#### REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS

The directors present their report and financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2004.

### **Charitable Status**

The company is limited by guarantee and is registered with the Charity Commission for England and Wales. The company is governed by the Memorandum and Articles of Association.

### Charitable Object

The principal object of the Spitalfields Festival is to promote enjoyment and discovery of music through a programme of concerts each June and December and year-round education and community activities, encouraging and supporting the broadest range of participants to develop their experience of music.

### Organisational Structure

The affairs of Spitalfields Festival are managed by the members of Council, shown below, supported by associate members, who sit on the Finance & Legal, Artistic and Education sub-committees and the Development Working Party.

Day-to-day management is the responsibility of a permanent administrative team of nine led by the Executive Director, Judith Serota.

Composer Jonathan Dove took on the role of Artistic Director for five years from December 2001. Jonathan Dove is one of Britain's leading composers and is actively involved in the Education & Community Programme.

#### **Review of Activities**

Spitalfields Festival continues to programme a wide variety of music, primarily (but not exclusively) Western classical music and including a significant amount of early and new music, including Festival commissions. Our extensive year-round Education & Community Programme includes projects in schools, and workshops and residences with young people and adults throughout the borough of Tower Hamlets.

The Festival produces a full, illustrated report on its activities each August. Copies of this report are available from the Festival office.

#### 2004 Festival Highlights

In planning the 2002-2006 Festivals, Artistic Director Jonathan Dove is exploring themes of immigration in the Spitalfields area. In June 2004 the Festival had a Bengali strand, Irish and Somali strands are planned for 2005 and 2006 respectively.

### The programme

- 50 events in the Summer Festival 2004, in 16 venues over 18 days
- 11 events in the Winter Festival 2004 over 8 days
- 22 Education & Community Programme projects take place in this academic year
- 21 world, 1 European and 1 London premiere were given in June 2004, including 2 Festival commissions by Judith Weir and Naresh Sohal
- 22 walks, talks and exhibitions held throughout the local area each year, plus an associated programme of fringe events
- Tickets are always available at £5 or under; 40% of Summer Festival 2004 events were completely free

### The people

- 7,756 people attended the Summer Festival 2004, 5% more than last year
- 3,616 people attended the Winter Festival 2004, our busiest Winter Festival ever
- 2,956 people attended free daytime and evening events that year, 39% more than last year
- 3,236 people were involved in the Education & Community Programme during the 2003-2004 academic year, 25% fewer than last year due to a more focused and targeted programme
- Over 28,000 people have now been involved in the Education & Community programme as performers, participants and audiences
- 56% of the school participants in the Education & Community Programme are Bangladeshi
- 71% of our adult audiences define themselves as being white British, 14% fewer than last year
- 64% of the ticket bookers for Summer Festival 2004 events have attended the Festival previously

### The profile

The Education & Community Programme received a shortlist nomination for the prestigious Royal Philharmonic Society Awards in 2003.

Press coverage of the Summer Festival 2004 included 12 reviews and 38 previews and articles. In total more than 148 positive reports about the Festival were seen in national and local media, raising public awareness of Spitalfields and the surrounding area.

7 concerts were recorded by BBC Radio 3, including a live broadcast of the world premiere of Judith Weir's *Piano Trio Two* performed by the Florestan Trio.

The Festival would like to thank our principal sponsor, Clerical Medical Investment Group Limited for this, their last year of sponsorship. It has been vital to have a principal sponsor behind us, and we are most grateful for such generous long-term sponsorship.

We are of course also very grateful to all the other companies, trusts and arts funding bodies who support the Festival. They are named in Notes 2,3 & 4.

### **New Music Commission Fund**

The New Music Commission Fund, set up by Judith Weir to safeguard the future of newly commissioned music for the Festival, has now reached £92,065. We hope to raise an endowment which will generate enough money each year to commission a composer in every year. Our target is £200,000.

### **Christopher Vaughan Legacy Fund**

The funds are invested through Brown Shipley and are used to support musical education for children in the London Borough of Tower Hamlets and performances by younger musicians.

### REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS (continued)

#### **Developments**

Since the closure of Christ Church for restoration in November 2002, Festivals have taken place in a variety of venues in and around Spitalfields. We returned to Christ Church in the Winter Festival 2004.

### **Financial Results**

The results for the year ended 31 December 2004 are shown on page 7 of the financial statements.

#### **Fixed Assets**

Details of changes in fixed assets are given in Note 12 to the financial statements.

#### Reserves

At 31 December 2004 reserves (being the balance on unrestricted funds) amounted to £430,063 (2003: £38,928).

It is the aim of the Festival to hold reserves equivalent to 6 months running costs. This means building and maintaining reserves of approximately £300,000.

The substantial legacy from Peter Lerwill will be held in reserve and invested in accordance with the Festival's Investment Policy. Unspecified amounts from the capital, and any interest earned, will be withdrawn by the Festival in accordance with his wishes. Guidelines for the use of Peter Lerwill's legacy are available from the office.

Endowments made to the New Music Commission Fund will be held in reserve and invested in accordance with the Investment Policy.

