TRUSTEES' REPORT

The Trustees have pleasure in presenting their report and audited financial statements for the year ended 31st March 2003.

These statements relate to the funds of the Society and its decentralised Sickle Link Projects.

THE CONDITION

Sickle Cell is an inherited blood disorder, which affects the red blood cell. One of the primary roles of the red blood cell is to carry oxygen from the lungs around the body. For an individual with a sickle cell disorder when the red blood cell gives up its oxygen it loses its flexibility and uniform roundness adopting a sickle shape. This makes the cell difficult to pass through the blood vessels and creates blockages.

When these blockages occur, they cause a great deal of pain, a sickle cell crisis, for the individual with a sickle cell disorder. A crisis can last a few hours, days or even weeks and often requires hospital admission where the individual will be treated with high potency painkillers. Anaemia occurs frequently as cells that are sickling (changing shape) within the spleen are rapidly destroyed.

Over time sickle cell individuals can experience damage to organs, such as the liver, kidneys, lungs, heart and spleen. As a result of these medical complications a high proportion of this client group are disabled. There is no easy cure and death is sometimes a further consequence of these complications.

OUR STATUS

Sickle Cell Society was founded in 1979 by a group of healthcare professionals, sufferers and families affected by sickle cell in the London Borough of Brent. The Society was later established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Associations, since 1993. Under those Articles, the Society is limited by guarantee not having a share capital. Each of the members of the Society is liable to contribute £1 towards the liabilities of the Society in the event of liquidation.

The Society's charity registration number is 1046631 and the company registration number is 2840865. The Head office is located at 54 Station Road, London NW10 4UA.

MISSION STATEMENT

The Society's mission is to enable and assist individuals with a Sickle Cell disorder to realise their full potential. This mission will be achieved by raising awareness through; education, the provision of welfare services and assisting in research.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED)

CHARITY OBJECTIVES

The main objectives of the Society are:

- To provide relief for persons with sickle cell disorders
- The relief of poverty among members of the immediate family of persons who are suffering or who, immediately before their death, suffered from sickle cell disorders.
- The provision of recreational activities for affected individuals and their families
- The improvement of public information, assisting in research into the causes, treatment of the condition and dissemination of such information.

In pursuance of these objectives the Society's resources are expended primarily on:

- Welfare support provision including:
 The Ralma Faulkner Welfare Fund
 Bryan Jones Educational Fund and
 Children's Holiday Fund
- 2. Sickle Link Community Respite Support Care Projects
- 3. Health Education/Information program:
 Leaflets, Exhibitions, Books and Videos, Conferences and Seminars
 Internet web site and e-mail services

STRUCTURE

The Memorandum and Articles, as amended in 2002, allows 14 individuals from the membership to the Board elected each year at the Annual General Meeting, to serve for 2 years.

The Board meets monthly. The meetings are complemented by sub-committees, and ad-hoc working groups. These Committees have delegated powers. Management committee meetings are open to members on prior notification to the Company Secretary or Chair.

The Executive Director (heading a team of eleven, in addition to a pool of volunteers) provides strategic support to the Board and is responsible for the day-to-day operational activities of the organisation. The Executive Director also has line managerial responsibility for all Sickle Link Projects.

REVIEW OF ACTIVITIES AND DEVELOPMENT DURING THE YEAR

EDUCATION/INFORMATION & AWARENESS:

The Society's Communication's Sub-committee has worked consistently to review existing publications and to develop new publications. This is supported by the Health Information/Educational Officer (see staff reports). This post was funded jointly by The John Ellerman Foundation and the Society. The new pieces of work targets are:

- New parents of children with a sickle cell disorder
- Adolescence Getting Through It Together
- Employers and Employees
- "Get Tested"

In addition, the Society has developed audiotapes for the booklets for parents of newly diagnosed children. Copies of the 'Get Tested' booklet have been available since the Society's National Conference in Manchester in July 2002. Copies were given away free during July 2002 as part of celebrating the Sickle Cell & Thalassaemia 6th National Awareness Week.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED)

During the year the Society provided information, advice and referral service in response to 3,300 letters and email requests, and 2500 telephone calls. The Health Education/Information Officer continued work with the media (BBC TV, Casualty series; Top Sante Magazine; Roots Magazine; The Voice Newspaper Group; The New Nation newspaper and Channel 4 TV.

