Report of the trustees

For the year ended 31 March 2009

The trustees present their report and the audited financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2009.

Reference and administrative information set out on pages 1 and 2 forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the memorandum and articles of association and the Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

Structure, Governance and Management

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 1 July 1997 and registered as a charity on 25 March 1998.

The company was established under a memorandum of association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its articles of association.

Members of the Board are elected from amongst the members at the Annual General Meeting, for a three-year term, or co-opted.

The trustees have a detailed induction process which includes inductions with the Chair, the Chief Executive, each member of the Management Team and other key staff members, as appropriate.

The Board sets the strategy for BOND and the implementation is delegated to the Management Team that is led by the Chief Executive with four managers covering Advocacy and Representation, Learning and Training, Membership and Communications, and Finance, Administration and Systems.

All trustees give their time voluntarily and received no benefits from the charity. Any expenses reclaimed from the charity are set out in note 5 to the accounts.

Objectives and activities

The objects for which BOND is established are the advancement of any charitable purpose and in particular for the relief of need anywhere in the world arising out of poverty, sickness, distress, age, infirmity and disablement by promoting the efficiency and effectiveness of voluntary organisations and other institutions in so far as such organisations and institutions are working to advance charitable purposes.

Public benefit focus on ensuring that our activities achieve our charitable aims

The trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and when planning the future activities.

The trustees review the charitable company's aims, objectives and activities each year. This report looks at what BOND has achieved and the outcomes of its work within the previous twelve months. The trustees report the success of each key activity and the benefits they have brought to those groups of people BOND is set up to help. The review also helps the trustees ensure the charitable company's aim, objectives and activities remained focused on its stated purposes.

Achievements and performance in the delivery of public benefit

Our main activities and who we try to help are described below. All our charitable activities focus on relief of need anywhere in the world arising out of poverty, sickness, distress, age, infirmity and disablement by promoting the efficiency and effectiveness of voluntary organisations and other institutions working in this area and are undertaken to further our charitable purposes for the public benefit.

Achievements and performance in 2008-9

Considerable progress was made against the key objectives outlined in the 2006-11 strategy, with many of the achievements made possible by the recruitment of new staff, including Chief Executive Nick Roseveare who led the review of BOND's work. This included strengthening the relationship with members and key stakeholders and building links with other strategic audiences to ensure that BOND effectively represented the sector and influenced those in power. Eight new trustees were elected to the Board, and all received a full induction. BOND said farewell to Richard Hawkes, after three years as BOND's Chair, and six as a BOND trustee. We would like to thank him for presiding over the organisation during a period of great change. Anna Feuchtwang was elected as his successor.

Aim 1: Building our influence

BOND played a crucial role in convening cross-sector groups, which has helped to consolidate member engagement in advocacy and credibility with stakeholders. As Chair of the Campaigning Coordination Team, we led and coordinated several successful high profile collective campaigning events including 50 Global Days of Action in October 2008 and the Put People First mobilisation in March 2009 ahead of the G20 London Summit. In the UK, approximately 50,000 and 35,000 people took part respectively, and both events helped to raise awareness of international development issues to a wider audience.

We deepened our relationship and extended our influence with key decision-makers to ensure that the views of BOND members and the UK development sector were represented at the highest level. This included the BOND submission to the Department for International Development (DFID) Institutional Strategy Paper for Europe, which influenced the Government's final paper, and joint work with the UK Aid Network on the High Level Forum on Aid Effectiveness in Accra, which led to a strong UK and European influence in the negotiations.

Member advocacy on EU development policy and institutional issues increased, for instance, the BOND Funding Group contributed to the CONCORD submission to the European Commission consultation on the EU budget review. We also influenced the debate around the Lisbon Treaty and future EU institutional reforms, primarily through the work of the BOND European Policy Group. We contributed to AidWatch and launched the 2008 AidWatch report to a UK audience.

Donor advocacy was accelerated to help secure a stable financial future for the sector. A formal submission was made to the DFID Governance and Transparency Fund review and we had an effective high-level dialogue with the Big Lottery Fund consultation. We also led a response to the Conservative Party's proposed Poverty Impact Fund, and work started on a long-term donor influencing strategy.

We contributed to the pan-European CONCORD manifesto for the EU elections and led work on the UK manifesto, which was used to engage members and promote the international development agenda to candidates. Hustings were held in each region, giving members of the public and others the chance to engage in the issues and ask their local candidates questions.

BOND Groups were supported by staff to enable them to advocate on their specialist areas of work.

