### Cumbria Community Foundation Year ended 31 March 2022

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#### **Chairman's Statement**

Cumbria Community Foundation's over-arching objective is to make high quality grants in support of our most effective charities and community organisations, targeted to address the greatest need in the county.

Five years ago in order to expand our grant giving, we agreed an ambitious five-year business plan with targets to double our long-term funds under management from £15m to £30m and to double our annual base grant making from £1.4m to £2.8m. I am delighted to report that we have made massive strides over the last 5 years with long term funds under management now standing at £27.4mn (close to our target) and grant making in this last year of £4.1mn (way above our plan).

We retain our grant making priorities, which are:

- · Improving the lives of disadvantaged children and families
- Improving the life skills, education, employability and enterprise of disadvantaged people
- Supporting vulnerable older people
- · Improving the health and wellbeing of people
- Strengthening and supporting fragile communities
- · Enabling people to access arts, sports, culture, heritage and the environment

Spend against each priority is monitored and reported in detail in our Annual Report. It is important to be able to report clearly to donors and fundholders on the benefits arising from our grant expenditure.

Within our grant making strategy is an objective to make a smaller number of larger, multiyear grants to key organisations addressing priority issues. This objective ensures we provide sustainable benefits for organisations that are delivering strongly against our key criteria. This is assisted by increasing the coordination of support from multiple funds to high priority projects. Our average group grant size has increased by 30% over the last five years with 433% more multiyear grants awarded.

We are currently in the process of developing our next five-year plan and are extremely grateful to all those who have taken the trouble to contribute to the process so far. We will complete this process in the next few months.

Income this year was £5,406,270. This included substantial flow through funds – Sellafield Ltd gave £522,500 in March 2022 for the Bedrock programme; Better Tomorrows received donations/transfers from other funds of £499,962; we received funding of £667K for NHS North Cumbria Discharge Support Fund at the end of March, which was a follow on from NHS Hospital Discharge Fund; we also received £253,621 for the NHS Community Mental Health Transformation Fund, which will be spent next year; £350K from Cumbria County Council (CCC) for the Third Party Organisation Fund and a further £100K for the Community Resilience Fund; an individual donor gave £100k to the Young Persons Opportunity Fund.



It also includes donations to endowed funds as follows: £50K to setup the Buen Paso Fund; An increase to the Johnson Fund of £238,200; £93,650 donation to the Westmorland Fund; £50K Gurney Charitable Trust and £40K into the Thomas Graham Fund.

Promotion of philanthropy is a long-term process. The harsh reality is that what we do has never been more important. We are hugely grateful to all our funders and supporters who are enabling us to continue to develop and expand our activities.

In terms of direct grant giving, grants awarded totalled £4,109,543 with 499 grants awarded. In addition, we assessed 43 grants totalling £331,780 from funds managed by others which results in total grant giving of £4,441,323. Some of the key areas of grant giving follow: Better Tomorrows Programme £143,895; Cumbria Fund £267,241; NHS Hospital Discharge Fund £280,431; NHS Psychological Fund £138,182; Third Party Organisation Fund £240,463; Transforming West Cumbria £673,005; West Cumbria COVID-19 Community Recovery and Renewal Programme £445,091; Westmorland Family Fund £108,744; Winter Warmth £222,200; Young Persons Opportunity Fund £103,521.

You will see from the above, that in addition to our traditional grant giving, there has been substantial activity around themed programmes. This is a developing, and very important, capability within Cumbria Community Foundation.

Trustees continue to plan for board succession. We are enormously blessed that many good people are willing to give of their time and energy in support of our activities. We welcomed Suzanne Wilson as a new board member during this financial year and said farewell to Katherine Fairclough who moved on to pastures new. We welcomed on to our Grants Committees Bridget Johns, Niall McNulty, Philip Dixon, Alan Pitcher and Matty Buck and welcomed back Paul Rowe. My heartfelt thanks to all the funders, supporters, staff, Trustees and grant panel members who enable us to support so many amazing organisations and people.

As Chair of the board of Cumbria Community Foundation, I am pleased to introduce our accounts for another successful year. It is a great privilege to chair an organisation that has responsibility for directing the charitable gifts of so many kind and generous people and organisations. On behalf of all Trustees, I record my thanks and warmest appreciation for their support. In this challenging world in which we live, all the volunteers and staff at Cumbria Community Foundation remain committed to working hard to support the very many wonderful charities throughout our county who are really making a difference for our fellow Cumbrians living in challenging and difficult circumstances.

The Trustees (who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act) present their annual report together with the audited financial statements of Cumbria Community Foundation (the company and the group) for the year ended 31 March 2022. The Trustees confirm that the Annual report and financial statements of the company and the group comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the company and the group's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

Cumbria Community Foundation exists to tackle poverty and disadvantage and strengthen Cumbria's communities by connecting fund holders and people who give money with inspirational, life changing projects.

In particular, the Foundation supports people experiencing disadvantage. 'Disadvantage' is not defined but it is assumed that, due to financial hardship, rural isolation, disability or other limiting factor, those experiencing disadvantage do not have access to goods or services which most of the population would regard as the norm for a reasonable standard of living.

#### **Charitable Objectives**

The Foundation has wide charitable objects which are set out in its Memorandum of Association.

During the year Trustees updated the Memorandum and Articles of Association, these changes were passed as a special resolution by the members at the AGM on the 1<sup>st</sup> March 2022. A summary of the changes passed were as follows:

- The general Charitable objects were changed to exclude wording needed to obtain Landfill tax grants and to widen the area of benefit.
- Cumbria has been defined 'as is' in anticipation of the two unitary authorities changes.
- Allow virtual and hybrid meetings of the membership at the AGM. This also allows
  Trustee meetings to be held electronically and notices to be given electronically.
- Presidents, Vice Presidents, Patrons and Associate Trustees appointments in the future to be made by Trustees either for a term of years or for life.
- A provision requiring members to sign a written consent to be a member has been taken out
- Membership subscriptions are no longer fixed by the AGM but by Trustees.

The Memorandum of Association allows the Foundation to:

- (A) Support and promote any charitable purposes for the relief of poverty, the advancement of education (including training for employment or work), the advancement of religion, the protection or promotion of social wellbeing, good health both physical and mental, and for charitable purposes in connection with the provision, maintenance and improvement of a public park or other public or social amenity and/ or the erection, maintenance, repair, or restoration of a building or other structure for the benefit of communities, organisations, groups and/ or individuals:
- (i) in the County of Cumbria and its immediate neighbourhood (the 'Principal Area of Benefit'); and/ or

- (ii) outside the Principal Area of Benefit provided that the support and/ or promotion of such communities, organisations, groups and/ or individuals is ancillary to the support of charitable purposes benefitting the Principal Area of Benefit; and/ or
- (iii) outside the Principal Area of Benefit where grants or other payments are made from a fund held by the Company where such fund is also to benefit charitable purposes in the Principal Area of Benefit, and/ or
- (B) any other charitable purpose for the benefit of A (i) and/ or (ii) and/ or (iii) above.

Grants of £129,591 were awarded for activities undertaken outside the County in 2021/22. £109,167 of these grants were in relation to the Beck Burn Windfarm Fund, the windfarm is based in North East Cumbria, but the community fund includes parts of South Scotland.

#### **Activities for public benefit**

The Trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Foundation's aims and objectives and in planning future activities and setting the grant making policy for the year.

