TRUSTEES' REPORT For the year ended 31 October 2005

The Trustees, who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act, submit their annual report and the financial statements of Verification Research, Training and Information Centre (VERTIC) for the year ended 31 October 2005. The Trustees confirm that the annual report and financial statements of the company comply with current statutory requirements, the requirements of the company's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in October 2000.

Constitution policies and objectives

The company is registered as a charitable company limited by guarantee and is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association as incorporated on 17 August 1998, and subsequently amended on 2 October 2000.

The company is established:

- To conduct research and obtain information on verification, monitoring and implementation of international and intra-national agreements, arrangements and related issues; and
- To publish such information both indirectly through the media channels and directly through its own publications.

There have been no changes in the objectives since the last annual report.

Directors and Trustees

The directors of the charitable company are its trustees for the purpose of charity law. There are no other trustees. The trustees who served throughout the period and at the date of this report are set out on page 1. A Board of Directors governs the company. In accordance with VERTIC's constitution, the maximum number of Board members is determined by the company in general meeting and the minimum number in office at any given time must be three. At the Annual General Meeting on 21 January 2005 all of the existing Board members resigned and were eligible for reappointment. The Board of Directors has the power to appoint new Board members at any time up to the maximum fixed amount, currently nine persons.

Organisational structure and decision making

The Board of Directors is responsible for overall control of VERTIC's operations and meets regularly to review the performance of VERTIC, and to plan and authorise strategic decisions. The Executive Director is responsible for the day-to-day administration of the charity.

Review of activities and future developments

Introduction

This has been a year of change and financial constraint for the organization. However, despite this, VERTIC has continued to maintain a high level of productivity and quality of publications and activities. Furthermore, despite the organizational constraints VERTIC has managed to develop new and innovative projects.

Nuclear weapons

In the nuclear area, VERTIC continued to closely follow developments in respect of Iran and North Korea, as well as the continuing improvement in nuclear safeguards. VERTIC continued its close collaboration with the Comprehensive Nuclear Test Ban Treaty Organization (CTBTO), including holding a seminar during the CTBT Article XIV Conference, in New York, in September 2005. Under a commission from the UK Overseas Development Institute (ODI), VERTIC produced a comprehensive report: 'An overview of the evolution, operation and status of nuclear safeguards', which was published in October 2005.

Biological and chemical weapons

VERTIC's work on biological weapons has continued apace. During 2005, VERTIC worked with the ICRC to develop a model law to implement the BWC and BW-related provisions of UNSCR 1540 ['The Biological and Toxin Weapons Crimes Act'], an initial draft of which was launched at an ICRC/Foreign and Commonwealth Office (UK) workshop on international humanitarian law, held in Kenya, in July 2005. VERTIC has continued to chair the BioWeapons Prevention Project (BWPP) and contributed to many of its activities including a series of seminars on BW issues hosted by the BWPP in New Zealand during February 2005 and a range of seminars held at the Meeting of Experts to the BWC in June 2005 and the BWC meeting of State Parties in December 2005. VERTIC was also an observer at an UNMOVIC biological weapons inspector training course held in the UK in July and August 2005.

VERTIC has also maintained a watching brief on chemical weapons concerns and in November 2005, observed the Tenth session of the Conference of States Parties to the Chemical Weapons Convention in Geneva, Switzerland.

Weapons of mass destruction

In January 2005, VERTIC submitted comments on the EU Strategy against Proliferation of Weapons of Mass Destruction and these formed part of the House of Lords report: 'Preventing Proliferation of Weapons of Mass Destruction: The EU Contribution' (April 2005). In April 2005, the Weapons of Mass Destruction Commission (WMDC) published a report written by VERTIC on: 'National measures to implement WMD treaties and norms: the need for international standards and technical assistance'.

In July 2005, under a one year grant from the UK Foreign and Commonwealth Office's Global Opportunities Fund, VERTIC initiated a major programme to raise awareness and build capacity among states to implement nuclear and biological weapons treaties, norms and UN Security Council resolutions (specifically UNSCR 1540) through national measures, including laws and regulations. The capacity building materials for this project are being developed through consultations with international and national civil servants and academia. These materials will provide the basis for a series of awareness raising seminars with diplomats on the margins of treaty meetings (the first of which took place on the margins of the December 2005 Meeting of States Parties to the BWC in Geneva, Switzerland). These meetings will be complemented by a set of regional seminars, commencing with pilot workshops in the Middle East and South Asia during 2006.

