

Leadership & management

The Board of Trustees is the governing body of the charity. It determines the strategic vision of the organisation, the direction and thrust of its work. It also monitors and evaluates quality and progress. The composition of the Board is very rich in its diversity. The Board is very diverse in terms of ethnicity, gender, age and backgrounds. Collectively, the Board has a wealth of expertise in all areas of our work. Survivors and Bawso ex-service users bring their first hand experience to ensure the organisation is at all times fully responsive to service users' needs and views. Most of our Trustees work in senior positions in the public, private and third sector and sit on other boards. They bring a wide range of finance, management and governance skills acquired in different sectors, including law, finance and banking sector, higher education, management consultancy, government, NHS, and housing.

Our Senior Management Team comprises the Chief Executive and six senior Heads of Department. They are multi-skilled specialists with many years' experience, who have been dedicating their professional lives to Bawso for many year's. Their expertise ranges from leading large teams and managing front-line services to developing strategies. They also have proven expertise in building coalitions and leading change. For example, the team chaired the Wales Violence Against Women Action Group, which was instrumental in lobbying the Welsh Government to pass the Violence Against Women, Domestic Abuse and Sexual Violence (Wales) Bill.

Partnership working

To ensure that the diverse needs of our service users are met, we work very closely with a range of service providers (e.g. mental health services, family law or immigration solicitors, and adult education) and statutory services. For example, we join efforts with the four police forces in Wales to protect victims and hold perpetrators to account; we collaborate with local authorities, especially children social services to improve outcomes for children who are on the child protection register. To improve our efficacy and efficiency, over the years we have forged close links with a very wide range of organisations A few examples include:

- In Swansea Bay we are part of Seren Môr, a consortium of five organisations working in the field
 of domestic abuse. We currently collaborate to develop and bid for joint services with the aim of
 increasing efficiencies and reducing duplication.
- In South East Wales we are a key partner in the Gwent Regional Violence Against Women Domestic Abuse and Sexual Violence Partnership Board. This is a partnership of statutory and voluntary organisations regarded as an exemplary set-up for joint working across counties.
- In Cardiff we offer all domestic abuse services as part of a consortium with two local Women's
 Aid groups, in a seven-year partnership funded by the local authority. We were instrumental in
 winning the contract in 2018. We bring our unique specialism and expertise to the One Stop
 Shop.

1.0 OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES.

Bawso is an all Wales registered charity (Number 1084854) and a company limited by guarantee (3152590) that delivers specialist services to people from Black and Minority Ethnic backgrounds who have been affected by all forms of harmful traditional practices including sexual violence domestic violence, female genital mutilation, forced marriage, honour-based violence and modern-day slavery and human trafficking.

Last year we supported 7,681 ethnic minority people in Wales (98% of whom are women). We intervene at the earliest opportunity to protect people at risk of violence and support those who are affected by it, accompanying them on a journey towards safety and recovery. We do this by delivering specialist services that are accessible 24/7, 365-day a year, via our Helpline, Advice and Advocacy open door centres, purpose-built refuges, and community-based services.

We offer housing advice and support services to victims of violence and contribute to women not becoming repeated victims by building their confidence, assertiveness, and understanding of their rights. We support them to recover from the trauma they have experienced and to move on with their lives.

We also reduce the barriers BAME women face in accessing statutory services by training practitioners on the needs and experiences of BAME women. Finally, we work with BAME communities to challenge harmful traditional practices and change attitudes that allow abuse to continue to go unreported.

2.0 SERVICES DELIVERED

2.1 Protection and Support for victims of all forms of Violence Against Women

2.1.1 Advice and housing support

We provide practical and emotional support to families at risk of becoming homeless due to domestic abuse and to manage their accommodation and live independently and inclusively in the community. We offer advice on their entitlements, applying for benefits, signposting, and making referrals to other agencies. We also provide money and debt advice and training and run a 24/7 Helpline. In 2019/20, we advised 3,168 individuals and provided housing-related support to 660 families. Our intervention is crucially important. Last year we prevented all the families we supported from becoming homeless.

2.1.2 Safe accommodation for victims of domestic abuse

Our purpose-built refuges are specially adapted to meet the cultural and religious needs of service users. We deliver all our interventions in collaboration with service users with the aim of providing both choice and control over arrangements. Creating a safe environment and providing support to children is an integral part of Bawso services. In 2019/20 we accommodated 126 women and 113 children. Over 94% of service users reported that, since accessing the service, they felt safer and that both their lives and their children lives had improved.

