#### Report of the trustees

#### For the year ended 31 March 2008

The trustees present their report and the audited financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2008

Reference and administrative information set out on page 1 forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the memorandum and articles of association and the Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting by Charities (issued in March 2005)

#### Objectives and activities

The objects for which BOND is established are the advancement of any charitable purpose and in particular for the relief of need anywhere in the world arising out of poverty, sickness, distress, age, infirmity and disablement by promoting the efficiency and effectiveness of voluntary organisations and other institutions in so far as such organisations and institutions are working to advance charitable purposes

## Achievements and performance in 2007/8

In the second year of BOND's 2006-11 strategy, BOND was led by Interim General Secretary Charlotte Imbert. During the course of the year the Interim General Secretary undertook a review of performance and over the course of the summer there was a small restructure of the organisation. The result of these activities was to put in place a staff team more aligned for delivering BOND's new strategy. Greater emphasis was placed on member communications, HR support to staff and the project management needed for implementing a new website and database.

#### Aim 1: Building our Influence

BOND developed and produced an influential position paper on the EU Lisbon Treaty highlighting its implications for development and NGOs' concerns about the way in which the Treaty might be implemented if ratified across Europe BOND's paper played a crucial role in the UK Parliament debate on ratification, and has enabled parliamentarians to feel more informed about the opportunities to show EU leadership in global poverty reduction BOND members called for improvements to the quantity and quality of European official development assistance as part of the CONCORD Aid Watch initiative "Hold the Applause! EU Government risk breaking aid promises" highlighted the need for the UK to pressure other EU member states on aid commitments

BOND led the European media work for a petition to Angela Merkel and the EU Council BOND led the voluntary sector response to the Charity Commission and Home Office on proposed antiterrorism legislation to protect INGOs from terrorist abuse. A special project group of members led this process to inform the Home Office and Charity Commission of the impact of the strategy and legislation on international NGOs and their partners and beneficiaries. BOND continues to engage with the charity. Charity Commission on good practice in this area.

BOND facilitated collective campaigning on the German G8 and EU presidencies on 2 June 2007 involving 100 civil society organisations including many who had taken part in Make Poverty History Thousands of poverty campaigners came to London to urge G8 countries to fulfil their 2005 poverty commitments and over 300,000 UK citizens wrote to Tony Blair ahead of the 2007 summit in Germany Working with key partners BOND developed the African Voices campaign in order to highlight Africans' feelings about Europe / Africa relations, informing discussions on the EU Africa Strategy A successful launch event took place at the Foreign Press Association with speakers including Baroness Amos BOND working groups continued to develop their influence and credibility in policy dialogue, for example the Development and Environment Group held a large conference with Hilary Benn and David Milliband as speakers

The BOND Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights Working Group, submitted a response to DFID's consultation on reviewing their strategy for tackling AIDS and HIV in developing countries

Conferences were also held by the Disability and Development Group and the Funding Working Group

BOND met with Douglas Alexander (Secretary of State for International Development), Alistair Darling, Gareth Thomas and Shahid Malik on a variety of issues including funding for NGOs, access for members to policy dialogue, collective campaigning priorities and the EU Treaty

## Aim 2. Building our Capacity

In 2007/8 there were 648 learners over 89 event days. We have continued to refresh the programme, agreeing revised thematic areas, opening it up to members to suggest course ideas and widening the range of contributors to the programme. We are excited by the prospect of increasing the number of learners in 2008/9

BOND has continued to develop its role in supporting its members to improve the quality of their work, with the Quality Group meeting quarterly, covering areas such as improved mechanisms for listening to beneficiaries

#### Aim 3: Strengthening our Membership and Networks

In this year BOND membership increased by 30 members to 344 members as of 31 March 08

The secretariat monitored member engagement and listening to member needs. Two key surveys informed a review of member engagement, a member needs and a groups needs analysis. This was supplemented by a member visits programme which provided a range of qualitative insights.

Stemming from this we increased engagement and support of group chairs, commenced development of guidelines for working groups, commenced the roll out of member visits for all secretariat staff, gave working groups direct involvement in the annual conference, supported working groups to develop member-led strategies for their work together which were incorporated into 08/09 plans. We also ran a number of new member welcome meetings

Substantial improvements were made to BOND communications with members moving to a more systematic approach, segmenting for particular interests 'Your Network', a flagship email version of "The Networker" was launched providing an opportunity for greater dissemination within organisations

The AGM conference in October was a well organised and challenging event with a key note speech from Secretary of State Douglas Alexander and record attendance of 172 delegates

#### Aim 4: Strengthening BOND

A number of key staff changes were made in the year with a new Membership and Communications Manager, Advocacy and Representation Manager and an Interim Learning and Training Manager

Richard Bennett, BOND's General Secretary, resigned his position in October 2007 after considerable achievement in developing the network, most recently chairing the Make Poverty History coalition team. Richard continued to provide some consultancy support whilst Charlotte Imbert stayed in the role of Interim General Secretary until the permanent new Chief Executive Nick Roseveare was recruited in March 2008.

