2. STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing Document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006. The Charity commenced operations in 1984, incorporated in 1997, and is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

Appointment of Trustees

The management of the Bureau is the responsibility of the Trustees who are appointed under the terms of the Articles of Association. The maximum number of trustees is fifteen and the minimum is three. Trustees are elected at the annual general meeting or co-opted by the Trustee Board. Co-opted trustees must not exceed one third of the total number of trustees. All trustees retire from office on the third AGM following the AGM at which they were appointed and may be re-elected.

Induction of Trustees

Newly appointed Trustees are given a copy of the 'Citizens Advice Welcome pack.' Trustees are encouraged to attend appropriate external training and development events where possible.

Risk management

The trustees undertake an annual review of the major risks to which the Bureau is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the bureau. Trustees are satisfied that systems are in place to identify and mitigate those exposures to the major risks.

Organisational Structure and decision-making

The board of Trustees appoint a Chief Officer to run the day to day operational activities. The Chief Officer is supported by paid staff and a volunteer pool who help provide the front line service.

Related Parties

Cyngor ar Bopeth Ceredigion Citizens Advice Bureau is a member of Citizens Advice, the operating name of the National Association of Citizens Advice Bureaux, which provides a framework for standards of advice and casework management as well as monitoring progress against these standards. Operating policies are independently determined by the Trustee Board of Cyngor ar Bopeth Ceredigion Citizens Advice Bureau in order to fulfil its charitable objects and comply with the national membership requirements.

3. OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Public benefit & charitable objects

The charity's objects are to promote any charitable purpose for the public benefit, by the advancement of education, the protection and preservation of health and the relief of poverty, sickness and distress for the benefit of the whole of wales, in particular, but not exclusively for the benefit of the community in Ceredigion and surrounding areas.

The aims of the Citizens Advice Service are:

- To provide the advice people need for the problems they face
- To improve the policies and practices that affect people's lives

and our principles:

The Citizens Advice Service provides free, independent, confidential and impartial advice to everyone on their rights and responsibilities. It values diversity, promotes equality and challenges discrimination.

As a member of the Citizens Advice Service, the Bureau, accepts and endeavours to incorporate the above statement into its service delivery. The bureau's Business and Development Plan sets out the organisations objectives for the three year period 2013-2015. This is reviewed on an annual basis.

Contribution of Volunteers

The charity receives help and support in the form of voluntary assistance in advising the public and administering the charity. The volunteers contributed a total of 10,321 hours to the value of £156,411 for the year ending 31st March 2014.

4. ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable Activities

During the year 3,479 (2013:3542) unique new clients were recorded at Cyngor ar Bopeth Ceredigion Citizens Advice Bureau with a total of 8,331 (2013: 12,401) new social policy issues. Of the total client constituency recorded, 66.2% (2013: 72%) were residing in Ceredigion; 9.8% (2013: 9.9%) in Pembrokeshire, 6.8% (2013: 6.2%) in Carmarthenshire, 1.2% in Powys (2013:1%) and 16% (2013: 11%) other.

Investment Activities

The bureau holds 561 ordinary 25p shares in GlaxoSmithKline and valued at £8,929 (2013: £8,629) on an open market value basis as at 31st March 2014.

Factors Affecting the Achievement of Objectives

Given the current economic climate and public spending cuts the charity is under significant funding pressure at a time when there is increasing demand for its services. To develop and move forward the charity is actively seeking to increase its volunteer pool and seek new sources of funding for the forthcoming year.

5. FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial Position

Incoming resources in the year were £416,240 (2013: £440,892), of this £312,176 (2013: £319,459) related to project restricted activities.

A surplus of £11,779 (2013: deficit of £3,577) was made in the year on general funds before transfers and unrealised gains. At 31st March 2014, the total reserves were £316,732 (2013: £288,902) of which £33,281 (2013: £25,420) represent restricted funds.

Reserves Policy

Cyngor ar Bopeth Ceredigion Citizens Advice Bureau is required to ensure that free monies are available in each financial year to meet any reasonable foreseeable contingency. The bureau produces a Bureau Business and Development Plan which covers three years and endeavours to ensure that income continues to be derived from as wide a variety of sources possible. The Trustee Board will take all necessary steps to ensure that at no time within this period would it be possible for the cessation of one or more funding streams to present so serious a challenge to the future of the organisation that it could not be managed so as to continue to provide a best value advice service.

In reviewing the potential costs that could arise should a significant reduction in income be incurred the Trustees have determined that 'free' reserves should be maintained equal to 6 months normal operating expenditure which equates to £184,625. The bureau's free reserves amount to £203,596 as at 31st March 2014.

Principle Funding Sources

The Trustees extend their gratitude to Ceredigion County Council and Pembrokeshire County Council who continued to support the core operating capacity of the charity, and also the Town and Community Councils and local organisations who give donations annually. Additionally project specific funding was received from the Welsh Government for the Better Advice: Better Health and Disability Benefit for Children project; Financial Inclusion Fund – Money Advice Service (for delivery of debt advice); the Big Lottery to support work with those suffering from mental ill health or substance misuse; Volunteering in Wales to support volunteer recruitment and training; Hywel Dda Charitable Trust; Trust house Forte Foundation and Citizens Advice.

Funds in Deficit

No funds were in deficit at the balance sheet. Deficits on any restricted funds were met out of reserves (see note 13).