A second bid to continue our work on awareness, (again working in partnership with the UK Thalassaemia Society), has been submitted to the Department of Health. In the meantime, the DoH have awarded us £30,000 to support the production of health education materials.

The Society is represented by the Executive Director on the Government's National Haemoglobinopathy Screening Programme. It is expected to be delivered in 2004. It is intended that the Society's Awareness Campaign will provide the information, awareness and education to run alongside this national development.

The Sickle Cell Society has maintained its external training activities during the year and has delivered seminars on sickle cell disorder to as diverse an audience as schools, colleges, university hospitals, churches, housing associations, the Fire Service, Nursing associations, the Black Communication Workers Annual Conference in Birmingham, Soroptimists International (Women Fellowship) in London and midwives (St George's Hospital), in Essex.

INTERNET WEBSITE & GENERAL INFORMATION COMMUNICATION TECHNOLOGY

Our website, <u>www.sicklecellsociety.org</u>, continues to register a phenomenal rise in visitor activity and now records over 25,000 hits per day. This converts to an estimated actual visitor episode of 1000s per week. A revamp of the site was in plan for the coming year, to improve user interactivity.

The Society invested in information and communication technology (ICT) by commissioning the networking of the Society's computers, both internally (LAN) and externally (internet). Thus virtually all the Society's machines are now networked and a broadband communication modality was also adopted to increase speed, efficiency and versatility.

DIRECT SERVICES

Sickle Link Projects:

Funding from the London Borough of Brent Local Authority ran out in December 2002. The Trustees continue to maintain current levels of service for Brent Sickle Link from the Society welfare funds. The new Volunteers' Coordinator, recruited in March, should help facilitate the service maintenance, until new funding is secured to revitalise the scheme in Brent.

Hackney Sickle Link project has maintained a service users forum for representing mothers of children with a sickle cell disorder in the borough. Meetings are held quarterly, 22 volunteers are registered with the project providing respite care and carrying out hospital visiting initially for children and now for adults.

During the year the project was again successful in securing £15,000 to deliver hospitals visiting and support care for adolescents and adults with a sickle cell disorder, in the Borough of Hackney.

Lambeth Outreach was launched in July 2002, and a community link service for sickle-cell sufferers started delivery, finally in February 2003, thanks to part-funding from Lambeth Social Services.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED)

Focus AR 2002-03: our annual children's holiday

Once again we were able to take 20 children and 9 carers to Woodrow High House, Buckinghamshire for a week of respite for both children and families. This has been made possible by donations from members of the public to the Society. The welfare fund spent £ 10,752 on this year's holiday. A documentary, Lifeline Appeal, featuring the children and Darren Jordan of the BBC, filmed during the week, was shown on nation-wide television in September 2002, raising a lot of interest in the work of the Society and issues around sickle-cell disorders.

Problems faced by the families affected by sickle cell can lead to over representation in the low income and single parent categories. This compounds the symptoms of isolation and despondency often linked with the families we assist.

One of the projects we have in place to help tackle this problem is the annual children's holiday. It brings together parents with similar challenges and children with a common medical background. Lifetime relationships are formed with the children and parents are comforted that they are not alone.

The holiday is a single week, which can appear a short period of time. However, we have seen children transformed in front of our eyes as new friends are made and confidence is increased. An environment is created where the children feel accepted, motivated and expectations are high. Some of our volunteer carers, themselves live with the sickle cell disorder and provide good role models for the children.



* VENUE

Woodrow High House is based in the Chilterns near Amersham in Buckinghamshire, it sits in 24 acres of beautiful secluded grounds offering leisure and sports activities.

The relaxed environment combined with comfortable and accessible activities, encourages the children to learn new skills, build confidence and share their time together in a productive and enjoyable way.



CHILDREN

All children are aged between 7 and 17 years, they can be nominated by their support groups, sickle cell centres, doctor or family with supporting evidence. The completed forms returned for nomination often outline family lives with financial difficulties, prolonged illness and family loss.

The week is divided into art & craft activities, music, sports, excursions and sessions which explore their feelings and views towards their condition.

At the conclusion of the holiday all children are requested to complete an evaluation form where they can express their views on their experience.



TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED)

Comments also included things like lumpy custard, not enough time in the pool and too much walking in the theme parks. Typical remarks from children having a great time and for some a life changing experience where they can go back to their lives feeling valued by people outside of their family.

FAMILY

For the parents, the children's holiday can provide a much-needed break. For some it is an opportunity for them to spend some quality time together, while for others its an opportunity to focus attention on the remaining healthy siblings.



The parents are not requested to provide feedback to the Society. However, we often receive letters, cards, gifts and calls of thanks.

Some of the comments:

"Michaela seems far more confident and positive since the holiday"

"We could not have afforded a holiday such as the one you have provided, Thank you"

"Me and my partner enjoyed a lovely evening out, the first for a very long time"

"I wish this was available when I was younger, it would have helped my confidence"

HISTORY

The Children's Holiday has been an annual event for the last 11 years, with two years of absence due to lack of funding. It is scheduled for August each year to coincide with the school summer holidays. With the widely accepted benefits to the family and the consequent growth in popularity the residential holiday costs are ever increasing.

It is with regret that each year children are declined a place on the holiday and are asked to reapply next year. The Trustees of the Society have decided that corporate funding should be sought annually to ensure the holiday is a permanent and stable feature within the activities of the Society instead of relying upon unrestricted donations to determine its fate.

Like many small charities the priority for unrestricted funds are core costs and the delivery of services.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED)

BENEFITS

The Children's Holiday is an activity, which benefits the whole family as illustrated earlier. Up to 26 families will be impacted by the holiday, It provides respite for children experiencing some very trying life events and brings some happiness, excitement and hope which is sadly missing from much of their lives.

It is difficult to put a value on the uplifting of peoples spirits but we all recognise its importance. With the support of our donors, we wish to maintain this holiday for many more years to come, as part of our direct services.

THE RALMA FAULKNER WELFARE FUND (UNRESTRICTED)

This fund provides welfare benefit to individuals with a sickle cell disorder in the form of household items such as carpets, curtains, beds and washing machines. The fund spent £13,509 supporting individuals with a disorder.

THE BRYAN JONES EDUCATIONAL FUND

During the financial year to March 2003, this fund has distributed £3,892 (including £774 of restricted money) in support of individuals with a sickle cell disorder who miss out on schooling, require IT support or who are undertaking a university or college course.

PARTNERSHIPS & NETWORKING

Black & Minority Ethnic (BME) Sustainability Project.

This is a major research and development project funded by the Active Community Unit of the Home Office. The Society operates the project in partnership with the Institute of Charity Fundraising Managers (ICFM) and Blackliners (an HIV campaign charity). The project aimed to increase the ability of the Black & Minority Ethnic voluntary sector to develop effective and sustainable fundraising. The Society manages the funds on behalf of all partners. The project has produced a research report, "Finding the Funds", and helped train our Fundraising Manager, as well as assisted with the production of our fundraising strategy (see also staff report).

With UK Thalassaemia Society: Joint Nationwide Awareness Campaign.

In partnership with the UK Thalassaemia Society, a joint nationwide awareness 3 year campaign for haemoglobinopathies was designed. A funding bid is presently at the attention of the Department of Health.

The Society's national networking included active membership to the Long-term Medical Condition Alliance, the Patients Forum, the Health Coalition Initiative, the UK Forum for Haemoglobinopathies, the National Council for Voluntary Organisation (Health Electoral College), the NHS Haemoglobinopathies Screening Campaign Steering Group, as well as work with the National Blood Service and the Brent Health & Race Forum.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED)

PUBLIC RELATIONS

In a bid to raise the Society's profile, we were successful in attracting the support of eminent personalities including, the Rt Hon Paul Boateng MP (Chief Secretary to the Treasury) and Mr Trevor Phillips OBE, Chairman of the Commission for Racial Equality, (formerly, Chairman Greater London Assembly), as new patrons. We continue to enjoy the patronage of Mr Lenny Henry CBE, Mr Clive Lloyd OBE, Mr Derrick Evans (alias Mr Motivator) and Floella Benjamin OBE.

