REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2019

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2019. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The Objects for which the Company is established are, as set out in the Memorandum of Association:-

"The relief of poverty and sickness amongst people who are homeless or have no permanent accommodation by the provision, according to Christian principles and faith, of healthcare, counselling and other support services."

The work at Beacon House started in August 1996. A team of paid and volunteer workers carry out the functions of the Charity. All staff are committed to the principles of the Christian faith in accordance with Charity policy. At the year end there were 12 employed staff, and 48 volunteers working at Beacon House. The work was also supported by students on placement from Essex University, Anglia Ruskin University, University of Suffolk and Colchester Institute.

During the year Beacon House moved its day centre to Crouch Street, in the centre of Colchester. The premises are very conveniently located and the services now operate on a single floor which is an efficient environment and enhances the services provided. More users are visiting the centre on a daily basis which demonstrates the success of the relocation.

Beacon House provides a very large range of services from its day centre which are tailored to the needs of each individual. Healthcare services include a drop-in clinic, vaccinations, consultations with nurses, sexual health services and needle exchange. Those without a permanent home also receive considerable welfare services including a hot lunch and other food and drink, a barber, foot care, postal services, use of computer, showering facilities, toiletries, laundering and clothing as well as help with alcoholism and stopping smoking.

The homeless and those at risk of homelessness also receive help with their personal development to promote their opportunities in life including life skills training, occupational therapy which includes an art and activity room, housing options advice, cooking and home management training, technology skills training and benefit applications. Clients receive a range of therapeutic activities to build skills and confidence. Full health and wellbeing assessments are also provided and, using the Outcomes Star programme, we work to move our clients forward into healthier and more stable lives by providing support services in our centre or referring them to partner agencies.

The agencies and organisations that work in partnership with Beacon House this year included The Terence Higgins Trust, Colchester Emergency Night Shelter, NACRO, Emmaus, Sanctuary Housing, Open Road, Alcoholics Anonymous, Open Door, Community Mental Health Team, Abberton Rural Project, STaRS, Phoenix Alcohol Project, The Princes Trust, National Careers Service, Essex Law Clinic, Colchester Food Bank, Adult Social Services, Provide, St Helena Hospice, ACL Essex, Essex Offender Services, Colchester Borough Homes, CBC Welfare Rights, and JobCentrePlus.

Beacon House also arranges accommodation for clients in conjunction with the Colin Bennett Trust. Clients may be offered places in three houses in Colchester which in total accommodate thirteen people. This is a very helpful service giving accommodation to homeless clients before they move on to more permanent accommodation with rent linked to the benefit system.

Public benefit

The directors have regard to the public benefit general guidance issued by the Charity Commission. They believe that the description of the Company's activities in this annual report evidences that those activities carry out the Company's objects for the public benefit.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

Developments in the current year

In July 2018, the day centre services were relocated from East Hill to Crouch Street. The original accommodation was proving to be less effective by the constraints of the small rooms over five floors. The new day centre is all on one ground floor, in a much more accessible building. The services are provided in an open-plan environment, with specific private spaces for medical and therapeutic care. There is greater visibility in the new centre and the design encourages people to access the full range of services on offer. The refurbishment of the building was supported by funds from Essex County Council Community Investment Fund, The Community Fund and Catalyst Charity. The design was provided by Duncan Clark and Beckett and the building work was undertaken by Hutton Construction.

In November 2018, we started the refurbishment of our old day centre on East Hill into nine self-contained flats. This refurbishment programme maximises the use of our resources, and the future use is more in keeping with the residential area, and the recent conversion of other East Hill properties back to residential use. The flats will be offered at affordable rents to people who have used Beacon House services. We own or directly manage a range of shared accommodation and individual flats in North East Essex. This accommodation is made up of supported "move on" rooms and flats for people who have been homeless. We provide support to develop financial, tenancy management and social skills to enable people to move on to more permanent housing. This accommodation is invaluable to those who do not qualify for access to supported housing but whom, nevertheless, have the need to develop their life skills. Their development is facilitated by stable accommodation give them a base from which they can "move on" to more sustainable and fulfilling lives.

We employed a second Occupational Therapist in December 2018. Service users at Beacon House require comprehensive assessment and interventions. We use effective, tailored, evidence based occupational therapy models to support our beneficiaries. Service users respond well to goal setting towards improved self-care, personal productivity and becoming involved in leisure activities. The Occupational Therapists promote health, well-being and independence through effective occupational therapy. This role is highly interactive with the wider team to deliver a holistic service within Beacon House and works with partner organisations, carers, clinicians and other practitioners to ensure the most effective support.

Beacon House has been supporting the NHS One You Programme. Designed to help people to make better choices today to have a big impact on their health. One You helps people to get healthier and feel better with free tips, tools and support. We have provided regular opportunities for our beneficiaries to move more, eat more healthily or do personal health checks to make small, practical changes that fit in with lifestyles.

We have identified that there is a gap for provision of services in the afternoon before the Night Shelter opens, and in winter this twilight zone is significant for those who have no secure housing. As the rest of the population is preparing to go home and shops, cafes and services close the homeless population feel even more isolated and marginalised. For the winter months from November to March, we opened our centre between 4pm and 6pm to offer hot food and drinks, access to computers, access to laundry and a supported social space. This work was in partnership with the One Colchester Winter Resilience Fund.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial position

The financial performance of Beacon House continues to be strong. In the year income was increased as a result of a wide range of fundraising activities and this enabled expenditure to be further increased on important services to those without a permanent home in the Colchester area.

A surplus of £23,685 was made in the year on the Unrestricted Fund. This followed surpluses in recent years which have cumulatively increased our reserves. The increase in reserves has enabled us to fund, in conjunction with the Colin Bennet Trust, the conversion of our freehold premises in East Hill, Colchester, to flats for the homeless. Expenditure on this project to the year end was £211,710.

A surplus of £82,580 was also made in the year on Restricted Funds. This arose from grants received for the refurbishment of our new day centre at Norfolk House, Crouch Street, Colchester. The refurbishment has successfully converted the premises to a lay out which efficiently provides the range of services to our clients described above. The related expenditure on the conversion will be written off Restricted Funds over the life of the lease for the premises.

At 31st March 2019 Beacon House held reserves of £332,583 in the Unrestricted Fund and £324,401 in Restricted Funds. Our policy is to retain free reserves equivalent to a minimum of six months total operating costs.

The accounts for the year ended 31st March 2019 are set out on pages 7 to 13.

Investment policy and objectives

There are no long-term investment policies due to uncertainty of our funding income. There is an aspiration to grow income and therefore this will continue to be reviewed in line with any surplus that is created.

FUTURE PLANS

Our strategic goals will provide the framework against which we will measure our performance and structure our operational planning.

We will provide a range of appropriate, quality services to support homeless people local to Colchester to lead safe, independent, and fulfilling lives by developing and delivering the new housing programme and developing and delivering a range of day centre services.

We will work with others to improve support to homeless people local to Colchester and increase awareness of their circumstances by increasing and developing shared service delivery with statutory services and developing the Day Centre as a hub for other partners.

Beacon House has converted its former day centre premises in East Hill, Colchester to nine flats for homeless individuals and couples. The flats were completed in Spring 2019 and have been occupied after the year end. This initiative significantly extends the accommodation we are offering to local people without permanent homes. Rents are generally linked to the benefit system. We were able to complete the major building conversion because of our success in fundraising in recent years and by working in conjunction with the Colin Bennett Trust.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Beacon House Ministries is a registered charity and is incorporated as a company limited by guarantee. As set out in our Articles of Association the Company is managed by its Directors who determine its functions and policy and act as charity Trustees. Management and direction of routine operations, external relations and income generation is undertaken by the Chief Executive Officer, Vivienne Wiggins.

The trustees regularly review the skills, aptitudes and experiences that are needed to ensure there is good governance. When vacancies occur, or skills gaps are identified the trustees approach individuals from the community who are known to meet the necessary criteria. There is an application and assessment process, after which new trustees are invited to join the board.

The trustees meet bi-monthly with the CEO to manage strategic and operational aspects of the charity. Occasional sub-committees are created specifically to manage identified areas that need more in depth consideration. The sub-committees report back to the main board, and are dissolved when the issue has been completed. The trustees are required to visit the charity regularly to keep strong and meaningful relationships with team members.

RISK MANAGEMENT

The directors actively review the major risks which the Charity faces at every board meeting and confirm that systems have been established to enable regular reports to be produced so that the necessary steps can be taken to lessen any risks.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2019

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, with the exception of Investments, which are valued at market value.

Financial reporting standard 102 - reduced disclosure exemptions

The charity has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemptions in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by FRS 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland':

- the requirements of Section 7 Statement of Cash Flows;
- the requirement of Section 3 Financial Statement Presentation paragraph 3.17(d).

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

Voluntary income is received by way of grants and donations and is included in full when receivable. Gift Aid recoveries on donations from individuals are recognised in the same period as the donation.

Unrestricted grants, where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant. Restricted grants are recognised on receipt except to the extent where the grant is time related to the delivery of a service in a future period it is carried forward as deferred income.

Donated goods are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified, and relates to food etc donated from supermarkets. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included in these financial statements.

Investment income is included when receivable.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Expenditure includes non-recoverable VAT, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charitable company; this includes the preparation and examination of this annual report and financial statements, and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity.

Support costs are allocated to charitable activities based on floor space and estimated resources used.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - CONTINUED FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2019

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Freehold property - 2% on cost
Leasehold property - Period of lease
Plant and machinery - 20% on cost
Fixtures and fittings - 20% on cost
Computer equipment - Straight line over 3 years

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

The pension cost is allocated between activities and between restricted and unrestricted funds based on the analysis of the employee cost to which it relates.

Investments

Investments are treated as current asset investments where they are held in readily accessible funds.

Listed investments are stated at market value less provision for any permanent diminution in value. The market value of listed investments is based on the closing middle market price on the London Stock Exchange. The SOFA includes the net gains and losses arising on revaluations and disposals throughout the year.

All the £93,879 Restricted Fund grants received in the three years to 31 March 1999 for the purchase of 90 East Hill, Colchester, were spent on establishing this base for Beacon House. All the £251,375 Restricted Fund grants received in the three years to 31 March 2004 for the purchase, refurbishment and adaptation of 91 East Hill, Colchester, were spent on creating an enlarged Beacon House. These grants are being written off in line with the amortisation of expenditure on those properties.

Grants of £87,200 have been received to Improve the leased property at Norfolk House. These are ongoing and during the year £82,406 had been spent on these improvements. The costs are being written off in line with the amortisation of the expenditure.
