TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED)

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2009

Objectives and Activities

The European Pressure Ulcer Advisory Panel's (EPUAP) objective is to provide the relief of persons suffering from, or at risk of pressure ulcers, in particular through research and education of the public.

Major activities undertaken by the charity are the education of health care workers, patients and their carers and the general public.

Risk Management

The trustees have identified the major risks which the charity faces and are taking steps to mitigate those risks.

Objectives and Activities

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Achievements and Performances

The charity's objectives continue to be achieved. The 11th annual meeting of the EPUAP was held in Site Oud Sint Jan, Bruges in September 2008. The meeting was well attended and scientific exchange exciting and well received. A small financial surplus was made.

How the Charity meets the public benefit.

One of the main aims of the panel is education of the public with regard to prevention and treatment of pressure ulcers. There is widespread ignorance of the causes and treatment for this very debilitating and expensive condition. It is the panel's intention to remedy this by updating present guidelines with scientific back up and practice guidelines. This needs to be done in several forms – for medical personnel, care workers in nursing homes and relatives and friends who are faced with home care.

The main thrust of the panel for this year was the updating of the Prevention of Pressure Ulcer Guidelines in conjunction with the National Pressure Ulcer Advisory Panel (NPUAP) of USA who were updating the Treatment of Pressure Ulcer Guidelines. This was a massive ongoing programme incorporating guideline development groups and small working groups from throughout Europe and USA researching literature with special reference to randomised controlled trials to give justification of the guideline recommendations. Members of the EPUAP gave up their time free to research these problems and the EPUAP paid a postgraduate in the University of Gent, Belgium to collate the information. The whole process will be finished in 2009. Stakeholders in the project were also encouraged to give their comments on the web site which was specially set up for this. Educational grants from four companies helped to fund this project. The interest from Health authorities, Hospitals, Clinics, Nursing homes and the general public has been phenomenally high.

The 12th Annual European Pressure Ulcer Advisory Panel meeting will be held at the Academic Medical Center (AMC), Amsterdam the Netherlands where the theme of the meeting will be 'Pressure ulcers: not just a disease of the elderly – are your patients at risk?' The local host will be Dr.Maarten Lubbers, Surgeon and renowned speakers from throughout the world will lecture on problems and solutions as well as trustees who will be giving reports of local European studies and initiatives.

Membership of the panel continues to expand and Industry has yet again taken an active interest in the work of the Panel providing educational grants as well as expertise.

Financial Review and Reserves Policy

The charity reported net outgoing resources of £3825 for the year 2009 (2008 : incoming : £5595). The trustees continually monitor the funds of the charity.

It is the policy of the charity to maintain unrestricted funds, which are the free reserves of the charity, at a level which equates to approximately six months unrestricted expenditure. This would provide sufficient funds to cover management and administration and support costs and cover publication expenses. The trustees are researching ways to meet this objective.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2009

1. Accounting Policies

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the charity's financial statements.

(a) Company Status

The charity is a company limited by guarantee. The members of the company are the trustees.

(b) Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost accounting rules, and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities issued in March 2005 and the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2007).

(c) Fund Accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor.

(d) Income and Expenditure

Income and Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis. Conference income and expenditure is recognised in the year the event was held.

Monies received in respect of corporate sponsorship are allocated 25% to subscriptions and 75% to conference income. These funds are recognised on receipt.

Subscriptions are recorded on a receipts basis. The subscription period runs for one year from renewal/signing up date which may be at any time during the year. As the subscriptions are spread through the year no adjustment has been made for subscriptions in advance. Subscriptions are non-refundable.

(e) Tangible Fixed As sets

Tangible fixed assets are stated at historical cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided using the reducing balance basis at rates which reflect the anticipated useful lives of the assets and their estimated residual values:
