TRUSTEES' REPORT

The Trustees have pleasure in presenting their report and audited financial statements for the year ended 31st March 2002.

These statements relate to the funds of the Society and its decentralised Sickle Link Projects.

STATUS

Sickle Cell Society was founded in 1979 by a group of health professionals and families with sickle cell in the London Borough of Brent. The Society was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Associations. Under those Articles, the Society is limited by guarantee not having a share capital. Each of the members of the Society is liable to contribute £1 towards the liabilities of the Society in the event of liquidation.

The Society's charity registration number is 1046631 and the company registration number is 2840865. The Head office is located at 54 Station Road, London NW10 4UA.

MISSION STATEMENT

The Society's mission is to enable and assist individuals with a Sickle Cell disorder to realise their full potential. This mission will be achieved by raising awareness through; education, the provision of welfare services and assisting in research.

CHARITY OBJECTIVES

The main objectives of the Society are:

- To provide relief for persons with sickle cell disorders
- The relief of poverty among members of the immediate family of persons who are suffering or who, immediately before their death, suffered from sickle cell disorders.
- The provision of recreational activities for affected individuals and their families
- The improvement of public information, assisting in research into the causes, treatment of the condition and dissemination of such information.

In pursuance of these objectives the Society's resources are expended primarily on:

- Welfare support provision including:
 The Ralma Faulkner Welfare Fund
 Bryan Jones Educational Fund
 Children's Holiday Fund
- 2. Sickle Link Respite Care Projects
- 3. Health Education/Information program:
 Leaflets, Exhibitions, Books and Videos, Conferences and Seminars
 Internet web site and e-mail services

TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED)

STRUCTURE

The Memorandum and Articles allows 12 individuals from the membership to the Board elected each year at the Annual General Meeting.

The Board meets bi-monthly. The meetings are complimented by sub-committees, which meet on alternative months. These Committees have delegated powers. Management committee meetings are open to members on prior notification to the Company Secretary or Chair.

The Director (heading a team of eleven, in addition to a pool of volunteers) provides strategic support to the Board and is responsible for the day-to-day operational activities of the organisation. The Director also has line managerial responsibility for all Sickle Link Projects.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED)

REVIEW OF ACTIVITIES AND DEVELOPMENT DURING THE YEAR

EDUCATION/INFORMATION & AWARENESS:

The Society's Communication's Sub-committee have worked consistently to review existing publications and to develop new publications. This is supported by the Health Information/Educational Officer. A quarter of this post was funded by the Department of Health and three-quarters by the Society. The new pieces of work targets:

- New parents of children with a sickle cell disorder
- Adolescence Getting Through It Together
- Employers and Employees
- Get Tested

In addition, we are developing audiotapes along side the booklets for new parents. Copies of the 'Get Tested' booklet will be available at the Society's National Conference in Manchester in July 2002. Copies will be given away free during July as part of celebrating Sickle Cell & Thalassaemia National Awareness Day on 4th July.

During the year 2267 requests for information were received by the Society.

A second bid to continue our work on awareness has been completed for submission to the Department of Health. Again working in partnership with the UK Thalassaemia Society.

The Society is represented by the Director on the Government's National Haemoglobinopathy Screening Campaign co-ordinated by Dr Allison Streetly. It is expected to be delivered in 2004. It is intended that the Society's Awareness Campaign will provide the information, awareness and education leading up to the national screening campaign planned for 2004.

The Sickle Cell Society have increased its external training activities during the year and have delivered training on sickle cell disorder to the Probation service in Leeds, Macclesfield, London, Peterborough and Kenilworth.

DIRECT SERVICES

Sickle Link Projects:

In August 2001 we appointed Bawor Ogisi to the post of project manager at Brent Sickle Link. During the period to March 2002 we undertook an advertising campaign on 65 London buses covering five routes in and around the London Borough of Brent to promote the project's services and to recruit volunteer carers. In addition, the Society ran a volunteer recruitment campaign specifically targeting Brent. We are now seeing the result of this work. Information on Brent Sickle Link services has been translated into Urdu, French, Gujarati, Somali and English to make sure we reach all at risk communities.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED)

Hackney Sickle Link has developed a service users forum for the project representing mothers of children with a sickle cell disorder in the borough. Meetings are held quarterly, 81 volunteers are registered with the project providing respite care and carrying out hospital visiting initially for children and now for adults.

During the year the project was successful in securing £15,000 to deliver hospitals visiting for adolescents and adults with a sickle cell disorder in the borough of Hackney. The Mayor of Hackney, Mr. Saleem Siddiqui and Dianne Abbbot, local MP, supported Hackney Sickle Link awareness campaign "Sickle Cell not Prison Cell". During the year Comfort Ndive was appointed as Link Worker for the project.

