For the year ended 31 March 2007

The trustees present their report and the audited financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2007

Reference and administrative information set out on page 1 forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the memorandum and articles of association and the Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting by Charities (issued in March 2005)

Structure, Governance & Management

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 1 July 1997 and registered as a charity on 25 March 1998

The company was established under a memorandum of association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its articles of association

Members of the Board are elected from amongst the members at the Annual General Meeting, for a three-year term

The trustees have a detailed induction process which includes inductions with the Chair, the General Secretary, each member of Management Team and other key staff members, as appropriate

The Board sets the strategy for BOND and the implementation is delegated to the management team that is led by the General Secretary with four managers covering Advocacy and Representation, Learning and Training, Membership and Communications and Finance, Administration and Systems

Reserves policy

BOND needs reserves both to protect its current activities and to ensure the continuity of service in the future. The Board has examined the needs, risks and challenges faced by the organisation in both the short and medium term, along with the relevant financial forecasts, and has formulated a policy to meet those needs.

The company's reserves policy states that BOND's free reserves (calculated as the unrestricted reserves less designated funds) should be set to cover a minimum of six weeks, a maximum of three months and an ideal level of 10 weeks of budgeted unrestricted expenditure, and that this should be reviewed periodically, with a view to building reserves further. As at 31 March 2007, free reserves stand at £136,345 which represents 8 weeks of budgeted unrestricted expenditure.

Risk statement

The Board has updated the risk register of the potential risks facing the charitable company Measures to address the risks have been identified and steps taken to ensure that these are adequate

Objectives and activities

The objects for which BOND is established are the advancement of any charitable purpose and in particular for the relief of need anywhere in the world arising out of poverty, sickness, distress, age, infirmity and disablement by promoting the efficiency and effectiveness of voluntary organisations and other institutions in so far as such organisations and institutions are working to advance charitable purposes

BOND's purpose is to work collectively, as UK international development NGOs, for sustainable development, the eradication of extreme poverty and attainment of human rights. BOND's strategic aims are

STRATEGIC AIM 1. Building our influence and holding to account

As BOND members to influence the policy environment that impacts on the lives of poor people and hold those in power to account

- Goal 1.1 To facilitate effective collective influence on the policy and practice of governments and international institutions
- Goal 1.2 To promote and enable effective engagement in advocacy and campaigning by all UK civil society organisations committed to poverty eradication

STRATEGIC AIM 2: Building Our Capacity

As BOND members, we aim to improve the quality of UK-based civil society's performance in international development through mutual learning, the sharing of knowledge, experience and ideas

In 2006-7, BOND worked towards these aims with the following objectives

Establish the UK's place in the Global Call to Action Against Poverty, enabling the energies from Make Poverty History to support campaigns led from other parts of the world, lead the organisation of a month of mobilisation in October 2006, and prepare UK organisations for their part in campaigning towards Germany's leadership of the G8 and EU

Overhaul its training programme on the basis of a training needs analysis, introducing new packages in the final quarter of the year, and managing a pilot mentoring programme

Assess with members the role of quality standards in the sector, and determine BOND's role in their use to strengthen the quality of the sector's work

Introduce a range of new and redesigned communication tools to enable members more readily to learn about and engage with BOND activities

Achievements and performance

In the first year of its bold new 2006-11 strategy BOND deepened its understanding of member needs through increased member engagement and surveys of learning needs, quality standards and the support needs of its working groups BOND also developed a business plan for 2007-10, to resource the strategy through fundraising and income generation BOND took a lead role in collective campaigning

Aim 1

In 2006-7, BOND continued to take a leadership role in UK collective campaigning activities, for example the October 17th, GCAP (Global Call to Action Against Poverty) linked mobilisation. Stand Up against Poverty BOND also took a leadership role representing its members in Europe within CONCORD and GCAP Europe (the joint Aid Watchers work was particularly successful in this arena). At international level BOND established the UK's place in the Global Call to Action Against Poverty, and provided valued support to campaigns on debt, trade, aid and accountability across the world BOND prepared UK organisations for their part in campaigning towards Germany's leadership of the G8 and EU. The year saw intensive planning and preparation work for the "Your Voice Against Poverty" mobilisation (involving both 'insider' and 'outsider' approaches) culminating in the World Can't Wait event on 2 June 2007. BOND co-ordinated this mobilisation and 100 organisations signed up to support it. In order to involve BOND members and MPH licensees the secretariat organised Economic Justice Forums and EU Assemblies.

