TRUSTEE'S REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2013

The directors present their report and financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2013.

Reference and administrative information set out on page one forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the memorandum and articles of association and the Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting by Charities (issued in March 2005).

Structure, governance and management

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 11 October 1994 and registered as a charity on 11 November 1994. The Company was established under a Memorandum of Association which establishes the objects and powers of the charity.

All directors are members of the charitable company and guarantee to contribute to the assets of the company in the event of it being wound up such amounts as may be required not exceeding £1. The number of guarantees at 31 December 2013 was 5 (2012 - 5). The directors have no beneficial interest in the charitable company nor in its activities and are not remunerated. A register of business interests is maintained.

The trustees has assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

Demos adopted a risk assessment in accordance with guidance set out by the Charity Commission at the 2011 Annual General Meeting. This has not been formally updated, but from time to time the Directors review Demos' risks and the actions put in place to mitigate them.

DEMOS PROJECTS LIMITED

The charity controls Demos Projects Limited (company number 2667039), a company limited by guarantee. Two Directors of Demos Projects Limited are also Directors of Demos. It is currently not trading and its use is under review by the trustees.

Objectives and activities

The Charity's objects are governed by our Memorandum and Articles of Association which state that Demos exists:

- To promote education for the public benefit in issues of politics, economics, the environment and public policy.
- To promote for the public benefit research in any of the above fields of education and to publish the useful results of such research.

The trustees have had due regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit when considering the charity's objectives and activities. There have been no changes in the objects or the policies of the charity during the year. The principal activities of research, education and publication are reflected in the organisational structure of the charity. The overall management of Demos is the responsibility of the Director who provides leadership to the organisation and specifically leads the development of the intellectual and research agenda of the charity. Reporting to the Director are the Deputy Directors, the Head of Finance, the Head of External Affairs and heads of programmes. Research projects are managed by heads of programmes and other senior researchers. A team of senior researchers and researchers undertakes research projects, supported by temporary assistants and interns. Freelance collaborations are entered into to fulfil technical and consultancy roles, as well as helping with particular aspects of research, writing and the production of publications. All projects have a budgetary review before contracts with funders are signed, and are subject to an extensive quality review process from initiation through to publishing the final report. All staff are encouraged to contribute to any appropriate aspects of research, administration, the achievement of the charitable objects and the planning processes.

Aims for 2013

2013 was our 20th Birthday year, and as such our main aims for 2013 were to continue to improve the financial standing of the organisation alongside promoting the Demos brand with an intellectual refresh and outreach to new partners. Specific objectives were

- Continuing to improve Demos' reputation and profile
- Deliver a series of Birthday events, essay collection and related media activity, as well as prepare for the relaunch of Demos Quarterly (journal)
- Maintain stringent cost control measures on research projects
- To maintain the reduced fixed staff costs to give us greater flexibility regarding our single largest expense (wages)
- To deliver high profile, large research projects combined with shorter term pieces to maintain a more stable cash-flow throughout the year
- To host a comprehensive series of events at the autumn Party Conferences as well as a year-round events programme to supplement our research income

A lower than expected project income, combined with Birthday related costs affected our overall financial position by year end. Nonetheless, we delivered a successful party conference programme and maintained a stable flow of work throughout the year, ensuring cash flow remained predictable. We also launched Demos Impact in Q3, a membership programme with universities around the UK, which will continue to grow and provide a stable source of additional income in coming years.

We maintained the strategic decision taken in 2011 not to replace permanent staff lost through natural wastage unless it damaged the capacity of the organisation, and to continue to sub-let our events space. We have expanded the sub-let area of our office as our full-time staff team grew smaller, leading to continued reduction in our fixed costs.

Achievements during 2013

Specific achievements for 2013 include:

- The securing of a large grant from the Paul Hamlyn Foundation to run a two year pilot in four schools, exploring the use of coproduction techniques with disengaged pupils
- The start of a three-year evaluation of a Department of Health funded pilot run by the Motor-Neurone disease association
- Two influential reports on End of Life Care, which has generated continued policy engagement with large organisations and the government on this issue
- A very popular and well-attended Birthday lecture series and keynote lecture by former Leader of the Canadian Liberal Party and leading public intellectual on both sides of the Atlantic, discussing the troubles of progressive politics
- A refreshed Demos Facebook page to celebrate our 20th Birthday, with a timeline of important dates in our history https://www.facebook.com/demosonline
- The launch of Demos Impact, a membership programme with universities to bring academic work into the public and policy making arena

LECTURES, CONFERENCES AND SEMINARS

Demos organised a wide range of lectures, events and conferences during the year. On average, Demos hosts and organises two events each month, ranging from large-scale public debates to smaller scale seminars on particular issues. In addition, Demos staff give presentations and speeches, and take part in debates at conferences and events. Notable events during the year include:

Moving On Up: How welfare and skills can work together

Demos hosted policymakers and industry experts, including Esther McVey, Minister of State for Employment, to address how the welfare-to-work system can contribute to improved living-standards, not simply by helping people into work, but also by ensuring that people can find jobs that provide opportunities for training and progression.

Giving Something Back

The launch of Demos' report assessing the value of charity retailers on the high street featured an expert panel exploring the relationship between charity retail and the high streets of the present and future, including the Minister for Local Government and High Streets, Brandon Lewis MP, and Social Value Ambassador Chris White MP.

The Chicago Plan: Radical ways to reinvent banking

Demos Finance hosted speakers Michael Kumhof, Adair Turner and Anatole Kaletsky who addressed radical reform initiatives for the UK banking sector, following Michael Kumhof's paper on revisiting the so-called Chicago Plan.

The Top of the Ladder

The launch event of the Top of the Ladder report, on the chronic under-supply of appropriate housing for older people, also marked the launch of The Campaign for Housing in Later Life. The event featured a discussion with Jack Dromey MP, Shadow Housing Minister; Paul Burstow MP, former Minister of State for Care Services; Richard Blakeway, London Deputy Mayor for Housing, Land and Property; and was chaired by Esther Rantzen CBE.

Twentieth Birthday Lecture Series

To mark Demos' Twentieth Birthday, Demos hosted a series of lectures looking at some of the biggest challenges facing society over the next 20 years:

- Paul Burstow MP considered how an ageing population will affect the next twenty years and whether our public services are fit for purpose;
- Jesse Norman MP discussed how to remoralise the economy and laid out a conservative vision for long term economic reform, and was joined by economists Mariana Mazzucato and Andrew Lilico;
- Michael Ignatieff, former Leader of the Canadian Liberal Party and leading public intellectual on both sides of the Atlantic, discussed the troubles of progressive politics, the apparently growing gap between political elites and ordinary voters and how to engage the demos, build coalitions and lead, with responses from Lord Maurice Glasman, Richard Sennett, David Willetts MP, and Alison Wolf;

• Diane Abbott MP, Labour's shadow public health minister, identified a 'crisis of masculinity' in Britain, and argued that rapid economic and social change has affected male identity, creating a number of largely unspoken problems.

Poverty Events Series

Following the 2012 flagship report, Poverty in Perspective, Demos this year ran a series of seminars, aiming to assist the Joseph Rowntree Foundation with its anti-poverty strategy programme. Discussions with a wide range of experts generated deeper understanding of the issues at stake and ideas for policy interventions.

Liberty versus Security

The Rt Hon Yvette Cooper MP gave a major speech laying out Labour's plans to balance to national security with concerns about issues of liberty and freedom of speech.

PROJECTS

Demos carried out a wide range of research projects during 2013, drawing on a varied range of innovative methodologies which Demos is now known for, including focus groups and interviews, citizen's juries and ethnographic study. We built on our new social media analytics capability in partnership with the University of Sussex to enable us to analyse Twitter content. We also worked in partnership with the statisticians at NatCen, Ipsos Mori and Cass Business school, as well as with our Impact Partners in universities around the UK

Top of the Ladder

A review of the gap between supply and demand of specialist housing for older people, providing new quantitative analysis on the scale of the problem and acting as a valuable evidence base for the start of a campaign by a coalition of housing providers to overcome barriers to supply of new housing for older people.

Health in austerity

An essay collection in partnership with Durham University, a Demos Impact Member. This collection brought together academics, MPs, journalists and practitioners to discuss the impact of the economic downturn and austerity policies on public health and the development of the NHS.

Backsliders: Measuring democracy in the EU

This research created an innovative measure of democracy and reviewing EU member states against this, creating a matrix showing which members states were 'backsliding' in terms of open democratic processes.

Generation strains

This partnership with IpsosMori was a very well received and widely discussed analysis of changing attitudes to welfare and the welfare state, comparing attitudinal data from different age cohorts to understand trends in opinions of contributory welfare and 'deserving' poor.