VERTIC's Deputy Director was also commissioned to write a chapter on 'UNSCR 1540 and the BWC' for a book on the Resolution, which will be published by the Brookings Institution and Chatham House in early 2006.

UN review of verification

In October 2005, VERTIC's Deputy Director presented a paper on 'Evolution in verification technologies' as part of an expert seminar on Verifying non-proliferation and disarmament agreements, organised by the UN Department for Disarmament Affairs. Subsequently she has been commissioned by UNIDIR to act as a consultant to the UN Governmental Panel of Experts on Verification, which is due to commence work in January 2006.

Environment

VERTIC's Climate Change Project continued apace this year. The Environment Researcher has written a major paper on the role of verification in the climate change regime, versions of which will appear in two forthcoming publications by International Institute of Applied Systems Analysis and the European Safeguards Research and Development Association. He has participated in a series of governmental and non-governmental climate change meetings, as well as the eleventh session of the UN Conference of the Parties to the Climate Change Convention (COP 11) and the first meeting of the Parties to the Kyoto Protocol (MOP 1), held in Montreal, Canada from 29 November to 9 December 2005. During this conference, VERTIC launched a Brief on the Kyoto Protocol's compliance mechanisms. The researcher has also contributed to the activities of the Climate Action Network (CAN).

Review of activities and future developments (continued)

The climate change work carried out during 2005 will be built on in the 2005-2007 grant period. Throughout the year, the researcher has kept a watching brief on developments in other multilateral environmental agreements.

Peace and human security

Although VERTIC had no dedicated staff or funding for its Peace and Human Security Programme, the organization maintained a watching brief in this area with articles in Trust & Verify. Furthermore a VERTIC Brief on verification of the Israeli-Palestinian Peace Agreement will be published in February 2006.

Conventional weapons

Despite the fact that VERTIC has not received dedicated funding for work on conventional arms and antipersonnel landmine issues for several years, the organization maintained a low level of engagement on this area. This led to VERTIC being commissioned by UNIDIR to write a paper on 'Verifying EU arms embargoes' and to contribute to UNIDIR's project on 'European Action on Small Arms, Light Weapons and Explosive Remnants of War' which was funded by the European Commission. VERTIC also re-established its membership of the International Action Network on Small Arms (IANSA) and joined the UK Working Group on Arms Transfers.

Publications, networking and information

VERTIC's publications, networking and information activities have continued apace. Four issues of Trust & Verify were issued, along with one new VERTIC Brief. VERTIC staff have also produced a number of commissioned reports (detailed above) and articles in a wide range of publications. In February 2005 VERTIC launched its online Verification Organizations Directory (VOD) with contact details for over 500 national and international entities based in 171 countries involved in verification activities in the field of arms control and disarmament. VERTIC also became a principal partner of the International Relations and Security Network (ISN), which provides an additional opportunity to promote VERTIC's work through a well-respected information clearinghouse. Due to lack of funds and delays in recruitment of key staff, work on the Verification Yearbook was postponed.

Staffing

This year VERTIC has seen important staff changes. Trevor Findlay, VERTIC's Executive Director of seven years resigned in early February 2005 and was replaced at the end of June by Michael Crowley. Angela Woodward was appointed Deputy Director in January 2005 and became Acting Director during the five month interregnum. In September 2005 Jez Smith joined VERTIC as Assistant Information Officer and Networker under the Quaker Peace and Social Witness programme, his salary funded by the Joseph Rowntree Charitable Trust. At the end of December 2005, VERTIC's Administrator, Ben Handley, resigned. A recruitment process is now underway for his replacement.

In November 2005, VERTIC successfully obtained funding from Polden Puckham to extend its Science Fellow Programme. The first three-month Science Fellow will join VERTIC in February 2006 and work on the verification of nuclear research and development (specifically weaponization of nuclear materials). A second Science Fellow will be recruited in July 2006 to work on an environmental programme project.

Fundraising

Given the very poor financial position of the organization in the first half of 2005, fundraising became the top priority for both the Acting Director and the incoming Executive Director. During this year, VERTIC obtained significant new grants from the UK Foreign and Commonwealth Office Global Opportunities Fund and the Ford Foundation. VERTIC also successfully renewed its two year grant from the Esmée Fairbairn Foundation. It received smaller grants from Polden Puckham to expand its Science Fellow programme and from the Joseph Rowntree Charitable Trust to upgrade its aged computer system.

Despite these welcome funds the financial situation is still not satisfactory. Fund raising continues to be the top priority for the Executive Director. VERTIC has recently developed a three year environmental programme fundraising strategy to broaden and deepen funding in this area. A similar fundraising strategy is now being developed for other areas of the organization's work.

Dependence on volunteers

A steady stream of interns continued to be attracted to VERTIC. While interns make a great contribution to VERTIC's work and work ambience, it could not be said that VERTIC's operations were dependent on them.

Reserves policy and risk assessment

A detailed review of the VERTIC's activities, risks and opportunities is conducted annually by the trustees and staff and forms an integral part of the charity's strategic planning. The trustees are confident that a full spectrum of risks faced by the charity has been identified, quantified and where appropriate, action taken to mitigate those risks.

Our responses to the external risks identified play a key part in shaping our strategy and our operational plans. Internal risks are addressed by periodic reviews of internal controls and improvements in systems designed to minimise such risks. Examples include:

- Written procedures governing the delegation of authority to the Executive Director and to other staff.
- Formal limits of authorised expenditure for each staff member and the requirement for at least two signatories to approve transactions above specified levels.
- Segregation of duties amongst members of staff as far as possible.
- Regular reviews and reconciliations of the accounting records by the Executive Director.
- Responding to any control issues highlighted by our auditors.

A key component of the Trustees' strategy to mitigate risk is the policy of maintaining a level of unrestricted reserves, which ensures that there are adequate funds to meet all current and known future liabilities. In practice, the trustees consider that holding unrestricted reserves equivalent to three to six months' core costs provides sufficient resources to respond to unexpected adverse changes in VERTIC's funding or activities. This is equivalent to between £50,000 and £100,000 based on current costs. At present, the free funds amount to £14,272. The level of reserves is reviewed at regular intervals by the trustees, and consideration is being given to ways in which additional unrestricted funds can be raised.

VERTIC is an expanding charity in an ever-changing environment and the trustees are very much aware that the risks facing the charity are not constant. Consequently, the monitoring of risk will continue to be a high priority for the trustees and staff.

Investment policy and performance

The Memorandum and Articles of Association provides that the company invests moneys not immediately required for its own purposes in or upon such investments, securities or property, as may be thought fit. At the present time the trustee's policy is to maintain all such monies on deposits earning a market rate of interest.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (continued) For the year ended 31 October 2005

Financial review

VERTIC's income was £265,473 in the year ended 31 October 2005 compared to £293,249 for the year to 31 October 2004. The total expenditure was £301,854 for the year to 31 October 2005 compared to £292,924 for the year ended 31 October 2004. The fund balance carried forward at 31 October 2005 was £18,228 on unrestricted general reserves. The restricted reserves balance on ongoing projects was £87,496 at 31 October 2005. The full Statement of Financial Activities is set out on page 9 of these accounts.

VERTIC holds no significant assets apart from fixtures and fittings, office and computer equipment.

Details of the restricted projects are given in note 12 to the accounts. The trustees are confident that adequate resources are available to enable completion of these projects.

Trustees' responsibilities

Company and charity law applicable to charities in England and Wales requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company and of the surplus or deficit of the company for that period. In preparing those financial statements the Trustees have:

- selected suitable accounting policies and applied them consistently;
- made judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- stated whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepared the financial statements on a going concern basis (unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation).

The Trustees have overall responsibility for ensuring that the company has an appropriate system of controls, financial and otherwise. They are also responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the detection and prevention of fraud and other irregularities.

Auditors

A resolution proposing that Trustient be re-appointed as auditors of the company will be put to the Annual General Meeting.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the year ended 31 October 2005

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2005). The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" published in October 2000, applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 1985.

