Objectives and Activities

Tête à Tête Productions was founded in the autumn of 1997 by director Bill Bankes-Jones and conductor Orlando Jopling.. The company became a registered company limited by guarantee in February 1998 and a registered charity in April 1998.

Mission Statement

Tête à Tête's mission is to bring uplifting, surprising, dangerous and intimate opera productions of the highest quality to the widest possible audience.

### **Aims**

- Presenting opera in unusual, innovative and imaginative ways to the highest possible standard.
- Developing new audiences and widening access to opera by performing in English and in atypical venues and formats.
- Making educational work central to the planning of all the company's activities.
- Developing the repertoire through the commissioning of new operas, translations and orchestrations.
- Contributing to the personal development of authors, performers and artistic personnel while creating the best possible working conditions.
- Operating efficiently, creatively, generously, and professionally.



Reveiw of Progress and Achievements.

Tête à Tête's third year of trading has seen tremendous leaps forward in the growth and definition of the company. With Orlando Plays Mad and revivals of The Flying Fox and Shorts, we have more than doubled our previous output of one production a year. In terms of touring development, profile of the company, relationships with partners and general consolidation of the organisation, the general health of the company has improved way beyond what might be immediately apparent.

Orlando Plays Mad - BAC Opera, August 2000

Always intended as an experiment, Orlando Plays Mad was received as very much a finished product, which is very flattering. Only in retrospect can one realise how huge an undertaking it was to resurrect, edit, translate and perform Vivaldi's opera for the first time since he himself performed it in 1714. The show played to packed houses and was very enthusiastically received. I later heard from the director of the Vivaldi Institute in Venice that it received more press, radio and television coverage in Italy than any previous Vivaldi modern première.

Among the many lessons from this experiment was how, with three times as many singers and four times as many instrumentalists as Shorts, to stage this kind of work experimentally really stretched Tête à Tête to the limit. So the planned full production, or any kind of tour, will have to wait until a powerful co-producer comes forward. The performances were supported with a well-attended study day involving a distinguished panel of experts from England and Italy.

The Flying Fox - Middle Temple Hall, November 2000

A selection from our first show (our own version of Strauss's Die Fledermaus) was performed for a fundraising event for RUKBA. Though entirely self-financing, the performance was invaluable in raising the company's profile as well as generating welcome income for artists.

## Shorts - Bridewell Theatre, February 2001

Much of the year was spent working very hard indeed to build on the success of Shorts (five short commissioned operas in one evening) by taking the production out on tour. After a huge drive to secure bookings, it became obvious that in order to overcome venues' trepidation of taking the production, we would have to revive it for them to see. By performing Shorts at the Bridewell theatre, we effectively staked out a new venue for contemporary opera in London, and formed an important new relationship for Tête à Tête. The performances also well exceeded our hopes for much-needed press coverage, with an impressive wad of rapturous reviews. The long sought-after tour bookings, meanwhile, are at last starting to materialise, and the production is scheduled to tour in the autumn. And so, despite more modest box-office returns than we are used to, Shorts at the Bridewell has very much achieved what we hoped.



Future projects and partnerships - 2001-2002

Though very much modified by the experiences of the last year, our plans for 2001-2002 are now much more defined in terms of the aims and development of Tête à Tête.

Shorts Tour - autumn 2001

The Canticles - November 2001 - co-production with Streetwise Opera

The invitation to co-produce Britten's Canticles with the young company Streetwise Opera came after our production of Orlando Plays Mad. We will work together on the project for three months with a remarkable company of professional artists and homeless people, culminating in public performances at the Royal Opera House in November. Amongst many other things, I am very pleased indeed for Tête à Tête to dedicate its resources for some months to a specifically educationally orientated project.

### Six-Pack

A further corollary of Shorts at the Bridewell has been the invitation from the ENO Studio to co-produce a second programme of Shorts. We have already assembled a remarkable team of writers, building on the existing relationships of both Tête à Tête and ENO. The co-production will give us the chance to allow the writers and company a really thorough development period, before opening in London in February 2002 and touring nationally the following spring - with bookings already materialising!

## Personnel

A major change for Tête à Tête has been the departure of Music Director Orlando Jopling. With the focus of the company narrowing onto smaller-scale newer work, it became clear that after three tremendously creative years, Orlando needed more time to devote to his other activities. The impeccable musical standards of the company will be maintained by two different music directors for the next two shows, each particularly well-suited to their respective projects: for The Canticles, Dominic Harlan, and for Six-Pack, Stuart Stratford. I'm also delighted to say that the majority of performers for each production have already performed - magnificently - with Tête à Tête.

Administratively, meanwhile, the company has developed hugely with the help of Caroline Steane, rapidly becoming indispensable taking care of the core and day-to-day administration of the company. Natalie Steed, meanwhile, has turned her peerless knowledge and experience of touring small-scale music theatre to getting Tête à Tête finally out on the road. With the support of our co-producers as well, I'm glad to say the administration of the company becomes more and more solid.

## Conclusion

I do hope that I have set out how successfully Tête à Tête and the company's plans for the future have developed and matured through 2000-2001. With a much clearer emphasis on smaller-scale more modern work, education and touring, I am sure the company will move from strength to strength.

Notes to the Accounts for the year ended 31st March 2001

1. Accounting Policies

#### General

These Accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable accounting standards and the Charities SORP (Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting by Charities").

# 2. Directors' Remuneration and Expenses

No remuneration directly or indirectly out of the funds of the charity was paid or payable for the period to any director or to any person or persons known to be connected with any director.

Mrs Louise Grattan was re-imbursed for expenses incurred during the year. These expenses were associated with a fund raising dinner and consisted of the cost of food and drink for the event. Receipts were received for all purchases. Other than this, no other reimbursement of expenses has been made or is due to be made to any of the directors in respect of the year.