2.1.3 Support for women at high risk of homicide (Independent Domestic Violence Advocate Service - IDVA)

Highly trained, specialist workers provide outreach support to victims who are most at risk of homicide. In partnership with a range of agencies they address practical steps to protect victims and their children and identify longer-term solutions. In 2019/20 we supported 839 high-risk victims. Over 78% of women reported feeling safer and being witness to a reduction in the escalation and severity of abuse.

2.1.4 Services for victims of Human Trafficking and Modern Slavery

People can be trafficked into the UK for many different forms of exploitation such as forced prostitution, forced labour, forced criminality, domestic servitude, and forced marriage. We run the only supported housing provision (four safe houses) and an outreach project for female and male victims of human trafficking and modern slavery in Wales. We provide practical and emotional support. This includes support with legal proceedings, access psychotherapy services and pregnancy-related support, integration into the local community, and acquiring life skills. We have been combating Human Trafficking in Wales for ten years. In 2019/20, we supported 250 individuals. We led the establishment of the Care Pathway for victims in Wales and co-ordinate Human Trafficking Multi-Agency Risk Assessment Conferences where we share information with the Police and other agencies. We are an active member of Welsh Government's Anti-Human Trafficking and Modern-day Slavery Leadership Group.

2.1.5 Services for women and families affected by Female Genital Mutilation (FGM), Forced Marriage (FM) and Honour Based Violence (HBV)

We are the leading organisation in Wales providing services to BAME women and families affected by FGM, FM and HBV. We provide one-to-one specialist, holistic and culturally competent support and advocacy that meet the physical, emotional and mental health needs of BAME women and girls. We work very closely with Children's Services to protect children at risk. We also run support peer-groups for survivors. Bawso Co-Chairs the Welsh Government All Wales HBV Leadership Group. Through our activities during the year we reached out to over 1,800 individuals.

2.2 Prevention of re-victimisation: Recovery and Empowerment Services

Recovery and empowerment services are critically important for victims from minority ethnic backgrounds and migrant and foreign-born women. This may be the first time in their lives that they have a chance to articulate their needs, manage their own finances, or live independently from an abusive partner, family or controller. They invariably have very limited support networks to reply on. They may not be able to access other vital services such as mental health services due to stigma and fear. In order to address these needs we offer individual and group-based services to help women recover from trauma. We also offer peer-support and empowerment groups that help women make sense of their experiences and understand what their human rights are. We provide opportunities for service users to regain or reshape their sense of self and capabilities. For example, by encouraging women to get involved in the running of the organisation, from taking part in recruitment panels and focus groups to design new services and evaluate current ones. For those women who do not feel able to take part we offer a range of empowerment courses to build their confidence and assertiveness.

2.3 Primary Prevention of Violence Against Women

We strive to contribute to ending all forms of violence and abuse. To this end we raise awareness of all forms of Violence Against Women through a range of events and campaigns. We also work to change attitudes amongst communities and build the capacity of other service providers to respond to the needs of BAME victims.

2.3.1 Changing attitudes within BAME Communities

We work to change attitudes within communities that traditionally practice Female Genital Mutilation, Forced Marriage, and Honour Based Violence. Our non-divisive engagement strategies help communities understand that they can preserve positive aspects of their culture while discarding harmful practices. We train community members to become advocates for change and equip young people with tools to keep safe from violence. As a result communities are more aware of relevant legislation and of the risks of harmful traditional practices and more confident to reject them as part of their identity and speak out against them.

2.3.2 Training for frontline workers in public services

People from minority ethnic backgrounds often report a lack of understanding of their needs by statutory and voluntary services. They also experience prejudice and judgmental attitudes. At the same time professionals tell us that they need to understand the specific needs of BAME clients and have appropriate tools to support them. We offer training and advice to practitioners in the Health and Education sector, Police, Social Services, Local Authorities and third sector organisations. One example is the IRIS Project. Specialist Advocate Educators provide training and tailored consultancy to GP practice staff and act as a single point of contact to accept referrals from GPs. This is making a real difference to victims of domestic abuse: for the first time in their lives women who have been living in fear finally receive the support they so desperately need. Last year, we received 170 referrals from the surgeries we trained. This is in stark contrast to the two referrals received the year before the start of the project.

Strategic report

4.0 FINANCIAL REVIEW

Bawso has faced significant challenges in the past few years in light of the financial climate whereby funding has reduced in contrast to rising expenditure. Bawso has been successful in maintaining a good working relationship with funders and have attracted new projects and initiatives. However, Bawso recognises that in order to continue the vital work throughout Wales the financial position and income needs to be continually reviewed and robust financial information and reassurance arrangement applied to our current and to potential working partnerships.

