# STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

UKCOD is incorporated as a company limited by guarantee, and is registered in the UK as a charity (registered charity no. 1076346). UKCOD is governed by a board of volunteer trustees.

UKCOD operates a number of civic and democratic websites under a single project, mySociety. UKCOD has a wholly owned commercial subsidiary, mySociety Ltd, which itself has a wholly owned commercial subsidiary, Mapumental Ltd. Each subsidiary is governed by its own board of directors, comprising a combination of trustees from UKCOD, executive directors and independent non-executive directors. Trustees and non-executive directors are not remunerated by any of the companies.

UKCOD employs no staff directly, but buys in labour as required from its subsidiary companies or from independent contractors.

#### **OBJECTIVES**

The objectives of UKCOD are to conduct and promote research into the use and effects of information and communication technologies in the context of the operation of any body or bodies which has or have an electorate, and to disseminate the useful results of such research for the benefit of the public.

UKCOD operates the mySociety project under the mission statement "We invent and popularise digital tools that enable citizens to exert power over institutions and decision makers", using its UK websites and the international websites it supports to undertake active research to explore what is effective in delivering on this mission.

#### **ACTIVITIES**

UKCOD continued to further its charitable objects through various projects:

- Undertaking a review of its activities in order to focus on those which best further its charitable mission and objectives; a result of this was the retirement of some older projects including FixMyTransport.com and PledgeBank.com.
- Continuing to operate, maintain and grow the use of the core UK sites WriteToThem.com, TheyWorkForYou.com, FixMyStreet.com, and WhatDoTheyKnow.com.
- Assisting international partners in creating their own versions or equivalents of UKCOD's core UK sites, either through re-use of UKCOD's code or through user-centred design exercises to pinpoint the most effective intervention.
- Designing and carrying out research exercises on its own websites, its partners' websites, and comparable websites within the civic tech sector, in order to examine (and in due course increase) the usage and impact of such projects.
- Growing revenues from its subsidiaries, mySociety Ltd and Mapumental Ltd, through the establishment of new commercial relationships and products.
- Maintaining relationships with major grant-giving funders, and continuing to raise funds to ensure UKCOD's future sustainability and ability to deliver on its four-year (to 2018) strategic plan.

## **PUBLIC BENEFIT**

We have referred to the guidance in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aims and objectives and in planning our future activities. In particular, the trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set.

# **ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE**

Historically, UKCOD has measured performance based on usage of its UK websites. However, this represents an increasingly smaller proportion of the charity's activity. UKCOD's goals now include the establishment, in collaboration with international partners, of an ambitious number of substantially impactful sites and apps based on its code. The number and success of these partner websites are UKCOD's primary metrics.

The usage levels of FixMyStreet and WhatDoTheyKnow continue to grow, driven in part by UKCOD's investment in their underlying technology platforms for re-use in other countries and as commercial products. WriteToThem and TheyWorkForYou each saw a slight fall in usage due to a lower investment of time in improving and promoting them; however, with support from funders, some additional work was put into this in the run-up to the 2015 general election (outside this reporting period). FixMyTransport, as mentioned above, has now been closed down.

#### International re-use and adoption

Code developed by UKCOD under the mySociety project is now used to run projects in more than 30 countries around the world. In each of these cases UKCOD works with a local partner to ensure that the projects are appropriate and impactful in their local contexts. A number of these projects have significant profiles - the mzalendo.com and pa.org.za parliamentary monitoring sites in Kenya and South Africa respectively are each used by tens of thousands of people a month. Similarly, sites such as kimittud.atlatszo.hu and dostup.pravda.com.ua in Hungary and Ukraine respectively have generated thousands of Freedom of Information requests and have become useful resources for NGOs and journalists, as well as general citizens.

The charity remains committed to driving the re-use of its code, but at the same time understands that the barriers for partner projects succeeding are not always technical. Increasing awareness and use of tools such as Alaveteli and Pombola (Freedom of Information and Parliamentary Monitoring tools respectively) also requires marketing, PR and networking skills. UKCOD is therefore working to build international communities of partners around its projects - the largest of which is the community of partners who run sites powered by Alaveteli across more than 20 countries.

The focus of the organisation over the three years through to March 2018 with regard to the support and development of international partnerships is supporting projects that can reach a level of either at least 125,000 visitors or 2,500 transactions in a rolling six month period. UKCOD seeks to have at least 6 tools (outside of its historic UK sites) by the end of March 2016 and 24 sites by the end of March 2018.

