STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

UKCOD is incorporated as a company limited by guarantee, and is registered in the UK as a chanty (registered chanty no 1076346) UKCOD is governed by a board of volunteer trustees

UKCOD operates a number of civic and democratic websites under a single project, mySociety UKCOD has a wholly owned commercial subsidiary, mySociety Ltd, which itself has a wholly owned commercial subsidiary, Mapumental Ltd Each subsidiary is governed by its own board of directors, comprising a combination of trustees from UKCOD, executive directors and independent non-executive directors. Trustees and non-executive directors are not remunerated by any of the companies.

UKCOD employs no staff directly, but buys in labour as required from its subsidiary companies or from independent contractors

OBJECTIVES

The objectives of UKCOD are to conduct and promote research into the use and effects of information and communication technologies in the context of the operation of any body or bodies which has or have an electorate, and to disseminate the useful results of such research for the benefit of the public

Relatedly, the objectives of the mySociety project are to undertake active research, through building and reviewing the success of websites, to explore what is effective at providing simple, tangible benefits in the democratic and community aspects of people's lives, it also aims to teach the public and voluntary sectors, through demonstration, how to use technology better to help citizens

UKCOD and mySociety are both, at time of writing, going through a formal process of updating their objectives to be more relevant to the wider range of activities they now undertake

ACTIVITIES

UKCOD continued to further its chantable objects through various projects

- Continuing to operate, maintain and grow the use of the core sites WriteToThem.com, TheyWorkForYou.com, FixMyStreet.com, WhatDoTheyKnow.com.and FixMyTransport.com
- Continuing to operate, maintain and grow the use of a number of smaller sites and projects among others, Mzalendo com, HearFromYourMP com, PledgeBank com, PetitionYourCouncil com and HassleMe co uk

- Growing revenues from its subsidiaries, mySociety Ltd and Mapumental Ltd, through the establishment
 of new commercial relationships and products a dedicated Senior Consultant / Business Development
 Lead has recently been appointed to take charge of this process
- An increasing amount of international work, focused primarily on continued efforts to make the WhatDoTheyKnow (Alaveteli) and FixMyStreet codebases more accessible to re-users in other locates, and on a new strategy of building software 'components' that will help people to create parliamentary monitoring websites. Initial 'components' are
 - MapIt for the locations of administrative boundaries, like counties, regions, cities or electoral divisions
 - o Poplt for details of People, Organisations and Positions
 - SayIt for speeches and written statements
- Nurturing major grant-giving from
 - Omidyar Network continuing the pre-existing relationship, Omidyar Network supports UKCOD's work across its commercial, international and UK charitable endeavours
 - O Google org UKCOD was awarded a grant of \$1 6m over two years to provide developers with open source software 'components' UKCOD's own use of these tools will primarily be in parliamentary monitoring websites, but they will have re-use potential in many other civic apps and services. This will be coupled with an effort to promote greater knowledge and technology sharing amongst civil society groups of all kinds, especially in the accountability sector.
 - The Open Society Foundation and Hivos UKCOD had already been working, funded by these groups, for just over a year to improve and encourage international adoption of the Alaveteli platform underpinning UKCOD's WhatDoTheyKnow Freedom of Information site, and in October 2012, a second phase of this project was agreed and funded Alaveteli will now gain new features and be deployed in more jurisdictions, and is supported by a larger and stronger International Team within mySociety as a result of this grant
 - The Indigo Trust having a particular interest in UKCOD's work in parliamentary monitoring technologies, the Indigo Trust has awarded a grant of £40,000 towards the development of the platform behind the Kenyan site Mzalendo com with the intent of establishing similar sites in other countries in Africa
- With the support of all the above-mentioned major funders, building partnerships with academics both
 within and outside the UK, with the aim of specifying and commissioning research into the usage and
 impact of UKCOD's projects, and of using the results to improve and share knowledge within the sector
- Surveying users of WhatDoTheyKnow com about their experiences of using the site, to gather data for a research report similar to those already published about TheyWorkForYou com and WriteToThem com
- Participating in Google Summer of Code, an initiative to help and train the next generation of open source programmers

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

UKCOD measures its achievements and performance primarily through monitoring the traffic and usage levels of the websites it runs

Web traffic

Overall, traffic to UKCOD's sites and services (measured across all sites) is increasing, reflecting the efforts put in to increase reach through targeted advertising, community-building, media and general awareness-raising

At the beginning of the 2012-13 financial year, UKCOD set, in agreement with the Omidyar Network, a target of 5.9 million unique users across its 5 biggest sites (TheyWorkForYou, WhatDoTheyKnow, FixMyStreet, WhiteToThem and FixMyTransport) This target was met and exceeded only 9.5 months into the year. The final figure at the year end was 8.2 million unique users, with all five of the sites seeing an uplift in user numbers.