### **Financial Review**

Our income is derived primarily from membership subscriptions, training fees and publications and grants from the Department for International Development (DFID), the Big Lottery Fund and the European Commission BOND's income increased by 4 5% in 07/08

Membership income has increased by 14% from 2006/7 following the new method for calculating membership fees that was agreed in consultation with our members in 2005

Income from the "Advertisements Bulletin" and training fees continue to grow, by 6% and 11% respectively

BOND made a surplus of £8,686 in the year ended 31 March 2008, compared to a deficit of £28,693 in 2007. The result comprised net income of £56,805 on restricted funds, and a net expenditure of £48,119 on unrestricted funds. The surplus resulted in a net increase in reserves from £193,624 to £202,310. Of these, £88,989 are restricted and £113,321 unrestricted of which £7,657 is designated Reserves remain within the reserves policy, albeit at the lower end of the policy.

#### Plans for the future

Year 3 of BOND's 2006-11 strategy sees a new permanent Chief Executive as well as a new Chair of Trustees as Richard Hawkes term of office comes to an end

#### Aim 1: Building Our Influence

We will develop a Campaigning Coordination Team from BOND's membership to generate a future campaigning agenda working towards UK and European elections, the G8 Italy, and the "Road to Copenhagen" Climate Change Conference

We will continue to expand co-ordination of member advocacy on EU development policy and institutional issues building work on priority outcomes relating to the EU Reform Treaty and the EU Budget review and contribute to Aid Watch

We will establish a donor advocacy programme with a new dedicated staff member, working alongside the Funding Working Group to establish a long-term donor influencing strategy

The advocacy team will increase support to build the capacity of BOND working groups to advocate on their specialist policy areas

#### Aim 2: Building Our Capacity

We will develop our strategic approach to effectiveness in the sector, establishing a strong programme of interventions to support improvements at the practitioner level but also engaging with donors and in international discussions on civil society organisations' effectiveness in the lead up to and beyond the High Level Forum of Aid Effectiveness in Accra

We will improve targeting and marketing of training and learning activities, basing our programme on a new learning and training needs analysis

#### Aim 3: Building our Networks

We will establish a new website based on the feedback of members and other stakeholders enabling greater functionality and using open source technology. A new database will enable us to develop a more sophisticated approach to targeting communications and monitoring their effectiveness.

We will consult with members and update BOND's Statement of Principles reflecting collectively on our values and approach to development, supporting more effective development work

The Secretariat will build on the strategy plans provided by BOND working groups to support more productive structures and practices

BOND members will work with other networks to establish an effective UK platform for the Global Call to Action Against Poverty

A key priority will be strengthening BOND network relationships in climate change, aid, and with diaspora groups

#### Aim 4: Strengthening BOND

The priority for 2008/9 will be to establish new staff in their roles with clear responsibilities and priority objectives. Over the course of the year we will also continue to see the strengthening of HR practice. There will also be a continuation of commitment to training and learning for all staff and improvement in the working environment through responding to the results of the staff survey undertaken in April 2008.

We will review the financial performance of the training programme to ensure that this provides a sustainable contribution to unrestricted income, focusing on new income from trusts and foundations and a small number of corporates guidied by our ethical fundraising policy

BOND Board meetings will increasingly focus on key strategic issues and the strategy will be reviewed in Autumn 2008, at the midpoint of the 2006-11 strategy

#### Reserves policy

BOND needs reserves both to protect its current activities and to ensure the continuity of service in the future. The Board has examined the needs, risks and challenges faced by the organisation in both the short and medium term, along with the relevant financial forecasts, and has formulated a policy to meet those needs.

The company's reserves policy states that BOND's free reserves (calculated as the unrestricted reserves less designated funds) should be set to cover a minimum of six weeks, a maximum of three months and an ideal level of 10 weeks of budgeted unrestricted expenditure, and that this should be reviewed periodically, with a view to building reserves further. As at 31 March 2008, free reserves stand at £105,664 which represents 6.4 weeks of budgeted unrestricted expenditure.

