Principal activities

The company's principal activities continue to be the running of a family of churches known as Oxfordshire Community Churches (OCC) and the running of The King's School, Witney

Group structure and relationships

The Charity has a wholly owned non-charitable subsidiary, The King's Centre Limited The subsidiary carries out non-charitable trading activities to raise funds for the charity

Governing instrument

The company's activities are regulated by the Memorandum and Articles of Association. The objects of the company are

- To advance the Christian religion
- To advance education
- To relieve those who are poor, in conditions of need, hardship or distress or who are aged or sick
- To promote other charitable objects as decided by the directors from time to time

Directors' responsibilities

Company law requires the directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and the group and the incoming resources and application of resources, including the net income or expenditure, of the group for the year. In preparing these financial statements, the directors are required to

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently,
- · make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,
- state whether applicable UK accounting standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements,
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation

The directors are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and the group and to enable them to ensure that the accounts comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and the group and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Each director has taken appropriate steps to make themselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the company's auditors are aware of that information. The directors confirm that there is no relevant information that they know of and which they know the auditors are unaware of

Corporate governance

To facilitate the smooth running of the charity, the directors have established a number of sub-committees. All of these sub-committees have either a director or the company secretary among their members, and report to the directors

- Area Leadership Team Meets monthly to discuss and develop the spiritual life of the charity, and to develop and implement the charity's strategic plans
- Regional Development Team Meets monthly to assist in medium-term strategic development and management of the charity to achieve its strategic aim and objectives
- Apostolic Ministry Team Advises the Area Leadership Team on the spiritual life of the charity, and travels world-wide advising other Christian organisations
- The King's School Governors Oversee and develop Christian education through The King's School
- The King's Centre Governors Oversee and develop The King's Centre facility and operation
- Remuneration Committee Determines the remuneration policy and staff salaries

Risk management

The directors have assessed the major risks to which the charitable company may be exposed and have ensured that adequate systems are in place to mitigate those risks. These systems include Child Protection policy, Staff Management policy, Staff Handbook, Health & Safety policy, and monthly financial reporting.

Objects, objectives, and principal activities

Aims and objectives

We have come together in Oxfordshire Community Churches, as people committed to the Lord Jesus Christ, to extend God's kingdom and to share the knowledge of Christ's love in Oxfordshire and beyond. Through prayer, worship, studying the Bible, and a shared experience of the Holy Spirit, we want to know God better. We want to be a community together, serving and caring for one another. We are committed to everyone who joins us feeling part of the church family and playing an active role.

Whether or not people respond to Jesus in faith, we want to follow his example by doing good to all, both in this country and overseas, especially to those who are poor or in conditions of need, hardship or distress. We are concerned to help all people, whatever their age, race or gender. We are involved in educational work to extend Biblical understanding of and response to God and his creation in the next generation, based on our own experience of God.

Oxfordshire Community Churches is part of the Salt & Light Ministries family of churches. Oxfordshire Community Churches is also a member of the Evangelical Alliance. Both of these organisations are Christian charities that pursue similar objectives in the UK and overseas.

The King's School's vision is to produce young people who know their God and are trained to serve and influence their generation by godly attitudes and actions. The school encourages each child to achieve academically at the level of his or her own ability, recognising that each is an individual with different needs and potential.

Whilst Oxfordshire Community Churches does employ staff, it is the work of every member of Oxfordshire Community Churches, whether employed or voluntary, that helps Oxfordshire Community Churches fulfil its charitable objectives. This is achieved through 'being salt and light' amongst the people they interact with every day, by praying, by visiting the sick and others in need, in leadership of the church congregations, in administration and also classroom assistance in the school. The financial resources of the church are given by the members and their private assets and equipment are regularly used in the work of Oxfordshire Community Churches. Much of their time is given freely, without recognition, and the hours and value of that time cannot be quantified.

Oxfordshire Community Churches is a group of twelve established church congregations (Abingdon, Bicester, Carterton, Chipping Norton, Cote, Didcot, Leys, Oxford, Thame, Wantage, North Witney, West Witney) meeting in and around Oxfordshire Each local church congregation accounts separately for its own expenditure which is met from the donations and gifts it receives. The balance of the income is passed to the Area Fund to meet the pastoral and ministry expenses relating to the Area as a whole

Review of activities during the period

During the year ended 31 August 2010 the charity has sought to fulfil the calling of Christ and its charitable purposes for the public benefit as follows

1 To advance the Christian religion

Oxfordshire Community Churches has continued to develop the spiritual life of the twelve church congregations in Oxfordshire and their local communities. Each of these congregations has undertaken a variety of activities which advance the Christian religion. Sunday church meetings and a variety of courses designed to address specific aspects of Christian living for all ages have been available to all and open to the wider community without charge. The Alpha and Journeys courses are two examples that have been used widely. Each church also engages in community projects including a wide variety of initiatives for children and young people.