Children's Holiday

Once again we were able to take 26 children and 14 carers to Woodrow House for a week of respite for both children and families. This has been made possible by donations from members of the public to the Society. The fund spent £11,504 on this year's holiday.

The Ralma Faulkner Welfare Fund

This fund provides welfare benefit to individuals with a sickle cell disorder in the form of household items such as carpets, curtains, beds and washing machines. The fund spent £8,197 supporting individuals with a disorder.

Bryan Jones Educational Fund

During the financial year to March 2002, this fund has distributed £2,410 in support of individuals with a sickle cell disorder who miss out on schooling, require IT support or who are undertaking a university or college course.

A grant application to the Roald Dahl Foundation has been prepared to assess the needs of children with a Sickle Cell Disorder who miss out on schooling.

PARTNERSHIPS

Black & Minority Ethnic (BME) Sustainability Project

Tony Morrison was appointed the Society's first fundraising manager in June 2001 as part of the this major research and development project, funded by the Active Community Unit of the Home Office and in partnership with the Institute of Charity Fundraising Managers (ICFM) and Blackliners. The aim of the project is to increase the ability of the Black & Minority Ethnic voluntary sector to develop effective and sustainable fundraising. During the year the partnership held a conference for Trust funders. The Society manages the funds on behalf of all partners.

Volunteering Strategy: Delivering Care Partnership

This is the final year of this funding. The Society's aim was to increase the quality and number of service-user and active community volunteers in the Society. In order to achieve this during the year we have recruited, trained and supported a core of community volunteers in Hackney and Brent for respite and for general purposes. We have provided training for the Women's Royal Voluntary Services and the Consortium on Opportunities for Volunteering on recruiting and retaining black and minority ethnic volunteers.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED)

SPONSORSHIP

Choice FM was once again our sponsors for the Annual London to Brighton Bike ride held on Sunday 9th September 2001 along with Transport for London and the Royal Mail.

EVENTS & ACTIVITIES

180 individuals attended the Society's Annual General Meeting on Saturday, 23rd June 2001 at the Common Wealth Institute. Trevor Phillips was on hand to present the Black On Black Awarded to the winner for outstanding achievement.

This year's Christmas Raffle raised a grand total of £7,324.

The Rt. Hon Paul Boateng saw riders off on the 15th annual London to Brighton Bike Ride on Sunday, 9th September 2001 from outside Choice FM's building on Borough High Street. There was an increase of riders from 265 to 365.

MEMBERSHIP

Subscriptions to the Society stand at £1,575 (2001 - £1,715).

DONATION AND GIFTS

Donation and Gifts for the year totalled £68,084 (2001 - £65,281) with legacies for the year £9,023 (2001 - £Nil)

GRANTS

During the year new funding was secured from:

The Bridge House Estates Trust and City Parochial Foundation for the post of Direct Services Manager/Deputy Director.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The results for the year are set out in the accompanying financial statements.

INVESTMENT POLICY

The Trustees have the power to invest in such assets as they see fit. The charity sometimes needs to react very quickly to particular emergencies and has a policy of keeping any surplus funds in short-term deposits, which can be accessed readily.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED)

RESERVES POLICY

The Trustees of the Sickle Cell Society have set a reserves policy of maintaining a minimum of three months of the charity's total expenditure. Due to a limited amount of unrestricted funds it has not been possible to adhere to this policy during the financial year to 31st March 2002. The Trustees will work in pursuit of this goal.

RISK MANAGEMENT

The Trustees actively review the major risks which the charity faces on a regular basis and believe that maintain our free reserves at the levels stated above, combined with our annual review of the controls over key financial systems, will provide sufficient resources in the event of adverse conditions. The Trustees have also examined other operational and business risks, which we face and confirm that they have established systems to mitigate the significant risks.

UNRESTRICTED FUNDS

During the year the unrestricted funds experienced a deficit of £55,931 due to a reduction in project and core funding, an increase in staffing and in information requests. A transfer of £30,000 was made from the Designated Fund to Unrestricted Funds to support the Society's strategic development.

Three new members of staff were employed halfway through the year as part of the Society's restructure in order to support the organisation's development and enable it to deliver services. One key new post is that of a Fundraising Manager.

RESTRICTED FUNDS

All grants coming into the Society remain under Restricted Funds to deliver the objectives of the Society. During the year the restricted funds experienced a total deficit of £78,566 due to a reduction of grant income. However, there were sufficient brought forward reserves from the restricted funds to cover the deficit for the year. The total surplus reserves at the end of the year were £76,762 (2001 - £155,328).

