit. We are, however, exploring the possibility of investing some funds in an office property for our own use. Our lease of office space at Hill House runs out in April 2017 and the landlord has informed us of his desire to redevelop Hill House. We will, therefore, have to move in any event before long.

The Trustees and organisation

The Society is a charitable company. Although called trustees, we are the directors of the company for the purposes of company law. The trustees who served during the year and up to the date of this report are given on page 7.

Trustees are elected by the members of the Society at its AGM. Trustees may be co-opted onto the board during the year and must then stand for election by the members at the next AGM. At least a third of the trustees is required to retire from office each year but may, if they wish, offer themselves for re-election at the AGM. Trustees are recruited through the Society's members' magazine, Exchange, and its network of local support groups. In seeking recruits the Society has regard to the need to ensure that the trustee board has an appropriate skills base and also that trustees are drawn from a wide range of locations within the UK.

Trustees receive no remuneration and no trustee has a beneficial interest in any of the group companies. There must be a minimum of three trustees but there is no maximum number.

New trustees are provided with an introduction pack which includes the Society's governing documents, copies of past years audited accounts and an explanation of their duties and responsibilities and of the Society's decision making process. Prior to joining the board, new trustees will usually attend at least one trustees' meeting which gives them the opportunity to meet the trustees and senior members of staff.

The board of trustees administers the Society. It meets four times a year and in addition as circumstances demand. A Chief Executive is appointed by the trustees to manage the day to day operations of the Society within a framework agreed by the board from time to time.

Trustees' Responsibilities Statement

The trustees (who are directors of the National Eczema Society for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and the group and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable group for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;

- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business.

The trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and the group and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

In so far as the trustees are aware:

- there is no relevant audit information of which the charitable company's auditors are unaware, and
- the trustees have taken all steps that they ought to have taken to make themselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the auditors are aware of that information.

The trustees are responsible for the maintenance and integrity of the corporate and financial information included on the charitable company's website. Legislation in the United Kingdom governing the preparation and dissemination of financial statements may differ from legislation in other jurisdictions.

CORPORATE INCOME

The Society receives income from pharmaceutical and other companies that produce goods and services that are of proven benefit to people affected by eczema. However, the Society neither endorses nor recommends any product or service. The Society maintains a strict policy relating to the terms on which it will accept such support. This includes provision for review of relevant treatments and services by our Medical Advisory Group. During the period 1 April 2013 to 31 December 2013, no one company contributed more than 5.9% of the Society's consolidated group income.

Consolidated Group Income

The National Eczema Society had one wholly owned subsidiary company that traded during the period 1 April 2013 to 31 December 2013: Eczema Trading Limited. The consolidated group income shown in these financial statements, as in the year to 31 March 2013, comprises the income of the Society and that of Eczema Trading Limited. NES Enterprises Limited ceased trading on 31 March 2011 and was dissolved on 2 April 2013.

TO THE MEMBERS AND TRUSTEES OF THE NATIONAL ECZEMA SOCIETY

We have audited the financial statements of the National Eczema Society for the period 1 April 2013 to 31 December 2013 which comprise a Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities, a Balance Sheet and related notes. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

This report is made solely to the charity's members, as a body, in accordance with Chapter 3 of Part 16 of the Companies Act 2006 and section 44(1)(c) of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the regulations made under section 44. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the charity's members those matters we are required to state to them in an auditor's report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone, other than the charity and the charity's members as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed.

Respective Responsibilities of Trustees and Auditors

As explained more fully in the Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities above, the trustees (who are the directors of the charitable company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements and for being satisfied that they give a true and fair view.

We have been appointed auditor under section 44(1)(c) of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and under the Companies Act 2006 and report in accordance with regulations made under those Acts.

Our responsibility is to audit and express an opinion on the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland). Those standards require us to comply with the Auditing Practices Board's Ethical Standards for Auditors.

Scope of the Audit of the Financial Statements

An audit involves obtaining evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements sufficient to give reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or error. This includes an assessment of: whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the charitable company's circumstances and have been consistently applied and adequately disclosed; the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by the trustees; and the overall presentation of the financial statements. In addition, we read all the financial and non-financial information in the Trustees' Report to identify material inconsistencies with the audited financial statements. If we become aware of any apparent material misstatements or inconsistencies we consider the implications for our report.