The Foundation works to fulfil its objects by:

- Using its resources to make grants to voluntary groups and individuals that match community needs
- Promoting giving to enable the growth of professionally managed endowment funds to make grants in the future
- Being ready to respond quickly to new and emerging need
- Being the route of choice for both individuals and public bodies wishing to give charitable funds for the benefit of the County

Most of the Foundation's activity falls into two areas: grant making and promoting effective charitable giving. In addition to making grants from its own funds, it manages and administers grants programmes on behalf of individual donors, companies, trusts, and central and local government.

#### **Grant making policy**

The Foundation continued to measure grant making against the grant making priorities. These are as follows:

- Improving the lives of disadvantaged children and families
- Improving the life skills, education, employability and enterprise of disadvantaged people
- Supporting vulnerable older people
- Improving the health and well-being of people
- Strengthening and supporting fragile communities
- Enabling people to access arts, sports, culture, heritage and the environment.

The priorities have required our Grants and Donor Services Team to look to focus resources on the need to be more strategic in our grant making. More multiyear grants to give stability to key organisations have again been awarded in the past year.

The Foundation will continue to work with a range of donors whether or not donors intended objects meet the thematic priorities as long as Trustees believe donor's objectives are beneficial to Cumbria, address a genuine need and fall within the Foundation's objectives. Ideally donor's wishes will match key areas of need.

#### Grant making practice: groups

Over ninety seven percent of the Foundation's grant making (by value) in the year was to voluntary and community groups. To ensure the Foundation fulfils its objectives and to maximise public benefit, applicant groups must show that they fulfil charitable objects (though they need not be registered charities).

Each grant application is assessed against standard criteria including evidence of need, community use and involvement, organisational ability to manage and fit to local strategies. Environmental sustainability, partnership working and impact will also be considered. Each applicant group must provide its constitution, accounts, bank statements, safeguarding policies and where applicable other policies.

Protecting people and safeguarding responsibilities is a fundamental part of operating a charity for public benefit and a priority for the Foundation. All group grant applicants are required to demonstrate that they are committed to safeguarding and have adequate policies and procedures in place. For organisations working directly with children or adults at risk, we also require there to be an appropriately trained designated safeguarding lead, evidence of regular safeguarding training for all staff and volunteers, and for there to be appropriate checks on trustees, staff and volunteers in eligible roles.

The Foundation's conflict of interest policy requires all Trustees, staff and grants committee members and other volunteers to declare any personal interest in any grant application or other matter presented, and to withdraw from decisions where any conflict of interest may arise.

#### Grant making practice: individuals

The Foundation makes grants to individuals across a wide range of activities from relief of hardship to promotion of education and training. It also holds funds which promote artistic, cultural and sporting excellence. The Foundation also has devolved grant making arrangements to some of the Age UK organisations in the county, who make hardship grants to older people using funds we provide from our Winter Warmth Fund.

#### **Grant monitoring**

As part of Cumbria Community Foundation's ongoing monitoring of its Grants Programmes, we require all grant recipients to complete an end-of-grant report which summarises the outcomes of their project, the difference it made to the beneficiaries, and includes evidence of spend (financial monitoring). Monitoring and evaluating the projects we have funded is important not just to us and our donors, but also to organisations for planning and future funding applications.

When the recipient is notified of an award, they are sent a link to their online end-of-grant report form, which is populated with information and budget figures from their application. The recipient can see in advance the information they will be required to report on and ensure they collect the appropriate data for the duration of their project. The recipient will be required to complete the end-of-grant report within two months after their funding spent date (or longer if they need more time to collect adequate feedback about the project).

If the recipient has not spent the funding according to the terms and conditions of the Foundation, or has an underspend on the project, the recipient will usually be required to return funds.

#### **Promoting giving**

A central tenet of the community foundation movement is to encourage philanthropy by making people aware of community need and by offering grant making services tailored to donors' requirements.

The Foundation Trustees have made the strategic decision to dedicate resources to development work to secure grant making funds in pursuit of fulfilling our aims.

Cumbria Community Foundation allows donors to make a difference by connecting them with groups and causes that reflect their interests and which address priority community need. Timescales are flexible: donations to endowment funds generate a return for grant making in perpetuity, while flow-through grant making funds will normally be spent within 12 months.

The Foundation wishes to develop the widest possible base of donors in support of its work. To support this objective a membership scheme exists for individuals, families, businesses and voluntary groups. Members receive regular information about the work of the Foundation and can nominate and elect Trustees. In addition, the Foundation supports an events programme which provides a means of promoting the work of the Foundation, the needs in the County and the generation of additional income.

The Foundation is registered with and pays the voluntary levy to the Fundraising Regulator, we have adhered to the code of fundraising practice throughout the year. We do not use professional fundraisers or commercial participators to raise income for the Foundation. No complaints were received regarding fundraising activities. Fundraising is carried out by the staff of the Foundation with support from Trustees, committee members and supporters.

#### **HOW DID WE DO: ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE IN THE YEAR**

#### **Grant making performance**

The Foundation measures its performance by recording the number and value of grants by strategic aim.

As part of the grant monitoring mentioned above grant recipients report on how the grant was spent and the difference it has made to the lives of local people. Reports include specific outcomes as well as non-quantifiable benefits.

Grant making this year against last year is summarised below by each priority.

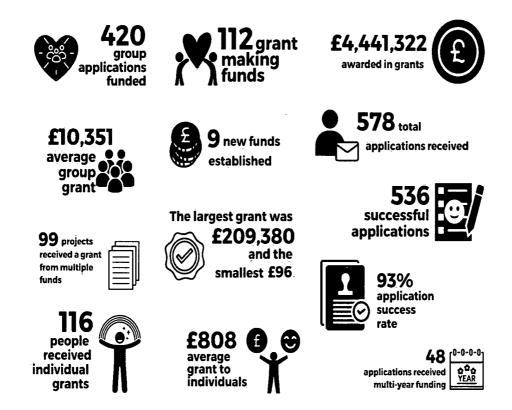
The number of grants awarded above differs to the grant making by fund table below as 99 (2021 - 85) grants were allocated to more than one fund. In some instances, this allows the Foundation to award the full project cost which it has not always been able to do in the past.

During the year the Foundation awarded 49 (2020 - 42) multiyear grant awards. This is something the grants team have been focusing on for a few years, as it allows organisations to be more financially sustainable by supporting an organisation for longer than one year.

Last year grant making under 'Improving the health and well-being of the people of Cumbria' includes grant making from the Cumbria Covid-19 Response Fund and the Pappagallino Flow Through Fund. The grants from the Cumbria Covid-19 Response Fund were much less this year and the Pappagallino Flow Through Fund ceased awarding grants at the end of last year. The increase in grant making under the rest of the aims was due to less applications under these aims last year due to the Covid pandemic.

The Foundation produced Cumbria Revealed in 2017 which explored the social problems in the County. Later we were commissioned to write West Cumbria Opportunities and Challenges report which looks at the opportunities and challenges facing communities in West Cumbria. During this year the Foundation worked on producing a report about social issues in Furness along with the good work that is being done in the area. This report was finished in July 2021. All of these reports provide evidence for our grant making strategy, help us engage with philanthropists, and introduce them to the issues facing their communities and the organisations tackling these.

On the next page is an infographic which gives the headline statistics of our grant making in the past year. The figures include grants awarded in the year for Trusts where we assess grants but the decision making rests with the relevant Trusts Trustees.