#### Structure, Governance & Management

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 1 July 1997 and registered as a charity on 25 March 1998

The company was established under a memorandum of association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its articles of association

Members of the Board are elected from amongst the members at the Annual General Meeting, for a three-year term, or co-opted

The Trustees have a detailed induction process which includes inductions with the Chair, the General Secretary, each member of Management Team and other key staff members, as appropriate

The Board sets the strategy for BOND and the implementation is delegated to the management team that is led by the General Secretary with four managers covering Advocacy and Representation, Learning and Training, Membership and Communications, and Finance, Administration and Systems

#### Risk statement

The Board has updated the risk register of the potential risks facing the charitable company Measures to address the risks have been identified and steps taken to ensure that these are adequate

#### Funds held on behalf of others

As at 31 March 2008, BOND held £9,803 on behalf of Make Poverty History BOND also holds funds on behalf of the UK Aid Network (£49,980) which enables improved collective work on the quality and quantity of aid, and the World Can't Wait (£12,357) As these funds are held on behalf of others, they do not appear on the Balance Sheet

#### Statement of responsibilities of the trustees

The trustees are required to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and the incoming resources and application of resources, including the net income or expenditure, of the charity for the year. In preparing those financial statements the trustees are required to

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently,
- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,
   State whether applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the
- financial statements, and
  - Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to
- presume that the charity will continue in operation

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and which enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. The trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Each of the trustees confirms that to the best of his/her knowledge there is no information relevant to the audit of which the auditors are unaware. The trustees also confirm that they have taken all necessary steps to ensure that they themselves are aware of all relevant audit information and that this information has been communicated to the auditors.

Members of the charity guarantee to contribute an amount not exceeding £1 to the assets of the charity in the event of winding up. The total number of such guarantees at 31 March 2008 was 296 (2007 - 283). The trustees are members of the charity but this entitles them only to voting rights. The trustees have no beneficial interest in the charity.

#### **Auditors**

Sayer Vincent were re-appointed as the charitable company's auditors during the year and have expressed their willingness to continue in that capacity

Our responsibility is to audit the financial statements in accordance with relevant legal and regulatory requirements and International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland)

We report to you our opinion as to whether the financial statements give a true and fair view and are properly prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 1985. We also report to you whether the information given in the annual report of the trustees is consistent with the financial statements. In addition, we report to you if, in our opinion, the charitable company has not kept proper accounting records, if we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit, or if information specified by law regarding the trustees' remuneration and other transactions is not

## Basis of opinion

#### For the year ended 31 March 2008

#### 1. Accounting policies

- a) The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 1985. They follow the recommendations in the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (issued in March 2005).
- b) Voluntary income is received by way of donations and gifts and is included in full in the statement of financial activities when receivable
- c) Revenue grants are credited to the statement of financial activities when received or receivable whichever is earlier
  - Where unconditional entitlement to grants receivable is dependent upon fulfilment of conditions within the charity's control, the incoming resources are recognised when there is sufficient evidence that conditions will be met. Where there is uncertainty as to whether the charity can meet such conditions the incoming resource is deferred.
- d) Income generated from the supply of goods or services is included in the statement of financial activities in the period in which the supply is made
- e) Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor Expenditure which meets these criteria is charged to the fund
- f) Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources received or generated for the charitable purposes
- g) Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular purposes
- h) Transfers from unrestricted funds to restricted funds are made when a project funded by restricted income does not receive its full cost from its funder
- i) Where information about the aims, objectives and projects of the charity is provided to potential beneficiaries, the costs associated with this publicity are allocated to charitable expenditure
  - Where such information about the aims, objectives and projects of the charity is also provided to potential donors, activity costs are apportioned between fundraising and charitable activities on the basis of area of literature occupied by each activity
- j) Resources expended are recognised in the period in which they are incurred. Resources expended include attributable VAT which cannot be recovered.
- k) Resources expended are allocated to the particular activity where the cost relates directly to that activity. However, the support costs of overall direction and administration of each activity, comprising the salary and overhead costs of the central functions, is apportioned on the basis of expenditure relating to each activity. This is done on the following basis.

# 1. Accounting policies (continued)

- I) Governance costs are the costs associated with the governance arrangements of the charity. These costs are associated with constitutional and statutory requirements and include any costs associated with the strategic management of the charity's activities.
- m) Unrestricted reserves are transferred to restricted funds to compensate shortfalls of projects not fully recovered by specific funds
- n) Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write down the cost of each asset to its estimated residual value over its expected useful life. The depreciation rates in use are as follows

- o) Items of equipment are capitalised where the purchase price exceeds £350. Depreciation costs are allocated to activities on the basis of the use of the related assets in those activities.
- p) investments held as fixed assets are revalued at market value at the balance sheet date. Any gain or loss for the period is taken to the statement of financial activities
- q) Transactions in foreign currencies are translated at rates prevailing at the date of transaction Balances denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the rate of exchange prevailing at the balance sheet date. Any gain or loss for the period is taken to the statement of financial activities.
- r) The charity makes payments to defined contribution pension schemes on behalf of employees. The assets of the schemes are held separately from those of the charitable company in independently administered funds. The pension cost charge represents contributions payable to the funds during the year. The charity has no liability under the scheme other than the payment of those contributions.