1 Accounting Policies

Basis of accounting The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable accounting standards. They follow the recommendations in the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (issued in March 2005) and the Companies Act 2006.

Consolidation Consolidated accounts have been prepared in respect of the National Eczema Society and its trading subsidiary Eczema Trading Limited. In accordance with Section 408 of the Companies Act 2006 a separate Statement of Financial Activities for the National Eczema Society has not been prepared.

Recognition of income Voluntary income received by way of gifts, donations and from appeals is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when received. Intangible income is not included unless it represents goods or services which would have otherwise been purchased. Gifts in kind are valued and brought in as income together with the corresponding expenditure. Revenue grants, sponsorship monies, subscriptions and income from investments, together with the related tax credits, are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they are receivable. Income from legacies is accounted for when received. Income generated from the supply of goods or services is included in the Statement of Financial Activities in the period in which the supply is made and is stated net of Value Added Tax.

Funds Restricted funds are incoming resources received or generated for specified purposes as laid down by the donor or the terms of the appeal. Expenditure which meets these criteria is charged to the fund, together with a fair allocation of overheads and support costs. Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources received or generated for the general charitable purposes of the Society.

Expenditure Staff costs are allocated to activities on the basis of staff time spent on those activities. Overhead expenditure is either directly related to the activities to which it relates or apportioned to activities in line with expenditure on them. Fundraising and publicity costs relate to the costs incurred by the charitable company in inducing others to make voluntary contributions to it. Governance costs include the management of the charitable company's assets, organisational management and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Depreciation Depreciation is provided on tangible fixed assets at rates calculated to write off their cost over their estimated useful lives.

Leasing All leases of property and equipment are considered to be operating leases, and rentals are charged against revenue when incurred. No assets are held under hire purchase agreements or finance leases.

Stock Stocks of goods held for resale are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Stocks of publications held for future distribution free of charge are written off in the year of purchase.

Pensions The Pensions Act 2011 has retrospectively amended the definition of a money purchase scheme. As a result, the scheme that the Society participated in has now to be regarded as a defined benefit scheme. That scheme (Series 3) closed to contributions on 30 September 2013. To avoid crystallizing an immediate payment of our now apparent underfunding in the Series 3 scheme (see note 12), we are (a) participating in the Series 3 Recovery Plan and (b) have elected to switch, with effect from 1 October 2013, from Series 3 to Series 4, a defined contribution scheme. The pension cost in the accounts represents amounts payable by the Society (a) to the Series 3 recovery plan (currently £1,151 a month) and (b) as ordinary employer contributions to the Series 3 and Series 4 funds.

Series 3 is a multi-employer pension scheme and the scheme administrators have confirmed that it is not possible to separately identify the assets and liabilities of participating employers on a consistent and reasonable basis. The assets of the scheme are co-mingled for investment purposes and benefits are paid from total scheme assets. As a result of this the Society has accounted for the scheme as if it were a defined contribution scheme, with contributions in the year charged to the Income and Expenditure Account. This is in accordance with FRS 17 — Retirement Benefits.

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12 Pension scheme deficit

As explained in note 1, the Society is participating in a recovery plan to eliminate its Series 3 scheme deficit over 10 year period. The Pensions Trust, the scheme administrator, has, however, advised that the amount of employer debt on the alternative of withdrawal from the Series 3 scheme has been estimated by actuaries to have been £204,711 as at 31 March 2012. The next full actuarial valuation is due at 30 September 2014.

As the Society intends to continue participating in the recovery plan no provision has been made for this potential withdrawal debt and contributions have been accounted for as if it were a defined contribution scheme.

During the period employer contributions of £11,034 (Year ended 31 March 2013: £499) were charged to the Income and Expenditure Account, including accrued contributions of £1,429 at 31 December 2013 (£83 at 31 March 2013).

13 Purpose of Restricted Funds

Research The Research Fund exists to provide resources for research into the causes of eczema, with the aim of developing more effective treatments or a cure.

Information Services This Fund represents donations, yet to be spent, received towards the provision of these services.