#### **Transforming West Cumbria**

Funded by Sellafield Ltd and the Nuclear Decommissioning Authority, Transforming West Cumbria (TWC) is a key strand of Sellafield Ltd's social impact programme: SiX (Social impact, multiplied) and addresses community needs identified in the Foundation's West Cumbria Opportunities and Challenges Report 2019. Now in its second year of delivery TWC has invested in building the capabilities and resilience of critical third sector organisations, inspiring social enterprise, encouraging youth social activism, supporting family wellbeing, and addressing financial hardship. Delivered in partnership, project partners include: Social Enterprise Acumen, Cumbria CVS, Cumbria County Council, Cumbria Social Enterprise Partnership, Cybermoor Services, University of Cumbria, Citizens Advice Allerdale and Citizens Advice Copeland. TWC also benefits from the knowledge and experience of key stakeholders who volunteer their support through the Bedrock/Spark Steering Group, Family Wellbeing Steering Group, #CanDo Youth Panel and West Cumbria Grants Committee.

Additional investment through the SiX social investment programme in 2021/22 enabled the codesign and delivery of the West Cumbria Mental Health Partnership programme. Forming part of TWC, this programme provides comprehensive mental health and wellbeing support to people affected by the pandemic and builds a more sustainable and collaborative third sector mental health provision for the future. Providing support for both adults and children, delivery is informed by key stakeholders, including the NHS, through the steering group. Vitally communication around low level mental health support provision in West Cumbria has been improved by the establishment of a new website and a regular wider partnership meeting that brings together both funded and non-funded third sector groups, statutory bodies, and health sector organisations.

#### **Grant making impact**

Like most funders, we are keen to find out what difference our grant funds make and how it improves things for people and communities. All grant recipients are required to submit monitoring information on their projects as detailed on page 7, this information is analysed, and details included in our annual report.

The data below highlights the value and demonstrable difference that philanthropy is making to our County and local communities within Cumbria.

The information is based on completed end of grant reports from funded groups and charities in 2020-21. The full statistics on which this information is based are available on our website.



#### **Promoting Giving: general**

The Foundation has continued its development work in the year. A programme of online events has been held to raise awareness of the opportunities to give through the Foundation and to maintain and develop relationships with current and potential donors.

As the country emerged from lockdown more face to face meetings and networking opportunities were able to take place. This resulted in the Development Team meeting and engaging with 25 new potential donors.

#### **Promoting Giving: building endowment funds**

Development work is partly directed to securing new donations to the Foundations endowment. During the year one new endowment fund was setup with several top-ups to existing funds. The Foundation received donations of £584,579 to endowment funds during the year.

Building endowment funds will enable the Foundation to continue its support to Cumbria's communities in the years to come.

#### **Promoting Giving: flow through funds**

Development work is also directed towards securing new flow through funds to manage for fundholders. The number of flow through funds we managed has increased again this year with nine new funds setup. During the year we received funds of over £1.2M from the NHS North Cumbria Clinical Commissioning Group, over £900K of this relates to grant making for next year. We received funding of £100K from Cumbria County Council for the Community Resilience Fund and £350K for the Third Party Organisation Fund.

During the year we received funding from Sellafield Limited of over £522,500 to extend the Bedrock part of the 'Transforming West Cumbria' programme. The private donor to the Young Persons Opportunity Fund has donated to the fund for a second year, with the Cumbria Communication Project and Cumberland Building Society Community Fund also continuing for a further year.

#### **Promoting Giving: membership and general fundraising**

#### **Annual General Meeting and Celebration Event**

The annual celebration event and the AGM were both held in person following both being held online last year. The annual celebration event was held on the 4<sup>th</sup> November 2021 at Castle Green in Kendal. The event was titled 'Stronger Together' with Des Moore (Chief Executive Officer of Cumberland Building Society) as guest speaker. 220 people attended, which allowed us to introduce fund holders and potential donors to a range of the issues in the County and introduce them to some of the groups that we support.

The AGM was held on the  $1^{st}$  March 2022. As well as the usual formalities we had presentations from various speakers as follows:

- Jenny Benson gave an overview of the Foundations grant making, programmes and partnerships.
- A short film presented the positive impact the Better Tomorrows Fund will have across the County.
- Tamsin Beattie from Groundwork North East who lead the work on the West Cumbria adult mental health partnership.
- Peter Rooney from North Cumbria Clinical Commissioning Group provided an overview of a new approach and the creation of the NHS Discharge Fund.

#### Membership

Membership numbers and income increased this year and was higher than pre-Covid figures following the payment holiday which we offered to all our corporate members the previous year.

Considering the long-term impact of the Covid-19 pandemic, we are fortunate that so many businesses continue to support our work. All bar one of those who took a holiday have now restarted their membership. We continue to attract new corporate and challenge members with 5 new members in October alone, with corporate membership standing at 122 for 2021/22.

#### **Cumbria Club**

The Cumbria Club is an inclusive and informal association of people who have a passion for Cumbria and the Lake District. Membership is open to individuals and families who live outside Cumbria and those who live in Cumbria and want to welcome others into our community. Membership of the Cumbria Club presents an opportunity to engage with others with an interest in the many dimensions of Cumbria, including our landscape, communities, culture, environment, economy and history.

During the year, 3 Cumbria Club events were held (both online and face to face).

"World Class Business in Cumbria" – a panel discussion featuring Cumbrian Business leaders.

A private viewing of the Norman Cornish exhibition at Castlegate Gallery.

"Carbon Zero in Cumbria and the Lake District" held at Rheged. 280 people attended in person and online.

#### Responding to emerging need: Cumbria Winter Warmth Fund

Up to 300 people die in a Cumbrian winter because of medical conditions linked to the inability to stay properly fed and warm. This is why the Foundation has responded by creating the Winter Warmth Fund, which ran for the twelfth time this year. This year we again held our own match challenge initiative, which was supported by the John Laing Charitable Trust, WCF (Brampton) Ltd, The Hadfield Trust, the Roselands Trust, the Brian and Ann Clark Fund, the Harvey Family Fund, the Johnson Fund and a private donor. This generated a match funding pot of £74,450, which we asked the public to match between the 15<sup>th</sup> November and the 13<sup>th</sup> December and was fully secured. In total, the appeal raised £222,819 from private, third sector and corporate donors. The Foundation awarded grants of £222,200 to four of the Age UK organisations in the County and Copeland Age and Advice Service who have helped 1,751 people in 1,319 households. Remaining funds are carried forward and used at the start of the following years appeal.

#### **Profile and publicity**

The 48-page 'Furness: Opportunities and Challenges 2021' report was issued in July and acts as a guide to what needs to be done to improve lives, and how to help attract funding to the area. More than 100 hours of research went into its production, which looks at everything from health and unemployment to education and housing, and speaks to people in the public, private and third sectors, from local government to film making to drug treatment.

Spearheaded by CCF Chairman, Better Tomorrows, was launched in August. It is a three-year programme encouraging people within Cumbria to become accredited in youth work and will provide accredited training to more than a hundred people as well as offer grants of up to £25,000 a year to community organisations setting up or providing new youth work opportunities for local people. As well as several press releases, a video was produced showcasing the programme following the first grants awarded, alongside quarterly newsletters issued to supporters.

Several new funds were established and supported with publicity, including the Young Person's Opportunity Fund, Made By Sport #ClubsInCrisis Fund, NHS Psychological Support Fund, NHS Hospital Discharge Fund, and Third Party Organisation Fund. The Welcome Fund was relaunched following an increase in asylum seekers and Ukrainian refugees into the County. The new Cumbria Home from Home Fund was launched to encourage holiday and second homeowners in the Lake District and Cumbria to give back and make a difference to local communities. A video was produced, newsletters in collaboration with Cumbria Tourism and material including pop ups and leaflets were created.