#### **Research Work**

During the year 2014/15 UKCOD was successful in winning a two-year \$750,000 grant from the William and Flora Hewlett Foundation to create an in-house research team to study the impact of civic technologies - both its own and those of others in the sector. The sector has, to date, been poor at defining, measuring and maximising the impact of civic technologies. UKCOD hopes that it will both add materially to the body of knowledge on these subjects over the next two years and also act to drive interest in and engagement with such research more broadly across our sector. The first step taken to address this latter point was holding the first conference dedicated to the impact of civic technologies - TICTeC - which UKCOD ran in London in March 2015.

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

UKCOD has excellent relationships with a number of major charitable funding bodies, including:

- Omidyar Network supports UKCOD across its international and UK charitable endeavours.
- The Open Society Foundation and Hivos support UKCOD's work internationalising and spreading the adoption of the Alaveteli software platform, which underpins the UK WhatDoTheyKnow.com Freedom of Information site.

- Google.org support the creation of open source software 'components' primarily for use in
  parliamentary monitoring. The Poplus project has resulted in the creation of an international
  community of activists and technologies, and 20+ successful deployments of its software tools.
- The William and Flora Hewlett Foundation supports UKCOD's research programme, which looks
  into the usage and impact of its projects, and disseminates the results in order to improve the
  sectoral knowledge base.
- The Indigo Trust supports UKCOD's work internationalising and spreading the adoption of the Pombola software platform for parliamentary monitoring websites, with particular focus on sub-Saharan Africa. Pombola was originally created for the Kenyan Mzalendo.com (the code for the UK's TheyWorkForYou.com being unsuitable for re-use) and is also in use in Ghana, South Africa, Zimbabwe and Nigeria. It uses several of the Google-funded components.
- The Knight Foundation awarded a grant to support UKCOD's provision of software tools to help local campaign groups in several key US cities, although this project was halted due to the difficulties of finding suitable partner organisations.
- Making All Voices Count awarded a grant towards the development of a Freedom of Information software platform in Liberia.
- The JRSST Charitable Trust awarded a grant towards the modernisation of TheyWorkForYou.com.

Each of these funders helps to fund maintenance, support and development of UKCOD's charitable websites, and in most cases also pays for specific projects, which UKCOD would be unable to undertake without such funding.

UKCOD's future goals were defined in 2014 in its 4-year strategic plan, and its fundraising approach is now to share and discuss this plan with potential funders, asking them to back all or parts of it. Over \$4m (£2.5m) has already been secured towards the delivery of the strategy, and fundraising continues. UKCOD also aims to increase the financial contributions made by its commercial subsidiaries mySociety Ltd and Mapumental Ltd towards the charity's work.

#### **PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS**

UKCOD's 4-year strategy is, in summary, to grow and restructure the mySociety project to deliver the following outcomes by 2018:

- Help launch and nurture 24 substantially impactful citizen empowerment sites and apps, running under the names of our partners, across a variety of middle income and developing countries.
   There will be hundreds if not thousands of other deployments of our tools, but these 24 will be the ones that will count.
- Publish high quality, useful research on the impact of digital citizen empowerment tools, including
  frank assessments of where and how they do not work. Also, we will create and share
  measurement tools that can used by others to learn about the impact of the services that they run.
- 3. Construct several high quality 'apps in a box' for international redeployment, and several components to accelerate innovation by third parties.
- 4. Carry out 10 user-centered design partnerships, helping campaigners around the world to successfully design digital tools that will be truly attractive to local users.
- 5. Stage 6 major international events two per year focused on the successful use of specific citizen empowerment technologies.

- Grow the communities around at least two of our tools so that, if necessary, in 2018 the communities would be able to take these tools over entirely, unburdening mySociety of the need to raise funds to cover their costs.
- 7. Run one research-focused conference a year that will provide a forum for mySociety, our partners and a wider peer group to share and discuss research findings and key research challenges.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2015

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of accounting

The Financial Statement have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable United Kingdom accounting standards, the Statements of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in March 2005 (SORP 2005) and the Companies Act 2006.

#### Basis of consolidation

The Group financial statements consolidate the financial statements of UK Citizens Online Democracy and its subsidiary undertakings mySociety Limited and Mapumental Limited drawn up to March 2015. The results of subsidiaries acquired or sold are consolidated for the periods from or to the date on which control passed. Acquisitions are accounted for under the acquisition method.

#### Cash flow statement

The Trustees have taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard No 1 (revised) from including a cash flow statement in the financial statements on the grounds that the charity is small.

#### **Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes.

#### Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category.

#### **Fixed assets**

All fixed assets are initially recorded at cost.

## **Depreciation policy**

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

#### Investments

Fixed asset investments are shown at cost less provision for impairment.

## Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the SOFA when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Such income is only deferred if the donor has requested the amount to be allocated for specific projects, in which case it is allocated to the financial year in which the project takes place.

Investment income is recognised on a receivable basis.