Secretariat staff underpinned member co-ordination through chairing and/or supporting a number of groups, for example Global Economic Justice Networks, Heads of campaigns, Development Policy Lobby Group, European Policy Group

BOND established a project group working on a response to the Home Office on the risk of charities being abused by terrorist organisations, a new area of collective advocacy

BOND set up the UK Aid Network (UKAN) enabling improved collective work on the quality and quantity of aid

BOND conducted consultations on the Department for International Development (DfID) White Paper

Aim 2

In 2006-7 BOND had 954 participants in the learning and training programme, from 231 organisations across its membership as well as from non-member organisations. It conducted a learning needs analysis which informed the launch of a new Learning and Training programme in January 2007 under the themes of Advocacy and Campaigning, NGO Practitioner Programme, Leadership Programme, Accessing Funding Opportunities and Learning, Planning and Management

BOND launched its quality standards work with members, by undertaking research leading to a report on how BOND members currently deal with quality and best practice. The recommendations gave rise to a member-led working group, which launched in January 2007 working on a range of approaches for improving the quality of NGOs' work.

The BOND organisational learning group (SMOLnet) developed a new strategic focus and there were two action learning sets with directors and senior managers of BOND member organisations

Aim 3

There were 316 BOND members as of March 31st 2007 BOND facilitated a range of groups, which provided mechanisms for collective advocacy and learning following Make Poverty History Whilst doing this it has continued to consult with stakeholders in order to develop a model for future collective advocacy. It took a leading role in Europe as the largest and most active NGO platform in CONCORD, supporting other member networks and representing its members.

BOND had 16 active member-led groups during the year which held a total of 65 group meetings, with 911 attendees to these meetings. A groups' needs analysis was undertaken in order to inform development and support of the groups programme.

Following Make Poverty History a new role emerged for BOND - mandated by its members in the 2006-11 strategy - to facilitate a more effective and efficient networking environment for members working on collective advocacy. To start this process BOND consulted with a range of networks on improved ways of working together for a more effective and powerful sector voice against poverty.

The monthly Networker publication carried an increasing number of well-received member written articles. The extensive BOND website enabled members to remain informed on key issues and opportunities for collective campaigning, as well as to access member services.

Aim 4

The BOND Board have continued to develop a new model of governance with an effective move towards allowing the Board to decrease operational engagement and thus focus more effectively on strategic oversight and governance responsibilities

The staff team developed a business plan and continued to diversify funding streams to ensure sustainability, working with a consultant trusts fundraiser to explore opportunities in this new fundraising stream. Income generation from the advertisements bulletin and training fee income increased on 2005/6 levels.

The funding from the Big Lottery Fund came to an end in August 2006. The Board took the decision to allocate £50,000 as a designated fund to bridge the funding gap, whilst close work continues with the Big Lottery Fund to secure future funding

There were key staff changes in the management team, with a new Finance, Administration and Systems Manager who started in January 2007, and a new Membership and Communications Manager recruited and due to start in July 2007. Development of the staff team continued with a renewed emphasis on high performance against the new strategy. This required further refinement of Human Resource policy and practice.