Investment Policy

As required in its Memorandum paragraph 3, in furtherance of its objects, and for no other purposes, the Charity has the power to invest any surplus monies not immediately required for its purposes in or upon such investments, securities or property as may be thought fit, subject nevertheless to such conditions and such consents as may for the time being be imposed or required by law.

6. FUTURE PLANS

Our key objectives for the forthcoming year are:

- To maintain services as far as possible in the face of funding cuts and consequent significant reduction in funding for 14-15
- To improve the IT infrastructure of the bureau in order to provide easier and faster access to quality advice and information
- To recruit and develop a strong and diverse staff and volunteer base
- To continue to apply for new bureau funding
- To raise awareness of our social policy work
- To maintain and improve governance
- To integrate equality and diversity measures as part of everything we do

Cyngor ar Bopeth Ceredigion Citizens Advice Bureau aims to continually improve access to its services but a projected decline in income for 14-15 will see the bureau reduce its opening hours in all locations.

Cyngor ar Bopeth Ceredigion Citizens Advice Bureau will continue to enable people to realise their rights and through campaigning for change in social policy, raise awareness of issues. The Citizens Advice brand is familiar to 95% of the public and has a central role in tackling injustice, reducing poverty and social exclusion.

We endeavour to continue to obtain financial support from funders and demonstrate the value of our work, the impact on the area and the benefits to the local communities.

Partnership working is increasingly important but it is a difficult and long process to develop the appropriate links. We will build on new partnerships with other charitable and statutory organisations to improve access for clients most in need of our services.

7. TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITES

Company Law and Charity Law require the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the surplus or deficit for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- (a) select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently
- (b) make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,
- (c) state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements, and
- (d) prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue in operation.

The trustees are also responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of Citizens Advice and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. The trustees are responsible for ensuring that the company maintains an adequate system of internal control designed to provide reasonable assurance that assets are safeguarded against material loss or unauthorised use and to prevent and detect fraud and other irregularities.

I report on the financial statements for the year ended 31st March 2014 set out on pages 12 to 21.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The trustees (who are also the directors of the company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144(2) of the Charities Act 2011 (the 2011 Act) and that an independent examination is needed. The charity's gross income exceeded £250,000 and I am qualified to undertake the examination by being a qualified member of the Association of Chartered Certified Accountants.

Having satisfied myself that the charity is not subject to audit under Part 16 of the Companies Act 2006 and is eligible for independent examination, it is my responsibility to:

- examine the accounts under section 145 of the 2011 Act:

Notes to the financial statements

1. Accounting policies

a) Accounting basis

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and are in accordance with the Companies Act 2006, applicable accounting standards and the Statement of Recommended Practice on Accounting by Charities.

b) Incoming resources

i) Grants receivable

Grants made to finance the activities of the bureau are credited to the income and expenditure account in the period to which they relate.

ii) Bank interest

Bank interest is included in the income and expenditure account on receipt.

iii) Other income

Other income is included in the income and expenditure account in the period to which it relates. Donations, gifts and covenants are included when received.

iv) Gifts and Intangible income

In addition to the above, the charity also receives help and support in the form of voluntary assistance in advising the public. This help and support is not included in the financial statements. However, its value to the Charity has been estimated and disclosed in the trustees' report.

v) Deferred income

Grants received in advance of the period in which the funder requires the expenditure to be applied will be reflected in deferred income within the balance sheet.

c) Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis. All expenditure directly related to the provision of advice services is included within charitable expenditure. Other costs incurred have been allocated between fundraising and publicity and management and administration as appropriate. Where such costs relate to more than one functional cost category they have been split on the basis of staff time.

1. Accounting policies (continued)

d) Fixed assets and depreciation

Depreciation is charged at the following rates over an assets estimated useful life:

Fixtures, fittings and equipment - various rates depending on nature of

asset

Freehold buildings - 2% on cost

e) Unrestricted funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objects of the charity. Unrestricted funds include a revaluation reserve representing the restatement of investment assets at market values.

f) Restricted funds

Income received for the restricted purposes is included in a separate restricted fund against which appropriate expenditure is allocated.

g) Designated funds

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for specific purposes. The use of such funds is at the trustees' discretion.

h) Leases

Rental costs under operating leases are charged to the statement of financial activity in equal amounts over the period of the leases.

i) Cash Flow

The bureau has taken advantage of the exemptions in Financial Reporting Standard No 1 from the requirement to produce a cash flow statement on the grounds that it is a small company.

j) Investments

Investments are re-valued at mid-market value at the balance sheet date and the gain or loss taken to the Statement of Financial Activities.

k) Pensions

The charity operates a stakeholder pension scheme for some eligible employees. This is independently managed. The charity made employer's contributions of £167 for the year (2013: £1,001) equivalent to 4% of gross salary.

15. Designated funds

The designated fund represent monies set aside to meet potential future redundancy costs, upgrading the bureau's IT infrastructure and relocation costs. In the opinion of the trustees, given the current economic climate and difficulty raising funds, there continues to be significant risk of closure and loss of funding. During the year a sum of £3,724 (2013:£2,917) was used to meet redundancy costs. A further provision of £15,000 has been made in the year to meet any potential future redundancy costs. Due to the need to upgrade the IT infrastructure and the need to meet the relocation costs of our Aberystwyth venue, a further sum of £25,000 has been set aside to designated reserves.