The Prime Minister's wife, Cherie Booth, QC, visited the Society on the afternoon of 24th March 2003. The private visit was a welcome opportunity to raise the plight of sickle-cell sufferers at the highest possible level in the UK. Cherie Booth accepted enthusiastically to take on a key aspect of our campaign- the need for the government to include sickle-cell sufferers among those on free NHS prescription.

Medical Advisors

Three new top-level consultants were recruited as Medical Advisors: Dr Iheanyi Okpala (St Thomas' Hospital); Dr David Rees (Kings College Hospital) and Dr Mary Petrou (UCLH, London). These joined the previous 4: Professor Sally Davies (Central Middlesex Hospital and the DoH); Dr Nellie Adjaye (Kent Community NHS Trust); Dr Adrian Stephens (Kings College Hospital) and Dr Mark Layton (Hammersmith Hospital).

SPONSORSHIP HIGHLIGHTS

Thanks to a donation from Ford Motors, (a Ford Ka) a car raffle raised over £ 10,000. The raffle was drawn by Mr Trevor Phillips, and the car prize presented by celebrity TV chef Mr Ainsley Harriott at Dagenham Motors Tottenham, in February 2003.

EVENTS & ACTIVITIES

Over 100 delegates attended the Society's 23rd Annual General Meeting on Saturday, 22rd June 2002 at the Common Wealth Institute in Kensington. Derrick Evans (Mr. Motivator) was on hand to present the Black On Black Award to the winner for outstanding achievement.

The Rt. Hon Paul Boateng MP saw 167 riders off on the 16th annual Jeff Johnson Memorial Bike Ride on Sunday, 8th September 2002 from the Wandle Recreation Centre in Wandsworth.

MEMBERSHIP

Subscriptions to the Society stand at £ 1,897 (2002-£1,575).

This however does not reflect the fact we remain the national umbrella for about 40 independent user support groups and statutory centres. By need and affordability, we have continued to support independent support groups, some of which had originated from our community seeding outreach activities over the years.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED)

DONATION AND GIFTS

Donation and Gifts for the year totalled £79,528 (2002-£68,084). There were no legacies.

Thanks to a grant (£5,000) from the Roald Dahl Foundation, a Payroll Giving scheme was initiated.

GRANTS

During the year new funding for respective projects was secured from:

LLoydsTSB Foundation and Henry Smith Charity (Volunteers Coordinator); John Ellerman Foundation (Health Education/Information Officer); Hackney LA (Hackney Sickle Link); Lambeth LA (Lambeth Sickle Outreach); Department of Health (Health Education).

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The results for the year are set out in the accompanying financial statements.

INVESTMENT POLICY

The Trustees have the power to invest in such assets as they see fit, except for trading purposes. The charity sometimes needs to react very quickly to particular emergencies and has a policy of keeping any surplus funds in short-term deposits, which can be accessed readily.

RESERVES POLICY

The Trustees of the Sickle Cell Society have set a reserves policy of maintaining a minimum of three months of the charity's total expenditure. Due to a limited amount of unrestricted funds it has not been possible to adhere to this policy during the financial year to 31st March 2003 and steps have now been taken to address this.

RISK MANAGEMENT

The Trustees actively review the major risks which the charity faces on a regular basis and aim to maintain our free reserves at the levels stated above. Combined with our annual review of the controls over key financial systems, they aim to provide sufficient resources in the event of adverse conditions. The Trustees have also examined other operational risks, which we face and confirm that they have established systems to mitigate the significant risks.

UNRESTRICTED FUNDS

During the year the unrestricted funds experienced a deficit of £57,656 due to a reduction in project and core funding, an increase in staffing and in information requests. A transfer of £30,000 was made from the Designated Fund to Unrestricted Funds following a careful review of the Designated Funds required for the Society's strategic development.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED)

RESTRICTED FUNDS

All grants coming into the Society remain under Restricted Funds to deliver the objectives of the Society. During the year the restricted funds experienced a total surplus of £17,290 (2002- £78,566 deficit) although there was a reduction in grant income. The total restricted reserves at the end of the year were £60,952 (2002- £76,762) and a transfer was, detailed in note 16.