Financial review

BOND's income was provided primarily by grants from the Department for International Development (DfID), the European Commission, the Big Lottery Fund, membership subscriptions, training fees and publications

Membership income has increased, due to a new method for calculating membership fees. This change in method was agreed in consultation with our members

The ads bulletin and training fees continue to show increases in income. Income from the ads bulletin grew by 16%, while training fee income increased by 27%

BOND, with total income of £1,167,916 and total expenditure of £1,196,609 made a deficit of £28,693 in the year ended 31 March 2007, compared to a surplus of £36,161 in 2006

BOND foresaw a gap in the Big Lottery Fund grant and therefore set up a designated fund at the end of last financial year. This designated fund of £50,000 ensured that this year's unrestricted deficit of £48,035 did not diminish general reserves.

The deficit of £28,693 resulted in a net decrease in reserves from £222,317 to £193,624. Of these, £32,184 are restricted and £161,440 unrestricted of which £25,095 is designated

Plans for the future

BOND enters year two of the 2006-11 Strategic Plan, and development plans are in full swing across BOND's four strategic Aims. This will mean an organisational review to align the work of the Secretariat with the strategy in the light of new information on member needs.

The results of the member needs' analysis will enable us to review member services and improve, refine and reinvent them to meet the current and future needs of our members. Our service delivery will be responsive to new membership trends. Our new Learning and Training programme will continue to develop. It will be guided by a panel of sector advisers, and delivered by an increased range of providers including member organisations themselves and we will continue to work closely with the Working Groups on important issues for the sector.

A new database will enable segmentation and better utilisation of membership data. A more sophisticated communications plan will ensure that our members receive targeted information in the most appropriate format.

Exciting new communications for members will be developed, including a new website, with plans to incorporate a members' only area, networking on line and document share facility. BOND will review and relaunch its flagship publication, the Networker to ensure that it meets the changing needs of its membership and will refresh its annual review and e-communications.

The Quality standards pilot will launch and the 12 month programme will be underway focussing on developing and sharing approaches to quality improvement in the sector BOND will continue to inform members about relevant standards for the sector and will build relationships to work towards a shared approach on quality and accountability with donors, standards holders and NGOs' partners and beneficiaries BOND will also work with other National networks across the world working on quality in order to ensure coherence

In 2007/8 the Learning and Training programme will continue to provide a menu of training courses, across a wider range of programme areas. Improvements will be made to monitoring and evaluation and to quality assurance of the programme. BOND will widen participation in action learning, and deliver a pilot mentoring programme as well as the more traditional learning opportunities.

The Secretariat will begin implementation of the 2007-10 Business Plan—Staff will develop efficient ways of working to increase and improve effectiveness, as well as developing a refreshed customer (member) focus—The staff will develop an improved market orientation and will develop existing and new services using sustainable business models

The Secretariat will map the networks environment to identify areas of duplication and also identify the potential for greater synergy and cross-working between networks and collations. We will work with our members and others in the sector to improve efficiency and effectiveness, facilitating mergers, where possible

BOND will work with other networks to facilitate new more effective mechanisms for collective advocacy, making use of GCAP structures in light of its extended remit and timescale

Support to collective campaigning to the G8, and other key advocacy moments will be provided by the Advocacy Team They will also widen participation of members in EU advocacy including the opportunity to input in to the Voices of Africa Publication

They will have provided opportunities for consultation with government and donors, including charities and their potential abuse by terrorist financing

The Secretariat will have established new relationships with incoming civil servants and Ministers in The Department for International Development, and have provided induction to BOND members and an overview of members successes, concerns and challenges

Funds held on behalf of others

As at 31 March 2007, BOND held £32,315 on behalf of Make Poverty History BOND also holds funds on behalf of the UK Aid Network (£39,797) which enables improved collective work on the quality and quantity of aid, and the World Can't Wait (£65,472) The funds held for the World Can't Wait relate to an event on 2 June 2007 which is part of the "Your Voice Against Poverty" mobilisation BOND coordinated this mobilisation and 100 organisations signed up to support it As these funds are held on behalf of others, they do not appear on the Balance Sheet

The trustees consider the objects of these unincoporated entities fall within BOND's own objects

Statement of responsibilities of the trustees

The trustees are required to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and the incoming resources and application of resources, including the net income or expenditure, of the charity for the year. In preparing those financial statements the trustees are required to

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently,
- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,
- State whether applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements, and
- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and which enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. The trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Each of the trustees confirms that to the best of his/her knowledge there is no information relevant to the audit of which the auditors are unaware. The trustees also confirm that they have taken all necessary steps to ensure that they themselves are aware of all relevant audit information and that this information has been communicated to the auditors.