DESIGNATED FUNDS

The Designated fund stands at £41,800 (2001 - £78,907). These monies form the Dear Legacy on which there were no restrictions will be used as the Society's Reserves on which we will endeavour to build year-on-year. During the year Trustees agreed a transfer of £30,000 to the unrestricted fund after careful consideration of the level of designated funds needed in the foreseeable future. This transfer will provide increased funding in the direct charitable areas of its work and the development of the Society.

The Trustees have allocated a portion of this fund for work that began in 2001 and continues throughout 2002.

- A feasibility study into the provision of Regional Care Advisors
- Review and development of audio education/information tapes for new parents of a child with a sickle cell disorder.
- The development of Audio Education/Information CDs for Young People
- The continued development of our website.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED)

PROJECT DEVELOPMENT

Projects are developed via feedback from our client group and the deliberations of our sub-committees and board.

BOARD DEVELOPMENT

The board has been developed to closer match our client group. The board of 12 Trustees is represented by three parents of children with a sickle cell disorder and four individuals with a sickle cell disorder.

TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial period, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the surplus or deficit for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

Select suitable accounting policies and they apply them consistently

Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent

Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records, which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time, the financial position of the charity. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

This report has been prepared in accordance with the special provision of Part VII of the Companies Act 1985 relating to small companies.

AUDITORS

The auditors, Pridie Brewster, Chartered Accountants, are willing to continue in office, and motion for their re-appointment will be put before the next annual general meeting.

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE SICKLE CELL SOCIETY

We have audited the accounts of The Sickle Cell Society for the year ended 31st March 2002 set out on pages 10 to 23. These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention and the accounting policies set out on pages 12 and 13.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and auditors

As described on page 7, the trustees who are also the directors of the Sickle Cell Society for the purposes of company law, are responsible for the preparation of accounts in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards. Our responsibility is to audit the accounts in accordance with relevant legal and regulatory requirements and United Kingdom Auditing Standards.

We report to you our opinion as to whether the accounts give a true and fair view and are properly prepared in accordance with the Charities Act 1985. We also report to you if, in our opinion, the Trustees' Report is not consistent with the accounts, if the charity has not kept proper accounting records, if we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit, or if information specified by law regarding trustees' remuneration and transactions with the charitable company is not disclosed.

We are not required to consider whether the statement in the Trustees' Report concerning the major risks to which the charity is exposed covers all existing risks and controls, or to form an opinion on the effectiveness of the charity's risk management and control procedures.

We read other information contained in the Trustees' Report, and consider whether it is consistent with the audited accounts. We consider the implications for our report if we become aware of any apparent misstatements or material inconsistencies with the accounts. Our responsibilities do not extend to any other information.

Basis of opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with United Kingdom Auditing Standards issued by the Auditing Practices Board. An audit includes examination, on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the accounts. NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2002

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a) Accounting convention

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Companies Act 1985 and follow the recommendations in Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) issued in October 2000.

b) Stock

Stocks of T-shirts and other material are shown at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

c) Capital grants

Capital grants received for the purchase of equipment and other fixed assets are treated as restricted funds in the Statement of Financial Activities.

d) Revenue grants

Revenue grants are accounted for on an accrual basis.

e) Donations

Donations and similar income are accounted for on a receivable basis.

f) Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

Fixtures, fittings & equipment - 25% straight line

g) Legacies

Legacies are accounted for on a receivable basis.

h) Charitable expenditure

A substantial proportion of overhead expenses are incurred in providing charitable services. Consequently an apportionment of these expenses has been made to support costs on the basis of charitable purpose salaries compared to total salaries.

i) Leased assets

Assets held under lease arrangements that transfer substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership to the company are capitalised. The capital element of the related rental obligations is included in creditors. The interest element of the rental obligations is charged to the Statement of Financial Activities so as to produce a constant periodic rate of charge. Rentals in respect of all other leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2002

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

j) Pension costs

The Society operates a defined contribution pension scheme. The pension costs charge represents contributions paid during the year.

k) Restricted funds

Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure which meets these criteria is identified to the fund.

1) Unrestricted funds

Unrestricted funds are donations and other income receivable or generated for the objects of the charity without further specified purpose and are available as general funds.

m) Designated funds

This is the investment property which was part of a legacy left to the Society and has been sold and the proceeds are to be used for the furtherance of the charity's objectives.

n) Grant income

Grant income is recognised on a receivable basis when the granting organisation is committed to payment.

o) Support costs

Support costs represent staff and overhead costs in support of the charity's principal activity.

p) Resources expended

Resources expended are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis, inclusive of any VAT which cannot be recovered.

Certain expenditure is directly attributable to specific activities and has been included in those cost categories. Certain other costs, which are attributable to more than one activity, are apportioned across cost categories on the basis of an estimate of the proportion of time spent by staff on those activities.

q) Donations in kind

Donations in kind are included in the accounts at market value.
