Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 December 2006

Objectives of the charity

The aim of the charity is to improve patient care through,

- 1 enhancing the ethical and communication skills of health professionals, and
- 2 developing effective ways in which organisations involved in the delivery of health care can promote high ethical standards

Operating policy

In order to achieve this aim, the charity focuses on three areas of activity

- 1 The development and delivery of undergraduate and postgraduate education and training with the object of equipping health professionals to care for the whole patient
- 2 Research into a range of key ethical and communication issues which affect the practice of medicine
- 3 Working with both the purchasers and providers of health care in establishing clinical ethics consultation services including clinical ethics committees

In pursuit of these aims the Ethox Foundation has powers to employ its own staff on a full or part time basis, to engage consultants, to make grants to universities and other educational institutions, plan and manage training courses, seminars etc. alone or in collaboration with other bodies, and to provide support facilities for scholars working in the Foundation's area of interest.

Organisational structure

The charity is managed by the trustees with the support of an administrator. Professor Michael Parker, Director of the Ethox Centre in the Department of Public Health and Primary Care in the University of Oxford, and Professor Tony Hope act as advisors to the Ethox Foundation.

Review of the year

It is with great sadness that the Board heard of Caroline Miles' death in November 2006. Caroline was the founding Chairman of the Ethox Foundation and was instrumental in founding the only academic Centre for Clinical Ethics in this country. She was astute, an inspirational leader and a warm and generous person with extensive experience of negotiating the labyrinth of health care and academe. During her time as Chairman of the Ethox Foundation she enabled major donations to be used to promote the development of Clinical Ethics in this country and latterly overseas. She was always concerned about the welfare of patients. She will be greatly missed.

The Clinical ethics support project continues to develop. The UK Clinical Ethics Network is about to be registered as a Charity and it has begun to receive subscriptions from individual ethics committees. There are now 90 clinical ethics committees in the Network. The Network has taken over the running of its own annual conference. The CES project continues to provide academic support to the Network in a number of ways. The Network website is run by the CES project and continues to be well used. We have received funding from the Department of Health to develop web based resources on this site to raise awareness of the Mental Capacity. Act implementation. We will be seeking similar funding to develop other topic resources on the site over the next 12 months.

During the year, the Centre continued to develop its international links with help from the Foundation, through visits by visiting academics from abroad and from its continued links with the Mount Sinai Medical School in New York

As of 31 December 2006, there were 16 members of staff, three funded wholly or in part by the Foundation

Future strategy

The Foundation continues to support the work in the Ethox Centre in the development of clinical ethics and communication skills in day-to-day medical practice, in the hospital setting and in primary care. Its focus remains patients and their families, and the ways in which ethically aware and appropriately trained health professionals can improve the quality of health care.

The Centre carries out training, provides ethics support to the NHS and carries out ethics research lts research focuses on ethics relating to four areas mental health, genetics, global health and clinical ethics

The Centre's national importance is now well-established Its international role is increasing through staff participation in seminars and conferences overseas and through its ability to offer hospitality to overseas scholars and those responsible for medical education

Future strategy (continued)

Although the Foundation's current financial resources are limited it is able to play a significant role in initiating these and other new areas of research and teaching, through small grants for pump-priming and pilot studies, and in support of visitors to the Centre, as well as funding posts on a full or part-time basis

Reserves policy

At 31 December 2006 general reserves stood at £188,865. A further £9,261 was held in restricted funds to support the work of the UK Clinical Ethics Committee and work on ethics and anorexia nervosa. The Board regularly compares planned expenditure with the level of the reserves to ensure that activities can continue for at least two years ahead.

Risk review

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks. The trustees believe that the main external risk to the foundation is the level of donations it receives. To mitigate this risk the trustees are currently developing plans to increase the number of donations received.

Trustees

The names of the trustees - who are the directors for the purpose of company law - who served during the year and up to the date of this report are set out on page 1

Members of the company guarantee to contribute an amount not exceeding £1 to the assets of the company in the event of winding up. The total number of such guarantees at 31 December 2006 was 6 (2005-6)

Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of the affairs of the charitable company as at the balance sheet date and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including income and expenditure, for the financial year. In preparing those financial statements, the trustees should follow best practice and

- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue on that basis

We have audited the financial statements of The Oxford Foundation for Ethics and Communication in Health Care Practice for the year ended 31 December 2006 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities and Summary Income and Expenditure Account, the Balance Sheet and the related notes. 1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities, the Companies Act 1985 and follow the recommendations in Accounting and Reporting by Charities Statement of Recommended Practice published in October 2005

incoming resources

Voluntary income received by way of donations and gifts and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable. The value of services provided by volunteers (including trustees) is not included

Grants are recognised in full in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they are receivable

Resources expended

Resources expended are recognised in the period in which they are incurred, and include attributable VAT which cannot be recovered

Resources expended are allocated to the particular activity where the cost relates directly to that activity Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they are allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources

Grants payable are recognised as expenditure when the commitment is entered into. Where such a grant is to be paid over instalments, the outstanding balance is disclosed as a liability.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset over its expected useful life. The following rates are used

Web site 25% on cost

Office equipment 25% on reducing balance Furniture and fittings 20% on reducing balance

Items of equipment are capitalised where the purchase price exceeds £200

Pension contributions

The company contributes to a defined contribution pension scheme for its employees. The charge in the statement of financial activities represents the contributions payable to the scheme for the accounting period.

Unrestricted funds

Unrestricted funds are funds which are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes

Restricted funds

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes
