OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing Cardiff & Vale of Glamorgan Parents Federation (Learning Disabilities) aims and objectives and in planning future activities.

Our stated purpose is '...to promote the health and welfare of people with a learning disability in the areas covered by the counties of Cardiff and the Vale of Glamorgan...'.

We achieve this by offering a mix of direct support to families, an information signposting service and by coordinating effective carer representation in consultation processes.

Parents and close relatives are typically the prime source of support and assistance in a learning disabled persons life and our services focus around supporting the family carer to be better able to face the challenges of caring. This work compliments the aims of the recent Social Services and Well Being Act (2014) and the Qualities and Sustainable Futures Act.

All our services are free. This includes the provision of information, literature, individual assistance, organisation membership and newsletter mailouts. In addition we co-ordinate workshops, events and informal social gatherings. We reimburse members expenses when attending meetings or events on our behalf in a voluntary capacity.

Support

We aim to help families and carers to be better able to continue to cope through the provision of a variety of carer-focussed support activities.

This includes coordinating carers' information workshops, social and training events and promoting activities that will benefit carers. We also coordinate the annual Understanding Disability awards that celebrate the inclusion of people with a learning disability in everyday life.

Carers and their disabled relatives are supported to enjoy a variety of social gatherings where they meet and exchange experiences, ideas and socialise. At these events, parents overcome social isolation and build confidence and skills to help them continue their caring role.

We are part of a Families First funded project that offers support, information and advice to families and young disabled individuals aged up to 25. Staff offer a hands-on service as required for eligible families to help remove some of the barriers faced when trying to access support and services.

We offer a similar support to families that care for an adult. For some families this extends to offering an enhanced level of signposting support to ensure that they are put in touch with appropriate sources of support.

Objectives and activities (continued)

Information and Signposting

Information on how to access support or assistance is of critical importance to a disabled individual and their relative/carer. Family carers are very often the only advocate or representative an individual can rely upon to press for the support and services that they should receive.

Our work includes liaising with families to share information, highlight new ways of doing things and promoting new opportunities. This may include entertaining the idea of families 'taking risks' by trying new or better value approaches to facing challenges in daily life.

We produce newsletters, host a website, maintain and update a detailed information guide (Where You Stand) and hold parent meetings to ascertain their views, needs and experiences.

The Where You Stand website is updated regularly and has been redesigned during this period. We also have a very popular social media presence.

Funding from the Lloyds Bank Foundation Enable fund has enabled us to develop a new 'smart' database that enables us to maintain closer links with families and share information quickly in a targeted manner. A consortia bid we have submitted with Glamorgan Voluntary Services and the Touch Trust will fund an extension of the popular social gatherings project we have piloted in the Vale of Glamorgan for several years. All these projects will improve the way we connect with families and encourage them to become more closely engaged in our activities.

Representation

Another aspect of our work is in pressing for better support services and increased opportunities for people with a learning disability.

This involves our working with many partner bodies and organisations to lobby for improvements, promote or instigate change and encourage new opportunities to be developed.

We support members to participate in key planning forums and networks that influence the strategic direction of existing or future services for people with a learning disability. This covers all age groups and abilities and includes participation in many cross-discipline strategic groups or frameworks at local, regional and national levels.

Members have representation on the Welsh Government and local authority planning groups and various other working groups. We are members of the Learning Disability Partnership Group (LDPG) that covers both Cardiff and the Vale of Glamorgan local authorities. We are actively involved in a number of its sub and task groups as well as participating in the Autism Strategy group across Cardiff and the Vale.

The Federation often consults its membership for their views in various consultations and surveys to ensure that families have a means to have their views listened to. We have teamed up with the All Wales Forum (of parents and carers) to ensure that we are better able to consult with families and have a stronger cross-Wales voice. The new resources being developed will assist us in this.

Our consultation responses are recorded on the website so that members can review our consultation activity.

ACHIEVEMENTS, PERFORMANCE AND FINANCIAL REVIEW

During the year 2016-17 demands for our services have continued to rise dramatically and membership at the end of March was over 1200. This is in part due to increased referrals via our partners in the Families First project across Cardiff but also attributable to the work we have carried out as part of other projects supported by the Lloyds Bank Foundation grant.

An increasing number of families and disabled individuals are finding they are unable to meet the stringent criteria for statutory sector funded support while at the same time facing losing DWP and other benefits income. This has resulted in an increased demand for our signposting and information services.

Feedback from families on the support we offer has been very positive and complimentary, suggesting that our services are well received. Feedback from professionals and agencies has been similarly positive.

Staff and volunteers have maintained a visible presence at the various forums and in consultations throughout this time, while volunteers have continued to successfully lobby for improvements in services and against changes and cutbacks. Our social gatherings that aim to link families and carers with one another to enable mutual support and overcome social isolation have been a great success. These continue to flourish with support from the Vale of Glamorgan Council and Lloyds Bank Foundation.

