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#### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2020

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2020. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Objectives and aims

As per the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the Objects for which the Company was established are:

'The relief of poverty and sickness amongst people who are homeless, or have no permanent accommodation, by the provision, according to Christian principles and faith, of healthcare, counselling and other support services'.

The work at Beacon House started in August 1996 and a team of paid and volunteer workers carry out the functions of the Charity. All staff are committed to the principles of the Christian faith in accordance with the Charity policy. At the end of the year there were 13 employed staff and 43 volunteers working at Beacon House. The work was also supported by student placements from Colchester Institute and Essex, Suffolk, and Anglia Ruskin Universities.

The Day Centre and Primary Health Centre are conveniently located on Crouch Street and offer a very wide range of services, tailored to each individual. Healthcare services include two drop-in clinics, vaccinations, nurse consultations, sexual health services, cervical screening and needle exchange. Welfare services include breakfast and hot lunch, tea and coffee throughout the day, a barber, foot care, postal services, a computer suite, showers, laundry facilities, recycled clothing and help with alcoholism and smoking cessation.

Given that our aim is to walk with and empower our Service Users on the journey towards self-fulfilled and independent lives, we provide help with their personal development which includes life skill training and occupational therapy (both internal and external activities). Full health and wellbeing assessments are also provided using the nationally recognised Outcomes Star programme and this enables our Service Users to move forward into healthier and more stable lives.

Beacon House also works very closely with a number of other organisations including Colchester Emergency Night Shelter, Emmaus, NACRO, Sanctuary Housing, Essex Law Clinic, Terrence Higgins Trust, Colchester Food Bank, Phoenix Futures, Alcoholics Anonymous, ACL Essex, Colchester Borough Homes, Open Door, STaRS and Job CentrePlus.

Through our own properties, and those we manage on behalf of the Colin Bennett Housing Trust, we provide 'move on' accommodation for up to 21 people.

#### **Public benefit**

The directors have regard to the public benefit general guidance issued by the Charity Commission. They believe that the description of the Company's activities in this annual report evidences that those activities carry out the Company's objects for the public benefit.

#### **ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE**

Charitable activities

Developments in the Current Year

Having moved to the Crouch Street premises in the latter part of 2018, which had the potential to significantly improve the effectiveness of our service offering, much of 2019/2020 was spent ensuring that the improvement was not simply theoretical but actually translated into providing an improved service to our clients by constantly reviewing and refining everything we did.

Feedback from Service Users was consistently sought (via both the suggestion box and a regular Service Users forum) in order to verify that any changes made were not simply what staff/management believed would work but did in fact improve the end-user experience. Overall, the feedback was extremely positive but where minor amendments were suggested, and deemed to be positive for the Service User group as a whole, these were implemented.

Occupational Therapy remains a vital part of the Beacon House strategy and the continued use of tailored, effective, evidence based occupational therapy models has made a significant positive difference in the lives of many of our Service Users. External activities, such as football and basketball, have been expanded with very positive results, and the occupational therapy team are constantly working on ways to increase both the scale and the effectiveness of the service.

Work on the nine self-contained flats in East Hill was completed and all are now occupied. Together with the twelve places in the other three houses we manage, these provide twenty one 'move-on' accommodations which are an integral part of the Beacon Strategy - the last step before our Service Users move on into their own permanent commercial tenancies. How long Service Users spend in our move-on accommodation varies according to the individual but all are offered the same level of support through the Occupational Therapists to develop their social, financial and personal skills that will enable that journey to be completed.

Fundamental to Beacon House are our nurses who, through the two clinics, provide a service that is universally recognised to be outstanding - so much so that it is being promoted by the NHS as a model to be copied elsewhere. Sadly, many of our Service Users are deemed 'too difficult' for mainstream surgeries and without the Beacon House clinics, they would struggle to obtain the medical intervention they need. It is testament to the ability and commitment of our nurses that 85% of the patients we see have their needs met entirely by Beacon House and only 15% require further referral. Cervical screening was introduced as a brand-new service during the year - driven by the realisation that most of our female Service Users do not undertake this routinely and many are at risk. Evidence of the need was almost instantaneous with four of our patients requiring immediate specialist medical attention based on the results of our testing.

The premises at Beacon House represent a superb facility, but one that has historically been somewhat underused. Opening during the twilight hours of the winter months November to March was introduced last year and that was expanded to include opening every Saturday. Our vision is to be a 365-day operation but that will be a staged process as both funding and staffing allow.

No report on 2019/2020 would be complete without comment on Covid 19, which manifested itself right at the end of the year and completely changed our operation. We were more fortunate than many organisations in that although we could no longer allow people inside, our location meant that we could safely continue to offer our services of food/drink, medical attention and assistance with applications for housing/benefits/employment, through the windows on to the very wide pavement of Balkerne Hill.

For safety reasons we stood down all our volunteers, and a couple of staff members who required shielding, but God has been very good to us and we lost no staff due to Covid and have been able to operate all the way through providing vital services to our very vulnerable client group.

Beacon House is not an island and it would be impossible for us to carry out our work effectively without the partnership between ourselves and other organisations within the Colchester and surrounding areas. If there is to be a silver lining coming out of the Covid 19 cloud, improved relationships and better collaboration with our partner organisations would be a top contender for that title and we would like to formally record our thanks to all those who have worked with us during the year, and even more so since Covid 19 came on the scene.

#### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

#### Financial position

The financial performance of Beacon House continues to be strong. In the year income was increased as a result of a wide range of work and initiatives and this enabled expenditure to be further increased in many areas on important services to those without a permanent home in the Colchester area.

A surplus before the revaluation of fixed assets of £67,783 was made in the year on the Unrestricted Fund, which was boosted by a significant legacy towards the end of the year. The Charity has made surpluses in recent years which have cumulatively increased our reserves enabling us to fund, in conjunction with the Colin Bennett Charitable Trust for the Homeless, the conversion of our freehold premises in East Hill, Colchester into nine flats for homeless and vulnerable people in Colchester. The conversion was completed in the year and the expenditure by Beacon House in this year and last year totalled £278,383.

A surplus before the revaluation of fixed assets of £49,460 was also made in the year on Restricted Funds. This included a grant of £55,186 to contribute to the building conversion costs of the East Hill flats.

At 31st March 2020 Beacon House held reserves of £364,863 in the Unrestricted Fund and £403,440 in Restricted Funds. Our policy is to retain free reserves equivalent to a minimum of six months total operating costs.

The accounts for the year ended 31st March 2020 are set out in pages 7 to 18.

#### Investment policy and objectives

There are no long-term investment policies due to the uncertainty of our funding income. There is an aspiration to grow income and to continue to grow our services, and this policy will continue to be reviewed.

#### **FUTURE PLANS**

Henry Ford once said, 'If you do what you've always done, you'll get what you've always got', which is absolutely fine if the outcome is both what was desired and is entirely appropriate. However, Covid has changed the landscape considerably and Beacon House needs to flex its operations accordingly to ensure that future outcomes match future needs. For example, with many rough sleepers having been housed by the council, and likely to be provided with such housing on an ongoing basis, we will need to provide a significantly higher level of support outside of the Day Centre than currently in order to help ensure those people maintain their new tenancies.

Our future strategy also includes opening for longer hours on the existing days and adding weekends. Longer hours and extra days are fully dependent on funding/staff/volunteers and active steps are being taken to increase all three. This strategy is predicated on the fact that the need does not disappear at weekends (and there is as a strong argument to say it actually increases), so 365-day opening is seen as a key goal for Beacon House.

From a clinical perspective, we intend to engage the services of a GP on a part time basis to provide both mentoring and support to our two nurses.

We are delighted to announce that Bishop Roger Morris, the Bishop of Colchester, has come on board as our new Patron and will have an active involvement in the Charity going forward.

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Beacon House is a registered charity and is a company limited by guarantee. As set out in our Memorandum and Articles of Association the Company is managed by its Directors, who determine its functions and policy and act as charity Trustees. Management and direction of routine operations, external relations and income generation is undertaken by the Chief Executive Officer, Steve Brown.

The trustees regularly review the skills, aptitudes and experiences that are required to ensure there is good governance. When vacancies occur, or skill gaps are identified the trustees approach individuals from the community who are known to meet the necessary criteria. There is an application and assessment process, after which new trustees are invited to join the board.

The trustees meet bi-monthly with the CEO to manage the strategic and operational aspects of the charity. Sub-committees, who report back to the main board, are formed where more in depth consideration of specific subjects is required. Trustees are required to visit the charity regularly in order to maintain strong and meaningful relationships with team members.

#### **RISK MANAGEMENT**

The directors regularly review the major risks which the Charity faces and confirm that systems are in place to mitigate such risks, supported by regular reporting.

#### Independent examiner's report to the trustees of Beacon House Ministries ('the Company')

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2020

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, with the exception of Investments, which are valued at market value.

#### Financial reporting standard 102 - reduced disclosure exemptions

The charitable company has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemptions in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by FRS 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland':

- the requirements of Section 7 Statement of Cash Flows;
- the requirement of Section 3 Financial Statement Presentation paragraph 3.17(d).

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

Voluntary income is received by way of grants and donations and is included in full when receivable. Gift Aid recoveries on donations from individuals are recognised in the same period as the donation.

Unrestricted grants, where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant. Restricted grants are recognised on receipt except to the extent where the grant is time related to the delivery of a service in a future period it is carried forward as deferred income.

Donated goods are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified, and relates to food etc donated from supermarkets. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included in these financial statements.

Investment income is included when receivable.

#### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Expenditure includes non-recoverable VAT, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charitable company; this includes the preparation and examination of this annual report and financial statements, and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity.

Support costs are allocated to charitable activities based on floor space and estimated resources used.

Freehold property consists of residential properties that have been converted by the charity from commercial use and are included at valuation at the time of the conversion. Depreciation is not provided on the freehold buildings as they are required to be maintained to a high standard, resulting in a residual value which would make any depreciation charges immaterial.

#### **Taxation**

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

#### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

#### Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

The pension cost is allocated between activities and between restricted and unrestricted funds based on the analysis of the employee cost to which it relates.

#### Investments

Investments are treated as current asset investments where they are held in readily accessible funds.

Listed investments are stated at market value less provision for any permanent diminution in value. The market value of listed investments is based on the closing middle market price on the London Stock Exchange. The SOFA includes the net gains and losses arising on revaluations and disposals throughout the year.

#### **Property**

All the £93,879 Restricted Fund grants received in the three years to 31 March 1999 for the purchase of 90 East Hill, Colchester, were spent on establishing this base for Beacon House. All the £251,375 Restricted Fund grants received in the three years to 31 March 2004 for the purchase, refurbishment and adaptation of 91 East Hill, Colchester, were spent on creating an enlarged Beacon House. A grant of £55,186 was received during the year from the Department of Health and Social Care for the conversion of the the Freehold property at East Hill and was spent during the year. These grants are being written off in line with the amortisation of expenditure on those properties.

Grants of £87,200 had been received during the year to 31 March 2019 to Improve the leased property at Norfolk House. Of this £82,406 had been spent during the year to 31 March 2019 with the remainder spent during the year on these improvements. The costs are being written off in line with the amortisation of the expenditure.