Policing in an information age

This research was an extremely timely exploration of how police forces use social media as a form of intelligence related to unfolding crimes, and their ability to use this in a robust and responsive way.

Financial review

Demos currently has no reserves and is in a net liabilities position as described below. Having cleared all of our legacy debt including HMRC and our loan with Venturesome in 2012, we sought to maintain this position in 2013 and service all debts as they fell due. Our strategy for achieving this was to take a firmer hold of project costs and to reduce our fixed costs (rent and staff costs), which we have been able to do without undermining Demos' capacity to deliver high quality work to deadline. Mixing longer term grant-based projects with a number of smaller projects which could be completed within a shorter time frame has helped us to maintain a reliable cash-flow while these debts were being serviced.

Although we had a successful Party Conference and a number of new project signings during 2013, overall project-related income was slightly lower than anticipated. This, combined with some Birthday-related costs associated with our essay collection and lecture series, and two projects generating slightly larger than anticipated costs meant we ended the year on a small deficit. Nonetheless we are confident that our birthday activities, preparation for our new Demos Quarterly and launch of Demos Impact will generate considerable additional funding interest in 2014.

At 1 January 2013, the balance sheet showed net liabilities of £58,198k. In 2013 the team continued to monitor and reduce project and fixed costs and maintain a strong focus on fundraising throughout the year. However birthday activity combined with lower than anticipated income has meant that the audited balance sheet at the end of December 2013 shows a net liability of £80,625 and shows that the company ended the year with a deficit of £23,799.

Plans for the future

2014, the year before the election, is seeing Demos expand our offer to include Demos Impact, Demos Quarterly and a range of essay collection and think piece outputs. This has already started to attract a more varied range of funding partners and will help smooth out income between larger research grants.

In response to the need for stronger intellectual direction and responsiveness to policy development opportunities, we have planned to give the Director David Goodhart an advisory role as head of a new Advisory Board, tasked with keeping Demos as the forefront of emerging policy thinking and political developments. Deputy director Claudia Wood takes over day to day running of organisation. This will ensure more effective delegation of duties and help position Demos as a go-to research and policy organisation in the run-up to the Election.

The Directors have reviewed the latest results for 2013 and the budget for 2014 together with a cash flow forecast. Based upon these forecasts they consider that these indicate that Demos can meet its liabilities as they fall due for the foreseeable future and have therefore prepared the financial statements on the going concern basis.

Auditors

Auria Audit LLP were appointed auditors to the company, a resolution proposing that they be re-appointed will be put to the members.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2013

1 Accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005 and the Companies Act 2006.

1.2 Incoming resources

Voluntary income is received by way of donations and grants, and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable.

Revenue grants are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities when received or receivable whichever is earlier, unless they relate to a specific future period, in which case they are deferred.

Contractual income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities as entitlement is earned through completion of the contract.

1.3 Resources expended

Resources expended are allocated to the particular activity where the cost relates directly to that activity. Resources expended include attributable VAT which cannot be recovered. The direct payroll costs of each activity are allocated on the basis of job function.

Governance costs include compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Support costs are re-allocated to each of the activities on the following basis which is an estimate, based on staff time, of the amount attributable to each activity.

Projects 85%

Publications and subscriptions 5%

Events and seminars 5% Governance 5%

1.4 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets costing more than £500 are capitalised in the balance sheet at purchase costs plus the cost of bringing the asset into working condition for its intended use. Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset over its expected useful life. The depreciation rates in use are as follows:

Plant and machinery 3 years
Fixtures, fittings & equipment 5 years

Depreciation costs are allocated to activities on the basis of the use of the related assets in those activities.

Assets are reviewed for impairment if circumstances indicate that their carrying amount may not be recoverable. Impaired assets are written down to their recoverable value being the higher of their net realisable value and value in use.

1.5 Leasing and hire purchase commitments

Rent payable under operating leases, where all the risks and rewards of ownership remain with the lessors, are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they fall due.

1.6 Pensions

The charitable company contributes to a stakeholder pension scheme. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the charitable company in an independently administered fund. The pension cost charge represents contributions payable under the scheme by the charitable company to the fund. The charitable company has no liability under the scheme other than for the payment of those contributions.

1.7 Foreign currency translation

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate ruling at the date of the transaction.

1.8 Accumulated funds

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. Expenditure which meets these criterea is chargable to the funds. Unrestricted funds are donations and othe incoming resources received or generated for charitable purposes.