Our social media presence continues to grow with over 750 friends or followers; this offers an invaluable means to communicate with families in real time.

Visits to our website are now over 10,000 per year and are generating new referrals and feedback from carers.

Ongoing support from the Cardiff and Vale of Glamorgan councils as well as the Families First team in Cardiff, Lloyds Bank Foundation and Consensus has ensured that we have maintained a high quality service and a visible presence during very challenging times.

Reserves Policy

We do not have a reserve contingency fund and have agreed that we need a minimum of 3 months running costs (approximately £26,000). We plan to achieve our stated target over the coming four years by close management of spend and ongoing reduction of overheads. This is a continuing challenge given the pressures on funding. The total funds held at 31 March 2017 were £13,029 (2016 £(116)), of which £11,750 (2016 £nil) is restricted. This leaves general reserves of £1,279, which has improved since the 2016 deficit of £116.

Going Concern

Our financial situation is still difficult but we anticipate balanced budgets for the coming year (2017-18) after having overcome a small deficit incurred in the period to March 2016. We have secured around 95% of projected income requirements for the current year (2016-17) but trustees are mindful of the uncertainty of future funding and shall take whatever steps are required to ensure that expenditure stays within income at all times.

This may involve implementing cuts in services that are not explicitly funded or reducing staff levels, but trustees are confident that the organisation will still be in a position to fulfil its core obligations.

Fundraising remains a priority and several bids are in hand including more consortia bids while others are awaiting an outcome. Other income raising initiatives include encouraging direct donations or fund-raising activities are being promoted. We also encourage members to use an online shopping 'portal' called Givingabit.

Trustees have identified these mechanisms as ways carers can support us without needing to pay a membership subscription. Trustees meet to review the financial situation as required and regularly meet to monitor budgets.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

We are involved in several partnership bids for funding that would ensure our longer term sustainability. These include third sector organisations within and outside the disability field. We are investigating and piloting various ways in which we can generate additional income from fundraising initiatives.

Our services are constantly changing to reflect needs of our members and in order to ensure best value and efficacy while pursuing our goal of reaching even more difficult to contact families.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee and is governed by a Memorandum and Articles of Association. The company was incorporated on 14 June 1995 and amended by special resolution on 13 July 1999. The charity was registered on 2 August 1999.

The directors of the company also serve as trustees of the charity. Trustees can be voted for at the Annual General Meeting annually by the members or can be co-opted by the board of trustees at any time.

The trustees have developed a risk register and are aware of potential challenges we may face both in the short and medium term. In order to address the risk of financial loss, the trustees have a statement on reserves and aim towards building on the current level of reserves. There are procedures in place to help deal with risk in the workplace such as health, safety and security and the relevant insurance policies are in place.

Notes to the Financial Statements

Year ended 31 March 2017

1. General information

The charity is a public benefit entity and a private company limited by guarantee, registered in England and Wales and a registered charity in England and Wales. The address of the registered office is Unit 14 Sbectrwm Community Centre, Bwlch Road, Fairwater, Cardiff, CF5 3EF.

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Charities Act 2011 as well as applicable company and charity law.

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Going concern

The general reserves of the charity are particularly low, which would hinder the charity's ability to continue as a going concern should there be any issue with funding. However, the trustees have considered 12 months from the date of signing the accounts and are satisfied that sufficient funding has been agreed for the future and that expenditure can be kept within the funds available.

Should funding cease, the going concern position will be re-evaluated.

Transition to FRS 102

The entity transitioned from previous UK GAAP to FRS 102 as at 1 April 2015. There were no transition adjustments required.

Disclosure exemptions

The entity has taken advantage of the exemption offered by Update Bulletin 1 to not include a cash flow statement.

Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported. These estimates and judgements are continually reviewed and are based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

There are no judgements or estimations that have a significant effect on these accounts.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

3. Accounting policies (continued)

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking activities
 that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those support costs and
 costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor
 part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

Tangible assets

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of an asset, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Computer equipment

20% straight line

Impairment of fixed assets

A review for indicators of impairment is carried out at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated where such indicators exist. Where the carrying value exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is impaired accordingly. Prior impairments are also reviewed for possible reversal at each reporting date.

Financial instruments

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised only when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at the amount receivable or payable including any related transaction costs.

Current assets and current liabilities are subsequently measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received and not discounted.

4. Limited by guarantee

Every member of the charitable company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the charitable company, in the event of the same being wound up while he or she is a member, or within one year after he or she ceases to be a member, for payment of the debts and liabilities of the charitable company contracted before he or she ceases to be a member, and of the costs, charges and expenses of winding up, and for the adjustment of the rights of the contributories among themselves, such amount as may be required not exceeding one pound sterling (£1).

19. Related party transactions

One of the trustees of Cardiff & Vale of Glamorgan Parents Federation is also a trustee of Vision 21, to which rent and other office costs of £5,368 was paid during the year.