Members of the charity guarantee to contribute an amount not exceeding £1 to the assets of the charity in the event of winding up. The total number of such guarantees at 31 March 2007 was 283 (2006 - 263). The trustees are members of the charity but this entitles them only to voting rights. The trustees have no beneficial interest in the charity.

Auditors

Sayer Vincent were re-appointed as the charitable company's auditors during the year and have expressed their willingness to continue in that capacity

We have audited the financial statements of British Overseas NGOs for Development ('BOND') for the year ended 31 March 2007 which comprise the statement of financial activities, balance sheet and related notes. Respective responsibilities of the trustees and auditors

The trustees (who are also directors of British Overseas NGOs for Development ('BOND') for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the annual report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law, United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice) and the Statement of Recommended Practice Accounting and Reporting by Charities (issued in March 2005) The responsibilities of the trustees are set out in the statement of responsibilities of the trustees

Notes to the financial statements

For the year ended 31 March 2007

1. Accounting policies

- a) The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 1985. They follow the recommendations in the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (issued in March 2005).
- b) Voluntary income is received by way of donations and gifts and is included in full in the statement of financial activities when receivable
- c) Revenue grants are credited to the statement of financial activities when received or receivable whichever is earlier
 - Where unconditional entitlement to grants receivable is dependent upon fulfilment of conditions within the charity's control, the incoming resources are recognised when there is sufficient evidence that conditions will be met. Where there is uncertainty as to whether the charity can meet such conditions the incoming resource is deferred.
- d) Income generated from the supply of goods or services is included in the statement of financial activities in the period in which the supply is made
- e) Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor Expenditure which meets these criteria is charged to the fund
- f) Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources received or generated for the charitable purposes
- g) Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular purposes
- h) Where information about the aims, objectives and projects of the charity is provided to potential beneficiaries, the costs associated with this publicity are allocated to charitable expenditure
 - Where such information about the aims, objectives and projects of the charity is also provided to potential donors, activity costs are apportioned between fundraising and charitable activities on the basis of area of literature occupied by each activity
- i) Resources expended are recognised in the period in which they are incurred. Resources expended include attributable VAT which cannot be recovered.
- j) Resources expended are allocated to the particular activity where the cost relates directly to that activity. However, the support costs of overall direction and administration of each activity, comprising the salary and overhead costs of the central functions, is apportioned on the basis of expenditure relating to each activity. This is done on the following basis.

1. Accounting policies (continued)

- k) Governance costs are the costs associated with the governance arrangements of the charity. These costs are associated with constitutional and statutory requirements and include any costs associated with the strategic management of the charity's activities.
- I) Unrestricted reserves are transferred to restricted funds to compensate shortfalls of projects not fully recovered by specific funds
- m) Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write down the cost of each asset to its estimated residual value over its expected useful life. The depreciation rates in use are as follows

Computer equipment 20 - 33^{1/3}% per annum Office furniture and equipment 33^{1/3} % per annum

- n) Items of equipment are capitalised where the purchase price exceeds £350. Depreciation costs are allocated to activities on the basis of the use of the related assets in those activities.
- o) Investments held as fixed assets are revalued at market value at the balance sheet date. Any gain or loss for the period is taken to the statement of financial activities
- p) Transactions in foreign currencies are translated at rates prevailing at the date of transaction Balances denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the rate of exchange prevailing at the balance sheet date. Any gain or loss for the period is taken to the statement of financial activities.
