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Trustees' Report for the year ended 31 March 2019

The Trustees, who are also Directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their annual report and financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2019. The Trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard FRS 102 (effective 1 January 2015).

Objectives and activities

The company is established as a company limited by guarantee under its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated May 1994.

The company's charitable aim as set out in its Memorandum of Association is the advancement of education through environmental conservation, protection and restoration for the benefit of the public by the provision of training and information services and the encouragement of participation and volunteering in practical environmental projects. The Trustees have agreed to three working aims:

- a) Raising awareness of environmental issues in all sectors of the community;
- b) Increasing participation in environmental projects by individuals and groups;
- c) Promoting change in society towards a more sustainable future.

The Environment Centre seeks to achieve its aims through three main areas of activity:

- i) Supporting other environmental groups and projects through a range of facilities and services;
- ii) Providing information services including a public information centre, a resource library, a monthly newsletter, regular features in the media, exhibitions and stands at local events;
- iii) Organising educational projects and activities for schools, community groups and the general public.

Organisational structure

The Environment Centre is managed by a Board of Trustees. Board meetings are arranged on a bi-monthly basis. Sub groups are organised to meet between Board meetings to discuss and progress finance, property and staffing issues, as well as the education and information delivery and outreach issues. These sub groups are made up of trustees, staff and volunteers, and report back to the board.

The Centre Manager is responsible for the day to day running of the Centre and provides a detailed activity report to the Board at the Board meetings. The Finance Manager prepares a comprehensive financial report for these meetings.

The Environment Centre is fully independent but works closely with many other organisations and is a member of several forums, partnerships and networks. The most notable of these are Swansea Environmental Forum (SEF), Swansea Council for Voluntary Service (SCVS) and the Swansea Fair Trade Forum.

Achievements and developments

Environment Centre staff over the year consisted of Philip McDonnell as Interim Centre Manager; Siân Jenkins as Finance Manager; Hannah Mitchell as Resources Officer (until end of August 2018); Anita Houten as Education Officer (until the beginning of April 2018); Clare Bennett as Shop and Volunteer Coordinator and Holli Yeoman as Bookings and Events Officer (both since September 2018); Mo Green as Cleaner/Caretaker. Stuart Cairns continues to volunteer his services as Treasurer.

The Board of Trustees were sorry to see the departure of Anita Houten and Hannah Mitchell during the year and are grateful for the contribution each made over the past 17 years at the Centre. During the previous year, the Board had taken the difficult decision to make Anita's post redundant due to grant funding for the Centre's education work coming to an end in March 2018. Following Hannah's departure, the Resources Officer role ceased and the Centre contracted Clare and Holli to take on some aspects of that role and some additional duties being taken on by both Siân, and Philip, who continued as Centre Manager on a part-time, interim basis to help the Centre through the period of change and secure a better financial footing. We also welcomed two student interns from Italy in February – Federico and Silvia took on administrative roles during their time at the Centre and their contribution was very much appreciated. The Board would like to acknowledge the tremendous contribution made by trustees, staff and volunteers over what has been another challenging year.

Trustees' Report for the year ended 31 March 2019

The Centre continued to serve as a hub for the community and environmental movements, providing a range of support services for other organisations and acting as the first point of contact for organisations and members of the public seeking answers to questions relating to issues such as recycling and waste, biodiversity, energy, pollution and environmental volunteering. The wealth of information and contacts that staff have accrued while in their roles at the Centre has enabled the Centre to help many in the community looking for projects, activities and services supporting ethical and eco-friendly lifestyle choices. The recorded footfall total for 2018/19 for people visiting the Centre was over 5,000, showing quite an increase from the previous year when footfall was just over 3,000. These figures relate primarily to those visiting the Centre shop or making enquiries in person at the reception desk – the numbers would be significantly higher if all those attending meetings and events, those visiting other organisations based in the Centre were included. Phone and email enquiries are also substantial and not included in the data we collect.

The Centre organised a programme of workshops and events through 2018/19 to help people gain new skills and knowledge including a Wild Plant Paper Making workshop; a Hammered Leaves workshop; a Postcard Craftivism workshop; an Art from the Beach Findings workshop; two Creative Writing on an environmental theme workshops; two Batik workshops; a Bird Box making workshop; Beginners and Intermediate Bike Maintenance workshops; and a Healthy and ethical cooking workshop. In February, the first Repair Café was held at the Centre – established in partnership with Repair Café Wales, this has become a monthly event. During the 2018/19 period, our hall was also used to host a range of interesting exhibitions 'Best Start Swansea' focussed on two fantastic children's books written by local parents; an exhibition on "Saving Energy, Saving Money"; and three separate exhibitions featuring the work of local artists: Val Godwin's "Welsh Rock"; Jeff Philips' "Desire and Despair"; and Alan Dobson's paintings. There was also a display on the stairs celebrating the 20th anniversary of the Wales Ape and Monkey Sanctuary. The Centre was also pleased to host an exhibition as part of the Swansea Festival of Stitch during August with artists Ruth Norbury and Haf Weighton displaying their work which was themed around the sea. The Centre arranged a beach clean in March, in partnership with Plastic Free Swansea and Keep Wales Tidy.

Our Green Shop went from strength to strength with new lines continually being added – with a particular focus on helping people reduce their use of plastic. It is estimated that during the year, the Green Shop helped customers prevent over 1,700 litre plastic bottles from going to landfill by using the refill stations, showing a great increase from 1,000 litres in the previous year. Sales in 2018/19 continued to increase with at near to 40% more takings than 2017/18. We expect to see this growth trend continue in 2019/20.

