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Trustees Report

The Trustees present their report and the accounts of Teme Valley Youth Project Limited, also known as TVYP, for the year ended 31 March 2009.

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 3 October 1996 and registered as a Charity on 16 May 1997.

The Company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association.

Principal Activities

The Charity's principal activity continues to be the provision of ongoing support and information for local young people aged 14 - 25 years through Centre based and outreach services. The charity offeres a range of educational; training; social; leisure and independent living experiences.

Progress and achievements

The Charity continues to maintain, develop and co-ordinate a range of supportive initiatives, including youth activity sessions, parent support, youth and community volunteer development, vocational support and outreach services but has needed to reduce costs this year in response to unsuccessful fundraising and a changing financial climate.

Until June 2008, the Youth & Community Resource Centre at Wigmore continued to deliver a wide range of quality user-led projects that aimed to raise skills and harness potential. Projects included a varied menu of Healthy Heart activities, a youth committee trip, a Moroccan Bazaar, 20:20 sketch show and bistro night and young people entered a soap box into the Richard's Castle soap box Derby, Loss of Connexions funding made it more difficult to provide vocational support but important links with police and youth offender organisations have been maintained. The number of employees was reduced and from July to March fewer existing projects were possible. The summer Bridge Cafe sponsored by Hall Garth Charitable Settlement was a successful exception. Herefordshire Council Area Based Grant provided welcome new youth activities in the first quarter of 2009. Volunteer support has become even more valuable and volunteer retention is high. Youth volunteers enjoyed becoming mystery shoppers in an innovative pilot project in partnership with Project Link. The trustees have focussed on the tough task of reducing costs and services to survive whilst developing the Centre in such a way as to increase income generation.

Gifts in kind from local businesses and residents to support the development amounted to :

- 1,148 (donated time by tradespeople)
- 6,376 (rate relief donated by Hereford Council)
- 9,723 (value of time donated by volunteers)
- 2,687 (value of time donated by youth volunteers aged 14 to 25 years)
 - 50 (donated gifts and materials value) (this value is included in the accounts)

We are grateful for these contributions which have helped us continue with our work.

The Trustees have prioritised planning for sustainability to progress their charitable aims. We continue to optimistically plan for future exciting initiatives recognising that a difficult period is ahead. We are seeking support from funders and organisations to develop a robust new business plan to carry forward the aspirations of the young people of this rural area. We continue to work towards achievement of quality assurance through Acqua.

Risk review

The Trustees through their identified management team have continued to review internal systems and communication methods leading to policy and procedural updates. Systems are being continually assessed to ensure they mitigate those risks to which the charity is exposed. Internal risks are minimised by procedures for authorisation of all transactions and projects. The new business plan will include a risk review. The Trustees have a zero borrowing policy. Risk assessment and minimisation is embedded at all levels of project development. Incident reporting and review is encouraged as a vehicle for learning.

Responsibilities of the trustees

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company as at the balance sheet date and of its incoming resources, including income and expenditure, for the financial year. In preparing those financial statements, the trustees should follow best practice and:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- * make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and
- * follow applicable accounting standards and the Charities Statement of Recommended Practice, disclosing and explaining any departures in the financial statements; and
- * prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the company will continue on that basis.

The trustees are responsible for maintaining proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. The trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Public benefit statement

Notes to the accounts for the year ended 31 March 2009

1 Accounting policies

- a) The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (2005), the Companies Act 1985 and follow the recommendations in Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice issued in 2005.
- b) Voluntary income is received by way of donations and gifts and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included.
- c) Grants, including grants for the purchase of fixed assets, are recognised in full in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they are receivable.
- d) Other incoming resources are included when receivable.
- e) Resources expended are recognised in the period in which they incurred. Resources expended include attributable VAT which cannot be recovered.
- f) Resources expended are allocated to the particular activity where the cost relates to that activity.
- g) Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset over its estimated useful life.
- h) Unrestricted funds are bank interest, miscellaneous income and any donations or grants without specified purpose and are available as general funds.
- Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the Board for a particular purpose.
- j) Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure which meets these criteria is charged to the fund.

Hall Garth Charitable Settlement

For the establishment of the summer 2008 Bridge Café project at TVYP.

Heart Research UK

Heart Research UK supports innovative projects designed to promote heart health and to prevent or reduce the risks of heart disease in specific groups or communities. Funding delivered an exciting Healthy Heart programme matching PCT funds.

Herefordshire County Council - Area Based Grant

Funding was received to provide a three month programme of youth activities called Blink and you've missed it.

Herefordshire County Council - Youth Opportunity Fund

Funding which is applied for by groups of young people for projects and activities. This year the grant enabled participation in a Soap Box event.

Lankelly Chase Foundation

To support the salary of the projectManager/agreed lead workers over three years while TVYP develop a new business plan to become sustainable.

NLDC

The Neighbourhood Learning in Deprived Communities (NLDC) funding is to develop the infrastructure that supports learning at grass roots level and at building capacity within the voluntary and community sector. The grant was used to refurbish training areas with a new carpet.

Project Link

Project Link is a local Community Interest Company. Funding was to deliver a pilot collaborative project that would improve information, support and training to the pub trade and deliver a greater youth awareness.

To part fund Lunch 'n' Learn club, an initiative for older people.

CB & HH Taylor 1984 Trust

To part fund Lunch 'n' Learn club, an initiative for older people.

West Mercia Homes