Aim 2: Building our capacity

The Learning and Training Programme was redesigned to establish a set of 12 core workshops, increasing BOND's financial sustainability. Events were commissioned and marketed much earlier which resulted in increased booking numbers and earlier bookings. An improved monitoring and evaluation system gave us a deeper understanding of the impact of the programme, which will continue to inform our work.

Overall, 37 training courses and seminars (covering 48.5 days) were attended by 558 participants, as well as five in-house training courses, which were attended by 67 participants. Thirty-one people also took part in peer learning (18 people in two groups attended six meetings) and action learning (13 people in three sets attended eight meetings). Together, these activities generated an income of approximately £124,300, against an events expenditure of approximately £76,000.

A series of Directors' Dialogues engaged with senior directors and established BOND's support role to leaders in the sector. The purpose, direction and scope of BOND's quality and effectiveness work was reviewed in order to develop a clear direction for the future. The inception phase of the BOND Effectiveness Programme commenced. BOND was actively involved in the CSO Effectiveness Initiative led by CONCORD and we represented UK NGOs' interests at the Accra High Level Forum on Aid Effectiveness in September 2008.

Aim 3: Strengthening our membership and networks

Our print and e-communications were improved to ensure a consistent, engaging and contemporary look and feel.

Major new IT investments, including the website and database, began to transform how we communicate with members and other key stakeholders. Together, they helped us to operate more efficiently and effectively and provide a better service to members, and we will continue to develop this work next year.

Each of the 18 groups in the BOND Groups Programme had a clear work-plan for the year, and three new groups were set up to tackle specific areas of need identified by members. The Small NGOs Group was revitalised and a comprehensive consultation with members identified clear themes for the group. Group Chairs received ongoing professional support to maximise the impact of the work of their group; two Chairs meetings were held so that Chairs could learn and share together, and a handbook was produced.

BOND strengthened links with other strategically important national NGO networks, for example with the G8 and G20 countries, countries that have held the EU presidency, and international networks, including those of Bangladesh and Ethiopia, to explore and develop closer collaboration on the issues that unite us. We played a key role in Global Call to Action Against Poverty (GCAP) that led to improved structures and ways of working internationally, including a new GCAP Global Council. We also worked closely with CONCORD to achieve change in EU development policy.

Aim 4: Strengthening BOND

BOND's staff team saw a period of growth and stability, with a new Chief Executive starting in June 2008 and a full staff team in post by the end of December. In line with the commitment to continue to strengthen our HR practice, new members of staff were given comprehensive inductions and clear and measureable objectives were set for everyone. All staff had a personal development plan which outlined specific learning and training objectives appropriate to the role.

We reviewed the financial performance of the learning and training programme and changes were made to the programme proposition. As a result, we expect to see an increase in the range of events in the programme in 2010-11.

There was a mid-point review of the 2006-11 strategy which provided a useful reflection on progress made so far and highlighted areas on which to focus our work in the coming years. The findings informed the 2009-10 annual plans and the two-year objectives that were set in January 2009.

The findings of the staff survey resulted in four task groups being set up to address some of the topics that were raised. All staff were involved and contributed their thoughts and ideas and several work practices changed as a result.

Financial Review

Our income is derived primarily from membership subscriptions, training fees, advertising income and grants from the Department for International Development (DFID) and the Big Lottery Fund. BOND's income increased by 13% in the financial year. Income from membership fees rose by just over 16% while other earned income saw a slight decrease of 6%. BOND's restricted income grew by just over 30%, rising from just under £400,000 to over £500,000. This increase was from the Big Lottery Fund Strategic Funding Agreement.

Expenditure overall increased by 3%, from £1.22 million to £1.26 million. The largest increase in expenditure, of 20%, was on Advocacy and Representation, bringing the team to full strength and focussing on work around campaigning activities. Membership and Communications saw an increase of 6% in overall expenditure while the Learning and Training activities saw a decrease of 13%. This decrease was due to lower costs for running events.

During the year a surplus in funds of £125,867 was generated which brought the level of free reserves to £227,357 representing eleven weeks of budgeted unrestricted expenditure. The charitable company's reserves policy states that BOND's free reserves (calculated as the unrestricted reserves less designated funds) should be set to cover a minimum of six weeks, a maximum of three months and an ideal level of ten weeks of budgeted unrestricted expenditure; and that this should be reviewed periodically, with a view to building reserves further. As at 31 March 2009, free reserves stand at £227,357 which represents eleven weeks of budgeted unrestricted expenditure.

BOND needs reserves both to protect its current activities and to ensure the continuity of service in the future. The Board has examined the needs, risks and challenges faced by the organisation in both the short and medium term, along with the relevant financial forecasts, and has formulated a policy to meet those needs.