Bawso has always been proactive in ensuring that it actively foresees change and addresses it effectively when it arrives.

The organisation has undertaken several organisational reviews in the past in anticipation of very significant growth in the activity and size of the organisation. This has strengthened the organisational structure of the charity and ensured that key management processes are robust and effective.

Bawso is now facing the challenge of re-commissioning Supporting People Services across all projects in Wales. Accordingly, Bawso will deliver projects in collaboration with other organisations. Much of the year has been spent on building relationships with other organisations in the sector.

5.0 PLANS FOR THE FUTURE

5.1 Financial stability

Throughout 2019/2020 the Bawso Board and Management Team has spent an inordinate amount of time overseeing and shaping the financial position of the charity through very difficult circumstances. The Board appreciated that prompt responsive actions would be necessary in navigating the organisation through 2019/20 and achieving a sound financial base thereafter. Bawso is pleased to report a surplus of £94.955 at the end of the year.

The Bawso Board was well aware of the uncertainties and challenges inherent in the introduction of Regional Commissioning bodies and rightly felt that it was positioning itself appropriately to meet these challenges.

Bawso is also 'future proofing' services by working in partnership with other sectors. Bawso will continue to evidence the need and ever increasing demand for its services.

5.2 Service developments

Forward intentions are to;

- Develop Regional and pan-Wales consortia.
- Expand services for victims of FGM, Forced Marriage and Modern Slavery.
- Sustain the Domestic Abuse Accommodation and Community based services funded through Supporting People funding.

5.3 COVID-19 Pandemic

At the onset of COVID-19 Bawso undertook a comprehensive Risk Assessment exercise around every facet of the organisation and services. The biggest impact has been the sudden increase in operational costs. Bawso has been financially fragile for the last three years and we entered lockdown uncertain of how we would manage the financial impact and keep afloat in the future. We focussed on increasing funding and keeping service users and staff safe with the understanding that the virus was spreading rapidly and we had to hit the ground running and use scarce resources very carefully to meet unexpected and unplanned costs. We were required to adjust quickly and redirect human and financial resources to realign our governance and our core operations to remote working and remodel services to ensure the delivery of safe, efficient and effective frontline services under COVID-19 conditions.

All our plans had to be reviewed and the focus for the organisation has had to be on continuing to deliver a safe service for the service users and to ensure that our core functions concentrate on transforming the model of support services to one of home and on-line working in order to protect staff and survivors. New operational procedures and protocols have been quickly devised together with all the necessary HR responsibilities to ensure the seamless transfer to new arrangements designed to meet such unexpected challenges. All staff now work from home using network facilities and video platforms for the provision of direct support to survivors, for internal management and staff support and supervision, and for external communications with government, funders and service delivery partners. Where critical intervention is required with a survivor one-to-one support in accordance with social distancing advice is delivered by Support staff using PPE.

1. General information

The charity is a public benefit entity and a private company limited by guarantee, registered in England and Wales and a registered charity in England and Wales. The address of the registered office is Clarence House, Clarence Road, Cardiff, CF10 5FB, Wales.

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Companies Act 2006.

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling and rounded to the nearest pound, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

The Covid–19 pandemic has had a major impact on the UK in very many ways. The charity has taken all the necessary steps to allow it to operate.

Consolidation

The charity is not required to prepare consolidated accounts in accordance with the Charities Act 2011, and has taken advantage of the option not to prepare consolidated financial statements contained in Section 398 of the Companies Act 2006 on the basis that the charity and its subsidiary undertakings comprise a small group.

Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported. These estimates and judgements are continually reviewed and are based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Fund accounting

The charity maintains a general unrestricted fund which represents funds which are expendable at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objects of the charity. Such funds may be held in order to finance both working capital and capital investment.

Restricted funds have been provided to the charity for particular purposes, and it is the policy of the board of trustees to carefully monitor the application of those funds in accordance with the restrictions placed upon them.

Any proposed transfer between funds would be considered on the particular circumstances.

3. Accounting policies (continued)

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

Income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.

Legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.

Income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.

Income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

Expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, non-charitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.

Expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.

Other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

Income tax

As a registered charity, the charity is exempt from income tax to the extent that its income and gains are applicable to charitable purposes only. Value added tax is not recoverable by the charity and is therefore included in the relevant costs in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Tangible assets

All fixed assets are initially recorded at cost.

Investments

Unlisted equity investments are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently measured at fair value. If fair value cannot be reliably measured, assets are measured at cost less impairment.