DESIGNATED FUNDS

The Designated fund stands at £11,800 (2002 - £41,800). These monies form the Dear Legacy on which there were no restrictions, will be used as the Society's Reserves on which we will endeavour to build year-on-year. During the year the Trustees agreed a transfer of £30,000 to the unrestricted fund after careful consideration of the level of designated funds needed in the foreseeable future. This transfer will provide increased funding in the direct charitable areas of its work and the development of the Society.

The Trustees have allocated a portion of this fund for work that began in 2002 and continues throughout 2003.

- A feasibility study into the provision of Regional Care Advisors
- Review and development of audio education/information tapes for new parents of a child with a sickle cell disorder.
- The development of Audio Education/Information CDs for Young People
- The continued development of our website.
- Increased Welfare Fund disbursements

PROJECT DEVELOPMENT

Projects are developed via feedback from our client group and the deliberations of our sub-committees and board.

BOARD DEVELOPMENT

The board has been developed to closely match our client group. The board of 14 Trustees includes two parents of children with a sickle cell disorder and three individuals with a sickle cell disorder.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED)

TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial period, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the surplus or deficit for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

Select suitable accounting policies and they apply them consistently
Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records, which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time, the financial position of the charity. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

This report has been prepared in accordance with the special provision of Part VII of the Companies Act 1985 relating to small companies.

AUDITORS

The auditors, Pridie Brewster, Chartered Accountants, are willing to continue in office, and a motion for their re-appointment will be put before the next annual general meeting.

STAFF/VOLUNTEERS

Finally, the Trustees would like to record their appreciation for the hard work put in by the staff and volunteers to ensure a very productive year at the Society.

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE SICKLE CELL SOCIETY

We have audited the accounts of The Sickle Cell Society for the year ended 31st March 2003 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Balance Sheet and related notes. These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective June 2002), under the historical cost convention and the accounting policies set out therein.

To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the Trustees for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and auditors

The trustees' responsibilities for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards are set out in the Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities.

Our responsibility is to audit the financial statements in accordance with relevant legal and regulatory requirements and United Kingdom Auditing Standards.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2003

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a) Accounting convention

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Companies Act 1985 and follow the recommendations in Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) issued in October 2000.

b) Stock

Stocks of T-shirts and other material are shown at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

c) Capital grants

Capital grants received for the purchase of equipment and other fixed assets are treated as restricted funds in the Statement of Financial Activities.

d) Revenue grants

Revenue grants are accounted for on an accrual basis.

e) Donations

Donations and similar income are accounted for on a receivable basis.

f) Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

Fixtures, fittings & equipment - 25% straight line

g) Legacies

Legacies are accounted for on a receivable basis.

h) Charitable expenditure

A substantial proportion of overhead expenses are incurred in providing charitable services. Consequently an apportionment of these expenses has been made to support costs on the basis of charitable purpose salaries compared to total salaries.

i) Leased assets

Assets held under lease arrangements that transfer substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership to the company are capitalised. The capital element of the related rental obligations is included in creditors. The interest element of the rental obligations is charged to the Statement of Financial Activities so as to produce a constant periodic rate of charge. Rentals in respect of all other leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2003

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

j) Pension costs

The Society operates a defined contribution pension scheme. The pension costs charge represents contributions paid during the year.

k) Restricted funds

Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure which meets these criteria is identified to the fund.

1) Unrestricted funds

Unrestricted funds are donations and other income receivable or generated for the objects of the charity without further specified purpose and are available as general funds.

m) Designated funds

This is the investment property which was part of a legacy left to the Society and has been sold and the proceeds are to be used for the furtherance of the charity's objectives.

n) Grant income

Grant income is recognised on a receivable basis when the granting organisation is committed to payment.

o) Support costs

Support costs represent staff and overhead costs in support of the charity's principal activity.

p) Resources expended

Resources expended are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis, inclusive of any VAT which cannot be recovered.

Certain expenditure is directly attributable to specific activities and has been included in those cost categories. Certain other costs, which are attributable to more than one activity, are apportioned across cost categories on the basis of an estimate of the proportion of time spent by staff on those activities.

q) Donations in kind

Donations in kind are included in the accounts at market value.