The facilities at the Centre continue to be a great resource for other environmental groups and the community of Swansea. Our low cost meeting space for the community with a range of equipment free to use is invaluable especially for small volunteer-led groups and other community groups needing space to meet or to host their project and public meetings. Organisations large and small, including local groups, businesses and government departments use the Centre and the three meeting room spaces as a base for their activities. This year, over 70 different groups or organisations used these facilities including Adult Learning Wales, Barnardos, Bikeability, Business in Focus, Cardiff University, Chartered Institute of Ecology, Citizens Advice Swansea, Diverse Cymru, Eden Project, Extinction Rebellion, Fair Trade Wales, Friends of the Earth, Gower Ornithological Society, Motor Neurone Disease Association, Naturally FED, NCT, NRW, Oxfam, RSPB West Glamorgan, Sauer Power (Gut Instinct), SEF, Socialist Heath Association, Susana Martin Spanish classes, Sustrans, Swansea Carers, Swansea Community Growing Network, Swansea Organic Gardening Group, Swansea Ramblers, Swansea University, Tiny Toes Ballet, Tiger Cardiff Ltd, VocalEyes, WCPPE, Wheelrights and Women 4 Resources.

Our annual Green Fayre at the National Waterfront Museum in November was once again our biggest community awareness raising event and an important fundraiser for the Centre. The event attracted approximately 4,000 visitors and involved over 70 stalls featuring local environmental groups, local producers, upcycled crafts, local woodcraft and more. A series of free talks and workshops were held which included a talk on fermented food, two singing workshops, launch of the Community Green Spaces online toolkit and the launch of Refill Swansea. The museum held Yoga taster sessions and family film screenings as part of the programme. There were also performances from local choirs Cancer Challenge Choir and Sanctuary Choir.

The Centre continued to raise funds from donation boxes, private and organisational donations. Following the donations received through the "Heat the Hall" campaign the boiler and heaters were replaced in the main hall in April. The Centre also held a clothes swap session, two Quiz nights and a Grand Auction which were all very well attended and lots of money was raised.

Trustees' Report for the year ended 31 March 2019

The Centre launched an Eastside Schools Project with primary schools in the cluster around Kilvey Hill were offered funding to cover the cost of a selection of environmental education activities. The project was funded by Swansea Bay Energy Partnership (SBEP) and enabled the Centre to maintain at least some school support work following the end of Natural Resources Wales (NRW)-funded education programme.

NRW did provide funding to the Centre and our key partner, SEF, to support activities related to the "Working with Nature" Objective of the Swansea Wellbeing Plan. This included organizing a major conference, held in May 2019 and a series of environment themed talks. The Centre also receive funding from NRW to create a turf roof over the bike stands in the garden, though this work was also carried out in the 2019/20 financial year.

As always, we value the commitment, enthusiasm and support that volunteers have given the Centre. We recruited a number of new volunteers during the year and said goodbye to some who were moving on or retiring. Over the year, volunteers donated in excess of 2,000 hours of their time to help the Centre achieve its aims. We have a diverse group of volunteers helping us to manage our Green Shop, run our events, maintain our building and the garden and promote what we do. We thank each and every one of them.

Risk Management and Public Benefit

The trustees continue to undertake an assessment of risks to which the Centre is exposed and are establishing systems to mitigate those risks. This process involves identifying the types of risks to which the Centre is exposed, prioritising risks in terms of their potential impact on the Centre's activities and identifying ways in which the risks might be managed. The trustees recognise that risk assessment is an ongoing process and the process will be reviewed and the quality of the assessment enhanced on a regular basis.

The trustees have paid due regard to the Charity Commission guidance on public benefit and believe that our activities continue to meet the public benefit requirement.

Reserves and review of financial position

The trustees' policy is to maintain reserves above that represented by fixed assets to meet its ongoing obligations and contingencies. The Centre's total unrestricted fund reserves at 31 March 2019 amounted to £79,029, of which £64,425 was held as net current assets. Total income is lower owing to the loss of some funding, but this has been compensated for in part by lower costs, and there have been increases in shop and rental income. The overall outcome is a decrease in reserves of £18,574 compared with a decrease of £16,781 the previous financial year. In terms of net current assets there was a decrease of £7,762 compared with a decrease of £1,286 the previous year, which was due in part to the new heating system at a cost of £4,992 treated as a capital addition.

Trustees

Trustees are elected on the basis of their ability to contribute in an individual capacity. Prior to each AGM, the Board will scrutinise all nominations made on an individual basis so as to ensure that the individuals concerned have the capacity to make an adequate contribution to the work of the Centre.

The Board may then co-opt up to three additional trustees. The following trustees held office during the year:

Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2019

1 Accounting policies

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material to the company's financial statements:

Basis of preparation

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102 "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)", Financial Reporting Standard 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Company status

The Environment Centre Ltd is a company limited by guarantee in England and Wales. In the event of the winding up of the company every member is liable to contribute to the debts and liabilities of the company such amounts as may be required, but not exceeding £10 each.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are funds available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the association. Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors. The costs of administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. Details of the restricted fund are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Grants and other income

Grants and other income are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amounts can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the association to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate costs related to the category.

Stock

Stock has been included at cost, less any adjustment where the realizable value is considered to be lower than cost. This relates to stock held in the shop & cafe, based on sales value less average mark-up on cost.

Fixed assets and depreciation

Items of furniture and equipment for the Centre's own use with individual values of less than £100 are written off as incurred. Other such items are capitalised and depreciated on a straight line basis over their useful economic lives as follows:

Furniture & fittings 5-10 years Equipment 3 years

Leasehold property and amortisation

The cost attributed to leasehold property includes expenditure incurred by the company and the value attributed to donated goods and services. Leasehold property is amortised on a straight line basis over the 25 year term of the lease.
