### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

### Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006

### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The number of trustees shall be not less than 3 and shall not exceed 15

The Council of the University of Leeds and the Vice-Chancellor of Leeds Metropolitan University may each appoint and remove by notice in writing one trustee who shall not be required to retire by rotation

The trustees may co-opt up to two members of staff from the Universities (but for the avoidance of doubt only one from each University) who are willing to be trustees and cause their co-option to cease. Such trustees shall not be required to retire by rotation

In addition to any trustees co-opted by the trustees, the trustees may co-opt up to two further trustees who are willing to be trustees, and may cause their co-option to cease, but such a co-opted trustee holds office only until the next AGM

WYEC shall appoint an individual to be trustee and a trustee so appointed will hold office of the chairman of the trustee's meeting and shall not be required to retire by rotation

Except for persons appointed per the above no person shall be appointed or reappointed a trustee at any general meeting or to fill a vacancy unless they are duly and properly nominated by a member of the Charity and has consented to act (or continue to act) as a trustee

The Charity may by ordinary resolution appoint a person who is willing to act to be trustee either to fill a vacancy or as an additional trustee and may also determine the rotation in which any additional trustees are to retire

No person may be appointed as trustee unless they have attained the age of 18 years or in circumstances such that, had they already been a trustee, they would have been disqualified from acting under the provisions of Article 7

### Trustees' responsibilities

The business of the Charity shall be managed by the trustees who may exercise all the powers of the Charity

The trustees shall expend the funds of the Charity in such a manner as they shall consider most beneficial for the achievement of the objects, invest in the name of the Charity such part of the funds as they may see fit, direct the sale or transposition of any such investment and expend the proceeds of any such sale in furtherance of the objects of the Charity

### Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error

### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

### Background

The Universities' Chaplaincy in Leeds Trust serves the staff and students across both the University of Leeds and Leeds Metropolitan University. This means supporting the spiritual welfare of 60,500 students and 12,400 staff of all faiths and none. The team works within the oversight of our parent body, the West Yorkshire Ecumenical Council (WYEC), a group of church bodies who have covenanted to work together to provide a chaplaincy service at these universities. Chaplains are from nine different Christian denominations and include both volunteers and stipendiary clergy.

### Day to day work

The key aspects of our day to day commitments are

### **ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE**

#### **Achievements**

The continued development of a proactive trustee body, providing support to the chaptaincy team in terms of financial oversight, personnel, organisation and mission, now complete with trustees from the wider university communities

We continue under the new service level agreements signed with both Universities for two more years Other significant activities around our day to day work include

- Crisis support which is widely appreciated by both Universities with chaplains helping support those affected by student death and trauma
- 2 An event held as part of an open Arts event entitled 'Light Night' attracted over 800 visitors to the Chaplaincy on one evening to explore ideas of creation 
  This followed on from the success of participation in 2009
- 3 The Chaplains regularly contribute to the work of University ethics committees and courses in which ethical issues are raised
- We were fortunate to attract funding to allow us to employ a full time replacement for the Student Outreach Worker position in 2010/11 (previously 0.6 full time employee)
- We have run many new events to reach out to more staff and students at the universities to make them aware of the service and provide support in an approachable atmosphere. There has been an ongoing number of outreach events to engage with individuals and build relationships with the staff and students at both universities. Testament to this is that we sent out over 200 Christmas cards to staff, students and supporters

### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

#### Financial review

The financial result for the year shows a loss of £5,168 through the year. This was planned as we are in need of reducing our reserves and seek to do so in line with our needs. Reserves are reduced to just over £56,500 which still represents a very healthy level in relation to the usual expenditure of around £80,000 The trust is therefore well placed to develop its chaplaincy work

### **FUTURE AIMS**

The future aims include

- Increasing chaplaincy provision through staff appointments and range of activities
- 2 Developing ways to increase spiritual awareness and opportunity amongst the staff and student
- Exploring the inter-faith context and collaboration 3
- Publicising the work of the Chaplaincy and reporting to our sponsors and supporters

# Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of The Universities' Chaplaincy in Leeds Trust

I report on the accounts for the year ended 31 August 2010 set out on pages five to twelve

### Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

### **Accounting convention**

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), the Companies Act 2006 and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities

### Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy

### Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

### Allocation and apportionment of costs

Support costs have been allocated based on the time spent on charitable activities and governance costs

### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life

Fixtures and fittings	-20% on reducing balance
Computer equipment	-33% on cost

#### Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities

### **Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes

### Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