Formal targets for 2013-14 are still to be agreed at time of writing, but one goal will certainly be to achieve an improvement upon this figure

UKCOD also measures usage of its sites in transactional terms, in order to have a picture of users' more meaningful interactions with the site beyond simply viewing pages

FixMyStreet is a particular success story. The huge increase on the previous year is because a number of councils have adopted it as their official street fault reporting tool, provided to them by mySociety Ltd on a commercial basis. With the increase in web traffic, though, over the past year, it is a surprise that transaction levels for the majority of sites are lower than in the previous year. This requires attention in the coming year, as UKCOD's aim is not simply to get more people looking at its sites, but to provide simple, tangible benefits in the democratic and community aspects of people's lives - and these benefits cannot always be provided through passive viewing of websites, but may depend on taking the further step of interacting with the site in question, so it will be important to encourage transactional behaviour.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

UKCOD has excellent relationships with a number of major chantable funding bodies, including Google org, the Indigo Trust, Open Society Foundation, Hivos and Omidyar Network. Each of these funders helps to fund maintenance, support and development of UKCOD's chantable websites, and in most cases also pays for specific projects which without funding UKCOD would be unable to undertake.

Grant funding is still a substantial proportion of UKCOD's income but Omidyar's grant specifically includes an element of funding for business development. Previously, the commercial subsidiary, mySociety Ltd, has generated much of its revenues from consultancy work, but the organisation now has the R&D budget necessary to develop white label SAAS (Software As A Service) products for resale. These are not only less labour-intensive in the first place but - with ongoing contracts renewed on an annual basis - also provide recurring income for the business. Bespoke development and consultancy work will continue alongside this to provide a diverse commercial strategy.

The long-term aim, supported by the business development element of Omidyar Network's funding and the activities of mySociety Ltd, is for UKCOD to become financially self-sustaining without needing to rely on grants and donations

FINANCIAL REVIEW (continued)

The financial year 2012-13 saw mySociety Limited register a loss of £43,812 – excluding payments make to UKCOD for rights of £24,488. This represents a cost to the group of £19,324 – a considerable drop from the previous year. The financial performance reflects a significant growth in the company over the course of the first half of 2012-13. The resulting increased costs led to a significant loss in the first half of the year. The second half was, in contrast profitable, as the expanded team had bedded in and grew reserves. This performance has continued with a profitable Q1 2013-14 and forecast profitability for the 2013-14 year as a whole

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

During 2012-13 UKCOD's subsidiary mySociety Ltd began marketing 'FixMyStreet for Councils', a 'software as a service' (SAAS) product for street fault reporting to add to the petitions product already available. The success of FixMyStreet for Councils installations in driving traffic and users to the chantable site FixMyStreet com has been discussed above. These also bring in recurring revenues for the company in the form of annual support fees. Mapumental Ltd succeeded in gaining some new clients for its travel time maps and is slowly growing its reputation in the mapping sector. For mySociety Ltd 2013-14 will see a continued sales and marketing effort on such off-the-shelf software products and services, along with bespoke development as required by clients. Consultancy still forms a considerable share of generated revenues, and an additional member of staff has been hired to support this stream in future.

On the not-for-profit side UKCOD's scope and reach are continuing to grow both domestically and internationally The core stable of UK sites will be maintained and improved throughout the year, with increased development resource available to devote to priority changes. Internationalisation work on WhatDoTheyKnow (through Alaveteli) and FixMyStreet will continue, with additional work being done to make both WriteToThem and the technologies that underpin parliamentary monitoring websites better adapted for others to re-use. Encouraging re-use of software rather than reinvention of the wheel is a key part of UKCOD's international strategy, and with a dedicated international team in post it is now possible for UKCOD to reach out to partners and potential partners, spearheading and establishing collaboration on shared resources.

UKCOD also wishes to become more closely involved in the academic community that studies its field of work UKCOD's websites and users provide a valuable resource for research fieldwork and the results of such studies will undoubtedly benefit the field

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2013

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable United Kingdom accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Chanties" issued in March 2005 (SORP 2005) and the Companies Act 2006

Basis of consolidation

The Group financial statements consolidate the financial statements of UK Citizens Online Democracy and its subsidiary undertakings MySociety Limited and Mapumental Limited drawn up to 31 March 2013. The results of subsidianes acquired or sold are consolidated for the periods from or to the date on which control passed. Acquisitions are accounted for under the acquisition method.

Cash flow statement

The trustees have taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard No 1 (revised) from including a cash flow statement in the financial statements on the grounds that the charity is small

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes

Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category

Fixed assets

All fixed assets are initially recorded at cost

Depreciation policy

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows

Fixtures & Fittings

25% Reducing Balance

Investments

Fixed asset investments are shown at cost less provision for impairment

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the SOFA when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy

Such income is only deferred if the donor has requested the amount to be allocated for specific projects, in which case it is allocated to the financial year in which the project takes place

Investment income is recognised on a receivable basis