#### **Investment Policy**

The management of the Festival's investments on a day to day basis is delegated to its investment advisers. The guidelines that have been set down are for both capital growth and income with an overall medium risk. During the year, our investment advisers were Brown Shipley.

#### Fundraising

Spitalfields Festival is grateful for the support of Clerical Medical Investment Group Ltd and many other sponsors and donors. The Festival's multiple sources of income are essential to managing the various strands of our work. We are continually trying to build up long-term funding agreements to maintain an element of stability. Long term funders include Arts Council England, London to 2006; Corporation of London to 2008; Singer & Friedlander 2004-2006; the Foyle Foundation 2004-2006; The Goldsmiths' Company's Charities 2003-2005; The Mercers' Company 2004-2005; Clifford Chance are funding The Education & Community Programme to 2005 and the Esmée Fairbairn Foundation have funded over three years a community cantata, *On Spital Fields*, which is based on the history of Spitalfields, composed by Jonathan Dove. In comparison to many arts organisations, an unusually large percentage of our raised income is from the private sector.

### Risk Management

The directors have identified the major risks the Festival faces and have reviewed and evaluated these. Systems are in place to manage and mitigate these risks. These include clear lines of delegation of authority from Council to the administrative staff and for reporting results in turn to Council. Annual budgets are approved by Council and results reported during the course of the year. Where possible there is division of responsibility within the administrative team. Financial policies and procedures are in place. Where practicable appropriate insurance cover is taken out.

### REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS (continued)

### Statement of Directors' responsibilities

Company law requires the directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company's financial activities during the period and of its financial position at the end of the period. In preparing those financial statements, the directors are required to

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- comply with applicable accounting standards subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue in business.

The directors are responsible for maintaining proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

### <u>Auditors</u>

Since the last Annual General Meeting, Arthur Goddard & Co. have merged with another firm and, with effect from 1st July 2004, are practicing under the name of Steele Robertson Goddard. Steele Robertson Goddard have signified their willingness to continue in office.

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# REPORT OF THE INDEPENDENT AUDITORS TO THE MEMBERS OF SPITALFIELDS FESTIVAL LIMITED

We have audited the financial statements on pages 7 to 19, which have been prepared under the historical cost convention as modified by the revaluation of certain fixed assets, and the accounting policies set out on page 10.

This report is made solely to the company's members, as a body, in accordance with Section 235 of the Companies Act 1985. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the company's members those matters we are required to state to them in an auditor's report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the company and the company's members as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed.

### Respective responsibilities of directors and auditors

As described in the Statement of Directors' Responsibilities the charity's trustees, who are also directors for the purposes of company law, are responsible for the preparation of financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards.

Our responsibility is to audit the financial statements in accordance with relevant legal and regulatory requirements and United Kingdom Auditing Standards.

We report to you our opinion as to whether the financial statements give a true and fair view and are properly prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 1985. We also report to you if, in our opinion, the Directors' Report is not consistent with the financial statements, if the charitable company has not kept proper accounting records, if we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit, or if the information specified by law regarding directors' remuneration and transactions with the company is not disclosed.

We read the other information contained in the Directors' Report and consider the implications for our report if we become aware of any apparent misstatements within it.

#### Basis of opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with United Kingdom Auditing Standards issued by the Auditing Practices Board. An audit includes examination, on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. It also includes an assessment of the significant estimates and judgements made by the directors in the preparation of the financial statements, and of whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the charitable company's circumstances, consistently applied and adequately disclosed.

We planned and performed our audit so as to obtain all the information and explanations, which we considered necessary in order to provide us with sufficient evidence to give reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or other irregularity or error. In forming our opinion we also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the financial statements.

#### Opinion

In our opinion the financial statements give a true and fair view of the state of the charitable company's affairs as at 31 December 2004 and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including its income and expenditure, in the year then ended and have been properly prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 1985.

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the year ended 31 December 2004

### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the following policies: -

- (a) The accounts are prepared under the historical cost convention modified for the revaluation of investments and the piano.
- (b) The accounts are prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards and in compliance with the Statement of Recommended Practice – "Accounting by Charities 2000" (SORP 2000).
- (c) Incoming resources are accounted for as unrestricted, unless restrictions exist under the terms on which they are received or solicited.
- (d) Legacies are accounted for on an accruals basis where the amount receivable can be estimated with reasonable certainty.
- (e) Sponsorship, donations and grants received, as well as fundraising and publicity costs, in respect of the festivals for a particular year will be recognised in the accounting period relating to that year's festivals. The Festival receives certain help in kind from many organisations and the directors confirm that these amounts are not quantifiable and thus are not reflected in these financial statements.
- (f) Ticket and programme sales are recognised in the year to which they relate.
- (g) Capital grants are recognised when received.
- (h) Depreciation on the piano, office equipment and office premises is calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of fixed assets on a straight line basis over their estimated useful lives. Depreciation on Lottery equipment is calculated on a reducing balance basis.
- (i) Cost of generating funds includes costs incurred directly such as advertising and promotion and an appropriate proportion of indirect costs such as staff costs.
- (j) Management and administration includes direct costs incurred in the governance of the Festival (such as audit, legal, constitutional and statutory), together with an appropriate proportion of indirect costs such as staff and office costs.