Transforming West Cumbria publicity included the launch of the West Cumbria Mental Health Partnership, worth over £1m over the next three years, which provides low-level mental health support. Publicity support included press releases, a new website and supporting the production of videos, commissioned by Sellafield Ltd. Further publicity around the Transforming West Cumbria programme included promoting the Bedrock Awards and the #CanDo elements of the Fund.

The website has been updated to include online membership subscriptions and a dedicated section on Community Needs, the Cumbria Club and the Cumbria Home From Home Fund.

Marketing material was created to support events including the Annual Celebration Dinner and several Cumbria Club 'Voices' events, such as the online 'Aspiration and Excellence: World class business in Cumbria' and 'COP26' hybrid event.

There was good coverage of CCF in the press throughout the year -221 news articles were featured in print and online media, as well as 38 TV and radio interview features.

The team also produced the 28-page Annual Report, which incorporated our impact statistics, almost 90 fund reports were issued to fundholders, alongside content for the monthly In Cumbria magazine, a monthly newsletter and a bi-annual member-only newsletter.

#### **OUR PLANS FOR THE FUTURE**

Trustees and staff were involved in the creation of a new 5-year business plan from April 2017 which confirmed twin organisational objectives of:

- · High quality grant making, and
- Promotion of philanthropy

A review and compilation of current statistics and information on need in the county was completed to inform the business plan. The findings have confirmed the significant challenges people of all ages face in our county and the very real need for the grants made by the Foundation.

Taking into consideration the level of need in the county and our objective of promoting philanthropy we set targets to double the Foundation's endowment to £30M and to double annual grant making by 2022. Trustees monitor performance against targets on a quarterly basis and review plans annually.

The 5-year business plan was due to come to an end as at 31 March 2022. Trustees have agreed to extend the current business plan for one more year while making preparations to implement a new business plan from April 2023

#### The following key performance indicators have been set for 2022/23:

- Secure a minimum of £2M in new endowment funds in the next 12 months.
- Secure an additional £670,000 in new flow through across various funds.
- Raise a minimum of £200,000 in donations for the Winter Warmth appeal.
- Target to engage with 40 prospects.
- · Contact at least 80% of active fundholders.
- Secure 20 new or resurrected corporate members.
- New 5-year business plan to start from April 2023, this will include a review of the grant strategy and high level of stakeholder engagement.
- Review of messaging and marketing with a new communications plan to be drawn up within the business plan cycle.
- Cross organisational equity, diversity and inclusion review.

Under each of these key performance indicators we have identified SMART (Specific, measurable, achievable, relevant and time bound) actions. Progress is then monitored against these SMART actions quarterly.

#### **HOW WE WORK: STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT**

The Foundation is constituted as a charitable company limited by guarantee. It was incorporated on 15 February 1999 and registered as a charity on 15 April 1999. It commenced its operations in May 1999.

The Foundation has seven Charities linked to it; these are as follows:
Cumbria Community Foundation Trust
Cumberland Educational Foundation
Dowker Bindloss Charity
Edmond Castle Educational Trust
The Beverley Charitable Trust
The Mary Grave Trust
The Westmorland Arts Trust

The accounts for these Charities are consolidated into these accounts.

In March 2012, the Cumbria Special Events Company was created to take responsibility for fundraising events. This company was made dormant at the end of March 2015 and has remained dormant during this financial year.

#### **Trustees**

All Trustees give their time freely. As disclosed in note 11 of the accounts, £nil (2021 - £nil) of expenses were either paid to the Foundation's Trustees or paid directly to a third party for mileage and expenses incurred on behalf of the Foundation.

The Memorandum and Articles of Association provide that the maximum number of Trustees is twenty three.

Trustees are nominated and elected by members as follows: -

- Group A Not more than three Trustees from any organisation, not being eligible under Group B, with charitable objectives working wholly or partly in Cumbria;
- Group B Not more than three Trustees who are any person, body of persons, grant-making charitable trust, Company, partnership or other organisation, not being eligible under Group D, who subscribe money to the Company or who contribute other assets or services judged by the Trustees to be beneficial to the Company;
- Group C Not more than three Trustees to be appointed annually from any local authority or other public body operating wholly or partly in Cumbria, of whom one appointee shall be a senior officer nominated by Cumbria County Council;
- Group D Not more than five Trustees from any organisation with a view to profit which subscribes money to the Company or contributes assets or services thought by the Trustees to be beneficial to the Company.

In addition, the Trustees at any time may co-opt not more than nine persons having special expertise valuable to the work of the Trustees paying due regard to ensuring that so far as possible the Trustees reflect the county-wide remit of the Company.

One third of Trustees in each of the Groups A, B, and D and all those Trustees in Group C or who have been co-opted retire at the Annual General Meeting. Retiring Trustees are eligible for reelection, re-nomination or re-co-option provided that they have served no longer than nine years, with the exception of a retiring Chair. A Trustee who has served for nine years may be reelected, re-nominated or re-co-opted after an interval of at least one year.

The Chair and Officers are appointed by the Trustees from among their number. The Board meets quarterly.

Committees have been set up for advice and support as follows:

- Management and Finance committee
- Investment committee
- Main Grants committee
- West Cumbria Grants committee
- Furness Grants committee
- Personnel committee
- Development committee
- Cumbria club

Each committee has its own terms of reference. All the committees may include members who are not Trustees but must include at least one Trustee.

Task and finish groups can also be setup for particular tasks or issues.

On appointment each Trustee is given an induction pack which includes relevant documents, such as the business plan, and a copy of Charity Commission leaflet CC3, 'The Essential Trustee'. Before agreeing to become a Trustee, potential Trustees meet with the Chair and/or Chief Executive, who outline the commitment which the Foundation expects of its Trustees. The Chair and Chief Executive will also discuss with each Trustee the contribution which they may make to the Foundation. New Trustees are invited to an induction tour of the office. Training needs are assessed, and training sessions are held for individuals or for the Board as required.

#### **Management and staffing**

Cumbria Community Foundation Trustees have delegated day to day management of the organisation to the Chief Executive who reports on the performance against the strategic aims agreed in the business plan. The Chief Executive has responsibility for planning and developing services and strategies for the Foundation within guidelines set by the Trustees. He was supported by the Senior Management Team of the Finance Director, Director of Programmes and Partnerships and the Head of Development during the year.

The Finance Director reports via the Management and Finance committee on the financial position and performance against budget. Full management accounts are received quarterly by the Management and Finance committee and are received as a standing item by the Board.

The pay of the charity's staff is reviewed annually by the personnel committee which comprises the Chief Executive and Trustees who have been elected members of the committee. There is normally an annual increase to cover any increases in the cost of living. Remuneration is bench marked against grant-making charities of a similar size and activity to ensure that the remuneration set is fair and not out of line with that generally paid for similar roles.

Due to the Covid-19 pandemic the Foundations staff started working from home from mid-March 2020, returning to the office under a hybrid working model in September 2021. There has been minimal impact to the Foundations operations with grants panels and governance meetings continuing to be held by video conferencing online during the year. Some meetings have started to be held in person since the year end, although it is expected that most meetings will continue to be held online.

