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Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 December 2007

Objectives of the charity

The aim of the charity is to improve patient care through,

1 enhancing the ethical and communication skills of health professionals, and

2 developing effective ways in which organisations involved in the delivery of health care can promote high ethical standards

Operating policy

In order to achieve this aim, the charity focuses on three areas of activity

- 1 The development and delivery of undergraduate and postgraduate education and training with the object of equipping health professionals to care for the whole patient
- Research into a range of key ethical and communication issues which affect the practice of medicine
- Working with both the purchasers and providers of health care in establishing clinical ethics consultation services including clinical ethics committees

In pursuit of these aims the Ethox Foundation has powers to employ its own staff on a full or part time basis, to engage consultants, to make grants to universities and other educational institutions, plan and manage training courses, seminars etc. alone or in collaboration with other bodies, and to provide support facilities for scholars working in the Foundation's area of interest.

Organisational structure

The charity is managed by the trustees with the support of an administrator Professor Michael Parker, Director of the Ethox Centre in the Department of Public Health and Primary Care in the University of Oxford, and Professor Tony Hope act as advisors to the Ethox Foundation

Review of the year

The Ethox Centre shares the Foundation's commitment to enhancing patient care by improving the ethical understanding and ethical standards of health professionals and healthcare organisations. It does this through research, education and the provision of ethics support to healthcare professionals and medical researchers. The Foundation currently supports two positions within the Centre. One of these is a full-time post which provides general administrative support to the Centre's clinical ethics activities.

During 2007, the Centre's new research activities included an empirical ethics research project investigating the views of patients, health professionals and medical researchers on the ethical issues arising in the use of personal medical records for research. In addition to its research activities, the Centre has continued to provide ethics support and education to health professionals and healthcare organisations both locally and nationally Locally, this includes support for the Oxford Radcliffe Hospitals Trust Clinical Ethics Committee and monthly ethics support to the Churchill Hospital's Regional Genetics Service. Nationally, the Ethox Centre runs a regular national ethics forum for nurses, genetic counsellors and doctors working with families with inhented conditions to present and discuss difficult cases and to share good practice. Proposed areas for future development include research on the ethical and policy issues arising in the care of vulnerable adults. This is a very important and expanding area of health care which presents a number of important ethical issues and where there is the potential for research to lead to important improvements in patient care. A proposal for a programme of empirical ethics research in this area is currently being considered for funding by the Foundation.

The other post funded by the Foundation is a part-time post to develop clinical ethics support. The Clinical Ethics Support Project has had a successful year. Its work in support of the UK Clinical Ethics Network continues in a number of ways. For example, Foundation support has been crucial in enabling the CEC network to establish a robust structure of support to clinical ethics committees in the UK. This has resulted in the Network becoming a registered charity in 2007. — the UK Clinical Ethics Network. The Network is now taking the lead on development of a core competencies statement for clinical ethics committees. The network website, maintained and developed by the Clinical Ethics Support Project, continues to be well-used. During 2007, a collaborative project between the Foundation and the Network to develop web-based resources and workshops on the Mental Capacity Act 2005 was funded by the Department of Health. At the end of 2007, the web resources were nearing completion and two out of three workshops had been held. We are currently negotiating with the GMC regarding a similar project on ethical issues in treating children and adolescents linked to new GMC guidance in this area. Areas for future development of the Clinical Ethics Support Project have been identified and a joint proposal between the Ethox Centre and Warwick Medical School to further expand research, education and the development work in clinical ethics, is currently being considered by the Foundation.

Last year we reported the death of our previous Chairman, Caroline Miles. Caroline was the inspiration behind the founding of the Charity. Her commitment to the Foundation has been evidenced by her bequeathing the residue of her estate to the Charity. The Board looks forward to commemorating her life and work by annual named tectures.

Future strategy

The Foundation continues to support the work in the Ethox Centre and is currently considering the two research proposals outlined in the 'Review of the year'. The Centre's national importance is now well-established. Its international role is increasing through staff participation in seminars and conferences overseas and through its ability to offer hospitality to overseas scholars and those responsible for medical education. The Foundation's focus remains patients and their families, and the ways in which ethically aware and appropriately trained health professionals can improve the quality of health care

Risk Management will continue to be a priority for the Board. The Chairman has held discussions with an Organisation Development consultant who has offered to work pro bono for the Foundation. It is anticipated this work will be instrumental in developing strategy and improving governance. The Trustees welcomed and appreciated this opportunity to look to the future

Reserves policy

At 31 December 2007 general reserves stood at £544,847 A further £13,375 was held in restricted funds to support the work of the UK Clinical Ethics Committee, work on ethics and anorexia nervosa and work on a project linked to the Mental Health Capacity Act. The Board regularly compares planned expenditure with the level of the reserves to ensure that activities can continue for at least two years ahead

Risk review

The Foundation has used the Charity Commission's document 'Charity and Risk Management' to begin to identify potential risk area's, their potential impact and mitigation. Role descriptions were developed for the Chairman, Treasurer and Secretary to the Board

In order to improve the skills and knowledge base of the Board the following new trustees have been appointed since the year end

Mr Charles Foster Dr Stephen Louw Mrs Annie Young

Each new trustee now receives an induction pack in line with Charity Commission guidelines and best practice

A risk assessment document was produced. This outlined the necessary internal controls that needed to be put into place. The document included the work that the Chairman and Administrator had already undertaken to ensure the recommended internal controls were in place. A series of procedural documents have been produced and were presented to the Trustees These were

- a Project Management
- b Roles and Duties of Officers
- c Trustee Induction
- d Financial Procedures

Declaration of Interests, Declaration of Eligibility, and Conflict of Interest policy documents are in course of production as well as the continuing review of the Charity Commission's document 'Charity and Risk Management'

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities, the Companies Act 1985 and follow the recommendations in Accounting and Reporting by Charities Statement of Recommended Practice published in October 2005

Incoming resources

Voluntary income received by way of donations and gifts and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable. The value of services provided by volunteers (including trustees) is not included

Grants are recognised in full in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they are receivable

Resources expended

Resources expended are recognised in the period in which they are incurred, and include attributable VAT which cannot be recovered

Resources expended are allocated to the particular activity where the cost relates directly to that activity Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they are allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources

Grants payable are recognised as expenditure when the commitment is entered into. Where such a grant is to be paid over instalments, the outstanding balance is disclosed as a liability.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset over its expected useful life. The following rates are used

Web site 25% on cost

Office equipment 25% on reducing balance Furniture and fittings 20% on reducing balance

Items of equipment are capitalised where the purchase price exceeds £200

Pension contributions

The company contributes to a defined contribution pension scheme for its employees. The charge in the statement of financial activities represents the contributions payable to the scheme for the accounting period.

Unrestricted funds

Unrestricted funds are funds which are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes

Restricted funds

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes
