The trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 31 March 2016.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the charity's governing document, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)"

Objectives and activities

The purpose of Bryncynon Community Revival Strategy is set out in the Mission Statement and states:

The charity's objects are to provide facilities in the interests of the advancement of education and social welfare with the purpose of improving the condition and quality of life for residents of Bryncynon in the Rhondda Cynon Taff area.

Public benefit

During the year the trustees have paid due regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission with regards to public benefit in deciding which activities the Charity needs to undertake. Our main activities and beneficiaries of those activities are described below. All of our charitable activities focus on helping the community and serves to further our charitable purposes for public benefit.

During the period 2015-2016, the organisation's objectives were as follows:

Achievements and performance

This year has seen the finalising of the restructure of staff at Bryncynon Community Revival Strategy Ltd, reducing the staffing levels to fit in with the level of funding and income generated for the organisation. This has resulted in the reduction of activities taking place in the charity, allowing the organisation to focus on delivering it's key services effectively and well.

The reduction in staffing and operational costs has allowed the organisation to take a strong control on it's finances and secure the future of the organisation.

Bryncynon Community Revival Strategy has continued to deliver successfully its Flying Start provision through 3 centres, as part of a good quality, well respected and essential service for the local community. This is complimented well with our Play Scheme situated at the Feel Good Factory.

In conjunction with Communities First and Children in Need, Bryncynon Community Revival Strategy has continued to provide a Youth Provision to the local community, based at both our own Youth Club centre, as well in sites at Perthcelyn and Penrhiwceiber.

The Feel Good Factory continues to prove to be an essential hub in the community, providing a range of services for the local community including a number of Community First provisions, community nurse services and a community café. The Café has re-launched after a refurbishment, providing an excellent meeting space for local residents. Providing a buffet service to local businesses has continued to grow under a new, improved reputation.

Financial review

Results for the year

Income for the year was £311,495, down from £576,265 in 2015. Expenditure for the year was £520,603, down from £720,318 in 2015. The overall deficit for the year was £209,107.

Reserves policy

It is the policy of the Charity to generate and maintain funds in order that it is able to maintain its operations for the foreseeable future, aiming for a minimum of 12 months full operating costs in reserves. Unrestricted funds are generated in order to cover expenditure not covered by other specific grants and any short term funding shortfalls which may occur from time to time.

The free reserves of the Charity at 31 March 2016 (unrestricted reserves less fixed assets, investments properties and designated funds) amounted to £52,806 (2015: £72,057).

Principle funding sources

The principle funding sources of Bryncynon Community Revival Strategy Ltd for the year ended 31 March 2016 are Flying Start funding; Communities First funding and a Children In Need grant.

Investment policy and objectives

The Charity is taking advice on the most appropriate policy for investing surplus funds which may arise from time to time and consider that an interest bearing deposit account is suitable for holding such funds. All projects have an exit strategy and there is a continual review and search for further funding for sustainability eventually leading to less grant dependency.

The trustees are responsible for safeguarding the charity's assets and ensuring their proper application in accordance with charity law and hence taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud, error and other irregularities.

Structure, governance and management

Governing document

The Charity is controlled by its governing document, Memorandum and Articles of Association, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by The Companies Act 2006. The Charity was incorporated on 8 May 1996.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Trustees serve for a 3-year appointment and can be re-elected for further terms. They are elected at the AGM of through a formal process of invitation and selection throughout the year.

In support of the above, regular updates are given at the monthly trustees meetings or as and when required.

Organisation structure

There is a board of 3 trustees who are also directors. The board of directors, led by the chair of the board, manage the strategic objectives. Empower Support for the Voluntary Sector have been appointed to assume management and operational responsibilities for the organisation, supported by the management team in the charity.

The trustees have considered the principal risks of the charity, and have concluded a key risk going forward is the securing of future funding.

Future Developments

Having completed the restructure of Bryncynon Community Revival Strategy Ltd, the main focus of the organisation is to ensure the sustainability of the charity for the foreseeable future. The significant losses the charity has previously faced has now come to end and our goal is now to continue to generate income and provide a quality provision against the funding we currently receive.

The board has brought in Empower Support for the Voluntary Sector to act as operational management for the organisation on behalf of the board and support the organisation in achieving its goals and ensuring its sustainability.

Key to the organisation's success is the Feel Good Factory and we plan to continue to develop this centre as both a vital community hub and as a source of generating unrestricted income. The newly refurbished Café is going from strength to strength and will be a vital contributor to generating income for the charity.

Marketing of the Feel Good Factory and it's Café are a big focus for the organisation and we are continuing to improve marketing material, both in print and online.

With a much smaller board than in previous years, another key drive for the organisation is increasing the number of board members, with key skills that can help the charity develop over the coming years. Relationships with key partners and stakeholders is a vital function our board will look to develop over the coming year.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2016

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

Bryncynon Community Revival Strategy Limited is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is The Feel Good Factory, Abercynon Road, Ynysboeth, MOUNTAIN ASH, Rhondda Cynon Taff, CF45 4XZ, UK.

1.1 Accounting convention

These accounts have been prepared in accordance with FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" ("FRS 102"), "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" the Statement of Recommended Practice for charities applying FRS 102, the Companies Act 2006 and UK Generally Accepted Accounting Practice as it applies from 1 January 2015. The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The accounts are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention, modified to include the revaluation of freehold properties and to include investment properties and certain financial instruments at fair value. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the accounts, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the charity continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the accounts.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives unless the funds have been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the accounts.

Endowment funds are subject to specific conditions by donors that the capital must be maintained by the charity.

1.4 Incoming resources

Income is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Legacies are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the charity has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known, and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

Turnover is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and represents amounts receivable for goods and services provided in the normal course of business, net of discounts, VAT and other sales related taxes.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2016

1 Accounting policies (Continued)

1.5 Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the Charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the Charity and include audit fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the Charity.

All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the Statement of Financial Activities on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly; others are apportioned on an appropriate basis.

1.6 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost or valuation, net of depreciation and any impairment losses.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

Freehold land and buildings

2% on cost

Plant and equipment

25% reducing balance

The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying value of the asset, and is recognised in net income/(expenditure) for the year.

Fixed asset additions costing less than £900 are not capitalised.

1.7 Impairment of fixed assets

At each reporting end date, the charity reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2016

1 Accounting policies (Continued)

Recoverable amount is the higher of fair value less costs to sell and value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset for which the estimates of future cash flows have not been adjusted.

If the recoverable amount of an asset is estimated to be less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount of the asset is reduced to its recoverable amount. An impairment loss is recognised immediately in income/ (expenditure for the year, unless the relevant asset is carried at a revalued amount, in which case the impairment loss is treated as a revaluation decrease.

Recognised impairment losses are reversed if, and only if, the reasons for the impairment loss have ceased to apply. Where an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but so that the increased carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset in prior years. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised immediately, unless the relevant asset is carried in at a revalued amount, in which case the reversal of the impairment loss is treated as a revaluation increase.

1.8 Stocks

Stocks are stated at the lower of cost and estimated selling price less costs to complete and sell. Cost comprises direct materials and, where applicable, direct labour costs and those overheads that have been incurred in bringing the stocks to their present location and condition. Items held for distribution at no or nominal consideration are measured at cost.

Net realisable value is the estimated selling price less all estimated costs of completion and costs to be incurred in marketing, selling and distribution.

1.9 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.10 Financial instruments

The charity has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the charity's balance sheet when the charity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2016

1 Accounting policies (Continued)

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the charity's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

1.11 Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the charity is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

1.12 Retirement benefits

Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit schemes are charged as an expense as they fall due.

2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.

Contingency fund – A sum of £100,000 has been designated to cover the cost of activity for a period of 12 months should funding contributions and trading income cease from other sources.

General – The charity has a core team of administrators, including finance and HR officers, as well as caretaking, cleaning and reception staff. These are generally funded from a combination of contributions from the trading and the grant income streams. However, with no new grants confirmed as yet for the year ahead, a contingency fund of £20,000 will be set aside.

Youth – We have a small grant fund from Children in Need, which will contribute to the majority of our youth programme. A new Youth Leader is being recruited to deliver this. Should no further funding be attracted during the year we will use a contingency fund of £3,000.