Impairment of fixed assets

A review for indicators of impairment is carried out at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated where such indicators exist. Where the carrying value exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is impaired accordingly. Prior impairments are also reviewed for possible reversal at each reporting date.

Financial instruments

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised only when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at the amount receivable or payable including any related transaction costs, unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where it is recognised at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Current assets and current liabilities are subsequently measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received and not discounted.

Defined contribution plans

Contributions to defined contribution plans are recognised as an expense in the period in which the related service is provided.

Limited by quarantee

The charity is limited by guarantee, each member having undertaken to contribute such amounts not exceeding one pound as may be required in the event of the company being wound up whilst he or she is still a member or within one year thereafter.

There are 41 members of the company (2019: 47 members).

Forced Marriage Project

The Forced Marriage Project was funded for 3 years by the Esmee Fairbairn Foundation to reduce the risk to girls and young women being forced into marriage in South Wales. This raising awareness initiative enhanced the knowledge and understanding of BME communities, professionals and young people in schools of the impact of Forced Marriage and how to challenge it. The project funded a part time support worker and activity cost which came to an end in October 2019.

In January 2019, Bawso has also been awarded 12 months funding by the Home Offices; Building a Stronger Britain Together Programme to deliver awareness activities across Wales. The project targeted young people, parents, new arrivals, schools, community members of different generation's and one to one support for those at risk or victims of Forced Marriage. The project funded 2.5 FTE support workers including activity cost which came to an end in January 2020.

Female Genital Mutilation Project (FGM)

Esmée Fairbairn Foundation also funded Bawso for a 3 year period for community-based Preventative work on FGM in South Wales. The project is working closely with the social services due to the increased number of safeguarding referrals.

The Home Office; Building a Stronger Britain Together Programme also funds the FGM Project to run the same activities as the Forced Marriage Project across Wales. The project funded 2.5 FTE support workers including activity cost which came to an end in January 2020.

Waterloo Foundation also funded a 12 months project from July 2019 to raise awareness and provided one to one support in the North and West Wales area. The project funded 2 part time workers.

BME Safeguarding Project

Swansea Social Services funded a support worker to work alongside the social services to raise awareness of harmful traditional practices and increase the rate of reporting.

Independent Domestic Violence Advocates Project (IDVA)

Police & Crime Commissioners and the Community Safety Partnerships fund the IDVA projects. The IDVA grant is used to fund the employment of Independent Domestic Violence Advisers to support high risk service users through the Specialist Violence Court (SDVC) Service. The project runs in the North Wales region.

Identification and Referral to Improve Safety Project (IRIS)

The IRIS project is in partnership with Cardiff and the Vale University Health Board and Cardiff Women Aid. IRIS provides domestic abuse training, support and referral programme for GP surgeries. The training is delivered by Advocators/ Educators (AE) and Clinical Leads. Bawso is responsible for managing and overseeing AE's work and deliver IRIS Programme across surgeries in selected cluster in Cardiff and Vale of Glamorgan.

Human Trafficking & Modern Slavery MARAC Coordinator

South Wales Police, Gwent Police and Dyfedd Powys Police in partnership funded the project - Tarian ROCU. The project funded a full time coordinator. Funding has been extended for another 2 years from November 2019.

The aim of the Human Trafficking & Modern Slavery MARAC is to provide a structure where professionals can refer known or suspected victims of human trafficking/modern slavery and share information where there may be suspicious activity.

TILI Project

This project is a 2 year partnership with Hestia and Crisis and funded by the Tampon Tax Fund. The project provides one to one support to victims of Modern Slavery who are outside the NRM process.

Asylum and Refugee Project

The Welsh Governments Inclusion Fund has granted a 3 year funding to provide community based raise awareness about all forms of Violence Against Women to Asylum Seekers and Refugees across Wales. The project also provides training sessions to professionals about the experience of Asylum Seekers and Refugees around FGM, Forced Marriage and Human Trafficking. The project funds a part time support worker and cost of running the awareness sessions and training to professionals.

Well Being and Empowerment Project

The Awards for All grant supports a group of BME women affected by FGM, Domestic Abuse, Modern Slavery, and Forced Marriage & Sexual Violence. The funding mainly supports the costs around group gym and cooking activities ie travel, childcare, refreshment and venue costs. This project came to an end at the end of this financial year.

South Wales PCC Victim Fund, funded a programme to deliver the Recovery Toolkit, MIME workshops and bespoke sessions to BME women affected by FGM, Domestic Abuse, Modern Slavery, and Forced Marriage & Sexual Violence.