Plans for the future: 2009-10

We are now entering the fourth year of our current 2006-2011 strategy which will see us continuing to build on progress to date, while also starting to plan for the next strategic period: 2011-2016.

Aim 1: Building our influence

Our advocacy work will focus on the themes of the global economic and financial crisis, climate change and development, aid policies and practice, the EU's policies and raising the public profile of international development issues to the UK public through our members.

We will support BOND Groups to generate policy priorities and effective influencing to achieve specific policy change. We will deliver year two of our Campaigning Effectiveness programme and we will also work to further improve the UK structures that plan and deliver collective campaigning.

The first BOND sector advocacy strategy will be put in place to deliver a proactive and reactive programme to meet member concerns on regulatory issues.

Aim 2: Building our capacity

The step-change in the learning and training programme will continue, particularly in terms of its quality, content, marketing, financial sustainability, and planning. We will further develop the reach and effectiveness of our learning and training programme to new and current audiences.

We will launch the BOND Effectiveness Programme, a new and important initiative that aims to make a significant contribution to improving co-operation and relationships between donors and NGOs, developing common ground to meet their varying needs.

We will build on the alternative learning programme with peer exchange and action learning sets, and relaunch the leadership programme, building on the success of the Directors' Dialogues.

Aim 3: Strengthening our membership and networks

We will focus our efforts on increasing members' engagement in BOND activities, services and products. This will be informed by a membership strategy that will engage specific audiences, and data from the membership audit will help us identify priority and under-represented groups.

We will build on our communications to develop a strong visual identity, brand and core messages that strengthen our voice and position in the sector and support our main business functions. The review of the Statement of Principles, including a consultation with members, will form part of this work.

The BOND Groups will perform against the plans and strategies they put in place and will continue to be supported, with the emphasis shifting from administration to value-added support.

We will develop and strengthen our relationship with other networks by delivering the BOND CONCORD engagement strategy and will work with CONCORD and GCAP Europe to develop the capacity of other networks in EU member states to enable them to participate in dialogue and activities addressing shared concerns. We will also increase the sector's non-EU international networking opportunities by developing links with relevant international structures and initiatives.

Aim 4: Strengthening BOND

We will focus on BOND's resilience and fitness for purpose for the future in a tough funding and financial climate. The business model will be reviewed to assure fitness for purpose and sustainability for the future. The outcome will be a strategy for securing a more sustainable financial future. Our internal financial management will be improved with a tighter system of budgetary control by managers.

We will continue the development of our governance arrangements with a review of, and recommendations for, Board structure and role. The Statement of Principles will also be revisited along with the mechanisms by which BOND is accountable to its members.

We intend to continue to develop our HR management by the implementation of a simpler and more user friendly performance management scheme, incorporating a formal mid-year performance review, and we will continue to review and refine BOND's key HR policies.

Risk statement

The Board has updated the risk register of the potential risks facing the charitable company. Measures to address the risks have been identified and steps taken to ensure that these are adequate.

Statement of responsibilities of the trustees

The trustees are required to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and the incoming resources and application of resources, including the net income or expenditure, of the charity for the year. In preparing those financial statements the trustees are required to:

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently
- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- State whether applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements
- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and which enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. The trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Each of the trustees confirms that to the best of his/her knowledge there is no information relevant to the audit of which the auditors are unaware. Each of the trustees also confirms that they have taken all necessary steps to ensure that they themselves are aware of all relevant audit information and that this information has been communicated to the auditors.

Members of the charity guarantee to contribute an amount not exceeding £1 to the assets of the charity in the event of winding up. The total number of such guarantees at 31 March 2009 was 333 (2008 - 296). The trustees are members of the charity but this entitles them only to voting rights. The trustees have no beneficial interest in the charity.

Auditors

Sayer Vincent were re-appointed as the charitable company's auditors during the year and have expressed their willingness to continue in that capacity.

Independent auditors' report

To the members of

British Overseas NGOs for Development ('BOND')

We have audited the financial statements of British Overseas NGOs for Development ('BOND') for the year ended 31 March 2009 which comprise the statement of financial activities, balance sheet and related notes. Notes to the financial statements

For the year ended 31 March 2009

1. Accounting policies

- a) The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 1985. They follow the recommendations in the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities.
- b) Voluntary income is received by way of donations and gifts and is included in full in the statement of financial activities when receivable.
- c) Revenue grants are credited to the statement of financial activities when received or receivable whichever is earlier.
 - Where unconditional entitlement to grants receivable is dependent upon fulfilment of conditions within the charity's control, the incoming resources are recognised when there is sufficient evidence that conditions will be met. Where there is uncertainty as to whether the charity can meet such conditions the incoming resource is deferred.
- d) Income generated from the supply of goods or services is included in the statement of financial activities in the period in which the supply is made.
- e) Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure which meets these criteria is charged to the fund.
- f) Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources received or generated for the charitable purposes.
- g) Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular purposes.
- h) Transfers from unrestricted funds to restricted funds are made when a project funded by restricted income does not receive its full cost from its funder.
- i) Where information about the aims, objectives and projects of the charity is provided to potential beneficiaries, the costs associated with this publicity are allocated to charitable expenditure.
 - Where such information about the aims, objectives and projects of the charity is also provided to potential donors, activity costs are apportioned between fundraising and charitable activities on the basis of area of literature occupied by each activity.
- j) Resources expended are recognised in the period in which they are incurred. Resources expended include attributable VAT which cannot be recovered.
- k) Resources expended are allocated to the particular activity where the cost relates directly to that activity. However, the support costs of overall direction and administration of each activity, comprising the salary and overhead costs of the central functions, is apportioned on the basis of expenditure relating to each activity. This is done on the following basis:

Learning and Training	31.5%
Membership and Communication	27%

1. Accounting policies (continued)

- I) Governance costs are the costs associated with the governance arrangements of the charity. These costs are associated with constitutional and statutory requirements and include any costs associated with the strategic management of the charity's activities.
- m) Unrestricted reserves are transferred to restricted funds to compensate shortfalls of projects not fully recovered by specific funds.
- n) Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write down the cost of each asset to its estimated residual value over its expected useful life. The depreciation rates in use are as follows:

- o) Items of equipment are capitalised where the purchase price exceeds £350. Depreciation costs are allocated to activities on the basis of the use of the related assets in those activities.
- p) Investments held as fixed assets are revalued at market value at the balance sheet date. Any gain or loss for the period is taken to the statement of financial activities.
- q) Transactions in foreign currencies are translated at rates prevailing at the date of transaction. Balances denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the rate of exchange prevailing at the balance sheet date. Any gain or loss for the period is taken to the statement of financial activities.
- r) The charity makes payments to defined contribution pension schemes on behalf of employees. The assets of the schemes are held separately from those of the charitable company in independently administered funds. The pension cost charge represents contributions payable to the funds during the year. The charity has no liability under the schemes other than the payment of those contributions.

Purposes of restricted funds

Big Lottery Fund

A three year strategic grant was finalised with BIG in October 2007.

Baring Foundation

Funding from the Baring Foundation was received under its 'Strengthening the Voluntary Sector' grant line.

DFID SFA EU Policy

This is the funding supplied by the EU Department of DFID to cover the EU areas of the Strategic Funding Agreement.

Allan and Nesta Ferguson Charitable Trust

A grant was received from this Trust as a contribution towards campaigning activities.

NCVO Campaigning Effectiveness

A campaigning capacity building programme in partnership with NCVO and grant funded by Capacitybuilders. The small deficit on this restricted fund will be covered by future confirmed funding.

GCAP UK (Make Povery History)

Remaining funds from Make Poverty History were passed to BOND when the 2005 coalition ended.

Collective Campaigning

Funds received from members for activities in specific joint campaigns.

Joffe Charitable Trust

This grant was received in order for BOND to progress work on the Quality and Effectiveness Programme.

DFID - Representation Grant

BOND held and disbursed funds on behalf of DFID for representation of BOND members and partners from the South at specific international meetings.

Purposes of designated funds

The designated fund for investment and fixed assets reflect the company's funds tied up in fixed assets (£8,609).

Transfers

Two transfers from restricted to unrestricted funds were made in the year. These represent fixed assets purchased with restricted funds whereby the funder requirements are fullfilled upon purchase.

13. Operating lease commitments

The charity had no annual commitments at the year end under operating leases.

14. Funds held on behalf of others

During the year the control of the remaining Make Poverty History balance transferred to BOND's restricted funds. BOND is now responsible for the expenditure of these funds.

The agreement with the UK Aid Network came to and end in October 2008 and the balance of the funds were paid to ActionAid in March 2009. ActionAid will continue to administer these funds.

The contributors to the World Can't Wait campaign agreed that as from 1st April 2008, the remaining monies could be transferred to BOND, as a restricted fund, for the use of collective campaigning.

As at 31 March 2009, BOND held £51,722 on behalf of Put People First.

In accordance with the SORP 2005, these transactions are considered to represent conduit funding and, as such, are not shown in the charity's statement of financial activities. Equally, amounts still to be disbursed by BOND at the year end are not shown on the balance sheet.