#### Risk Management

The Foundation's risk register is normally reviewed and updated each year. The Trustees monitor the work and internal control procedures of the Foundation and ensure that the relevant policies and practices are in place to manage risks. These include:

- Employing professional staff with appropriate skills and training.
- Business planning, which includes consultation with key stakeholders, long term strategic
  planning regarding fundraising, grant distribution policy, and staffing. Trustees monitor
  performance against business plan targets.
- The Management and Finance Committee receive quarterly management accounts and written reports on all aspects of the organisation's activities.
- Grant making procedures include monitoring of all grant awards, spot checks on awards and grant monitoring visits by staff and trustees.
- Members of the Investment sub-committee receive quarterly reports on investment performance from Investment Managers.
- The Chair and Chief Executive meet regularly to discuss and review progress.

In addition to the annual audit, the Foundation's grants programmes may be independently audited.

#### **HOW DID WE AFFORD IT: FINANCIAL REVIEW**

Cumbria Community Foundation is both a fundraiser and a grant maker. Because grant making is dependent on fundraising and development, Trustees need to maintain appropriate capacity in fund development activities.

#### **Funding sources**

The administrative costs of grant making are covered by donors and trusts, while fundraising and development work is funded by membership fees, grant income and other unrestricted revenue income.

#### Sponsorship and gifts in kind

The Foundation also receives valued support through sponsorship and in-kind donations.

Dodd and Co, Accountants, continue to provide payroll services.

The total value of gifts in kind in the year was £2,000. The Trustees would like to take the opportunity to thank Dodd and Co for their continuing support.

#### **Membership**

Membership allows the people of Cumbria to have a role within the Foundation and provides a valuable source of revenue income.

There are three categories of membership of the Foundation: Individual, Corporate, and Voluntary Sector. Members of the Foundation pay an annual subscription and have full voting rights.

#### **Reserves**

Our commitment to building an endowment fund to benefit Cumbria in the future is a primary tenet of the Community Foundation and is set out in our mission statement (which is stated on Page 5 under Objectives and Activities)

Funds designated as endowments are largely unrestricted and so the Trustees have the power to allocate them for ongoing support of the Foundation in the short term should circumstances demand. However, these funds are an expression of long term commitment to the people of Cumbria and they are held as endowed investments to generate a return for grant making. The Trustees retain an unrestricted reserve for the Foundation's contribution to its development programme but also for unexpected events.

At the year end, excluding tangible fixed assets, total unrestricted and designated reserves were £5,828,677 (This is made up of the unrestricted reserve of £536,507 below, the designated endowment funds in note 33 of £5,255,256 and the designated grant fund in note 27 of £19,463). The £536,507 unrestricted reserve is the unrestricted reserves in note 19 of £553,958 less tangible fixed assets in note 13 of £17,451.

The budgeted cost of the development programme over the next year is just under £200,000. The Trustees expect that this will be met from membership income, donations, in kind support, events and contributions from new funds brought in during the year, but recognise that this is not guaranteed and that this income may fall in the coming year. Unrestricted core funds may also be required to support the Foundation's own grant making.

The trustees have set a target of a minimum core reserve of £370,000 representing approximately 6 months' operational costs from next years budget (Not including investment management costs). This provides a buffer against the risk of falling membership income, and to secure development activities for the coming twelve months. Free unrestricted reserves currently stand at £536,507 (as stated above), which is above the minimum core reserve of £370,000. This is again due to a large increase in unrestricted reserves over the past 12 months.

#### **Investments**

The Trustees have absolute discretion in the investment of the funds of the Foundation, except for those holdings which are donated to the Foundation on condition that they are retained either in perpetuity or for a period of time.

The financial objective of the Foundation is to generate a stable and sustainable return on the investment of the assets to fund grant making and to support the operational costs of the organisation whilst maintaining the real value of assets.

The Foundation relies on the investment return to fund grant making. The key risk to the long term sustainability of the Foundation is inflation, and the assets should be invested to mitigate this risk over the long term.

The investment objective is to generate a total return of inflation, as measured by the Consumer Price Index (CPI), plus a minimum of 3.5% per annum over the medium to long term, after expenses. This is the Target Return.

To mitigate risk and to seek to secure the best financial return over time Trustees have adopted a 'total return' approach. This means investment return for all expendable endowments can be generated from income and capital gains. The Foundation aims to draw down a percentage of the value of the assets at the commencement of each financial year (inclusive of any cash then held by its investment managers). The amount of drawdown might vary from year to year

depending on grant making opportunities and past and projected investment returns (including capital appreciation and dividend income). The Investment Committee will agree the percentage draw down at no less than annual intervals, calculating performance over a rolling 5-year period.

Given the long term nature of the assets, the Trustees can tolerate short term volatility in the capital value of assets, as long as the Foundation is able to meet its grant making commitments through either income or liquid capital assets.

The delivery of sustainable long-term returns is a central requirement for our portfolio and we require our managers to assess and incorporate environmental, social and governance (ESG) risks in conjunction with the financial position of the Foundation's investments. We believe that this approach is in alignment with our broad charitable objectives.

Overall, on investment matters, the Trustees follow the guidance given in the Charity Commission publication CC14: Charities and Investment matters; A guide for Trustees.

Investment performance is monitored against agreed market benchmarks, and against the Target Return over the medium term, by which is meant, in normal market conditions, rolling 5 year periods. The Investment Policy Statement is available on request.

#### **LINKED CHARITIES**

#### **Cumbria Community Foundation Trust**

The Trust is an unincorporated Charity, charity number 1075120-1, which was established on the 10<sup>th</sup> May 1999. The Trust applies the income to support or promote any charitable purposes for the relief of poverty, the advancement of education (Including training for employment or work), the advancement of religion, the protection or promotion of good health both physical and mental, or any other charitable purpose for the benefit of the community of the County of Cumbria and its immediate neighbourhood.

It was agreed that donations from the Francis C Scott Trust and Barrow Council would be held in the Trust. As the Community Foundation is a limited company it is not permitted to hold funds which are permanently endowed. This is why the Margaret Taylor Memorial Trust fund, Elizabeth Fell Memorial Trust fund and Michael Hart Fund for Barrow in Furness are held by the Foundation Trust.

In line with donor wishes investment returns arising from the Barrow Development Trust Fund, the Francis C Scott Challenge Fund, Margaret Taylor Memorial Fund and Michael Hart Fund for Barrow in Furness are transferred as money for grants to the Cumbria Community Foundation charitable company. Income from the Elizabeth Fell Memorial Trust Grassroots Fund is paid out in grants through the Cumbria Community Foundation Trust.

An investment return of £7,086 from the Barrow Development Trust Fund and £2,593 from the Michael Hart Fund for Barrow in Furness were transferred to the Barrow Community Trust Fund of the charitable company during the year. Also, an investment return of £16,472 from the Francis C Scott Trust Fund and £2,612 from the Margaret Taylor Memorial Trust were transferred to the Cumbria Grants Fund of the charitable company during the year. The Elizabeth Fell Memorial Trust Grassroots Fund awarded 1 grant totalling £1,000 during the year.

The Trustee confirms that it has referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Trusts aims and objectives and in setting the grant making policy for the year.

As at 31 March 2022 the Trust had restricted funds of £980,700 (this includes an endowment of £977,128).

#### **Cumberland Educational Foundation**

The Foundation was appointed Trustee of the Cumberland Educational Foundation, charity number 1075120-2, under a scheme approved by the Charity Commission on 20<sup>th</sup> December 2001. The objectives of the Trust are to promote the education (including social and physical training) of persons under the age of 25 who are or whose parents are resident in the area of the former county of Cumberland and who are in need of financial assistance.

These objects fall within those of the Foundation both geographically and, as they relate to children and young people, to the furtherance of education and relief of poverty.

The Foundation achieves its objects and provides public benefit by making grants to disadvantaged young people and to local charities working with disadvantaged young people in the former county of Cumberland. During the year, the Foundation awarded 8 grants totalling £52,750.

On the 1<sup>st</sup> July 2019, the Trustees passed a resolution to apply the Charities (Total Return) Regulations 2013 to the permanent endowment, more detail can be found in note 36 to the accounts.

The Trustee confirms that it has referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Foundations aims and objectives and in setting the grant making policy for the year.

As at 31 March 2022 the Foundation had restricted funds of £1,201,596 (This includes a permanent endowment of £1,136,345).

#### **Dowker Bindloss Charity**

The Dowker Bindloss Charity, charity number 1075120-5, was formed in 1987 from the merger of two long-established charities: Miss Dowker's Spinsters Hospital established in 1831 and the will of Agnes Sarah Bindloss set up in 1895. The objects of the charity are to address disadvantage in Kendal. Trusteeship of the charity was transferred from Kendal Town Council to Cumbria Community Foundation in April 2012.

The Charity achieves its objects and provides public benefit by making grants to voluntary and community organisations supporting the residents of Kendal. During the year the Charity awarded 1 grant totalling £686.

The Trustee confirms that it has referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Charity's aims and objectives and in setting the grant making policy for the year.

As at 31 March 2022 the Charity had restricted funds of £28,474 (this includes a permanent endowment of £27,889).

#### **Edmond Castle Educational Trust**

The Foundation was appointed as sole corporate trustee of the Edmond Castle Educational Trust, charity number 1075120-4, on 4th May 2012.

The Trust achieves its object by making grants (a) in furtherance of the education and training of (1) any child or young person who is or who at any time has been in the care of or provided with accommodation by or under the supervision of the County Council (2) any child or young person in need within the meaning of section 17 (10)of the children act 1989 (3) any child or young

person resident in the area of the county of Cumbria (4) in payment to any charitable or voluntary organisation whose objects include education and training of children or young persons.

The Trust achieves its objects and provides public benefit by making grants to individuals and charitable organisations. During the year, the Trust awarded 10 grants totalling £10,649.

The Trustee confirms that it has referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Trusts aims and objectives and in setting the grant making policy for the year.

As at 31 March 2022 the Trust had unrestricted funds of £350,669 (this includes an expendable endowment of £338,798).

#### **The Beverley Charitable Trust**

The Foundation was appointed as sole corporate trustee of the Beverley Charitable Trust, charity number 1075120-8, on 8<sup>th</sup> March 2018. The objects of the Trust are to provide assistance to Charitable organisations or to provide assistance and relief from poverty to individuals.

The Trust achieves its objects and provides public benefit by making grants to individuals and charitable organisations. During the year, the Trust awarded 8 grants totalling £20,779.

The Trustee confirms that it has referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Trusts aims and objectives and in setting the grant making policy for the year.

As at 31 March 2022 the Trust had unrestricted funds of £1,074,653 (this includes an expendable endowment of £1,039,443).

#### **The Mary Grave Trust**

The Foundation was appointed Trustee of the Mary Grave Trust, charity number 1075120-3, on 17 February 2009. The object of the Trust is the advancement of education by the provision of scholarships grants and maintenance allowances to persons between the ages of 11 and 21 born in the former county of Cumberland (excluding those born in, and whose mother was a resident of, the City of Carlisle).

The Trust deed sets out the requirements for eligibility for support. It is constrained to support young people

- between the ages of 11 and 21, and
- who were born in the old County of Cumberland area; excluding those born in and whose mother was a resident of the City of Carlisle as defined prior to April 1974 at the time of the birth, and
- who are attending or have attended for at least two years an establishment of secondary or further education in that area, and
- who are not employed by British Steel or National Coal Board, and
- who are in needy and deserving circumstances.

The Trust achieves its object and provides public benefit by making grants to support young people. During the year, the Trust awarded 8 grants totalling £8,350.

The Trustee confirms that it has referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Trusts aims and objectives and in setting the grant making policy for the year.

As at 31 March 2022 the Trust had restricted funds of £2,343,762 (this includes a permanent endowment of £2,210,800).

#### **The Westmorland Arts Trust**

The Foundation was appointed as corporate Trustee of the Westmorland Arts Trust, charity number 1075120-7, on 26<sup>th</sup> June 2012. The objects of the Trust are to promote the education of the public in the southern part of Cumbria, which formerly comprised the County of Westmorland, in music drama and the visual arts. In the furtherance of such object but not otherwise the Trust may award grants, outside funding for ordinary educational curricula of making performances and works of high artistic quality more readily accessible to children and adults.

The Trust achieves its object and provides public benefit by making grants to charitable organisations. During the year, the Trust awarded 9 grants totalling £19,375.

The Trustee confirms that it has referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Trusts aims and objectives and in setting the grant making policy for the year.

As at 31 March 2022 the Trust had unrestricted funds of £431,624 (this includes an expendable endowment of £402,772).

#### STATEMENT OF TRUSTEE'S RESPONSIBILITIES

The Trustees (who are also directors of Cumbria Community Foundation for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under company law the Trustees must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and the group and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable group for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- a) select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- b) observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- c) make judgements and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- d) prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable group will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the charitable company and the group's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable group and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and the group and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

#### **DISCLOSURE OF INFORMATION TO AUDITORS**

Each of the persons who are Trustees at the time when this Trustees' report is approved has confirmed that:

- a) so as far as that Trustee is aware, there is no relevant audit information of which the charitable group's auditors are unaware, and

### 1 Statement of Compliance

Cumbria Community Foundation is a limited company incorporated in England and Wales. The address of its registered office and principal place of business is Dovenby Hall, Dovenby, Cockermouth, Cumbria, CA13 0PN.

The principal activity of the company is to improve the quality of community life for the people of Cumbria. It does this by promoting philanthropy and managing grant making funds on behalf of individuals, families, businesses and organisations.

These financial statements have been presented in Pound Sterling as this is the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Company operates.

### 2 Accounting Policies

#### Basis of preparation of financial statements and consolidation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 102, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019) – (Charities SORP 2019 (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Cumbria Community Foundation meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

The Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) and Balance Sheet consolidate the financial statements of the Cumbria Special Event Company (This company is dormant).

No separate SOFA has been presented for the company alone as permitted by Section 408 of the Companies Act 2006.

### **Company status**

The company is a company limited by guarantee. The members of the company are the Trustees named on page 3. In event of the company being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the company.

### **Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the company and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the Trustees for particular purposes. The aim and use of each designated fund are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors which have been raised by the company for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Endowment funds are long term funds which are invested to generate returns for grant making.

Investment income, gains and losses are allocated to the appropriate fund.

#### **Income**

All income is recognised once the company has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received, and the amount of income can be measured reliably.

For legacies, entitlement is taken as the earlier of the date on which either: the company is aware that probate has been granted, the estate has been finalised and notification has been made by the executor(s) to the company that a distribution will be made, or when a distribution is received from the estate. Receipt of a legacy, in whole or in part, is only considered probable when the amount can be measured reliably, and the company has been notified of the executor's intention to make a distribution. Where legacies have been notified to the company, or the company is aware of the granting of probate, and the criteria for income recognition have not been met, then the legacy is treated as a contingent asset and disclosed if material.

Donated services or facilities are recognised when the company has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use of the company of the item is probable and that economic benefit can be measured reliably. In accordance with the Charities SORP 2015 (FRS 102), general volunteer time is not recognised.

On receipt, donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the company which is the amount the company would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised in expenditure in the period of receipt.

Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Income tax recoverable in relation to investment income is recognised at the time the investment income is receivable.

Income from grant making programmes is recognised either on receipt or when the conditions stated in the programmes fund agreement are met.

### **Expenditure**

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

All expenditure is accounted for on an accrual's basis. All expenses including support costs and governance costs are allocated to the applicable expenditure headings.

Overhead costs are either allocated directly to the cost of generating funds or are allocated towards grant making.

Grants payable are recognised as expenditure when either the recipient has a reasonable expectation that they will receive a grant and Trustees have agreed to pay the grant, or the recipient has a reasonable expectation that they will receive a grant and any condition attaching to the grant is outside the control of the Foundation.

#### **Tangible Fixed Assets and depreciation**

Assets used for charitable purposes, with an expected useful life exceeding one year, are capitalised in the balance sheet.

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives on the following bases:

Computer equipment

Written off over three years on a straight line basis

Office equipment

25% on a reducing balance basis

#### **Investments**

Fixed asset investments are a form of financial instrument and are initially recognised at their transaction cost and subsequently measured at fair value at the Balance sheet date, unless fair value cannot be measured reliably in which case it is measured at cost less impairment. Investment gains and losses, whether realised or unrealised, are combined and shown in the heading 'Gains/(losses) on investments' in the Statement of financial activities.

#### Subsidiary undertakings

Investments in subsidiaries are valued at cost less provision for impairment.

#### **Debtors**

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

#### Cash at Bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

#### Liabilities and provisions

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the Balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the company anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the provision is based on the present value of those amounts, discounted at the discount rate that reflects the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discount is recognised within interest payable and similar charges.

#### **Pensions**

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme and the pension charge represents the amounts payable by the company to the fund in respect of the year.

#### **Operating leases**

Rentals under operating leases are charged to the Statement of financial activities on a straight line basis over the lease term.

### Going concern (Covid-19)

On 11th March 2020 the World Health Organisation announced that COVID-19 was a global pandemic which led to enforced restrictions and business closures being introduced by the UK Government. During the year and at the time of approving the financial statements, the

Trustees have considered the ongoing impact on the operations and finances of the charity. New working methods were successfully implemented which have allowed all services to be continuously delivered to service users, with minimal financial impact. The Trustees therefore consider that the going concern basis is appropriate.

#### 3 Critical Accounting Judgements and Key Sources of Estimation Uncertainty

In applying the Company's accounting policies, the directors are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions in determining the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities. The directors' judgements, estimates and assumptions are based on the best and most reliable evidence available at the time when the decisions are made, and are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be applicable. Due to the inherent subjectivity involved in making such judgements, estimates and assumptions, the actual results and outcomes may differ.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised, if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods, if the revision affects both current and future periods.

The critical judgements that the directors have made in the process of applying the Company's accounting policies that have the most significant effect on the amounts recognised in the statutory financial statements are discussed below.

#### (i) Assessing indicators of impairment

In assessing whether there have been any indicators of impairment assets, the directors have considered both external and internal sources of information such as market conditions and experience of recovery. There have been no indicators of impairments identified during the current financial year.

### (ii) Revenue recognition in respect of legacies

The company has estimated the value of legacies by looking at valuations of estates provided by the executor. These valuations can include assets that have not been realised yet, any variations to the estimates could result in the over or under recognition of revenue.

### (iii) Determining residual values and useful economic lives of equipment

The company depreciates tangible assets over their estimated useful lives. The estimation of the useful lives of assets is based on historic performance as well as expectations about future use and therefore requires estimates and assumptions to be applied by management. The actual lives of these assets can vary depending on a variety of factors, including technological innovation, product life cycles and maintenance programmes.

Judgement is applied by management when determining the residual values for equipment. When determining the residual value management aim to assess the amount that the company would currently obtain for the disposal of the asset, if it were already of the condition expected at the end of its useful economic life. Where possible this is done with reference to external market prices.

The Barker Fund makes grants to organisations that empower young people, support the advancement of education, including young farmers who are aged under 25 and live in Cumbria.

The Barrow Community Trust makes grants for the benefit of the people of the Borough of Barrow-in-Furness.

The Beeby Family Fund makes grants to improve the lives of disadvantaged children and young people in Cumbria, giving priority to those living in Wigton and in the villages and rural communities around Wigton.

The Brian and Ann Clark Fund makes grants to relieve poverty, advance education and religion and promote good health both physical and mental.

The CN Group Fund makes grants to support groups helping people facing disadvantage.

The Crofton Trust Fund makes grants to promote the education of the public around agriculture, forestry and the countryside.

The Cumberland and Westmorland Herald Fund supports groups benefiting people living in the Herald's main circulation area.

The Cumbria Cultural Fund makes grants to promote excellence in the arts and cultural life of the county.

The Cumbria Health Improvement Fund is split into 16 sub funds. The funds are used to support health wellbeing or prevention projects, services, and equipment that are likely to deliver most impact in terms of improving the health and wellbeing of individuals in Cumbria.

The Cumbria Industries Amenities Fund makes grants to support disabled people in the Carlisle area.

The Cumbria Young People's Fund makes grants to benefit young people aged 11 to 22 who either live in Cumbria or who grew up in Cumbria.

The Dora Beeforth Memorial Fund makes grants to help disadvantaged young people participate in sport or foreign travel.

The Gibb Charitable Trust Fund makes grants for vocational training for students and trainees.

The Gurney Charitable Trust Fund will make grants to relieve poverty, advance education and religion and promote good health both physical and mental.

The High Sheriff's Crimebeat Fund supports projects for young people involved in anti-social behaviour or crime

The Hunter Davies Fund makes bursaries to support the writing and publication of non-fiction books with a Cumbrian setting. It will also support the arts, education, heritage and related charities directed by the donor.

The Janetta Topsy Laidlaw Fund assists older people in the Carlisle area to remain in their own homes.

The Johnson Fund is a donor advised fund which makes grants primarily in the North of Cumbria.

The Kipling Funds were established by a legacy. There are two grant making funds: one benefits children and young people and the other the elderly.

The Laidlaw fund for the environment supports projects which enhance appreciation of and knowledge of the natural environment. The fund also encourages involvement by people in protection and enhancement of the natural environment.

The Lawrence Fund supports the relief of poverty, the advancement of education and religion, the protection of good health both physical and mental and any other charitable purpose in Cumbria.

The Live the Dream Fund makes grants to young people in West Cumbria to enable access to study or vocational training.

The Nuvia Cumbria Fund (formerly Nukem Cumbria Fund) benefits people living near to the company site and project offices in Cumbria.

The Out of Eden Fund gives priority to projects that support the advancement of training and education for employment, the promotion of good health both physical and mental and the relief of poverty. In particular the fund will support communities in the 17 parishes in the Upper Eden community plan.

The Pappagallino Fund awards grants in South Lakeland and North Lancashire to improve health and wellbeing by addressing social and rural isolation, particularly in older people.

The Printers Inc Social Mobility Fund supports young people aged between 14 to 25 to improve their life skills, education, employability and enterprise.

The Robinson Family Fund supports groups and individuals throughout Cumbria, with a preference for West Cumbria and Barrow.

The Staff 10th Anniversary Fund is a donor advised fund set up by Foundation staff. It makes grants for charitable purposes.

The Swales Trust Fund aims to give support to students being educated for the farming, forestry and horticultural industry.

The Border Fund aims to increase individuals personal skills and independence. The fund supports individuals and communities in rural areas, support groups helping people build long-term skills and support disadvantagec individuals over 25 years old who wish to change career. The fund will give priority to those living in remote rural areas to the northeast of Carlisle including north and east Longtown through to Gilsland and Newbiggin.

The Violet Laidlaw Trust Fund supports people in the Carlisle area made homeless as a result of alcohol and drug addiction, domestic violence, family breakdown and mental ill health.

#### 23 Restricted Funds - Grassroots grants funds Group and Company

The Catherine Alexander Grassroots Grants Fund makes grants in Kendal and the surrounding district.

The Cumbria Young People's Grassroots Grants Fund makes grants to benefit young people aged 11 to 22 who either live in Cumbria or who grew up in Cumbria.

The Doosan Babcock Grassroots Grants Fund will make grants in accordance with the four current priorities for social investment in West Cumbria as listed in the Communities That Work plan.

The Evening Hill Grassroots Grants Fund favours groups in rural areas, and those working with the elderly or with young people.

The Fryer Grassroots Grants Fund makes grants to groups and organisations benefiting children and young people, with a preference for those supporting 16-18 year olds that are leaving care.

The Grassroots Grants Fund for Barrow makes grants within the Borough of Barrow-in-Furness.

The Grassroots Grants Fund for Cumbria makes grants throughout the county. It supports groups at a local level, enabling them to continue or expand their work including advocacy and service provision.

The Lamont Pridmore Grassroots Grants Fund will make grants in West Cumbria and in particular priority 1 in the Communities That Work plan: Life Chances / Aspiration.

The Moorhouse Trust Grassroots Grants Fund is donor advised and makes grants throughout the county.

The Quarry Hill Grassroots Grants Fund makes grants throughout Cumbria with a preference for North Allerdale.

The Shepley Group Grassroots Grants Fund makes grants throughout Cumbria, with a preference for areas of Shepley Group employees' residence.

The Stobbarts Ltd Grassroots Grants Fund makes grants in accordance with the four current priorities for social investment in West Cumbria as listed in the Communities That Work plan.

The Carr's Group Fund will make grants that promote life skills, support for rural and farming communities and support people in fulfilling their potential in Cumbria.

The CCL Secure Fund has been created to support the local community in the boroughs of Allerdale and Copeland in Cumbria.

The Cumberland Building Society Community Fund supports groups whose projects benefit the communities within the Cumberland Building Society's operating area.

The Cumbria Communication Project supports groups to improve the communication skills and language development with an emphasis on pre school aged babies and toddlers, especially those who may be seen most likely to begin formal education lagging behind their peers.

The Cumbria Victims Charitable Trust Fund will provide support to victims and those affected by crime and antisocial behaviour who reside in Cumbria, and to groups or organisations that support victims of crime throughout Cumbria.

The Cumbria Home from Home Fund provides grants to organisations in and around the lake district that improve the health, wellbeing and employment prospects of residents by addressing social and rural isolation.

The Cumbria Winter Warmth Fund makes grants to groups supporting vulnerable older people in the county.

The NHS Psychological Fund supports organisations providing bereavement services and mental health support to people coping with psychological distress, as a result of Covid in Allerdale, Carlisle, Copeland and Eden.

All of these funds are held by the Cumbria Community Foundation Trust which is a separate Charity to Cumbria Community Foundation. The Trust has been linked to the Foundation for reporting and accounting purposes.

The transfers of (£25,122) are made up as follows:

- (£6,111) contribution to the Foundations running costs.
- (£19,011) investment drawdown for grant making.

#### **Barrow Development Trust Fund**

These monies were endowed by Barrow Borough Council as a fundraising challenge to other donors and to generate income and support grant making in the Barrow area. The endowment was made in support of the Barrow Community Trust Appeal launched by Cumbria Community Foundation to build a capital base to generate income for the support of the community in the Barrow area.

If at any time the Barrow Community Trust ceases to operate, the initial capital endowment of £146,959 held in the Barrow Development Trust Fund is repayable to Barrow Borough Council.

Income from the Barrow Development Trust Fund is restricted and is allocated to the Barrow Community Trust Fund.

### **Elizabeth Fell Memorial Trust Grassroots Grants Fund**

The funds of the Elizabeth Fell Memorial Trust were transferred to the Community Foundation in March 2012. The transfer attracted match funding at 50% from the Office for Civil Society.

Income from the Fund will be used to make grants to small local voluntary and community groups and organisations. Grants will be for the benefit of the inhabitants of the parish of Kingstown in Carlisle and of the surrounding area. The fund is permanently endowed.

### The Francis C. Scott Charitable Trust Challenge Fund

This endowment fund was established as a challenge fund to generate matched funding for Cumbria Community Foundation. The fundraising targets have been achieved, and monies retained for the generation of income in support of the charitable objects of Cumbria Community Foundation are restricted as follows:-

If the Cumbria Community Foundation should for any reason cease to function or in the opinion of the Trustees of the Cumbria Community Foundation cease to be capable of carrying out its objects effectively the Trustee shall forthwith return to the Trustees for the time being of the Francis C. Scott Charitable Trust the sum of £250,000 or such lesser sum as shall for the time being represent the Fund.

Income from the Challenge Fund is allocated to the Cumbria Fund within the company.

#### **Margaret Taylor Memorial Fund**

The fund was established as a legacy from Margaret Elizabeth Taylor. The income accrued from the fund shall be applied to the aims and objectives of the charity and will be added to the Cumbria grants fund. The fund is permanently endowed.

#### **Michael Hart Fund for Barrow in Furness**

The fund was established as a legacy from a former Trustee Michael Hart. The income accrued from the fund shall be added to the Barrow Community Trust Grants Fund. The fund is permanent endowment.

#### 36 Cumberland Educational Foundation

On the 1st July 2019 the Trustees of Cumbria Community Foundation (Cumbria Community Foundation is the sole Trustee of the Cumberland Educational Foundation) signed a resolution to apply the Charities (Total return) Regulations 2013 to the permanent endowment funds held by the Cumberland Educational Foundation.

The resolution identified that the original value of the endowment for investment was £501,919 as at the 31st March 2019. The unapplied income and increase in value of the Trust since the date of the valuation together shall constitute the initial value of the Charity's unapplied total return, at the 31st March 2019 this was £526,565

The Trustees also recorded that it is their present intention to:

- Apply the maximum sum each year that can be applied from the unapplied income fund to the investment fund under the Regulations.
- Retain in the unapplied income fund the whole or greater part of the sum held so that the income of the Trust does not decrease.
- Apply to the income fund the whole or part of any additions to the unapplied income fund, so to enable
  the Trust to finance greater awards and grants in the future by spending income and at the Trustees
  discretion some of the capital appreciation, at the same time preserving the value of the endowment.

#### 43 Related party transactions

The Foundation is the corporate trustee of seven other charities, the Beverley Charitable Trust, the Cumberland Educational Foundation, the Mary Grave Trust, the Westmorland Arts Trust, the Edmond Castle Educational Trust, the Dowker Bindloss Charity and the Cumbria Community Foundation Trust.