Oxfordshire Community Churches has sought to continue to plant new churches with work continuing in Moreton-in-Marsh, The Wychwoods, Banbury and Kidlington

Oxfordshire Community Churches is also committed to extending Biblical understanding of and response to God by reaching out to children in the many schools across Oxfordshire. This was done through various employed and voluntary schools workers. They have given lessons and run assemblies, lunch clubs and after-school clubs.

Smaller regional gatherings of churches have continued, initiating new activities and strengthening our congregations and local evangelistic work. Significant work has been undertaken to consider how these regional groups can increase our effectiveness as a charity and streamline our corporate governance.

Various pastors travelled overseas in order to teach, advise and support churches, missionaries, and Bible colleges. These trips were undertaken at a cost of £23,632 to Oxfordshire Community Churches and without charge to those we visit. Nations visited include Belgium, Canada, France, Holland, Sweden and Switzerland and those nations listed below in point 3.

The members of the churches have consistently been applying the principles of church life, as outlined in the New Testament, in the places where they live and work and by impacting social attitudes in wider national society. This is a very significant part of the purpose of the churches and much of it is done without publicity and the enormous amount of time spent in this way cannot be quantified.

2 To advance education

The King's School provided education for 142 pupils from the ages of 6 to 16. We have continued to run an Ofsted approved pre-school in Bicester. Stepping Stones Foundation. Unit in Witney operated for its first full year providing education for 30 children from the ages of 2½ to 5.

Work was completed on the new facilities for The King's School and Stepping Stones Foundation Unit during the autumn of 2010. This development has been completed on time and within the budget of £2,750,000. The new facility also provides an excellent facility for the North Witney Community Church and wider community use

At The King's Centre, Oxfordshire Community Churches has run training courses, e.g. The Marriage Course and Celebrate Recovery. These courses were open to all and had an impact in changed lives and strengthened relationships for those who attended

In addition, many local churches run discipleship programmes and leadership training, helping people deepen their Biblical understanding and application to everyday life

3 To relieve those who are poor, in conditions of need, hardship or distress

There has been support of individual workers, relief and development work both in the UK and overseas A total of £57,210 has been paid out from central funds, with further significant support from individual local churches, for work overseas Through these activities we have been able to help people in many nations including Burundi, China, India, Kazakhstan, Poland, Rwanda and Uganda

Whilst Oxfordshire is a generally affluent county, many of our churches are working into areas of poverty and hardship Homeless work, food banks, CAP Money courses and Street Pastors all help to alleviate these conditions. Through a subsidy of £63,602, we have been able to help The King's School and Stepping Stones offer fees assistance to families who could not otherwise afford to send their children.

4 Other activities

We have continued to make the facilities of The King's Centre available to the local community and business users. Through this activity, we have benefited our visitors and the income generated furthered our primary charitable activities.

The King's Centre Limited, the subsidiary trading company of Oxfordshire Community Churches, generated a surplus of £114,020 which was remitted to Oxfordshire Community Churches as a donation From this donation £25,000 was allocated to the Building Fund and the remainder used towards the costs of running the centre

Financial review and results for the year

Churches

Tithe and other unrestricted voluntary income through the local churches rose by £33,875 to £1,026,783, reflecting a modest recovery after the downturn in the previous year

The King's School and Stepping Stones Foundation Unit

The school's pupil numbers were down by 22, partially reflecting the transfer of the reception year group (YR) to the new Stepping Stones Foundation Unit
The combined fee and Early Years voucher income of the school and foundation unit dropped by 1% but both achieved a modest surplus for the year

The King's Centre Building Fund

The final repayment of the mortgage loan was made in September 2010

The King's School Building Fund

Whilst some of the development has been paid for through existing funds, borrowing has accrued during the development, with the final drawdown due in mid 2011 Repayments will then start

The King's Centre Limited

Our trading subsidiary, The King's Centre Limited, which hires out rooms at The King's Centre, received income of £152,608, 6% less than in the previous year. There has been a noticeable reduction in bookings from regular users, including local authorities. However, since the end of the year a group has been formed to spearhead development of the centre and its marketing.

Freehold properties

The freehold properties are included at valuation, based on their existing use, with additions in the year included at cost. The valuation amount of £3,900,000 at the start of the year represented £2,700,000 for The King's Centre, Oxford and £1,200,000 for The King's School, Witney—Additions of £2,324,669 in the year related to The King's School, Witney—The properties are being maintained in good order and, as part of on-going maintenance, the roof over part of The King's Centre was replaced during the year at a cost of £136,235, this cost is included in Resources Expended in the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities

Reserves

The majority of the charity's income is derived from school fees, regular gifts, and donations from a wide range of sources and these are forecast to cover the budgeted monthly expenditure at both Oxfordshire Community Churches and The King's School Additional offerings and the majority of the amount received in Gift Aid are designated towards the loan repayments. The reserves in the Building Fund and Gift Aid tax recovered, together with undesignated reserves, are monitored monthly and the directors ensure that short term commitments do not exceed funds available. The directors consider that a level of general reserves equivalent to one month's expenditure is adequate and not excessive for the needs of the charity. These reserves will continue to be generated over the next 3 years through allocating amounts from the main Oxfordshire Community Churches, The King's School and The King's Centre running budgets.

Restricted funds

There are a number of restricted funds which are accounted for separately. The detail for these is shown in note 15 to the accounts. Gift Aid relating to these funds is allocated accordingly.

Future plans

Medium to long-term strategy

Oxfordshire Community Churches' medium to long-term strategy continues to focus on our primary charitable activities

- Being local churches that are outwardly focused in our communities and responding to the needs of each local community
- Planting churches that follow our mission statement and so increase our geographical base
- Establish pre-schools and primary schools across Oxfordshire, so that more children can have a Christian-based education
- Continue to develop the facilities of The King's Centre, in order to serve our larger mission, and to encourage more
 external business and community use of the Centre
- Seek to reduce the outstanding mortgage debt for The King's School, on or ahead of the agreed payment schedule

Next year

During the next year we intend to

- Continue to develop smaller regional groupings of churches and workers to increase our effectiveness in the future
- Continue to develop church planting activity in Banbury, Moreton-in-Marsh and Kidlington
- Investigate the government's Free School proposal and its potential for our educational development
- Continue to work towards establishing a school in Oxford
- Commission the new building for The King's School and establish the school, Stepping Stones and North Witney church's use of the new facilities
- Develop community use of the new facilities at The King's School

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS for the year ended 31st August 2010

1 Accounting policies

i Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of freehold properties. The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005) issued in March 2005, applicable UK Accounting Standards and the Companies Act 2006.

The accounts consolidate the results of the charity and its wholly owned subsidiary The King's Centre Limited on a line by line basis

ii Incoming resources

Voluntary income, including donations, are accounted for when received. Any resultant Gift Aid claimed is included as part of the income for the year. The church congregations collect the tithes and offerings locally. The majority are passed to the Area fund to meet the pastoral and ministry expenses relating to the group of churches. Each local church retains an amount sufficient to cover its own church and administrative expenditure.

Other income is accounted for on a receivable basis. The value of services provided by volunteers is not incorporated in these accounts.

iii Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised when a liability is incurred, and includes irrecoverable VAT. It is allocated to the relevant cost category appropriate to the use derived from the resources

iv The King's School and Stepping Stones Foundation Unit

An amount is set aside each year from the Gift Aid claimed in order to provide subsidies for parents of children who are unable to afford the full fees. This allocation of funds is treated as income for the year of The King's School and Stepping Stones.

v Tangible fixed assets

Low cost assets, including those acquired by local church congregations, are written off on acquisition. Other fixed assets are depreciated on a straight line basis at rates estimated to write off each asset over the term of its useful life. The rates in use are as follows.

Furniture and equipment

20 - 25% per annum

Vehicles

20% per annum

Freehold land and buildings are stated at revalued amounts, with subsequent additions at cost, as set out in note 7

vi Stock

Stock is stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value

vii Fund structure

Restricted funds arise from income received where the donor is either responding to an appeal for a specific purpose or has stipulated that their donation should be used for a particular purpose

Designated funds are amounts which have been set aside at the discretion of the directors for a specific, but not legally binding, purpose

viii Pension contributions

The charity operates a defined contribution scheme for some of its employees. The charge in the statement of financial activities represents the contributions payable to the scheme in respect of the accounting period.

8 Investment in subsidiary (Charity)

The charity's wholly-owned trading subsidiary company is The King's Centre Limited, which lets out the meeting rooms at The King's Centre on a commercial basis. The charity owns the sole issued £1 share in the company, which pays all of its profits to the charity.

The turnover of The King's Centre Limited for the year ended 31 August 2010 was £152,608 (2009 £161,982), and its profit donated to the charity was £114,020 (2009 £113,812)

19 Capital commitment (Charity and Group)

In September 2009 a contract was signed with Cooper Construction Ltd to erect a new building on The King's School site in New Yatt Road, Witney—This was to enable the Senior and Primary departments to function from the same location—A separate contract for refurbishment of the existing building was signed subsequently with the same company—The building work was sufficiently complete for the start of the school year in September 2010 although work, including landscaping of grounds, continued beyond then—The expected cost of the work is approximately £2.64 million, including refurbishment and redecoration of the original building—Capital expenditure incurred in the year of £2,324,669 is included as additions to freehold property—The commitment for capital expenditure not included in these statements is approximately £226,000