1.2 Company status

The company is a company limited by guarantee. The members of the company are the trustees named on page 1. In the event of the company being wound up, each member is liable to contribute a sum not exceeding £1.

1.3 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the company and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors which have been raised by the company for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

1.4 Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activites when the company is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. Income from donations and grants is included in incoming resources when these are receivable, except as follows:-

- When donors specify that donations and grants given to the charity must be used in future accounting periods, the income is deferred until those periods.
- When donors impose conditions which have to be fulfilled before the charity becomes entitled
 to use such income, the income is deferred and not included in incoming resources until the
 pre-conditions for use have been met.

Donated services are included at the value to the company where this can be quantified and a third party is bearing the cost. No amounts are included in the financial statements for services donated by volunteers.

1.5 Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been included under expense categories that aggregate all costs for allocation to activities. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular activities they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of the resources.

Overheads have been allocated on the basis of staff costs.

Fund-raising costs are those incurred in seeking voluntary contributions and do not include the costs of disseminating information in support of the charitable activities. Management and administration costs are those incurred in connection with administration of the company and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the year ended 31 October 2005

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

1.6 Cash flow

The financial statements do not include a cash flow statement because the charitable company, as a small reporting entity, is exempt from the requirement to prepare such a statement under the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective June 2002).

1.7 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

All assets costing more than £200 are capitalised.

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives on the following bases:

Furniture and Fittings - 25% reducing balance
Office Equipment - 25% reducing balance
Computer Equipment - 25% reducing balance

Computer equipment funded through restricted project funding has been written off over the duration of the project.

1.8 Operating leases

Rentals applicable to operating leases where substantially all of the benefits and risks of ownership remain with the lessor are charged to the SOFA as incurred.

1.9 Foreign currencies

Assets and liabilities in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rates of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. Transactions in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rate ruling on the date of the transaction. Exchange differences are taken into account in arriving at the net income/(expenditure)result.

1.10 Pensions

The charity subscribes to individual pension plans covering all its permanent employees. The staff contract stipulates that the charity will make contribution of at least 3% of basic pay provided the employee also contributes. Such contributions are held in funds administered by Friends Provident completely independently of the charity's finances. The charity's contributions are defined and no further liabilities accrue to the charity. Pension costs charged in the Statement of Financial Activities represent the contributions payable by the charity in the year.

1.11 Value Added Tax

The charity is not registered for VAT. In common with many other registered charities, The Verification Research, Training and Information Centre's expenses are inflated by VAT, which cannot be recovered.

1.12 Tax status

The company is a registered charity and is not subject to corporation tax on its current activities.

Each of the projects is described in more detail below:

Kyoto Protocol Project

This project promotes effective verification of the Kyoto Protocol to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change. This is the second year of a 2 year grant from the Esmée Fairbairn Foundation.

Arms Control & Disarmament Programme

In this programme, funded by various funders, Ploughshares Fund, the Foreign & Commonwealth Office and the Canadian, Norwegian and Netherlands Governments VERTIC promotes effective verification measures for, and monitors the implementation of and compliance with all major arms control and disarmament regimes, including:

- nuclear (notably the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty, including International Atomic Energy Agency nuclear safeguards, the Comprehensive Nuclear Test Ban Treaty)
- biological (the Biological Weapons Convention)
- chemical (the Chemical Weapons Convention) and small arms and light weapons, including landmines.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the year ended 31 October 2005

Information/Networking Programme

Funded by the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation, this programme involves expanding VERTIC's network of contacts and collaborators in the verification field generally, increasing VERTIC's media presence and developing its publications activities, including its website. It also provides for conferences and workshops on key verification issues.

VERTIC Science Fellowship

Funding received in the previous financial year from Polden-Puckham Charitable Foundation was used to provide for a Science Fellowship. This enabled VERTIC to appoint a scientist in this post on a short-term contract to work on the Fissile Material Cut-off Treaty.

Relocation Costs

VERTIC relocated to new premises during the previous year. The costs related to the relocation were partially funded by the Joseph Rowntree Charitable Trust. The balance of funding still remaining will be fully utilised in the coming financial year, in accordance with the funding agreement, for equipment purchases.
